Dean N. Scarfe To Address Meeting

Dean Neville Scarfe, of the University of British Columbia and one of Canada's prominent men in the field of education, will speak to the people of Kenora and Keewatin at a meeting sponsored by the Home and School Council to be held in the High School Auditorium, Easter Monday, April 22 at 8 p.m.

Dean Scarfe's message is vitally important at this time. Speaking on "Youth and our Changing Concepts," Dean Scarfe will deal

with the problems of educating young people to meet future challenges the world will present to them. And he will deal with the work of the parents and schools.

Following the meeting Dean Scarfe will board the train for Fort William, flying from there to Toronto where he will take part in the Ontario Education Association convention.

"Put Things In Perspective"

There is a motto: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

This motto is applicable to the problem of tuberculosis in our communities. It is a problem that can be defeated and is being defeated, but the efforts of the considerate are being hampered by the few misguided individuals who fail to be x-rayed. While they worry over cancer and heart trou-

ble they fail to account to tuberculosis though it is indisputably true that more can be done to prevent and cure TB than either of these others.

That the course of tuberculosis can be effected is proved: The deathrate in Ontario in 1900 was 160 per 100,000 now it is less than 5. To those who are afraid, you have more to fear by not facing x-rayed. Early discovery means early recovery and almost certain recovery when the disease is tuberculosis.

That improvement is being hampered is also proved. One third of those eligible do not bother to attend chest x-ray surveys. Many people over 40 years of age have never been x-rayed. The result is a sustained incidence of the disease. More Ontario people

are going to sanatoria now than 10 years ago.

The answer is not contained in facilities. The number of x-ray machines in the province has expanded yearly. Physicians have chest x-ray facilities. The government has installed machines in 137 of our major hospitals. Better clinics operate free of charge to the patients in 240 centres in Ontario. Industrial and community surveys provide free chest x-rays to plant and community populations. Special consideration is provided for industries with an occupational hazard, such as mines and foundries, and this service includes chest x-rays.

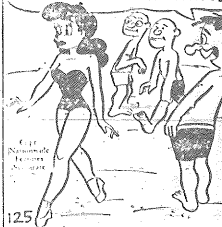
Yet tuberculosis remains the chief killer among communicable diseases and 10% of those of who die are diagnosed shortly before, or after death. In addition, of the 3,500 victims of the disease who enter sanatoria every year, 70% have moderately or far advanced disease.

The answer is contained in the attitude of the public.

There is to be another free chest x-ray opportunity for all citizens of this vicinity. All of us should affirm, "God grant me the courage to change the things I can and the sanity to act now."

A battle appears to be shaping up over the National Boxing Association's suggestion that managers boycott Louisiana because of the state laws banning bouts between whites and negroes. 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Kitchen Classics

Dinner With a Difference

A well-aged cheddar cheese puts a yummy goodness in a new type of Parker House rolls that's especially good when they are baked or reheated. Nestled in a napkin-lined basket, the attractive-to-look-at, golden-baked rolls will lend an elegant touch to the Easter buffet. They are a supporting attraction to go along with cold ham and salad and will help turn any meal into a beautiful production.

Cheese Parker House Rolls
Yield: 3 dozen rolls
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup lukewarm water
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 envelope active dry yeast
1/2 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup lightly-packed shredded Canadian cheddar cheese
1/2 cup milk; stir in the 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, shortening and cayenne. Cool to lukewarm.
In a large bowl, measure lukewarm water into a 4-quart bowl; stir in the 1/2 cup sugar. Sprinkle yeast. Let stand 10 minutes.
Stir well. Stir in lukewarm mixture and about 2 cups of flour. Beat until smooth and stiff. Work in cheese and sufficient additional flour to make a but not sticky dough - about 3 cups more. Turn out on a floured board or canvas and knead until smooth and elastic. Grease in greased bowl; grease top and let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 1 hour.
Roll down dough and turn out on a lightly-floured board or canvas and knead until smooth. Roll dough into 3 equal portions. Cover with tea towels and rest 10 minutes. Shape each portion of dough into a roll 12 inches long and cut into 12 equal pieces. Form each piece into a small ball; using a rolling pin roll out into an oval 2 1/2 x 4 inches; fold in half crosswise. Press edges together lightly. Grease tops. Cover with a tea towel. Let rise in a warm place, from dough, until doubled in bulk - about 30 minutes. Bake in a preheated hot oven (375 deg. F.) for 15 minutes.

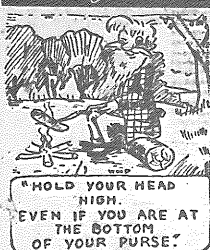

Car Costs Less As It Gets Older

Ottawa - That new car you
bought on time may cost you
about 16 cents a mile for operat-
ing and other costs in the first
year but only about seven cents
a mile in the tenth.

Taking all costs into consid-
eration, including depreciation and
finance charges, gas and oil, re-
pair and maintenance, with gar-
age tolls and insurance, the Sun
Life Assurance Co. of Canada
estimates the total cost of own-
ing and operating a car may
amount to about \$1,277 in the
first year.

Figuring the average car lasts

about 10 years and runs about
8,000 miles a year, the company
said in a report to the Gordon
Economic commission that in the
first year the car cost per mile
might be about 16 cents. The cost
would decline progressively.

Taking an auto purchased in
1954 as an example, the comp-

any gave these detailed estimates
of costs in the first year: Depre-
ciation \$87; repair and mainte-
nance \$32.56; tires and tubes \$15;
accessories \$16.50; gasoline \$14;
.50 oil \$17.60; insurance \$84;
garage tolls \$100; finance
charges \$108.10; gasoline tax \$54;
license fee \$16.

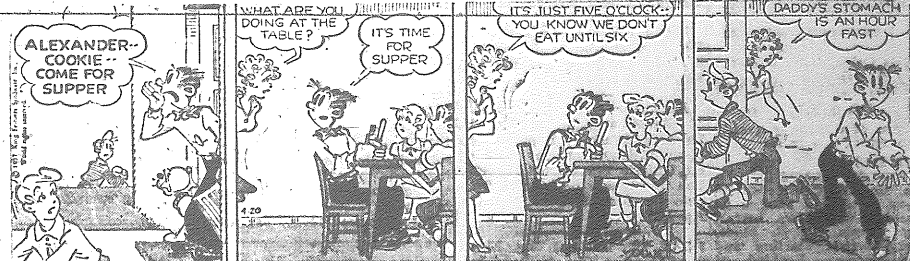

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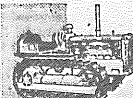
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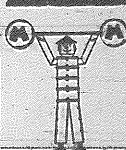
