KEEWATIN TOWN COUNCIL DEALS WITH VARIED ITEMS OF BUSINESS

The regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Keewatin held in the Council Chambers, February 9th with Mayor Walter Hodgkinson presiding. The minutes of the Inaugural Meeting held January 12th, the special meeting held January 20th, and First and Second Sittings of the Court of Revision held January 22nd, 1953, and January 29th, 1950 were confirmed as read.

Council instructed the Clerk to renew the insurance policies covering liability at the Keewatin Memorial Rink, Telephone Office contents and a Bond on the Cashier for a further period of one year. A communication from the District of Kenora, Magistrate's Court contained a cheque for \$153.48 to cover this municipality's portion of fines for the month of December 1954. The Secretary, Treasurer of the Board of Public School Trustees in letters dated January 12th and Feb. 5th requested requisitions to cover progress payments number five and six for the new school. Mr. J. E. Ellard of Ellard's Garage wrote Council concerning repair work on Corporation owned equipment. The above noted request was referred to the Board of Works for their consideration. A request by the Ladies Auxiliary of St. Joseph's Hospital for permission to hold a Tag Day in Keewatin on Saturday August 1st, 1959 was authorized.

A letter from the District of Kenora Health Unit advising that the per capita rate had been increased from \$1.00 to \$1.05 or \$2,079.00 as this Corporation's share of operating costs was approved and referred to the Finance Committee of Council for inclusion in the 1959 levy. The request from the Board of Public School Trustees for an advance of six thousand dollars a month was passed, said advances not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$36,000.00 pending receipts of the Budget of the Board for the year 1959. A letter of appreciation from the Kenora Keewatin District High School Mustang football club for the use of the Athletic Grounds for the 1958 football season was moved filed.

The request of Mr. Ernie Multimaki for Lot 2, Block-12, Plan 18 for the sum of \$150.00 was accepted by Council. A communication from the Teamsters International Union Local 990 requested to open negotiations to amend and revise present existing Agreement (as per Article 13 of Agreement) between the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Keewatin and The Teamsters' International Union Local 990. The Clerk was instructed to contact Mr. J. Happonen, regarding his letter in this regard.

The inquiry concerning the repair of the billiard tables was referred to the Finance and Building Committees. The matter of the park planting and the procuring of flowers was referred to the Parks and Recreation Committee of council. Council was advised of the excess of snow in

the business section on both Wharf and Ottawa Streets. Chairman of the Board of Works advised the matter would be taken care of at the first opportunity.

Numerous accounts totalling \$53,343.41 were read and received and the Mayor and Treasurer authorized to make the required payments. The cost of a canvass cab for the D2 Caterpillar as submitted was \$35.50 and was referred to the Board of Works. The Clerk was authorized to transfer to the credit of the Board of Separate School Trustees the sum of \$1,000.00 to be charged against the levy for Separate School purposes for the year 1959. The feasibility of renting the parking lot was referred to the Board of Works.

Following the preliminary inquiries and receipt of a communication from William M. Mercer Ltd., Consultants on Civic Pension plans, of Winnipeg, Manitoba the Municipal Council proposed exploring the possibilities of establishing a pension plan for corporation employees.

Kenora Couple Died Suddenly In Florida

The entire community was shocked to learn of the deaths of a well known Kenora couple, Mr. and Mrs. C. Hargrave of First Avenue South.

According to reports received by the Miner and News, Mrs. Mary Hargrave died suddenly at Palm Springs Florida on February 9th. Eleven days later on February 20th her husband Clifford died suddenly at Tarpon Springs Florida. He was believed to be 61 years old.

The remains are being shipped to Clark - Leatherdale Funeral Home Winnipeg for funeral services on Thursday afternoon, February 26th at 2.15 p.m. Interment will be in St. Johns Cemetery. The body of Mrs. Hargrave was cremated and as soon as the remains arrive in Winnipeg they will be interred.

The late Mary Hargrave was born in Duluth Minn. She lived in Fargo and Winnipeg before coming to Kenora. After the death of her first husband D. Read, she was married to Clifford Hargrave in 1942. She was a past president of the Ladies Section, Kenora Golf Club. Only known survivor is a sister Mrs. Catherine Origer of Clearwater Florida.

Clifford Hargrave was born in Winnipeg, served overseas during the First World War, was a former member of the Kenora Rotary Club and was engaged in business with the Kenora Lumber and Supply Company. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Mona Shaw of Winnipeg.

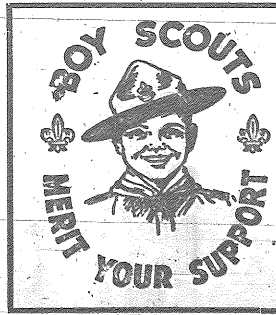

Scholarships Offered Pupils Playing Strings

The shortage of young people studying stringed instruments in North America today is of increasing concern in the music world, according to music teachers, symphony orchestra officials and professional musicians themselves. The string selections of orchestras are steadily getting older, while the young musicians turn to other instruments.

One official of a provincial department of education blames it partially on the rise in popularity of the high school brass band, which drains musically inclined students away from the more exacting study of strings. The conductor of a major symphony points to long, and often financially unrewarding, years that must be spent before proficiency, let alone virtuosity, is attained in the field of the strings.

Whatever the reasons, the shortage is causing such concern to the 250,000-member American Federation of Musicians of the United States and Canada that

in January it announced an international "Congress of Strings" to discover and encourage skilled young string players through annual scholarships competitions.

The string congress is open to accomplished string players, male and female, between the ages of 15 and 21. Winners will be chosen in community auditions, and each will receive a \$300 scholarship donated by Federation locals. The grant will provide eight weeks of intensive instruction, under some of the continent's most distinguished string players and teachers, at the famous summer school at the Greenleaf Festival Camp near Tulsa Oklahoma. Already a number of applications have been received.

Students interested in applying for the scholarship should contact the International Falls, Minn. local of the American Federation of Musicians.

The shortage of new dance bands also is worrying music authorities, and the Federation is simultaneously conducting a continent-wide search for up and coming young musical groups in the dance field.

As in the Congress of Strings, locals across Canada and the United States are inviting dance

bands to enter the Best New Dance Band of 1959 competition. It is open to any band, not now in the "name" category and the rewards are substantial.

Best Band applications are to be made via Federation locals. Deadline for entries is March 15. Ten regional competitions are to be held on May 1, with continent-wide finals on May 15.

The winning band will be featured on a national U.S. television show, will record an album for Decca Records, make a tour of U.S. and Canadian ballrooms, and be supplied with new instruments by the Conn Corporation.

Apple Also Nature's Toothbrush

The old saw, "An apple a day keeps the doctor away" could, perhaps, be widened to include the dentist also for according to the Canadian Dental Association, they help keep the teeth clean and may be termed "nature's toothbrushes."

Apples are rich in pectin and cellulose, and these colloidal substances, because of their ability to take up and hold water, stimulate or maintain normal intestinal activity.

The apple is relatively rich in levulose, a sugar quickly turned into energy.

The crisp, firm apple flesh helps to keep teeth and gums in good condition. Apples have an acid, tart flavor and reaction, thus stimulating the flow of an

alkaline saliva which promotes better oral hygiene and the digestion of foods containing proteins and fat.

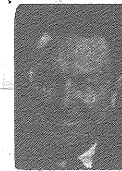

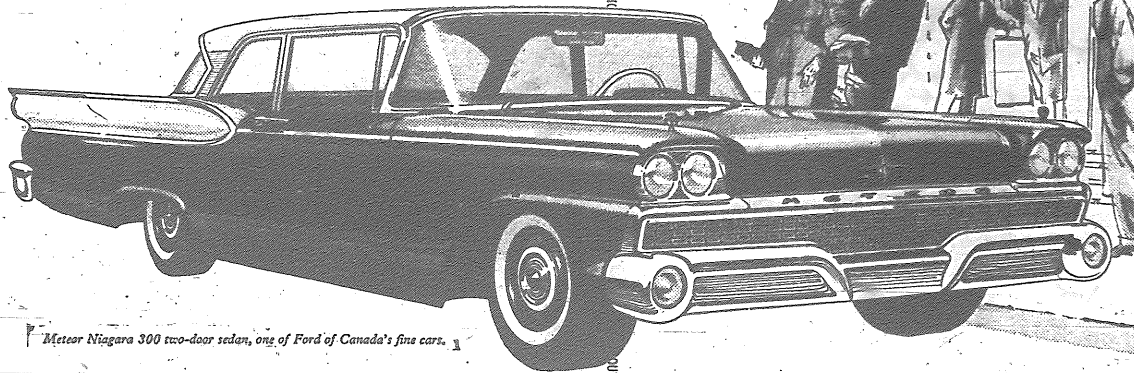

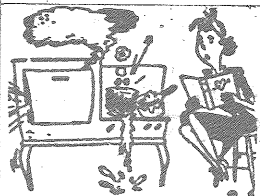

NOVEL BARBECUE SAUCE FOR ROAST PORK

How often do you roast a loin of pork and say to yourself, "I wish I could do something different to this meat?"

BARBECUE SAUCE

¾ cup water

¼ cup vinegar.

3 tablespoons packaged onion soup.

2 tablespoons sugar

½ teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon prepared mustard

1 thick slice lemon

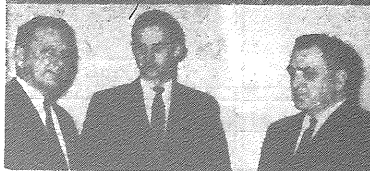
¾ cup butter

½ cup ketchup

Combine water, vinegar and onion soup (just as it comes from the package). Stir in remaining ingredients, except ketchup. Heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in ketchup. Makes about 2 cups of sauce.

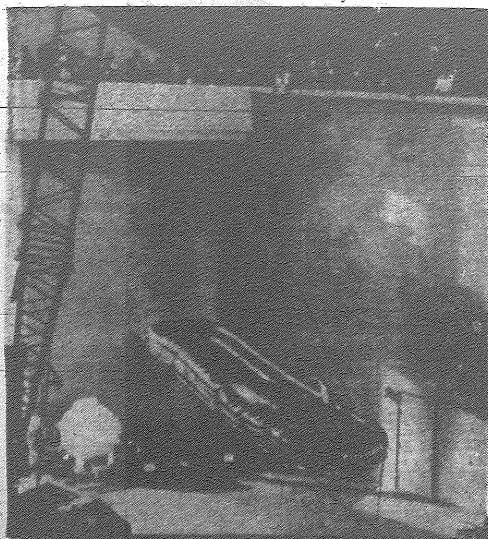
