ONT. CHAPTER, MARCH OF DIMES ANNOUNCE EXPANSION OF SERVICE

The Ontario Chapter of the Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis will in future extend its March of Dimes rehabilitation services to include adults handicapped by other orthopaedically disabling conditions. It was announced here today by W. Denis Whitaker of Hamilton, President of the Chapter.

Funds raised in previous March of Dimes campaigns have financed a rehabilitation program limited to those handicapped by polio. Assistance will now be provided in other disabling conditions, Mr. Whitaker said.

In announcing the expanded program, Dr. P. P. Dewar, Chairman of the Medical Advisory Committee, emphasized that additional cases will be accepted on a priority basis as necessary funds become available through the annual March of Dimes campaign; and that the Foundation would retain without interruption its present program of rehabilitation of poliomyelitis.

"This big step is the result of more than a year's intensive study by a sub-committee of our Medical Advisors," Dr. Dewar explained. The study revealed a real need for rehabilitation in large groups of disabled persons who have no other source of help; those who are not covered by insurance or Workman's Compensation. At present, no means exist to pay for rehabilitation of these patients — to provide them

reasonable chance of success is evident.

Under the program, clinical examination and necessary corrective surgery are provided without fee wherever financial need exists, by members of the Medical Advisory Committee, located in designated polio treatment centres throughout the Province.

Under the new expanded program, the Medical Board will invite consultants to help provide this service in Kirkland Lake and Sault Ste. Marie, since at present, patients from these communities must be brought long distances for assessment and treatment. As in the case of polio, patients with other orthopaedic handicaps may be referred to the Foundation through their own family doctor.

"Despite the advent of Salk Vaccine, the problem of the disabled polio patient will be a difficult one for the next twenty years," Mr. Whitaker pointed out. The March of Dimes has been assured of the interest of both Government and industry in such a project, and the intention is to make it eventually self-supporting, he said.

Fuel Oil Dealers Have Good Supply For All Kenora

A survey of the fuel oil situation in Kenora and District with regard to the Railway strike, shows that adequate supplies are on hand and all users of oil will have no worries. Large oil tankers have been hauling to Kenora from the refineries since last week. Canadian Oil has informed the Miner and News that trucks have been hauling oil since last Saturday and all their customers will be well looked after. "The same holds true for us too," states Bill Keefe of Husky Oil and Ted

Maluish of North Star Oil. Imperial Oil reported earlier that they have sufficient supplies to meet all needs.

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KENORA KINGS EDGE THE BRAVES 8-6

The Kenora Kings added their own mark of victory to the young Intermediate "B" league last night when they defeated a stubborn Kenora Brave hockey team by the score of 8 to 6.

The King's victory lifted them out of the cellar into third place while it left the Brave team with its third straight loss.

The game was relatively 'clean' with only a few penalties. The Kings managed to pick up three of them while the losers only sat out one.

Here is a brief summary of the periods.

1st Period
The Kenora Braves started the scoring at the 2:30 mark when Levand came in alone to score. Less than a minute later Carlson fed a pass to the Brave goalie who blasted past the King's net to tie up the game at 1-1.

Then at the 6:50 mark young but able Stew Ponton put the Kings ahead with a picture goal on a very fine solo effort.

Riding high with a 2-1 lead young Ponton set up his teammate Lyle Rayner who slapped the puck home at the 7:45 mark to make the score read 3 to 1 for the Kings.

The Skeads of the local Braves came into their own at the 8:55 mark when L. Skead drove home a pass from B. Skead. That goal put the Braves only one away from a tie.

At the 12:55 mark Chuck Carlson received a pass from Malmo and he easily evaded the opposition's defence to raise the Kings lead to two big goals.

Five minutes later Gagnon took a pass from Thomas White and plugged the puck past the Brave goalie to make the score read 5 to 2 for the Kings at the end of the first period.

2nd Period
The Kings kept it to themselves again in the opening minutes of the second frame when Malmo on a pass from Lundin. That put the royal team ahead 6 to 2.

Tom White made it 7 to 2 at the 5:30 mark when he pulled out the Brave goalie and sent the puck deep into the mesh. The assist on Tom's goal went to Gagnon.

The Kenora Kings kept up their terrific pace as Gagnon fired his second goal of the evening on a pass from Robertson.

At the 9:02 mark the Skeads rallied to the cause again as L. Skead batted home a pass from brother L. Skead.

The Braves ended the scoring in that period when D. Skead knocked home an unassisted goal. The score after two periods read - Kenora Kings 6, the Kenora Braves 4.

3rd Period
The raging Braves kept things hopping in the third period as they pulled on a terrific comeback and beat Whiteman to the punch for the second time to put the score at 8 to 5.

Less than a minute later D. Skead fed a sharp pass to Levand who again pulled Whiteman out of the net and fired home the marker to make things feel a little warm for the Kings. The score now read 8 to 6 for the Royal team. The Kings finally broke up the Brave rally and came into their own at the 14:40 mark when Larry Parsons rifled a shot from the Braves blueline that caught the losing teams in the per hand corner of the net to make the final score read 9 to 6 in favour of the Kenora Kings.

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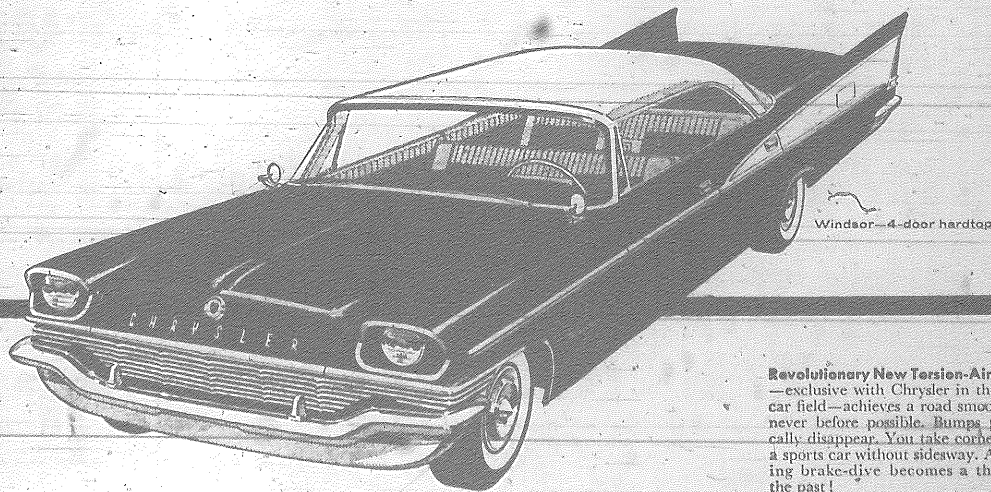

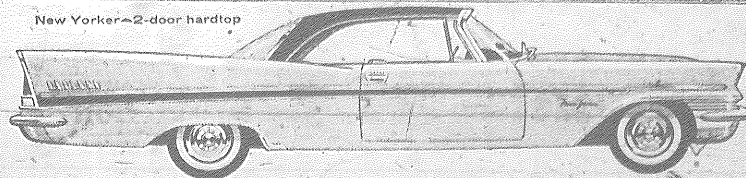

Kitchen Classics

MINCEMEAT BREAD
 Ingredients: 2 cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup firmly-packed brown sugar, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine (melted), 1 cup moist mince-meat.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon. Beat egg with rotary beater (hand or electric) until it begins to get thick and is lemon-colored; add milk and brown sugar and beat enough to combine. Stir in melted butter and mincemeat.

Add mincemeat mixture to dry ingredients; stir only enough to moisten. Pour into greased loaf pan (8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches). Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven for 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Turn out of pan on rack. When cold store in tightly covered container for 24 hours before slicing. Nice sliced thin and spread with butter.

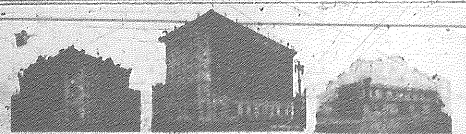
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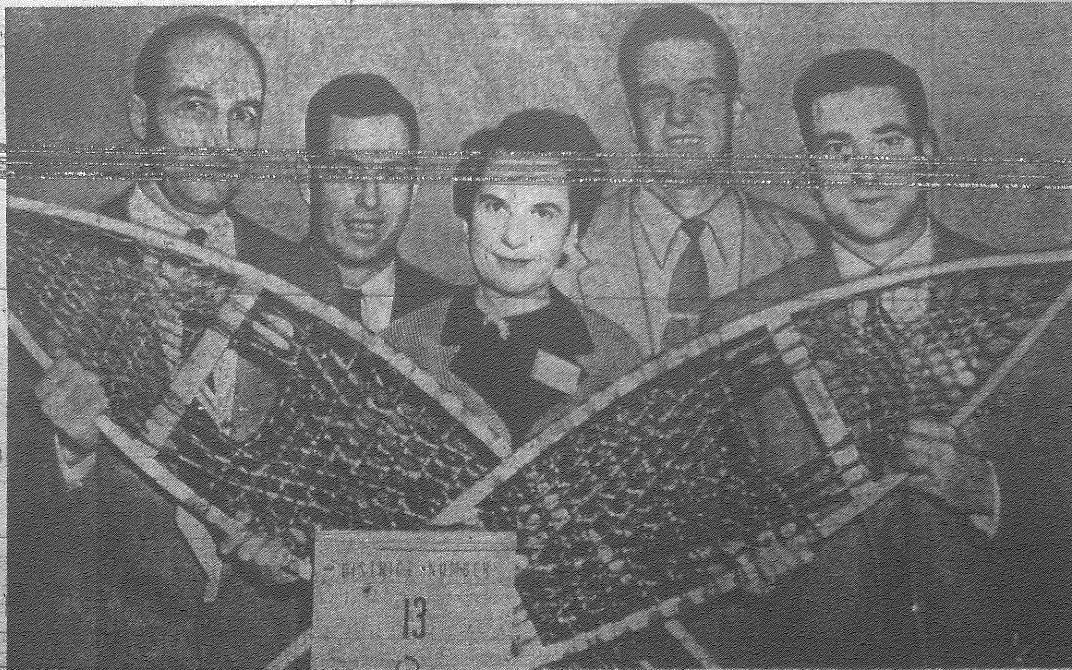

FLUORIDATION QUESTION AWAITS 1957 FORT FRANCES COUNCIL

Fort Frances: The retiring Fort Frances town council at its farewell meeting included fluoridation among unfinished business left over for the attention of Mayor-elect J. M. Newmar and the 1957 council. The new council takes office Monday, January 7.

Mayor George Lockhart and his councilors discovered it takes more than a referendum vote to start pumping fluorides into the town's water supply.

SPECIAL AUTHORITY from the Ontario government must be obtained before the municipality can implement the fluoridation by-law approved by the voters Dec. 3, it was learned in a letter from the provincial health department.

This authority can be obtained from the provincial legislature passing a private bill or otherwise, the department replied to council's request for authorization of the plan recommended by local and national health associations. The letter did not explain the "or otherwise" suggestion.

Until the town can arrange presentation of a private bill at Toronto, the health department stated that "under the circumstances we have no alternative but to return the by-law to you."

MAYOR LOCKHART and councilors observed the government delays with fluoridation proposals negatively since a number of other municipalities attempting to introduce the dental health measure have experienced court action and injunctions against the plan. The province has not set up any legislation permitting specific approval of municipal fluoridation programs. Clerk-treasurer Earl Balde explained the Ontario municipal board withheld approval of another referendum issue passed by voters, the 1950 beach tax issue.

Another problem is the town's bath house when the town from the financial arrangements, completely expected to be completed this year.

Other problems solved are small amount of money Council to extend its deadline beyond 180 days from the referendum date in order that sale of debentures can be arranged.

The Ontario Telephone authority, however, inferred that over a \$5 "tariff fee"—its charge for issuing an order—is delaying its approval of sale of the town's telephone system to Bell Telephone Company of Canada, another decision made in the recent election. The council gave instructions to forward the fee.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the council:

- Forwarded news that a glove-making firm is planning to locate a factory in a small north-west town, to the local Chamber of Commerce for investigation.
- Reading of the bylaw revealed the town's total assessment now stands at \$6,581,907 and its debenture debt, at year's end, is \$1,030,492.

Although he mastered an advanced type of slide-rule at 11, the extent of his talent was not discovered until two years ago when he solved a problem which had stumped his teachers.

"That trick question solved itself after I looked up a few astronomical and gravitational figures," Allan said. Later he came third in the Mathematical Contest of America.

He now is studying radio and wireless theory and getting first class honors in his university entrance course.

His high school principal, W. R. McDougal said Allan "seems to have a great future."

The young student said the main interest in his work is his curiosity about astronomy, his favorite science.

"I hope to attend university, take science and then decide on my career."

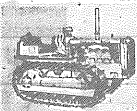

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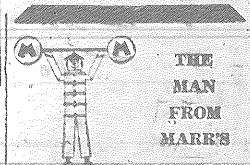

January 12—

The Women's Institute met in the ice cream parlour of the Tourist Hotel. Guest speaker for the evening was Dr. R. J. Whitaker who spoke on "The Care of the Teeth". The doctor's paper was both interesting and instructive. He handled his subject in such a clear concise manner that his hearers could not fail to realize and remember the importance of the care of the teeth. During the business part of the meeting, a letter was read from Mr. Peter Hoeman M.P. re "An Old Folks Home". The Women's Institute of this town feel that an Old Folks Home or place of refuge is a necessity in this district.
