

EVIDENCE TAKEN IN CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE CHARGE ON FRIDAY

The preliminary hearing of a charge of manslaughter against Leo Leroux, laid following the death early January 24th of Margaret Joan Hatle, was heard Friday afternoon by Magistrate J. V. Fregeau. At the conclusion of a three and a half hour session, the Court granted a defence request that the decision be handed down at a time when bondsmen, if needed, would be present. The decision of the Court will be made known, Monday morning.

First of the dozen witnesses called by Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty to testify, was Dr. Earl Bryngelson. The Doctor told of answering a call to St. Joseph Hospital early January 24th to attend those injured in an automobile accident which had just occurred beyond the eastern limits of the Town on Highway 17. Witness said that he pronounced the victim, dead.

Dr. S. M. Burris, coroner, said

that in the course of his duties he had examined the body of the victim, and had found no external evidences of the cause of death.

Dr. Dave Halliwell said that he had conducted a post mortem examination on January 24th, and described to the Court the numerous internal injuries which he said, caused death.

SCENE EXAMINED

Constable George Orosy said that he was called to the scene of the accident at 12:55 a.m. January 24th, arriving with Con. Miller about ten minutes later. He told of seeing two women lying on the ground beside a damaged car. Two parked trucks were also in the immediate vicinity. A detailed description of the scene and the vehicles involved was given in evidence together with a sketch of the area. Numerous photos were identified, which showed the road and vehicles after the accident and also some later daylight shots.

Con. Orosy said that he had examined the vehicles; taken certain measurements and had indicated to Leo Leroux, driver of the 1936 Chevrolet, one of the three vehicles involved in the collision, that he would take him to hospital for attention. Mr. Leroux, bleeding from the face, complained also of sore ribs.

Mr. Harry Walsh of Winnipeg, acting for the defence, questioned the witness closely concerning the position of the vehicles, and especially the matter of lights on the two trucks.

Corp. Herb Roller identified numerous photos which he took between 1:30 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. January 24th at the scene, as well as other photos taken later at the same spot.

AT THE HOSPITAL

At this point the Court adjourned, to transfer hearings to St. Joseph Hospital where the evidence of Evelyn Shouldice, the third occupant of the Leroux car, was taken.

Forty five minutes later, back in the Court House, David Blank, who was working in the bar of the Lakeshore Hotel January 23rd, told of seeing Mr. Leroux

and two women in the beverage room, about 9:45 p.m. Mr. Walsh suggested that the actual consumption of beer of the individuals was not kept track of, and might have been less than estimated.

Joseph Shouldice, father of Evelyn, told of two visits by the accused, at his house early in the evening of January 23rd. "He wasn't drunk when he left me," he told the Court, speaking of Mr. Leroux.

TRUCK TROUBLE

Ed Cedarwall, driver of a 3-ton Ford truck, told of his trouble in bringing a load of pulp from Andy Lake to Kenora the night

Damage to the Dodge front end was estimated at \$350. The truck escaped serious damage.

At 9:00 a.m. a Ford station wagon, driven by Arnold Reid of Pellatt and a 1937 Dodge, driven by Marcel Fontaine, collided at the corner of Matheson Street and McLellan Avenue. Considerable damage was caused to the left sides of both vehicles.

"James Craig, Man At The Piano"

The following music review appeared in the Hamilton Press and will be of interest to the many friends of James Craig. Well known locally, Mr. Craig taught at the public schools before leaving for Toronto where is on staff at the Toronto Conservatory of Music and also director of the Toronto Opera club.

"JAMES CRAIG, THE MAN AT THE PIANO"

The Duet Club Recital at the Dalewood Auditorium Saturday afternoon was a double scoup, first for the Toronto Conservatory Opera Festival Artists and secondly for the Duet Club itself.

Saturday afternoon is not the most propitious time to hold a recital of any sort, and with the Metropolitan Opera available at the turn of the dial, possibly less so for an operatic recital.

But the Dalewood school auditorium was packed and additional chairs had to be brought in for the late comers. If the quality of the programmes continue in the calibre of Saturday's, there is little doubt of a crisis returning to the club in the future.

The Artists were four members of the Toronto Opera Festival Company Iona Kombrink, Teresa Stratas, Patricia Snell and John Arab. David Ouchterlony, Supervisor of the Branches of the Royal Conservatory in Milton Cross-fashion introduced each artist and aria, wrapping a fair amount of information in palatable cloak of wit, urbanity and good humour.

It is difficult to know where to start in this prima donna studded Recital, so we will begin with the least likely, "the man at the piano" James Craig.

The accompanist, the forgotten man in a recital of this sort

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Mozart's "Marriage of Figaro"

Miss Kombrink brought the voice that won her the coveted Metropolitan Opera auditions of the air last year, an instrument assured and full in its range, one of warmth and power. Her manner is regal and poised, a rounding performance of 14-carat professionalism.

Miss Snell's voice might be thinner not derogatorily so, but in some ways more colourful than that of Miss Kombrink's. She has vitality and innate dramatic sense. With Mr. Arab the duo showed impeccable ensemble, not only musically but dramatically following into the line of the love aria.

Mr. Arab also joined Teresa Stratas in the "Voglie Danzar pel tuo piacer" from "Carmen" and in it displayed the lyric tenor lent to his voice in Don Jose's beautifully pathetic melody "Il foir che avevi". Miss Stratas has a voice that excites, not so much in what it can do now, but in what it will do. It is an instrument of natural beauty and drama which time and further study will possibly ripen into one of the finest operatic sopranos of our time. This young Greek Canadian soprano rounded out her programme with "Un Be Di" from Madame Butterfly and "Pace Pace" from "La Fro Forza Del Destino". Certainly she places second to none as an actress.

Mr. Arab concluded his programme with Bizet's Open Thine Heart, with a voice of control power and sweetness.

The warm applause that greeted the artists, particularly the accompanist at the close of the recital, left nothing more to be said. Proceeds will go to the Duet Club Scholarship awarded this year to Michal Koran, of Dundas.

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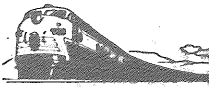
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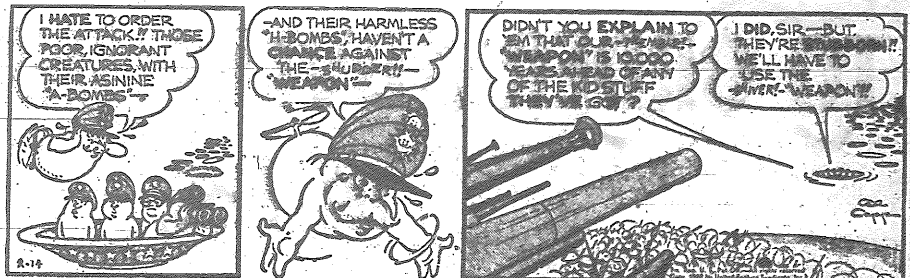


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Experienced Cast To Offer Difficult Production Tuesday

Onlookers at last night's rehearsal of "I Rise In Flames," predict that this play by Tennessee Williams will afford a half hour of arresting entertainment when it is presented on Tuesday evening at the Kenora District Music Festival. The tensely moving little drama, which is concerned with the last day in the life of the rebel-novelist, D. H. Lawrence, presents enough problems to put the director, Mrs. Veronica Kirk, as well as the line cast she has chosen, on their mettle.

The central figure, Lorenzo, as he is intimately known, must be shown as a dying man, and yet one with force and passion enough to go on fighting for, and fiercely expounding, the causes he so splendidly believes in. Mr. Fowles has shown notable skill in performing difficult roles before, and he has been seen by

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Kenora audiences in almost every theatrical capacity. His cockney character in "Shanghai," which won him the best actor's award in the Festival, will long be remembered. He was able to gain the best actor's title a second time by his performance in the lead role in "The Fitch of Bacon." When Frank takes on a role he adds a professional polish to it, and he showed last night that he could get under the skin of the controversial figure, and reveal both the bravura and poignancy of the man that was Lawrence.

Playing Freida, Lawrence's wife, Mrs. Jane Burns has to make a similar contradictory hurdle in showing the alternate toughness and tenderness which this character displays towards her high strung artist husband. There is one point in the story when she is called upon to achieve a powerful dramatic effect by merely showing restraint, and this she accomplishes admirably. Her experience in directing the award winning "Men in the Bowler Hat," and on stage in "Babbie's Boy" and "Sleeping Dogs" have helped give her the stature to take on this demanding role.

Mrs. Peggy Cowlard has always taken a behind-the-scenes interest in theatrical work, but in "I Rise In Flames" she will go before the footlights as Brett, the Lawrence's friend, a character almost as complex as those of the writer and his wife. One emotion of Brett's is swiftly overtaken by another, and Mrs. Cowlard shows a neat ability in bringing about these changes.

The play can be said to be "talky" but by no means static. On the contrary it fairly shimmers as the afternoon in the Riviera sun wears on. The cast, as

To Open North Patricia Dist. To Hunting - Fishing

TORONTO — Plans are under way to open the Patricia area — the hinterland of northern Ontario hitherto closed to hunting and fishing — for approximately 200 miles north of the present line.

In making the announcement, the Hon. J. W. Spooner, Ontario Minister of Lands and Forests, also said that it is planned to open this area to acceptance of applications for limited tourist development.

"This brings the area to approximately the 54th parallel," the Minister explained. "The opening is the result of studies made during the past few years by the staff on the potentialities of the game and fish resources in Patricia."

"Further studies are proceeding in the area north of the 54th parallel."

Check Wiring Fire Chief Warns

Fire Chief Davie issued a warning today against faulty wiring in many of Kenora's homes.

"Electricity is as safe as it is possible for any lighting, cooking and heating method to be," the Chief said, "but figures from the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office show that one out of every ten fires in Ontario was caused by the misuse of electricity. That means human carelessness was to blame. It also means that fires caused by the wrong use of electricity can be prevented."

The Fire Chief made this statement in support of National Electrical Week, February 8 to 14. He is urging citizens to take stock of the possible electrical fire hazards which they may have in their homes.

One of the most common hazards, the Chief pointed out, is the carelessly used extension cord. These should never be used

to effect electrical connections for heaters, irons, range-tops or other heavy current users. Many of these cords are just not designed to carry the load and will often overheat thereby eventually destroying the insulation and constituting a high fire hazard. Many homes in Kenora were wired before the introduction of today's wonderful electrical servants and are consequently un-

safe from the standpoint of load-carrying capacity when these appliances are installed.

"To be safe from fire and to enjoy all the benefits of a modern electrical age," Chief Davie suggested, "have your wiring inspected by Ontario Hydro and observe the simple rules of electrical fire safety. It will pay you now and in the years to come."

Evidence Taken In Criminal

(Continued from Page 1)

of January 23rd. Overheating had caused "considerable trouble en route to Kenora, the latest of several stops being about a mile east of the Town limits, just east of Whitehead's Ranch road. His brother, who had come out from town to assist, was proceeding immediately ahead in a half-ton truck. Witness said that his brother, noticing the large truck had stopped, turned around and returned to the scene, pulling in to the left (north) side of the road, and stopping possibly 20 feet directly behind the wood truck. Witness said that dim headlights, cluster lights, turn signal lights and rear clearance lights were all burning, as were the dim headlights and turn signal lights of the half-ton truck, at the time of the accident. The two brothers were in the smaller truck getting warm, after again working on the larger truck, when the accident occurred.

Mr. Cederwall said that immediately after noticing the headlights of an approaching car, he remembered nothing until a man at the truck window inquired if he was alright.

Mr. Walsh reviewed the evidence, dealing particularly with the matter of lights and the manner in which the half ton truck had been parked. "I suggest to you that your brother parked facing east on the south side of the road". Mr. Cederwall was emphatic that such was not the case. His truck was parked directly behind my three ton truck in order to give one clear lane, was the answer. Witness said that the accused was in a dazed condition when he first saw him.

John Johnson, a youthful appearing 22 year old Sioux Narrows resident, told the Court that he was returning home after midnight, January 24th. Just east of the Kenora jail a 1955 Chevrolet passed him, said the witness. Moments later after rounding the curve by the Town limits, Mr. Johnson said the Chevrolet had pulled to the extreme right side of the road, so he passed. Witness said he travelled between 55 and 60 m.p.h. up the straight stretch and the hill, slowing to 35 m.p.h. after rounding the curve at the top of the hill when he saw the lights of a parked truck. Just as he was within 4 feet of meeting the parked truck, witness said he suddenly spotted the Chevrolet beside him and passing. Mr. Johnson said he saw the car strike the front corner of the pulpwood truck box, swing around and in a backward motion, strike the parked half ton truck, driving it back about 90 feet. After stopping as quickly as possible, witness said he returned to Town to report the accident.

Corporal Smaile told of taking a statement from the accused at 4.00 p.m. January 31st. Mr. LeRoux had been in hospital until that time, had given the statement freely, said the witness.

Final witness was Con. Miller, who told of being present when the statement was taken. The statement, entered as an exhibit, was not read to the Court.

Court closed at 5.40 p.m.
