The Young Naturalists Club has the support of leading authorities in the educational, conservation, government and communications field, and is the result of many months of research and planning.

## New Legion Building Opened At Dryden

DRYDEN — Representatives from many Legion branches in Northwestern Ontario were present with local members for the official opening of the new Dryden Legion Hall Thursday.

Some 25 branches in the Thunder Bay, Kenora, and Rainy River Districts sent representatives to Dryden for the occasion.

The ceremonies got underway at 3:00 p.m. with the laying of a wreath at the cenotaph by Lt. Col. A. Evans, Command President. Legion members gathered at the town hall at 2:15 and following the wreath laying ceremony marched to the Legion Hall. Opening ceremonies at the hall commenced at 3:30 p.m. Dinner followed a cocktail hour between five and 6:30. Dedication of the new branch colors took place immediately after dinner (around nine p.m.) and was followed by a social evening.

The hall was opened to public inspection between ten a.m. and six p.m. Friday and a public dance was from eight p.m. to two a.m. the same evening.

## To Present Ontario's Budget Next Wednesday

Toronto — Ontario may get its first billion-dollar budget next week.

Provincial Treasurer Allan told the legislature that he will bring down his budget for the coming fiscal year next Wednesday.

Record expenditures are expected but outsiders can only guess how much they'll go above the \$956,000,000 budgeted last year.

Major government departments are reported to be planning only slight increases in spending, but an expanded mental health program announced by the government could bring a big boost.

## 1958 Car Entries Maintain Average Of Last 6 Years

The number of U.S. Cars entering Ontario during 1958 totaled 1,499,740. Travel and Publicity Minister Bryan L. Cathcart announced. This figure has been established by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Compared with 1957, the total is down 34,102, or 2.2 per cent, erasing part of the 3.3 per cent gain registered in 1957. The average for the last six years has been quite constant, however, with minor gains and losses alternating. The last big swing occurred in 1953 when a gain of 137,015 was achieved over the preceding year. This was followed by a

loss of 41,757 in 1954, a gain of 57,564 in 1955, another loss of 64,582 in 1956, still another gain of 48,482 in 1957, and finally last year's decrease of 34,102.

The average for the last six years has been around 1,500,000 T.V.P. entries from the United States.

Total entries for Canada last year were 2,547,391, down 7,683 from 1957, or just about 0.3 per cent. Ontario accounted for 53.9 per cent of the total.

## Ottawa Considering New Customs Post On Rainy River

Further consideration is to be given to the establishment of a customs post on Rainy Lake, as recommended by the Fort Frances Chamber of Commerce.

The Hon. Eileen Fairclough, minister of citizenship and immigration, wrote W. M. Benidickson, M.P. as follows:

"I have received your letter of February 3, concerning the establishment of an additional customs post on Rainy Lake. After my letter of December 18, 1958, to you on this subject, a meeting was held between immigration and customs officials with a view to making a recommendation on the matter. At this meeting the customs and excise

officers found they required further detailed information from their collector at Fort Frances. My officers have just been informed that the report needed from the Fort Frances collector has been received and another meeting is to be held quite soon."

# HAROLD WHITEMAN TO RECEIVE MERIT AWARD

His Excellency the Right Honourable Vincent Massey, C.H. Governor-General of Canada, in his capacity as Chief Scout for Canada is pleased to announce on the occasion of the anniversary of the birthday of Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell, that Harold A. Whiteman of Kenora, District Badge Secretary, is to be awarded the "Medal of Merit" for good services to scouting. It is expected that Mr. Whiteman will be presented with the medal at the annual Boy Scouts Association of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario to be held in Winnipeg on March 6th.

Harold Whiteman, born and educated in Kenora has a long and distinguished record of service to the local Scouts and Cubs dating back to the year 1931. It was in that year that Harold commenced work with the scouts in the old Y.M.C.A. He went from there to Knox United Church where he had his own Cub pack till 1936 when he joined the service. At the end of the war in 1945, Harold returned to Kenora and resumed his work with the Scouts.

For three nights a week until 1952, when illness forced him to give up the work he loved, Harold looked after two cub packs and one scout troop at Knox. He was then made District Cubmaster, visiting various groups when

his health permitted. In 1956, when he was confined to a wheel chair, Harold was forced to give up the work he loved so much but he still maintained an interest in scouting and accepted the office of Badge Secretary for the district, a position he holds today.

Not only does he pass Cubs and Scouts in signalling but the Girl Guides and Brownies wend their way to his home in Lakeside to pass their signalling tests too.

With the formation of the 1st Kenora Sea Scouts two years ago, Harold again took an active part in the organization of this new group by serving as an assistant to Scouter C. Winfield. In January of this year, the group was divided into a senior and junior division, with Harold assuming command of the senior boys. These scouts go to Harold's home for their meetings, recognizing that they have a leader of highest calibre and they want to go where it is easiest for him.

The whole community joins in saluting Scouter Harold Whiteman, rejoicing with him that his meritorious service has been rewarded. Citizens and boys and girls salute too, a man, not only a scout's ideal, but the ideal of all — a man whose example of triumph over difficulty is an example for all to follow. 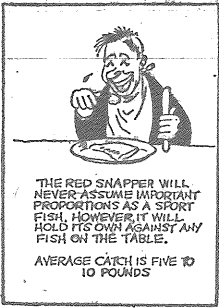

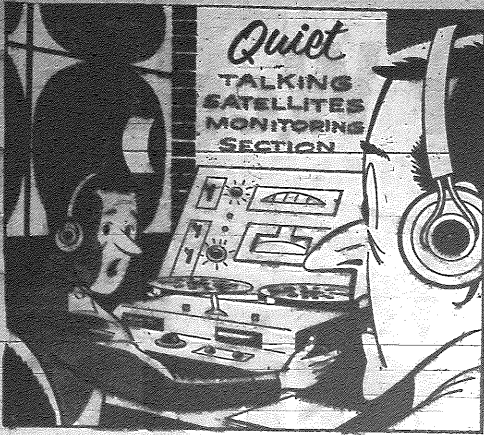

### Smoking Helps Prevent High Blood Pressure

LONDON — A team of scientists at Birmingham University says if smoking helps to cause lung cancer, then it also helps to prevent high blood pressure.

In an article in the medical journal Lancet, the scientists report that examination of more than 1,700 elderly men showed substantially more cases of high blood pressure among non-smokers. The same tests showed a greater number of cases of lung cancer and bronchitis among smokers.

The team, led by Professor Thomas McKeown, said there were as many cases of high blood pressure among smokers who had given up the habit as there were among men who had never smoked.

### More Dwellings Completed in 1958

Both starts and completions of new residential units set new records in 1958, DBS reports in an advance statement. Starts increased nearly 35% to 164,632 units from 122,340 in 1957 and bettered by 19% the previous peak of 138,276 reached in 1955. Completions climbed 25% in the year to 146,686 units from 117,200 in the preceding year and exceeded by 8% the previous high of 135,700 units set in 1956.

In December the number of starts rose to 9,596 units from 8,

241 in the same month of 1957 and the number of completions to 13,489 units from 10,472. At December 31 there were 88,162 units in various stages of construction, up sharply (21%) from the year-earlier total of 72,573 units.

More units were completed in 1958 than in 1957 in all provinces and more were completed in all except Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. Units under construction at year's end were more numerous than a year earlier in all provinces except New Brunswick. More units were started in December compared to a year earlier in all provinces except Ontario, Manitoba and Alberta, while more were completed in all except Alberta.

### THE 10 COMMANDMENTS FOR GUNS

- (1) Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.
- (2) Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- (3) Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- (4) Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction

of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

(5) Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

(6) Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.

(7) Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.

(8) Never climb a tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

(9) Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your back-stop is adequate.

(10) Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

### NEW MANUAL FOR DRIVERS

A new textbook has been issued by the Department of Transport to replace the old Motorist's Manual, and bring Ontario motorists up to date on the requirements of the law and the rules of good driving.

The new 72-page booklet is called the Driver's Handbook and includes all recent amendments to the Highway Traffic Act.

The Handbook deals in simple language with the rules of the road and with all other subjects such as parking, what to do in case of accident, a car and its equipment, licence information, sign shapes and colours, and finally the new demerit point system.

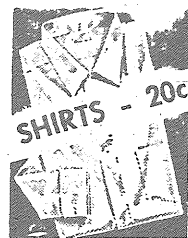

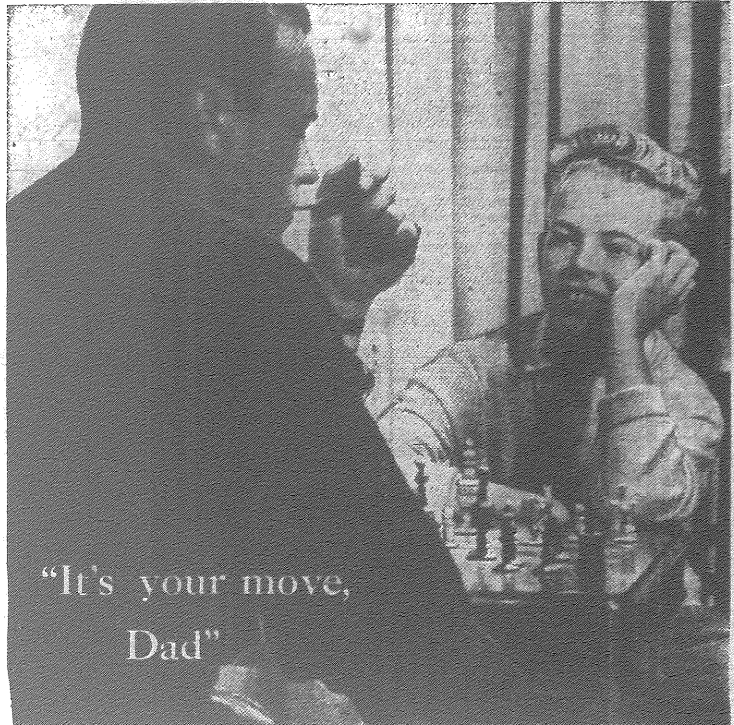
## Demerit System To Get 2 Month Trial Run

The new demerit point system for traffic offences is undergoing a two-month trial run during which demerit points are not assessed, Transport Minister John Yaremko, Q.C., announced in the Legislature.  
 The system was inaugurated on February 1 but, until April 1, points will not be registered against drivers. During the trial period, persons convicted of a serious enough offence will receive a letter bringing to their attention the point system and

Another reason to postpone the effective start of the system is the increase in speed limits which is contemplated for certain highways. Starting in April, the speed limit will be increased from 55 to 60 m.p.h. on divided highways, excepting certain sections where the limit will still be 50 m.p.h. And on August 1, the maximum speed will be raised from 55 to 60 m.p.h. in many sections of two-lane King's Highways where warranted and recommended by traffic engineers and the Provincial Police.

On account of these changes, Mr. Yaremko said, there will be no assessment of points for exceeding speed limits by 10 m.p.h. or less until after August 1 of this year when all the speed limits and signs have been changed.

### SENATOR ASKS RELIGION IN POLITICS

OTTAWA — Senator Muriel Fergusson says there should be more religion in politics.

"We Canadians have a prejudice against mixing religion and politics," she told a meeting. "To me, this seems an irrational and unjustified prejudice."

Senator Fergusson, the New Brunswick Liberal, addressed 100 Anglican university students attending a national conference of Canterbury clubs.

Many Christians avoid politics because they are afraid they will be "contaminated" by the conflicts and compromises so often demanded in political life, she said. But they still were "really responsible" for the acts of political officials.

"We are the culprits when the society of which we are a part behaves in an immoral fashion," Senator Fergusson said.

### High School Driver Education Needed Speaker States

We do not have to choose between traffic safety and space-ships", said Mr. Ira G. Needles, President of the Ontario Safety League and Chairman of B. F. Goodrich Canada Ltd., in a recent speech. He was discussing the reluctance of some educators to introduce high school driver education in view of Russia's lead in science teaching. "Driver Education does not displace any cultural subject from the curriculum, and I think the time will come when all our high schools

will produce better educated boys and girls, and better drivers too."

There is no effective substitute for driver education in school, he went on. Driving skill can be learned elsewhere, but skill is only a minor part of good driving. The foremost essential is good Attitudes. Only in school can sufficient attention be given to educating a boy's attitudes, in developing his sense of responsibility and maturity in the vital period of time, the time BEFORE he gets out on the roads with 200 horsepower under his excited command.

Mr. Needles believes that the ultimate aim of education is to meet the needs of the people. There is an obvious need for better education in science — even more, perhaps, in the Humanities. But, in this automobile age one

of the crying needs of the people is to be spared the unnecessary bloodshed that stems from our failure to teach our young people what they need to drive and survive on our streets and highways.

### STUDY EXTENSION OF NORTHLAND RAILWAY

The Ontario Government is studying the practicability of extending the Ontario Northland Railway south from North Bay and locating its southern terminus at Parry Sound, Premier Leslie M. Frost announced in the Legislature.

"This would give," Mr. Frost explained, "a direct rail connection from a Great Lakes ocean port to the tidewater port plan-

ned at Moosonee. By reasons of the availability of natural gas, processing of our great resources may take place in Northern Ontario. This will be greatly enhanced by the services our own railway provides and the availability of the lake ports."

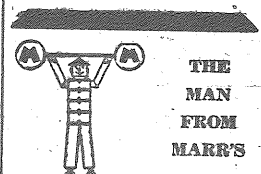

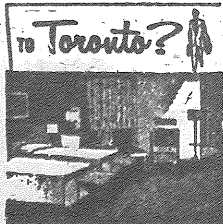

## Traffic Deaths Up In 1958

Fatalities resulting from motor vehicle traffic accidents in the third quarter of 1958 increased to 1,001 from the like 1957 total of 973, placing the 1958 nine-month total slightly above the year-earlier total at 2,277 versus 2,230. Number of persons injured in the quarter was greater than a year earlier at 23,622 versus 23,564, making the nine-month total larger at 58,506 against 57,300. Third-quarter fatalities and injuries took place in 55,689 accidents compared to 55,813 a year earlier, while the nine-month total occurred in 157,392 accidents versus 156,974.

Death toll was greater in the third quarter of 1958 compared to the corresponding 1957 period in Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, smaller in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario and the Yukon and Northwest Territories. Total unchanged in Manitoba. To-

tal was: Newfoundland, 14 (5 a year earlier); Prince Edward Island, 9 (7); Nova Scotia, 48, (53); New Brunswick 42 (54); Quebec, 289 (273); Ontario, 327 (366); Manitoba, 43 (43); Saskatchewan, 50 (40); Alberta, 97 (70); British Columbia, 62 (61); and the Yukon and Northwest Territories, nil (1).

## TOMBSTONE FOR ENGLISH PIG

Los Angeles—A 90 - pound tombstone for an English pig was placed in Commodore N. W. Smith's stateroom aboard the Orient and Pacific liner Orsova here yesterday. It will sail in his care across the Pacific and through the Suez canal to England and its final resting place in Rottingdean, Sussex.

The unique monument was donated by the listeners of a San Antonio, Texas, disc jockey who conducted a campaign to immortalize a Sussex pig named "Grover". This unlucky swine, born with a connoisseur's palate finally went to his reward enjoying too much of a good thing. Grover made front pages all over the world last December when he broke into a Rottingdean wine cellar and drank all the wine. He later died, his owner attributing it to sheer ecstasy.
