## GORDON RICHARDS RIDES RCAF To Display FIRST DERBY WINNER Its New Jet Plane

Pinza has won the 174th running of the Epsom Derby, there by Sir Gordon Richards his first victory in the classic in 28 attempts.

Queen Elizabeth's Aureole was second, and the French colt Pink Horse owned by Prince Said Tassoun was third in the field of 27 starters in the mile and one-half event. There were two late scratches, Kithyra and Criticism.

MONTREAL — A resident of St. Marguerite in Dorchester County, Quebec, Egide Labreque, won top money today of \$46,000 in the Army and Navy draw when Pinza romped home the

winner of the 174th running of the Epsom Derby. Ross Asseltine of Toronto held an Army and Navy ticket on Aureole and won \$27,000. John MacDonald of Fort William, Ontario, won \$17,000 with his ticket on Pink Horse. Three Canadian — all from Ontario — won top prize money today in the Irish Sweepstakes as Pinza romped home the winner in the 174th running of the Epsom Derby.

## New Navy Air Chief From Britain

Canada is calling in another Briton to run her naval aviation. An Ottawa announcement says that a Royal Navy Officer for 29 years—Commodore Walter Leslie Mortimer Brown — has been appointed Assistant Chief of Naval Staff for Air. That makes him boss of the navy's air arm . . . a job that has been entrusted to the British since it was formed in the post-war years because of lack of such experience among Canadian officers. He succeeds another Royal Navy officer—Commodore Lindsey Keighly-Peach — who is returning to Britain after two years in Ottawa.

Ten Canadian centres from Gander, Newfoundland, to Vancouver will soon see the RCAF's new comet jet transport. Air Force headquarters announces in Ottawa that the new jet will take off next Monday on a training flight to enable comet crews to work out landing and servicing procedures with RCAF and civilian airport officials.

Points to be visited are Toronto and Winnipeg on the same day—June 8th — Saskatoon and Edmonton on June 9th, Calgary and Vancouver on June 10th; Winnipeg and Ottawa on the 11th, Montreal on the 17th, and Moncton, New Brunswick, St. John's, Newfoundland, and Gander all on June 18th.

The British-built Comet is the first of two purchased by the R.C.A.F. to ease the transportation burden on Canadian-built North Stars . . . and to exercise the air defence system. The second comet is due to arrive in Canada on June 15th.

## IVAN WILSON'S VARIED COMMUNITY SERVICE RECORD RECALLED AT HIS RETIREMENT ON JUNE 1st

It would appear that Ivan A. Wilson, who recently retired from the service of the Canadian Pacific Express Company after 43 years' service, was always fated to belong to Kenora, from the day of his birth in old Rat Portage, September 29th, 1893, to his retirement a few days ago.

Even when transferred to Swift Current, Sask., and Moose Jaw, Sask., early on in his career, he was working under agents and assistant superintendents who had also served in Kenora, and his final appointment back to Kenora as agent, was of undoubted benefit to the old home town as his record of public service reveals.

Here was a citizen who demonstrated by act and deed that meritorious and efficient service to his company, could be matched in his own time by loyal and devoted service to his community, church and fraternal associations.

One finds it hard to enumerate all the organizations in which Mr. Wilson has played a leading

part, and continues to contribute to with unflagging zeal.

He is a past president and council member of the Kenora Board of Trade; past president of the Kenora Camp Owners' Association; twelve years a member of the Kenora General Hospital Board; past master, secretary and treasurer of the Masonic Order; for the past twenty years chairman of the Board of Managers of Knox United Church and still officiating in this capacity; past grant, secretary and treasurer of Gold Hill I.O.O.F. lodge; past president, Kenora Boy Scouts' Association; member of the Town Planning Board, and on numerous other committees down through the years.

Mr. Wilson was born here and educated in Kenora Public and High Schools. In the summer of 1910 he was employed for some months in the Kenora municipal offices, his first employment, and later that year, October 1st, 1910, to be exact, he joined the services of the Dominion Express Company (now the Canadian Pacific Express Co.). The agent at that time was R. S. Craddock.

In June, 1911, he was transferred to Swift Current, Sask., where he worked under Fred Love, agent, who had also entered the company's service at Rat Portage. From there he went to Moose Jaw in June, 1912, where he was working under C. N. Spooner, assistant superintendent, also a former agent at Kenora.

He returned to Kenora on August 15th, 1913, as agent, and on May 31st, completed forty years in that capacity, with a distinguished record of service to the company of 43 years.

## 6th C. of L. Drop May Be Last For Time

Thanks to lower food prices, living costs declined during April for the sixth month in a row. They took the edge off rising rents to snip another fifth of a point from the consumer price index.

But there are signs of price strength ahead. The wholesale industrial commodities yardstick reversed a 20-month drop to edge up in May. Prices of farm products also showed gains.

The April drop pushed the consumer price index to 114.4 . . . making for a total drop of 1.7 points—over a half-year period.

## Bread Price Rise Of 2c Per Loaf Likely Here Soon

WINNIPEG — Price of bread in Winnipeg is expected to jump one cent a loaf Monday following an announcement by city bakeries.

Officials of Canada Bread and Weston's Bakeries Limited, said yesterday that increased costs have led to the move. "A spokesman for Weston's said, "Everything that has to do with bread from labor to flour has increased."

Bryces Bakery Limited said they were "still considering" the price hike.

Ed. Note: There is every reason to expect that the price of bread locally will be increased shortly, the Miner and News learned Friday. The new international wheat agreement has been responsible for boosting the price of flour 50c a bag to local bakeries, and since the adoption of vitamin enriched flour, costs have risen another 8c. Whereas Winnipeg prices will rise 1c a loaf; the weight of the Manitoba loaf is 1 pound, against our 1½ pound loaf. It is therefore expected that the price increase in Kenora-Keewatin area will be 2 cents.

## Sunny Skies And Warmer Weather

Sunny week-end is in store for most of the regions.

The prairies have been clear all night and Northwestern Ontario will clear this evening.

Under sunny skies the temperatures will rise to between 60 and 70 in the afternoon. N. W. Ontario will be warmer than yesterday but the afternoon temperatures will still remain in the low fifties.

## SIOUX NARROWS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ASKS IMMEDIATE ACTION TO COMPLETE HYDRO LINE FROM KENORA - CROW LAKE

A strongly worded resolution asking immediate action and completion of Ontario Hydro services for Sioux Narrows was passed Wednesday evening at the regular meeting of the Sioux Narrows Chamber of Commerce.

It was reported that 39.1 miles of line would complete the service from the Kenora end of the road, and that some 175 prospective users had already signed for hydro service, with the probability of one hundred more when service work is proceeded with.

Sioux Narrows is growing by leaps and bounds, and many resort extensions are taking place, while a new modern motel, will be built in the near future, embodying all the latest conveniences of the modern motor court.

It was also reported that according to the understanding of some members, the necessary sum for to complete this extension had been placed in the estimates, and final approval of the project would give Sioux Narrows a much-needed electrical service; possibly this year, if the work was expedited.

It is understood that to provide service from the south end where the line is now within 11 miles of Sioux Narrows that a "booster" station would be required, but that the line could be continued from the Kenora end with no booster station required.

The Kenora Board of Trade

council passed a similar resolution urging immediate completion of the power line.

# U.S. JET BOMBER AVERAGED 566 M.P.H. TO SET NEW ATLANTIC RECORD

One of the American Stratoliner B-47 bombers has set a new U.S. to England flight record. The plane clipped six minutes off the previous mark set yesterday by two other B-47s. The record-breaking flight covered the 3,120 miles from Limestone air base in Maine to the Fairford air base in England in exactly five hours and a half. The average speed was 566 miles an hour.

At the same time it's announced that a British Canberra jet bomber set a new unofficial East-West Atlantic crossing record today. The Canberra flew the 2,260 miles from Wharfton, Lancashire, to Gander, Newfoundland, in four hours and 26 minutes. The average speed of the Canberra was 510 miles an hour.

## Lung Cancer May Be Detected Early

**MONTREAL.** — Lung cancer can often be detected by special type x-ray even before symptoms appear. Doctor Frederick Dubsky, Port William, Ontario, revealed this in Montreal today.

Doctor Dubsky was addressing delegates to the annual meeting of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association. He said ordinary x-ray fails to give a clear picture because it superimposes several sections of the chest onto the plate.

Planigrams, which are produced by focussing sharply on the exact section or plane of the chest

make it possible to understand in detail the normal structures of the chest and disease can be more readily recognized. This type of x-ray was developed in France 20 years ago but not widely used until recently.

Lung cancer, when suspected from the results of an ordinary x-ray, can be more closely checked by planigrams at an early stage of the disease.

It is essential that planigrams be taken before deciding on chest

surgery. Doctor G. E. Maddison, Saint John, New Brunswick, was chosen president-elect of Tuberculosis Association and will take over next year. Doctor G. J. Wherrett, Ottawa, is executive secretary.

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**CORONATION  
SIDELIGHTS**

LONDON. — There was very little glittering and very few thousand-dollar dresses at this certain Coronation party held in London last night. But it was classy enough ... and a lot of people showed up.

Nearly 600 bums and down-and-outs including a half-dozen women crowded Central Hall, Westminster — a stone's throw from Westminster Abbey. They donned paper crowns and coronets and had themselves a time.

There was food a-plenty, but no champagne, so the ragged, unshaven gathering toasted the queen in orangeade.

The party was given by middle-aged Miss Betty Baxter, a vicar's daughter, who made London's tramps her own special responsibility 20 years ago.

She became known as the "Silver Lady" from the coins she hands out.

For the coronation party, she sent out silver-lacquered invitations to all the lodgings and to the hundreds of bums she knows personally. And on their behalf she sent a message of good wishes to the Queen.

They all turned up to cheer a message from the Queen, "conveying her sincere thanks for your kind and loyal message of good wishes."

GLASGOW. — Arthur McGowan, a 26-year-old unemployed seaman, was fined ten pounds with the option of 60 days in jail in Glasgow, Scotland, today. The fine was for removing the numer-

als "II" from an E. I. R. Coronation sign on a Glasgow store. The number two means Elizabeth the Second.

He told the Magistrate "I have done nothing dishonourable or unethical. We believe our Scottish history to be true and there can be no justice without truth."

Some Scottish nationalists object to the Queen calling herself Elizabeth II, since the first Queen Elizabeth ruled over England alone, and Scotland has had no previous Queen Elizabeth.

SINGAPORE. — Police disclosed today in Singapore a 22-year-old Chinese was arrested on charges of attempting to deface a portrait of the Queen on Coronation Day. He is reported to have splattered it with tar.

LONDON. — British Columbia was thanked today for its contribution to the flowers decorating London's coronation route.

British works minister Sir David Eccles, the man in charge of the vast government coronation decorating program, said in a message to the British Columbia House that the 300 lily bulbs sent by B.C. "have been of great help."

"My sincere thanks for your contribution," was what Sir David told W. A. McAdam, the B.C. agent-general.

McAdam says the bulbs were planted in St. James' and Hyde Park well before the coronation and were donated by the B.C. Department of Agriculture. He said he believed B.C. was the only province donating flowers for the coronation.

**Leper Suspect In  
Vancouver Found**

A 22-year-old Chinese was discovered today in a Chinatown office in Vancouver after a city-wide search for the suspected leprosy victim.

Woo Sik Main says he's convinced he's not a leper ... but that he will submit to a medical examination.

The youth reached Vancouver by train from Calgary yesterday morning. He had been allowed to stay at his father's home in Calgary because city health officials were not able to enforce a quarantine. Woo says that four Calgary doctors have thoroughly examined him and would not confirm a diagnosis of leprosy.

If he is cleared in the medical examination in Vancouver, Woo has indicated he will fly to Hong Kong ... or put himself in the care of Federal health authorities.

**At Least 6 Dead In  
Texas Plant Explor'n**

HOUSTON, Texas — a fireworks factory and warehouse exploded in Houston late Friday. At least six people were killed and estimates of the number injured went as high as 50.

The explosion occurred at the Alco Fireworks and Specialty Company plant and warehouse. The company is a distributor and importer of fireworks. It also plans and produces commercial fireworks displays.

Houston Post reporter Harold Young was at his home, a mile from the plant, when the blast occurred. He said: "I thought a jet bomber had hit the side of the house. I've seen houses shake before, but never like this one. I went outside and there was a mushrooming cloud like that of an atomic explosion, only it was white instead of several colors. Glass windows were shattered in the River Oaks shopping

centre, one mile from the explosion site.

Every available emergency ambulance was rushed to the scene, about two miles west of downtown Houston and a mile from the swanky River Oaks residential section.

The report of six dead came from police dispatchers.
