Fire Causes \$500 Damage

Prompt action by the Kenora Fire Department Sunday night, resulted in minor damage being done to a suite in the Henry's Book Store block.

The department was called by R. Milton at 2:55 p.m. when he noticed smoke coming from Suite 3, occupied by Bob Mills. Investigation showed that a fire had started presumed from a short circuit in the wiring of an electric refrigerator. Flames had started up the wall and ceiling of the kitchen. Firemen had the fire out in short order and damage is estimated at \$500.

Murder Charge To Be Heard Tomorrow

The preliminary hearing of a charge of murder, laid against Tom Young of Ear Falls, will open at 10 a.m. tomorrow in Magistrate's Court, Kenora. Magistrate J. V. Fregeau will preside. Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty will conduct the case for the Crown and J. T. Brett will act for the defence.

Tom Young will be charged tomorrow with the unlawful killing of Ontario Provincial Police Constable Calvin Russell Fulford of Ear Falls, who died early Christmas morning in that northern community. Four others were shot and killed the same day in the same community.

Death At Sioux Lookout
Ontario Provincial Police are investigating the death of a man at Sioux Lookout Sunday.

Corporal Sangster reported that the body of Stanley Skaski, 55, was found in a building on his property, lot 10 with a .22 calibre rifle beside it. Death is believed to be suicide. Police were originally called to investigate a fire which had completely destroyed the man's home.

This 14th annual bonspiel was a string of successes for this Winnipeg skip as he and his teammates, emerged as unbeaten champions of the spiel. Curling against the "surprise" rink skip

In receiving the trophy and accompanying prizes from Bill Johnson, representing the donors, Lindstrom and Nilson, Mark Gordon paid tribute to the many great curlers, "so many for such a small town." He also stated that Bill Johnson was one of the best curlers he had played against.

AFTERNOON DRAW



Guy's stock was further enhanced when he defeated the Chief of Police in the morning draw, dropping him alongside of Redding, who won from Frank Smith on the first draw.

This heading could be misunderstood as an advertisement but it is not so. It is an attempt to pay tribute to two men whose names are familiar to almost everyone.

Sam Gold and Charlie Zeal left Kenora almost a week ago. Their going was quiet and the mechanics of their move were simple as they had moved their homes to Winnipeg more than a year ago. Since that time they have been commuting to and from Kenora to carry on their business here.

Sam was the first of the two to come to Kenora. His first interest was the successful operation of a ladies' wear shop, known as Bernard's in the then Singer Block across from the Post Office. At the time when Mr. A. Coppleman decided to retire Sam saw an opportunity for a larger enterprise and interested his brother-in-law, Charles Zeal, in joining with him in acquiring the Coppleman-owned Shragge's Ltd., which had been for many years Kenora's higher quality men's wear business. All of this timed in with the moving of the business to the new store on Second Street with the addition of ladies' wear to the store and the abandoning of the Bernard business.

Misfortune struck the enterprising partners in the form of a total fire not much more than a year after the opening of the new store. With admirable courage Sam and Charles disposed of the damaged stock and rebuilt premises of even greater merchandising dimensions, making use of space which had been rented in the first building to the Masonic Lodges.

Almost exactly a year later both men were the victims of an automobile accident which caused them considerable discomfort and convalescence.

The story of the Zeal and Gold firm is one of success. They not only carried on the Shragge and Bernard traditions but increased the service offered to one, equal to fine urban establishments.

In addition to their business success both men have been good community builders. Boosters of hockey, curling and other sports they and their wives have been well known as supporters of cultural activities such as music festival, figure skating, celebrity concerts and local dramatics, toastmistress, home and school etc. They were active in the Masonic orders and Charlie has been in Rotary for some time. Their interests have been legion.

Both couples have a friendly warmth and it was disappointing to those who knew them then for good personal reasons they decided to move their homes to Winnipeg. Now that they have also removed their business interest there is a definite sadness among friends, customers and business associates who knew them so well.

Sam Gold and Charlie Zeal have left Kenora.

We will miss them and we wish them well.

TEACHERS PROTEST BOARD RULING

Belle River, Ont. - Teachers at North Essex District High School have protested a school board ruling that their salaries won't be raised until Grade 13 marks at the school are brought up to the provincial average.

The board made the ruling in reply to a request from the teachers for an across-the-board salary increase.

The teachers said salaries should not be based on grade 13 results since the level of instruction was only one of several factors entering into the final year standing. They asked for a meeting with the board as soon as possible.

The board contended Grade 13 results are frequently used as a "yardstick" for judging teaching ability by school inspectors. Belle River is about 20 miles east of Windsor.

RATE STRUCTURE DETAILED UNDER NEW ONTARIO HOSPITAL SCHEME

The new method of charging patient was faced with a final bill far in excess of that which he had anticipated. "Under the new inclusive rate system, the patient will know that the only factor affecting his final bill will be his length of stay in hospital" he added.

In discussing the new charges Mr. McClellan stressed the fact that the rates were struck on the basis of what it costs to operate the hospital. No provisions were made for capital expenditures which may be required for the purchase of new equipment or the extension of existing hospital facilities.

It was learned that money for capital expenditure would have to be obtained to a large extent through philanthropic giving. "The provision of hospital facilities and equipment is still the responsibility of the community, and when our hospital undertakes an expansion programme, we will have to depend to a large extent on the generosity of our citizens to provide a greater part of the money necessary to meet the cost of this expansion."

The Kenora Chairman emphasized that government participation in the field of hospital insurance was not intended, as some people believe, to solve all the hospital's problems. This, he claimed was merely an extension of the government's "partnership" with hospitals in helping to meet an urgent community


