Mail Delivery To Serve Norman

Patrons of the present Norman post-office and residents of that area who receive their mail at the Kenora Post-office, are receiving with their mail, copies of a letter and descriptive forms, concerning the proposed establishment of a suburban mail delivery to serve that portion of Kenora. Recipients of this letter will be well advised to read the documents carefully and then inform the postal authorities on the forms provided of their wishes.

As reported the Member of Parliament "B.H." Bendickson, has, during a number of years been urging the department to improve the postal facilities in Norman to a level comparable with the services rendered in other sections of the town.

As a result a complete survey was made by department officials to determine the possibility of installing carrier service. Reports showed that it would be entirely out of the question to put in carrier service for several seasons. of the expanding number of residents. Bill recommended to the department that an effort be made to meet requirements for improved services by establishing

urban services." This would involve the use of group boxes located at key points to serve the maximum number of adjacent residents.

Already the use of group boxes at the outskirts of existing carrier routes in Kenora and along the rural routes has proved extremely satisfactory and has been enthusiastically accepted by those who now have that service.

At present there are about twelve units in use within the town limits of Kenora and within a few days two or three will be put into operation in Kewatin along the line of travel of the Pellatt-Laclu rural delivery route.

Delivery to and pick-up from such boxes is made daily and the units are so constructed that each family box is self contained and only accessible to the owner or occupant who alone has the padlock keys to the section. A leaflet describing the group unit accompanies the letter to residents. The only cost to the recipient of mail is the cost of the padlock and key which is a matter of the individual's choice.

A sub post-office will be located in Norman to handle general mail business such as registra-

tions, money-orders, larger parcels which will not fit in the box. Notices of such parcels will be placed in the box advising the owner to call at the sub-office.

It is inevitable, in view of general progress, that sooner or later the post office at Norman will become a sub-office with all sortation being done by the larger staff at Kenora, and it is not advisable that there be two separate post-offices within one town. The system of sub-offices has been found to be most satisfactory in all larger cities and also in Kenora

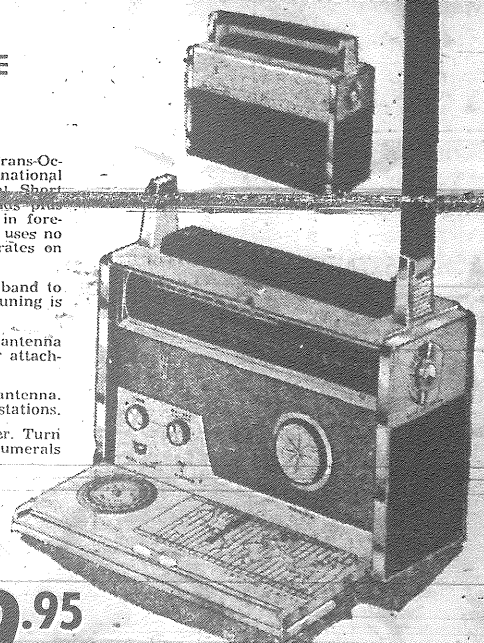
