President Mr. M. L. Roy, speaking on behalf of the Board of Directors, stated the year 1958 had been another year of steady growth with:

(1) Total Assets of One-Half Million Dollars.

(2) Largest increase in membership of any year in existence.

(3) Purchase of the Donnelly Block to house the new offices.

Some of the recommendations of the Board of Directors presented and approved were:

4% Dividened on Shares.

5% Refund on Interest.

Thomas Johnston, Keewatin Pioneer Died This Morning

Thomas Edward Johnston, Keewatin's oldest resident, who resided here for seventy-two years, died early this morning, Monday, February 16 at the Kenora General Hospital, following a short illness. Born in Iceland, June 19, 1865, he was in his 94th year.

He received his education in Iceland and came to Keewatin in 1887. He was married at Keewatin, October 31, 1890 to the former Ingibjorg Magnusson. The couple celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary last year. He was employed in lumbering and fishing in the early days, then joined the Lake of the Woods Milling Company, retiring in 1932 after forty-two years of service. He was a member of the Keewatin Orange Lodge and the Retired Men's Association.

He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. Esther Haugh of Winnipeg.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Wednesday afternoon, February 18th at two o'clock. Rev. Albert Dunn of Keewatin United Church will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery. Please omit flowers.

Magistrate's Court

Chickens on the loose and a dead cat caused much confusion at Magistrate's Court this morning, when they were mentioned as evidence in a case where a local resident was charged with causing a disturbance and molesting his neighbour. The case terminated with the man being charged, paying a fine of \$22 and posting a bond of \$100 to keep the peace.

Three Brandon youths were committed for seven days when found guilty of having liquor in their possession while under the age of 21. A Kenora youth on a similar charge paid his fine.

For selling liquor to persons under 21 years old, a local man paid \$50 and costs or 30 days.

Two Pellatt residents appearing on drunk charges had the option of \$10 fines or 7 days and two Kenora ladies took the 7 days in lieu of fines on similar charges.

A Pellatt man found guilty of impaired driving paid \$100 and costs plus automatic licence suspension.

POETRY - CHORAL READING CLASSES EARN PRAISE OF ADJUDICATOR

The first section of the Kenora District Music Festival opened this morning at the Legion auditorium with Mrs. Jean MacDonald adjudicating 2 classes of Spoken Poetry and 1 class of grade 3 Choral Reading.

Canon Watts, the platform marshal for the session welcomed everyone and also the adjudicator Mrs. MacDonald. The adjudicator said she was pleased to see so many boys and girls taking part, being particularly impressed with all the boys in white shirts. She put all the en-

trants at their ease and told them not to be afraid.

In the grade 3 Choral Speaking, South Ward School came first with 78. The conductor was J. Ross. The Evergreen School choir conducted by, Verna E. Spurr received the second highest mark of 76. "Good speech begins in the home. Parents should not put speech into the lap of the teachers," said the adjudicator. Mrs. MacDonald demonstrated clearly to the choirs just what she wanted to hear in "No Sir", an old English Ballad.

In speaking to the 8 entrants of grade 7 boys in the Spoken Poetry Class reciting "Sea Fever" by John Manefield, Mrs. MacDonald said, "my this is a nice class of boys who did some very lovely work. "This pleased me", she said because when I see boys in front like this, I feel Canada is safe. She told the class to think when they pick up a poem to read, "who did the poet have in mind? Who would be the ideal speaker and Who would be the ideal listener?" "Every single one of you boys had excellent training, she said, and once or twice I got the yearning." KENORA RAILROADERS' CREDIT UNION DECLARES DIVIDENDS - REBATES

A banquet attended by 325 members celebrated the fifth Annual Meeting of the Kenora Railroaders' Credit Union at the Canadian Legion Building on Friday, February 13th.

At the business meeting following the banquet, the Manager, E. LeBlou, told of the progress made by this Credit Union during the past year, and reported assets of \$287,884.95, an increase of \$125,811.00 over a year ago. Membership at the end of the year stood at 850 as compared with 670 at the end of 1957.

Dividends of 4 1/2% were declared on shares, 4% on estate shares, and 4% on deposits; and a rebate of interest paid on personal loans of 20% was approved.

Mr. J. M. Homer, Director of Education and promotion for the Ontario Credit Union League, was the guest of honor and delivered an inspiring and interesting talk explaining the many ways that the Credit Union can assist its members and telling of the ideals embodied in the Credit Union movement. He gave a number of examples of how membership in the Credit Union had provided assistance to members in times of trouble and told of many cases of membership

helping to prevent or overcome personal or domestic distress.

Mr. J. N. Davidson, a director of the Ontario Credit Union League and National Director of the Credit Union Association, spoke briefly, commending the Railroaders Credit Union on its growth and telling about how the first Credit Unions were formed in the district.

Other visitors present included S. Magnusson, manager of Keewatin Citizen's Credit Union; L. Wise, president of Kendo (Kenora) Credit Union; J. Roberts, president of the Kenora District Credit Union Chapter; L. Roy, President of Notre Dame Parish Credit Union; and members from several other Credit Unions in the district. The election of officers to fill expiring terms resulted in B. Sinclair and A. Stout being re-elected to the Board of Directors and W. O. Fonges being elected for his first term. J. Francis was elected to fill a vacancy on the Credit Committee, and H. Michaluk was re-elected to the Supervisory Committee.

Following the business meeting a very successful dance was held at which Tom Brown's orchestra provided the music.

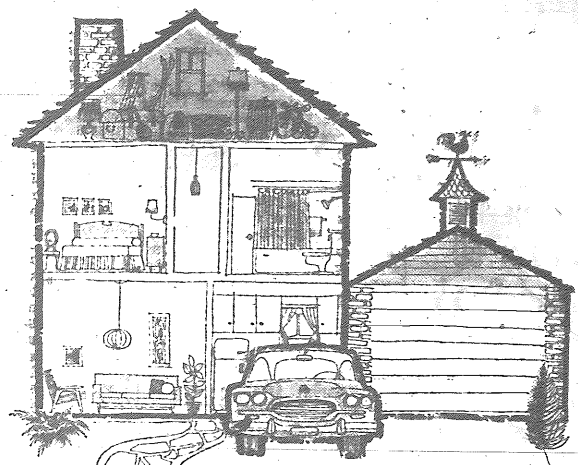

Canadian Chamber Plans Seminar At Kenora - May 28

Representatives from some 250 communities in Ontario have been invited to participate in 18 seminars on executive training at the community level to be held from February until May. Sponsored by The Ontario Chamber of Commerce and The Canadian Chamber of Commerce, two seminars will be held in Northwestern Ontario, at the Lakehead, May 26 and at Kenora, May 28.

These are part of a program of some 50 seminars scheduled during the next few months across Canada. The program was initiated at Sydney, Nova Scotia, last fall, and seminars have also been held in Ontario, Quebec, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

These one-day conferences of community leaders are designed to help make local Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce a still more effective force for community growth and improvement. At the 18 seminars in Ontario, board and chamber leaders will discuss how they can provide better leadership and organization in the service of their communities. Each of the seminars will bring together regional Board and Chamber personnel, businessmen from surrounding communities and staff personnel from the Canadian Chamber and the Ontario Chamber.

The program at the Ontario seminars will include three separate and concurrent sessions on the respective roles of the president, the secretary and the committee chairman in Board and Chamber work. These will be followed by group discussions on such topics as "program of work", "putting projects into action", "money and manpower", "area projects and problems".

The Ontario C.U. League gave a very informative talk on the growth and progress of Credit Unions under the title of "Twelve Months of Progress".

"As a result of a recommendation to make Cuna a world-wide organization two new leagues were admitted - The Fiji League in South Pacific and New South Wales League in Australia. It makes no difference, said Mr. Homer, whether a man is black, white, brown, whether he makes his living assembling autos in Detroit or Oakville, or growing coconuts on an island in the Pacific; whether his religion is the same as yours or mine, no matter what his situation may be, Credit Unions have something to offer him - the door is always open to him.

Further in his speech Mr. Homer stated "we talk of Communism as something base, as contrary to all good thinking - which it is - but Communism is an ideal. You cannot shoot it, you cannot confine it in a prison, but you can put it out of business by advancing an idea that is better. We believe the philosophy of the Credit Union movement is an ideal - a great ideal which, if it could be put into practice throughout,

U.S. WHEAT HIGH IN RADIATION

ST. PAUL, MINN. - Minnesota scientists have turned up a batch of northern plains wheat, grown sometime between 1936 and 1958, that contained more than six times the supposed tolerable limit of nuclear fallout-produced strontium-90.

The batch was one of 30 sampled from 10 areas. The scientists said the strontium-90 average of all 1958 wheat crop sampling was 1 1/2 times the "safe limit." The 1956 crop was barely over the limit.

"We did not expect to find as high quotas in the wheat," Dr. Maurice E. Vissler, chief of the

University of Minnesota medical school's physiology department, said.

He insisted, however, there was no need for panic.

"Much of the wheat's radioactive material is lost in milling," Vissler said. "Even after that, wheat makes up only a small part of the average diet."

Forest Industries Association To Summarize Data

TORONTO — The 54 member companies of the Ontario Forest Industries Association intend to proceed immediately with a project to summarize data obtained by individual companies on the condition of cut-over lands resulting from logging operations.

Announcement of the plan was made known by Julian H. Merrill, RPF, of Fort William, O.F.I.A. president, who is also vice president of woodlands, Great Lakes Paper Co.

The O.F.I.A. serves as the central agency for the 54 pulp and paper companies, sawmill operators and independent pulpwood producers as a means of solving mutual forest problems. The companies carry out logging operations on more than 79,000 square miles of Crown lands in the province.

"The pooling of information on reforestation will be a valuable guide to both industry and government in determining future forest productivity", said Mr. Merrill.

He said that all the pulp and paper companies, and many of the saw - timber operators, conduct periodic regeneration surveys on cut-over lands. Such surveys cover hundreds of square

miles in widely separated areas. These surveys therefore, provide a good sample of what actually becomes established.


He expressed the forest industry's belief that the condition of cut-over lands was much better than generally believed. Survey results from some companies indicated complete restocking with desirable coniferous trees within a few years after logging. When failures occurred, more intensive

research was required on cause of failure, said Mr. Merrill. He also pointed out that plantation programs may be necessary in some areas but that planting trees was the most expensive of all ways to ensure a second crop.

In commenting on a recent statement from the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests that nearly one-third of cut-over area required special treatment such as planting, the O.F.I.A. pre-

sident said that industry's experience indicated such estimate was greatly exaggerated and that the true figure was very much less.

"In any event," he said, "The substantial body of factual data on regeneration gathered by the forest industry when put together will permit an analysis of the problem. We desire to minimize haphazard opinion and study the economic facts."
