## Deal Men To Attend Farm Safety Conference

How can farm people live safely?

This will be the theme for a day Farm Safety Conference to be held on February 10 and 11 at the Ontario Agricultural College under the joint sponsorship of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Ontario Department of Transport. Addressing from this district will be John Corner of Oxdrift and Leo Herbach of R.R. 2, Kenora.

The conference will bring together a selected group of some public-spirited Ontario farmers representing every county and district in Ontario. The day will be devoted to a thorough province-wide Farm Accident Survey to be conducted by the Ontario Department of Agriculture for the year from March 1, 1959 to February 28, 1960. The survey will determine the accident picture in Ontario and help give impetus to farm organizations in Ontario government in education program designed to reduce the number of accidents on Ontario farms.

The first day of the conference will be devoted to a Farm Accident Survey. A Farm Safety Session will then discuss aspects of farm safety, including safety in the farm home, and fire safety on the farm.

The second day will deal with various aspects of traffic safety, and how it can be achieved through enforcement, through highway, traffic, and automotive engineering, through education and community organization, and through driver licensing and the point system.

The conference will draw to a close with a discussion by several rural leaders on the subject: "What can farm people and their organizations do to help prevent accidents?"
