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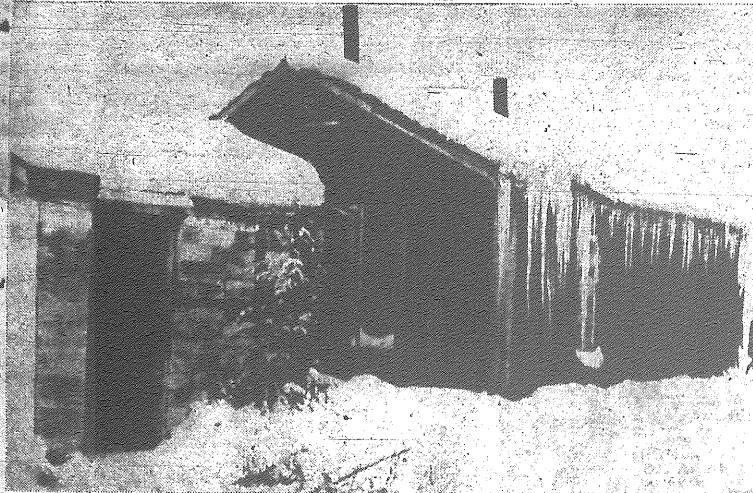

Five Murdered Christmas Morning

MURDER SCENE AT EAR FALLS



This is the 2 room cabin of Alfred Young, located 400 feet from Highway 105 directly north of the Hydro powerhouse at Ear Falls. Four young people walked in the open porch doorway, to pick up phonograph records for a Christmas dance, when they saw Tom Young, standing in the front room with a rifle in his hands. Two escaped, and two died within a few feet of this open doorway.

EAR FALLS MAN CAPTURED AFTER OFFICER, FATHER, NEIGHBORS DIE

The full story of a crime which claimed the lives of five people early Christmas morning in the hamlet of Ear Falls, some 75 miles north-east of Kenora on the Red Lake highway, are still being awaited, as Ontario Provincial Police, under the direction of Inspector R. L. Needham of the Criminal Investigation Branch, Toronto, continue their investigation. The crime, which rocked the Ontario Hydro community of some 300 people, took the lives of Constable Calvin Russell Fulford, age 28; James Gordon, age 20 and his 17 year old wife of one week, Clara Gordon, 45 year old Albert Young, and 47 year old George Williams. All were shot and killed by shells from a .303 rifle.

Charged with murder and held in District jail in Kenora is 26 year Tom Young, son of one of the victims.

Corporal Bob MacGarva, called to the scene early Thursday morning, and in charge of the preliminary investigations, has been joined by Inspector Needham today. Meanwhile Dr. McLean, pathologist from Toronto arrived in Kenora early Friday morning and conducted autopsies on the bodies of the five victims.

The residence of Constable Fulford, Mrs. Fulford, who had watched as her husband opened his gifts, was made aware that a shooting incident had taken place.

George Williams and a youth named Alex accompanied Constable Fulford to the north side of the powerhouse, and up the 200 yard path towards the Albert Young residence. About 75 feet from the front door, Constable Fulford spotted the body of James Gordon in the snow; off to the left of the path. When he was

WIFE HELD FOLLOWING SHOOTING IN DRYDEN

A shooting incident in Dryden Friday morning took the life of 28-year-old Grant Boyd, a Dryden business man. Held in connection with his death is Laverna Dorothy Boyd, 26-year-old wife of the deceased.

Chief Stanley of the Dryden Town Police Force said that Mrs. Boyd is being held in custody. A charge will be laid today after consultation with Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty.

The tragic events of early Friday have not all been pieced together yet, but it is understood that Mrs. Boyd called her husband by phone about 7:00 a.m. to come and take one of the children to hospital. He arrived some time after 8:00 a.m., but not before the child had been taken to hospital.

Chief Stanley said, evidence indicates that Mrs. Boyd, using a .303 rifle, shot her husband in the head, while they were in the ground floor of the dwelling. Two hours, or possibly three hours later, Mrs. Boyd phoned Dr. Cameron. He inquired if the matter was important, and was told that it was more urgent than that.

Dr. Cameron arrived at the Boyd residence about 11:45 a.m. and found the body of Grant Boyd pushed head down in a barrel in the basement. He immediately phoned police.

The Boyds have four children, ranging in ages from the baby up to 7 years. Mr. Boyd was a partner, with his brother, Morris, in an automobile business in Dryden.

"An autopsy was conducted in Kenora last night.

I had been afraid to tell my wife that I had spent \$10 on a ticket for the car." So said Bill Cunningham to this reporter later.

Yesterday he posed, with his wife and family and Lions Club officials, Mayor Ratuski and Bud Gibson, president of Westario Motors for official pictures.

Two Fires On Boxing Day

Kenora firemen yesterday answered two alarms. At 314-7th Ave. S. firemen found flames had eaten up the walls of the livingroom, after apparently starting in a chesterfield chair. A lighted cigarette may have started the blaze. There was no one home at the time. Fire was confined to one room, although there was heavy smoke damage throughout. The alarm was sounded at 1:20 p.m.

Earlier, at 11:05 a.m. fire caught on the wall of No. 9 cabin at Daiter's Motel, where a bachelor resides. Damage was light.

FORT FRANCES TROUNCE THISTLES 6-1 IN BOXING DAY MATCH

Now it is over. Now it is done. The art of fiction could not have had a better Christmas present for the border town Fort Frances Canadians. Kenora's enemy of the greatest magnitude defeated the Thistles 6-1 yesterday before 1,400 warm fans in the aging Thistle Rink. The Fort Frances club have never outclassed the Thistles in hockey as they did yesterday. With only two lines in operation, the Canadians displayed masterful hockey, although they were aided by the rather mediocre playing of the red and white puck carriers.

The visitors led 3-0 at the end of the first stanza, increased their lead to 4-1 by the end of the second period and wrapped the contest up in excellent style by scoring two in the final frame.

Fleming and Markarchuk scored twice for the winning cause while Jones and Johnson picked up singles. Slobodian scored Kenora's only goal.

The fast moving Canadians scored two goals within six minutes of the opening bell. Fleming counted both opening tallies, the second goal on a screen shot from just inside the Kenora blue line that caught goalie Bob Blake off guard. The first goal came on a pass from Kawulia, who grabbed the loose puck in a scramble in front of the Kenora net. At the 11 minute mark Jones scored on a blistering shot when Stubby Dubchuk was serving a Kenora penalty.

The Thistle's only goal came late in the second period when Alex Slobodian stormed in on Harry Barefoot and blasted the puck past the sprawling form of the Fort Frances netminder. Markarchuk had scored earlier in that second frame and he also added another in the third period as did Johnson for the border town bandies.

For the Fort Frances Canadians, it was a big thrill to defeat the Thistles before the large crowd and in Kenora. They deserved the laurels of victory. They managed to play a "whole of a game" with only ten players while the Thistles lacked in all departments with a host of players. Too many Thistles spoiled the soup.—Rick Hunt.

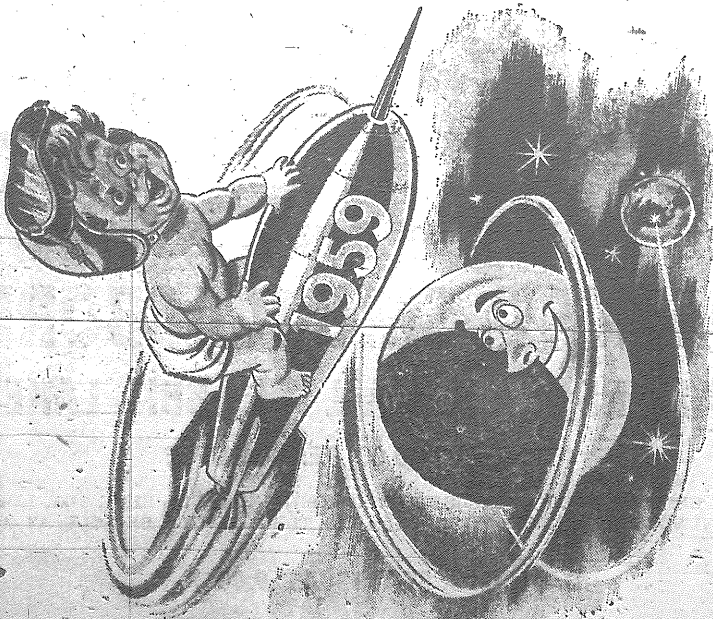

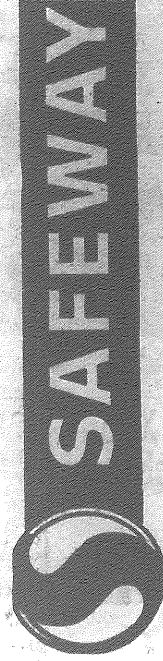

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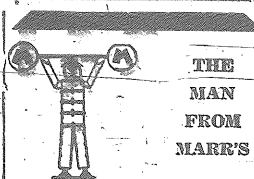

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Bannatyne told officers that Young was not in his father's home but at the residence of his grandparents at Goldpines, some 5 miles to the east.

Five officers then headed down the Goldpines road. Corporals MacGarva and Bender circled to the rear of the cabin, while Corporal Roller drove the Police cruiser car with two officers aboard, within 35 feet of the front door, to draw the possible attention of Tom Young.

When there was no response from within, Corp. Roller walked back towards the cabin. Meanwhile Corp. Bender succeeded in smashing the rear window with his gun, and Corp. MacGarva tossed in tear gas bombs.

Within seconds, Tom Young came out, pushing his blind grandfather in front of him. His grandmother followed immediately behind. Corp. Roller shouted, "there he is," and Young put his hands in the air, calling "I give up." Corp. MacGarva dashed in from the side of the building, and grabbed a revolver from Young's rear pocket - the same gun which Constable Fulford had been carrying earlier on Christmas Day. Young was taken first to Red Lake, and early Friday morning to the Kenora jail.

Meanwhile officers found three bodies in the Young's dwelling. On the bed in the rear room was the body of Albert Young. On the couch in the livingroom was the partly-clothed body of Clara Gordon while on the floor, immediately in front of the couch was the body of George Williams. It appeared as though the body of Clara Gordon had been dragged from outside and placed on the cot.

Funeral services for the late Constable Fulford will take place Monday at 2.00 p.m. in Emo, with full Police honors.

within 57 feet of the house, a bullet from the front window struck him. Alex turned and fled, but Williams continued into the house.

When her husband did not return, Mrs. Fulford called OPP headquarters at Red Lake. Corporal Bender and a second officer drove the fifty miles to Ear Falls, and approaching the house, saw Con. Fulford's body on the

path. The time was about 2.00 a.m. Inspector Tom Corsie ordered a halt to further attempts to get into the dwelling until daylight. Meanwhile he sent Corporals Bob MacGarva and Herb Roller from Kenora to the scene, along with two officers from Dryden. 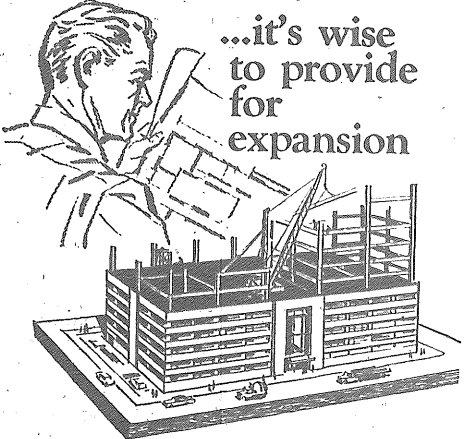
