**"Put Things
In
Perspective"**

There is a motto: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

This motto is applicable to the problem of tuberculosis in our communities. It is a problem that can be defeated, but the efforts of the considerate are being hampered by the few misguided individuals who fail to be x-rayed. While they worry over cancer and heart trou-

ble they fail to account to tuberculosis though it is indisputably true that more can be done to prevent and cure TB than either of these others.

That the course of tuberculosis can be effected is proved: The deathrate in Ontario in 1950 was 160 per 100,000, now it is less than 5. To those who are afraid, you have more to fear by not being x-rayed. Early discovery means early recovery and almost certain recovery when the disease is tuberculosis.

That improvement is being hampered is also proved. One third of those eligible do not bother to attend chest x-ray surveys. Many people over 40 years of age have never been x-rayed. The result is a sustained incidence of the disease. More Ontario people

are going to sanatoria now than 10 years ago.

The answer is not contained in facilities. The number of X-ray machines in the province has expanded yearly. Physicians have chest x-ray facilities. The government has installed machines in 137 of our major hospitals. Referral clinics operate free of charge to the patients in 230 centres in Ontario. Industrial and community surveys provide free chest x-rays to plant and community populations. Special consideration is provided for industries with an occupational hazard, such as mines and foundries, and this service includes chest x-rays.

Yet tuberculosis remains the chief killer among communicable diseases and 10% of those who die are diagnosed shortly before, or after death. In addition, the 3,500 victims of the disease who enter sanatoria every year 70% have moderately or far advanced disease.

The answer is contained in the attitude of the public.

There is to be another free chest x-ray opportunity for all citizens of this vicinity. All of us should affirm, "God grant me the courage to change the things I can and the sanity to act now."

Kitchen Classics

Dinner With a Difference
Here's a simple trick to give your appetite appeal to Easter dinner. A well-aged cheddar cheese puts a yummy goodness in new type of Parker House rolls that's especially good when only baked or re-heated. Nestled in a napkin-lined basket, attractive-to-look-at, golden rolls will lend an elegant touch to the Easter buffet. They are a supporting attraction to go along with cold ham and salad and will help turn any meal into a beautiful production.

Cheese Parker House Rolls

Yield: 3 dozen rolls
cups milk
tablespoons granulated sugar
teaspoons salt
cup shortening
teaspoons cayenne
cup lukewarm water
teaspoon granulated sugar
envelope active dry yeast
cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour
cups lightly-packed shredded Canadian cheddar cheese
cold milk; stir in the 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, shortening, cayenne. Cool to lukewarm. In meantime, measure lukewarm water into a 4-quart bowl; stir in 1 teaspoon sugar. Sprinkle yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, stir well. Stir in lukewarm mixture and about 2 cups of flour. Beat until smooth and soft. Work in cheese and sufficient additional flour to make a but not sticky dough - about 3 cups more. Turn out on a greased board or canvas and roll until smooth and elastic. Grease a greased bowl; grease top and let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 1 hour.

Knock down dough and turn on a lightly-floured board or canvas and knead until smooth. Divide dough into 3 equal portions. Cover with tea towels and let rest 10 minutes. Shape each portion of dough into a roll 12 inches long and cut into 12 equal pieces. Form each piece into a small ball; using a rolling pin, roll out into an oval 2 1/2 x 4 inches; fold in half crosswise; place on greased baking sheets; press edges together lightly. Place tops. Cover with a tea towel and let rise in a warm place, from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 30 minutes. Bake in a preheated oven (370 deg. F.) for 15 minutes.
