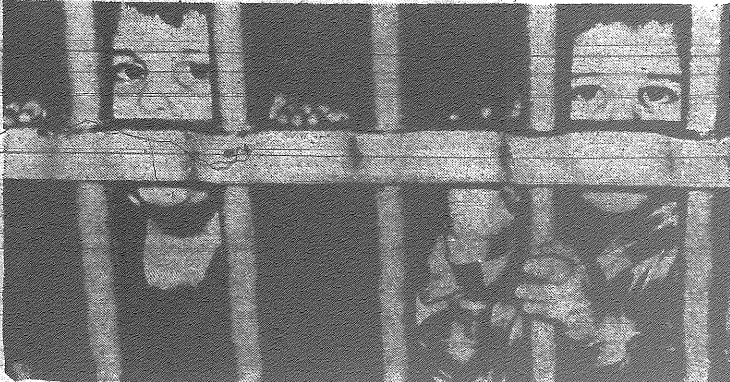

DR. S. BURRIS HEADS PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD

At the Inaugural Meeting of the Kenora Public School Board held last night in the Board Offices, Dr. S. M. Burris was re-elected Chairman of the Board and in a brief address, thanked the Board for the honour accorded him. He welcomed the guests, Mr. E. L. Carter, Chairman, and Mr. L. A. McLennan of the High School Board, and noted that the meetings of the Public School Board were very informal.

During the business session that followed, the Regular meeting of the Board were set for the third Monday of every month; accepted an invitation to attend the January 29th luncheon meeting of the Kenora Rotary Club.

to conduct Union negotiations; decided to attend a Teacher Salary meeting in Dryden; authorized payments of accounts amounting to \$6,374.04; renewed memberships in several trustee associations; gave the Town Engineer permission to relocate the road crossing the West Ward School playground; accepted a quotation for the installation of an inter-communication system at Evergreen School; asked the Architects for new plans for the fire escapes at South Ward School; and laid plans for setting up a kindergarten class at South Ward School to commence in September 1959.

The Management Committee reported activities of the various

schools, including visits made by pupils to the Library during Canada Book Week; the provision by a new crossing by the Town at North Ward School, noting with thanks that the Police Department is assisting in educating all pupils to use it; and the institution of an in-service training course in music, art, and physical education for the teachers.

The Supervisor of Maintenance reported considerable vandalism at King George VI School in the past months. Windows have been broken with rocks and B-B guns and during the recent holidays all the screens on one side of the school were slashed to pieces. At other schools, several flag pole ropes have disappeared, even though they were distinctly marked. The Police are investigating all these occurrences.

President W. H. Marr was in the chair, and one visitor, Mr

Charles Hayes, vice-principal of the school was welcomed. Attendance was 85.25%, reported George T. Beatty, acting secretary. Success was reported from other sources regarding the campaign to secure funds for Crippled Childrens' Centre to be built in Toronto, and members were urged to complete the local canvass. The resignation of Mr. Charles Zeal was received with sincere regret.

It was a problem to maintain the staff of the quality desired, and they usually spent many anxious moments filling vacancies. Yet despite this, a better than Provincial average was maintained, although they had to draw quite heavily on occasions from the Province of Manitoba, with results turning out well. There were signs, however, that this source of supply might prove more difficult in future.

Mr. McLennan felt that Eastern people do not know anything about Kenora, although they did not know what was known as the northern differential. He felt that perhaps Kenora was missing the boat in not directing some of its publicity and advertising to Canadians, and especially Eastern Canada.

We also did not produce too many high school teachers in this area, and only one on the present staff was from Kenora. The profession was apparently not so attractive to our young people, despite the attractive salaries paid, and he felt this offered a great challenge to our young people to take up the teaching profession in their own area.

Last year the school had experienced a very thorough inspection and received a very splendid report reflecting on the Principal and staff and the student body. It had fully indicated that we have a very fine school.

Mrs. Eleanor Fawcett, Kenora Public School Board representative on the Board and vice-chairman of management and chairman of the new Public Relations committee, said the board could see the necessity for a Public Relations committee to ensure sound and reasonable publicity. The Board had a dual

loyalty, one to the cause of Education and secondly to the taxpayers. They were looking forward to continued progress, and hoped to make a survey of the need for more technical training, and present the facts as clearly as possible to the public. They hoped to have all the answers in advance.

In the absence of Mr. Fred Collins, chairman of Finance, Mr. Joseph Bellamy, vice-chairman outlined costs of school and operation. Total cost of 1958 operations was \$264,500 of which \$181,433.00 was for teachers' salaries; p'ant operation \$29,090.68; maintenance \$3,735.49; auxiliary \$1,534.38; payments to other school boards \$706.96; transportation \$3,000.00; capital outlay, \$12,232.38; cafe etc., \$5,377.28; night schools \$1,132.50; miscellaneous \$1,583.20. The tax levy produced \$95,864.70; and government grants \$119,507.97. Bernie Marks, Separate School representative on the board, said that he was a very new member of only one week, and hoped to report more fully at a later date.

Vice-chairman A. O'son introduced the board's secretary, Mrs. Margaret Miller, who spoke briefly on her duties, and the kindness of the board members.

Chairman, E. L. Carter said that the high school system had made considerable progress in the last few years, and said the Board's duties were clearly defined, namely to ensure that the school operated with the proper staff, under the various acts, to

see all returns of operations were made, and insurance, repairs etc. were carried out.

Among things done was the appointment of Mr. C. Hayes as vice-principal; the determining of property lines with the Public School board; engagement of special constable to control traffic. Night classes had been discontinued with the exception of basic English, the grounds had been filled in considerably, the heating system converted to natural gas; and the opening of a new five class room addition.

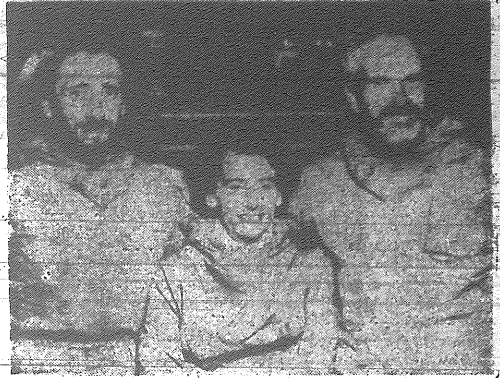

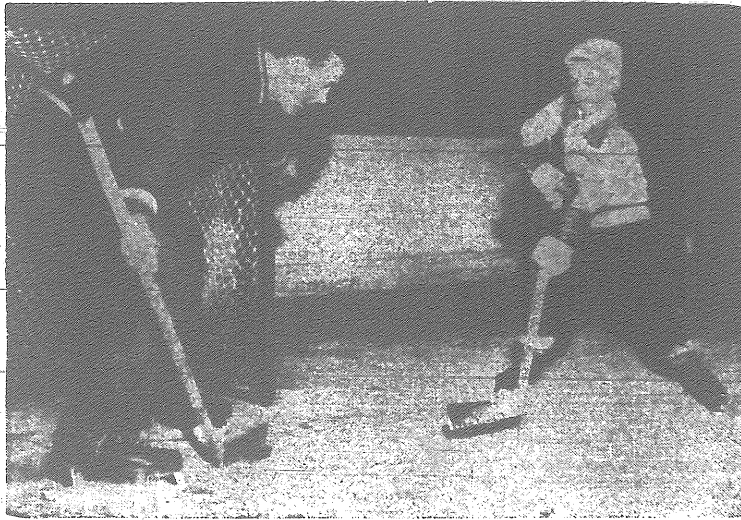

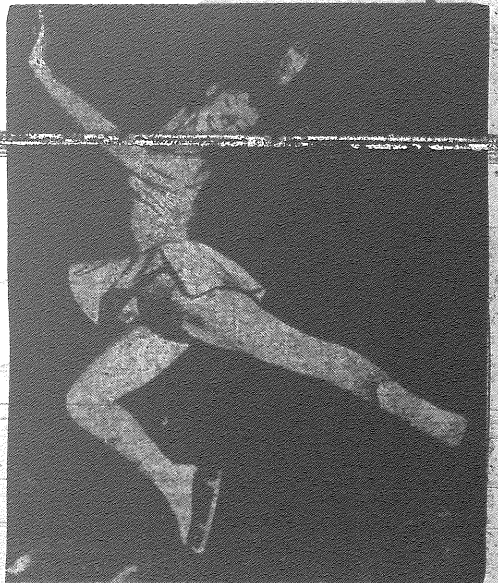

Dear Sir:

The project of a Receiving Home for the Kenora Children's Aid Society being located in the Lakeside area has met with some disapproval from that quarter. While it is desirable to hear valid reasons why the Receiving Home should not be established there, nevertheless, your report of the Council meeting held last Monday night in which Chief Constable Pike is reported to have said that there was no parking space in the area could hardly be given consideration: I'm sure that had the full text of Mr. Pike's letter been quoted the article would have

been interpreted quite differently.

The Children's Aid Society does not intend to operate a parking lot. The present purpose of the house is that of a boarding home, the occupants of which probably all drive cars and have no difficulty finding available parking space, as there is room for five cars at the house. The people that have been boarding at this house have been adults and the only significant change will be that instead of adults boarding in the home the occupants will be children - children who have been denied the right of being brought up in their own homes because of the inability of their parents for any number of reasons to care for them properly. The intention of the Society is to give them a temporary home


care before being placed in a foster home which will be chosen to meet their particular needs.

In that respect I fail to see how the Receiving Home can be called an institution, and it appears to me to be a tragedy that a project that could help so much in fostering good citizens for the future should fail on the ridiculous basis that there was not sufficient parking space.
