## J. Pike's Brother Feature Of Thirty Years Ago Story

The story reprinted below will be of interest to many in Kenora since the baby in this story of thirty years ago is a brother of Police Chief John Pike.

The story was a "New Year's Eve feature in the Fort William Times recalling events of thirty years ago.

Through tingling air of a bitter-cold mid-winter night over Falls from Hymers to Fort William, a baby bundled in blankets on a gasoline speeder held rights over rail-trains on the Port Arthur-Duluth and Western Railroad it was a New Year's Eve race for life, 30 years ago, Dec. 31, 1929.

The infant was 11-months-old Jimmy Pike, suffering a severe rupture requiring immediate medical attention. Horses and sleigh would have been far too slow. Plowed roads and regular winter snow traffic was unknown. Even snowmobiles were scarce. Section foreman Archie Casney

contacted railway officials and secured a clear line for the little gas speeder on its merry run through a frost-filled, subzero night.

With him were two sectionmen and the praying parents from Hymers, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Pike. Little Jim was deeply bundled in blankets and the race began.

Ended at Nebbing It ended at Nebbing yards where an ambulance from McKellar hospital awaited the flange-wheeled mite of mercy making its hectic run with rights over all rolling stock on the line.

Within the hour the little fellow was in the operating room. The medical report next morning — "going fine."

Recovery must have been completely satisfactory for Jim Pike, now over 30, residing somewhere in Missouri. A younger brother, Richard, lives at 123 North Marks street, and still another is J. Pike, present Kenora police chief.

Mrs. Casney, widow of the section foreman involved, still makes her home at Hymers.

The event was one of the rare instances in local railroad history when the humble track speeder was elevated to the status of a crack passenger train and ruled the rails as queen of the roaring-main line.

Dominion Bureau of Statistics  
**Weekly Highlights**

### MERCHANDISING

Retail sales during October showed a gain of 7% over last year, well above the average increase of 2.3% for the ten months January to October. Sales were higher in the month than last year in all provinces and for 16 of 18 specified trades, grocery and combination stores continuing to lead in size of gain.

Preliminary data indicate a November gain of somewhat over 2% in department store sales and a jump of 7% during the first week of December. Sales of new motor vehicles in October climbed 30% over a year earlier, but the month's gain left the number of vehicles sold from the start of the year 7% under the first ten-months of 1957.

### INTERNATIONAL TRADE

Canada's deficit from current transactions in goods and services with other countries declined to \$795 million in the first nine months this year compared to \$1,150 million for the same 1957 period. The third quarter deficit showed a smaller decline of \$187 from \$195 million. The drop in the deficit occurred in the merchandise trade balance, non-merchandise transactions resulting in an increased deficit of \$663 against \$579 million. October trade with other countries brought a capital inflow of \$26,400,000, largest monthly total since July last year. Aggregate inflow this year to the end of October was \$92,000,000, down from \$154,000,000 in 1957.

### LABOUR

Total number of persons without jobs and seeking work at mid-November is estimated at 385,000, an increase of 65,000 over a year earlier. Total number employed at the same date is put at 5,773,000 down about 6,000 from last year. Employment in non-farm industries was higher by 34,000, a drop in the farm work force accounting for the overall decline. Size of the labour force was 55,000 larger in November this year than last at an estimated 6,134,000. Labour income to the end of September was nearly 2% larger at \$12,042,700,000 this year than last.

## BABY BOY BORN NEW YEAR'S MORNING AT 5.10

October were an estimated 1% higher in value this year than last, but for the ten months were 3% lower. Total inventory held at the month's end was somewhat more than 4% less in value over a year earlier, and the value of new orders during the month was slightly larger.

## Child Welfare Act To Be Revised

TORONTO — New legislations comes into effect in Ontario Jan. 1 to prevent a repetition of the celebrated Maat case.

An amendment to the Child Welfare Act, passed at the last session of the legislation, requires consent for adoptions to be witnessed by either a judge or an official of a Children's Aid Society.

In addition, there must be a waiting period of seven days before an unmarried mother can consent to adoption of her child and she then has 21 days in which to cancel consent.

Twins Ronald and Richard Maat were the centre of a legal battle when their natural parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Maat, successfully fought to the Supreme Court of Canada to regain them from Mr. and Mrs. Austin Hep-ton of nearby Cooksville who had adopted them shortly after birth. The Maats later separated.

The new legislation also reduced by one-half to six months the minimum waiting period between applications for adoption and the issuing of a final court order. To prevent undue delay in adoption proceedings and people changing their minds—the legislation says a new application must be made if no court order has been made within 12 months of the application date.

Another change will affect every person ever adopted in Ontario, including residents adopted elsewhere but now living here. They will be classed as natural children of their adoptive parents for all legal purposes.

Welfare Minister Cecile says the new legislation is a major and progressive refinement of the present act. "It now means that adoption procedure is so definitely laid out that only a court would be in a position to question it."

According to reports young Master Reid reigns supreme as the only New Year Baby—the St. Joseph's Hospital reports no births at all on January 1st and the General Hospital records only the birth of the Reid baby, however, the awarding of the gifts will not be official till Monday January 5th.

## District Free Of Accidents Over New Year Holiday

Kenora and district citizens enjoyed a happy, and an accident-free New Year's, Kenora Provincial Police report today.

In Magistrate's Court this morning, a single motorist was charged, and convicted of impaired driving. Two drunks received the usual \$10 or 7 day levy. A local man was convicted of illegal possession of beer, and also of speeding. He paid \$25.00 on the first count and \$25 and costs on the second.

The cost to the motorist, convicted of impaired driving was \$100 and costs. He lost his licence for three months.

## Try To Block TV At Fort Frances

FORT FRANCES — A suppressed attempt by a television transmission company to block "free TV" for this reception-starved region brought a smouldering dispute to near boiling point at a packed meeting of Fort Frances town council Monday night.

Letters from three local unions and Fort Frances and District Trades and Labour Council urged the council to withhold signing of an agreement permitting International TV Cable company to operate in Fort Frances.

The unions stated the company has opposed an application that publicly-supported Minneonto Corporation has made to the Federal Communications Commission at Washington, D.C. The company earlier promised council that it would not interfere with the Minneonto plan which raised funds by public subscription from International Falls and Fort Frances.

James Pearce, attorney for the cable company, stated the action was not taken by International TV. He said that Superior Communications Company, which supplies the signal for the cable company, has petitioned the FCC for consideration of its franchise to bring the microwave from Duluth. The Superior Company has not lodged an injunction against Minneonto, he reported.

## THE GAME - AS I SAW IT

 The New Year was ushered in at the Thistle Rink, one of the season's fastest games. The element of speed was given to the game by a young crew of warriors called the Winnipeg Braves who celebrated the end of the festive season with a convincing 7-4 victory over the Kenora Thistles. A large, post-celebration crowd was on hand to watch the Langrell-Leiter-Larkin line tear up the ice lanes with five goals for the top Manitoba Junior team.

Laurie Langrell and Wayne "the keeper" Larkin scored two goals for the winning side while McKenzie, Leited and King added singles. The Leroux brothers scored singles for the Thistles.

The hockey match started off at a fast clip as each club staged end-to-end rushes in the first ten minutes without scoring. McKenzie broke loose on a pass from mate King for the Braves and Mac backhanded a blazing shot past Bob Blake into the upper right hand corner of the Thistle net. Leading 1-0 the duet of Larkin-Langrell, the brilliant junior pair in Winnipeg play, teamed up together with Laurie Langrell easily beating Blake on a breakaway play with Larkin. The third Brave goal within two minutes came when King skated through the entire Kenora club to score on a dazzling display of stickhandling and skating.

The second period was some 48 seconds old when the young warriors came roaring back to

add to their first period touch of scoring. Wayne Larkin came screaming down the ice with the puck and easily evaded the Thistle defence to pump the rubber past Blake to put the Braves ahead 4-0. At the time of his goal there were two Thistles and one Brave in the penalty box from the preceding period. In less than a minute the three L's from the Manitoba Junior League had combined to score another goal with Leiter getting the honours.

Neddy Olson broke the Thistle's zero barrier when he took a Brian Leroux pass at the 11 minute mark and shot it past the Braves' goalie.

The Kenora Thistle "kid" line produced the red and white's next goal when they scored a goal in the 17th minute. The Thistles slapped the puck into the Winnipeg net to make the score 5-2. Thirty seconds later, Wayne Larkin picked up a loose puck in his own end and he skated by the Thistles in an amazing style of speed and gave goalie Bob Blake no chance on the Braves' sixth goal of the evening.

In the third period Laurie Langrell scored at the six minute mark to push the Braves ahead 7-2. The two Leroux boys, Brian and Frank then scored singles for the Thistles in the last half of the third period to finally make the score 7-4. Frank Richards and Dick Caron handed out twelve penalties to the Braves and Thistles and each Club picked up six. Former Kenora Thistle player, Gary Bergman, managed to pick up the highest total, three.

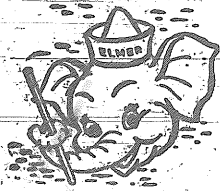

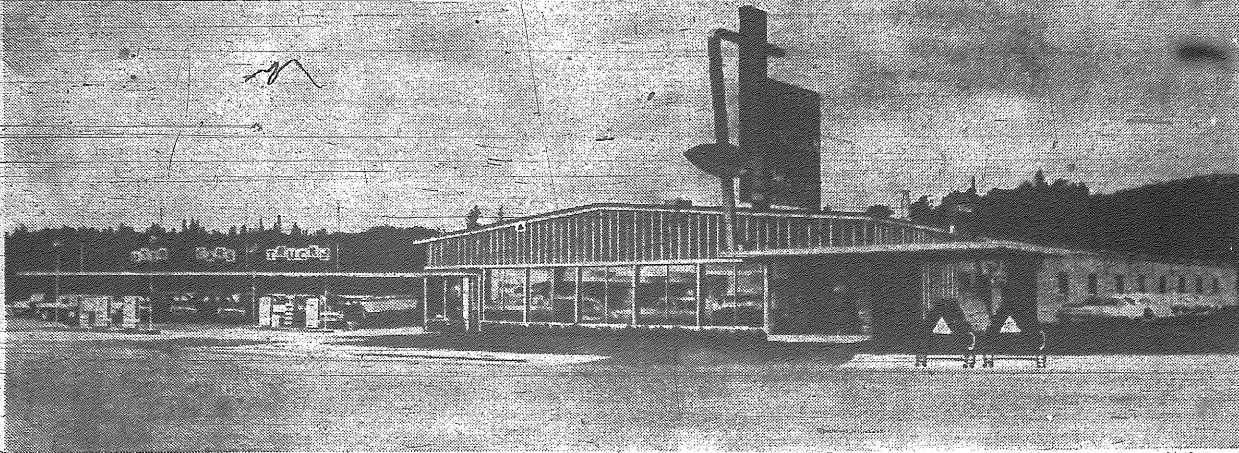

**NOVEMBER 16**—An old fashioned blizzard dumped 14 1/2 inches of snow on Winnipeg and traffic was tied up from Winnipeg to the Lakehead.

**NOVEMBER 18**—The community centre committee announced that they were confident that the canvass for a proposed community centre would be successful.

**NOVEMBER 20**—Judge Harry Donley was appointed as a county court judge at Toronto.

**NOVEMBER 22**—Mayor W. Hodgkinson and school board of Keewatin were returned to office by acclamation—E. W. Byers was re-elected reeve of Jaffray-Melick—nineteen were nominated for Kenora council and school boards.

**NOVEMBER 23**—The present council of Jaffray-Melick was returned by acclamation when others nominated failed to qualify—seven men qualified for council, seven for Keewatin.

**NOVEMBER 25**—A four million dollar project will get underway in the spring it was announced by Trans Canada Pipelines Ltd when a new compressor station is built 29 miles from Kenora.

**NOVEMBER 26**—The official opening of the new addition to the high school was held last night with A. H. McKague, Inspector of Secondary Schools as speaker—3 inches of snow had fallen in the past two days.

**NOVEMBER 27**—At a Jaycee sponsored Town Hall meeting, Mayor Ratuski stated 1958 was a year of achievement for the town.

**NOVEMBER 28**—A group of interested citizens discussed the possibility of starting a Community Investment Fund.

## DECEMBER

**Dec. 1**—Kenora armouries were named dart champions of 1958 and received the J. Bynski Trophy.

**Dec. 2**—A hunting trip ended in tragedy when 52 year old William Holodnuk of Hilly Lake lost his life by drowning when the ice gave way on Little Gordon Lake - Doug Kennedy was elected president of the Chamber of Commerce - Snowfall to date was 3 inches less than last year's total.

**Dec. 3**—Thomas McClellan, chairman of the General Hospital Board—announced plans for a million dollar addition to the hospital to start in the spring.

**Dec. 4**—The 1958 assessment for the Town of Kenora stood at an all time high of \$12,876,425.00, an increase of \$393,500.00 over 1957.

**Dec. 6**—The CNIB canvass for funds was a decided success with the objective of \$3,500 reached - The Keewatin Credit Union op-

ened a new office in that town.

**Dec. 8**—Joseph Derry, a resident of Kenora for over 80 years and pioneer theatre owner was called to rest - The Santa Claus Parade held Saturday and the radio patrol were most successful.

**Dec. 9**—Elections in Kenora saw Larry Johnson, Ab Minor and J. H. Armstrong elected councillors; saw the power by-law and sidewalk bylaw defeated - In Keewatin electors voted in favour of two year terms for councillors and elected W. Nicholson, L. Francis, C. Gilley, I. Contini, C. Christianson and W. Davis to council - in Jaffray and Melick, J. Doner, N. Zroback and S. Hoare were elected to the school board.

**Dec. 11**—The high school board was to conduct a survey in the new year to ascertain if vocational training should be included in the high school program - power and lighting rates were to go up in the town of Kenora.

**Dec. 12**—The high school inspectors stated that the local school and teaching staff rated with the best in the province.

**Dec. 13**—One of Kenora's downtown landmarks, the Dalmore Hotel was severely damaged by fire which broke out on the second floor at 10.47 Friday night & was finally brought under control at 6 a.m. Temperature was 28 below.

**Dec. 15**—The Tuberculosis Assoc. reported 134 district residents in the sanitorium with TB.

**Dec. 16**—High school students

raised \$1,139 for the Junior Red Cross, the biggest amount ever raised and well above the \$894 raised in 1957 - Kenora's snowfall was 40.9 inches.

**Dec. 17**—Two children were burned to death in a fire at Eagle River. They were 5 year old Ila and 2 year old Seppa, children of Finnish parents who came to Canada in June. - The post office put through 34,000 cards and 1,219 parcels. 1,120 parcels were delivered to Kenora homes Dec. 16.

**Dec. 20**—Contracts were awarded for the Baudette-Rainy River bridge - The Jaycees received a Guest Book from the Edinburgh Jaycees which was presented by Mr. Al Young to Chester Banka, president.

**Dec. 22**—Hundreds joined in the Lions Club community carol sing song held around the Christmas Tree on main street.

**Dec. 23**—The Ontario Municipal Board informed the town council that they were refusing to permit the town to proceed with the planned sewer and water installation for Norman; their reason being that the project was too costly for the number of services to be installed. Council will send a delegation to Toronto early in the new year to reopen the issue.

**Dec. 25**—Kenora and the whole of Canada was shocked by a crime which claimed the lives of five people early Christmas morning at Ear Falls. The crime took the lives of Constable O.P. Calvin Fultford 28, James Gordon 20, and his 17 year old wife Clara, 45 year old Albert Young and 47 year old George Williams. All were shot and killed

by shells from a .303 rifle. Charged with murder is Tom Young 26, son of one of the victims.

**Dec. 27**—A shooting incident in Dryden took the life of 28 year old Grant Boyd. Held in connection with his death is his wife Laverne, 26 - Bill Cunningham of R.R. 1 Kenora was the lucky winner of the Lions Club raffle for a Chrysler car.

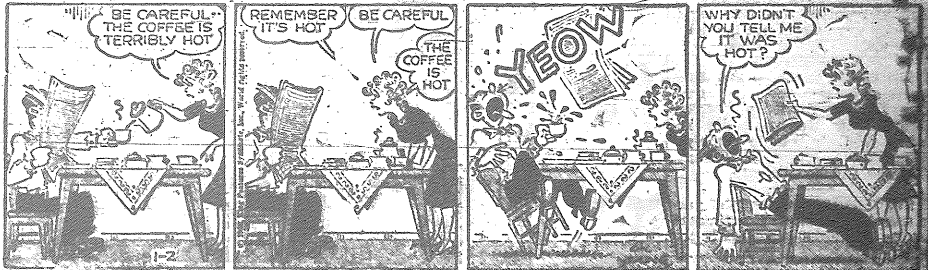

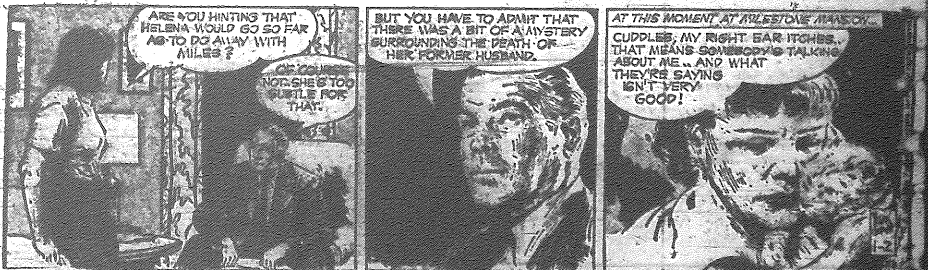

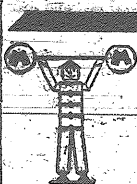

## OPTIMISTIC ATTITUDE REGARDING INTRODUCTION OF JET PROP PLANES

Winnipeg: The strength of the forces of recovery which became much more in evidence as we approached the end of 1957, provide good support for taking an optimistic attitude in regard to the Canadian economy in 1958, stated Mr. Ralph D. Baker, General Manager of James Richardson & Sons, Investment Dealers, in his annual year end message to managers and senior personnel of the firm's twenty-six offices across Canada. Mr. Baker went on to say: Admittedly the extent of our recovery from the recession is as yet only partial, nevertheless, it is felt that it has been sufficient to establish some very solid ground on which to build. All the elements necessary for the construction programme are present in the Canadian economy and their proper use rests on the establishment as rapidly as possible and administration of wise fiscal monetary and economic policies.

So much has been said of late regarding the dangers of inflation that a visiting independent observer could well be forgiven if he arrived at the conclusion that it was far more to be feared than the instability of idle resources. Inflation, so often thought of as an artificial buoyancy in our economy, is in practice the obvious result of a levelling or balancing process that is an inherent part of our economic system. A particularly clear demonstration of this process is to be noted in 1958 where money incomes and prices tended to move together and in harmony with the gradual change from recession to recovery conditions. Many charges have been levelled at inflation and its erosive effect on the economic status of individuals, corporations and governments. Few of the accusations stand up under close scrutiny said Mr. Baker. The entire history of Canada is one of almost continuous economic growth, both in physical and monetary terms, and with it the standard of living of the Canadian citizen has risen equally impressively. And yet, over the years the inflationary trend has kept pace with this physical and economic growth.

If the inflow of capital from the United States, the United Kingdom and certain European countries may be used as a yardstick there is much evidence of the external underlying confidence in the Canadian economy. It would seem that the real danger of inflation to Canada lies not in inflation itself but in taking steps to fight the chimerical danger of inflation which could seriously retard the whole economic

progress of the country. Now that the forces of recovery have begun to take hold, continued Mr. Baker, our monetary and fiscal policies have to be designed to stimulate their momentum. There must be an atmosphere calculated to encourage individual effort and create confidence on the part of the private investor not only within Canada but in other nations. It could be that in the past we have been inclined to be somewhat complacent or casual in regard to the development of our resources with the result that the contributions to the nation's economy at many levels have not only tended to be poorly timed but unbalanced, and on occasion, inadequate for the intended purposes. The condition, however, is by no means irrevocable. It is difficult to think of a time when the stimulus of courageously planned and well supported leadership in all divisions of our economy could be more rewarding than today.

Mr. Baker concluded his message by saying: While admittedly, many difficulties and problems appear to be facing the investor this is no time, however, to lose confidence. A policy of accumulation of carefully selected, well seasoned securities representing the basic industries of Canada is recommended.
