## LAKE LEVEL NEARING LOWER STORAGE LEVEL

The level of the Lake of the Woods recorded an almost uninterrupted drop during the full 12 months of 1958, a study of the daily levels, kept by the Lake of the Woods Control Board reveals. The only variation in the downward sweep of the graph took place June 27th and lasted about three weeks. On July 25th the downward curve resumed and continued right until the year-end.

The level of the Lake of the Woods at Keewatin on Jan. 1st, 1958, stood at 1059.96 feet above sea level. By the end of the month the level had dropped 1059.66, or about 4 inches. This 4 inch drop continued monthly in both February and March, while in April, the drop was about 7 inches. The low reached in the spring took place on June 26th-27th when the level was down to 1058.10 or down almost 23 inches. The climb started the following day, and continued on a gradual basis until the third week in July when the summer's peak was reached at 1059.51 feet. The downward trend resumed at a constant pace until Dec. 31st when the gauge read 1057.49. Actually there was a drop on Nov. 15th to 1057.25 feet, but this loss was quickly regained.

The prospects for the Lake to climb nearer to normal limits will depend greatly on spring rains. The low limit under International convention is 1056.00 feet or about 15 inches below the present level. The upper limit of storage by convention is 1061.00 feet with the upper limit of flood reserve by convention being 1062.00 feet. In the flood of 1950, the level of the Lake of the Woods actually reached 1064.00 feet, or 6½ feet above the present lake level.

One of the local industries concerned about the present water situation is the Lake of the Woods Milling Company. Low water may affect their source of power, which is direct from the power wheels. Both local powerhouses and those down stream will also be gravely affected unless the watershed returns to normal.

## Valerie Lane Chosen Queen Of Credit Unions

Miss Valerie Lane, who last fall was chosen Queen to represent Northwestern Ontario Credit Unions was Saturday named Miss Credit Union for the province of Ontario. She was crowned queen at the closing sessions of the Credit Union League's three day annual convention held in Toronto.

Miss Lane, well known in Keewatin, Kenora and Winnipeg, has been a consistent winner of beauty contests since she was fourteen years old, when she was crowned "Miss Hudson" of the town of Hudson, Ontario.

Born in St. Boniface, Manitoba twenty-five years ago, Valerie came to Keewatin when a teen-ager and attended the Kenora High School. During Kenora's 80th anniversary she was named Queen of the festivities.

In 1935 she was chosen Photographic Queen in Winnipeg and her picture sent east for entry to the Miss Canada finals. She placed second in this event. Last fall she won her first Credit Union title.

Miss Lane is at present a teacher of modelling at the Betty Vaughn School in Winnipeg and also teaches dancing lessons in Kenora.

The entire community joins in offering heartiest congratulations in paying homage to Queen Valerie.

## J. Van Walleghem Pioneer Dairy Head Died In St. Boniface

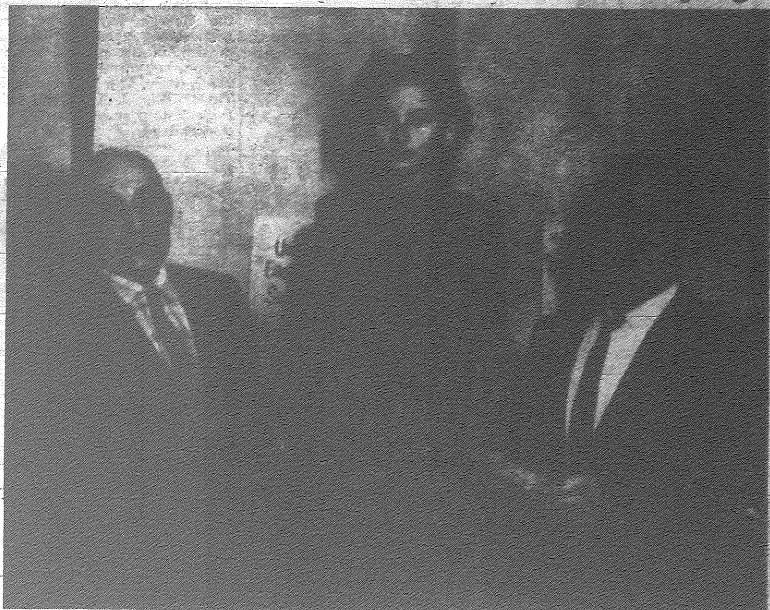
On March 2nd, 1959, a varied and active life was brought to a close with the death of Mr. Jules Van Walleghem at Hospice Tache, in St. Boniface at the age of 82. Mr. Van Walleghem was well known in Kenora and district.

The late Mr. Van Walleghem came to Winnipeg from Belgium in 1894. He joined the Klondyke gold rush in 1899, returning to Winnipeg three years later. He pioneered the dairy field in Winnipeg, operating a dairy at 870 Cambridge Street in 1902 and which is still in operation at the same location. He arranged for Elizabeth Livens to come from Belgium and they were married in Winnipeg, June 6, 1911.

He was an ardent sportsman winning many championships with his homing pigeons in races as far west as Medicine Hat, and as far south as Oklahoma. He received recognition from the Navy and Air Forces during World War II for valued services

## J. N. Davidson Named Vice-Pres. Ont. Credit Unions

James N. Davidson of Kenora, Saturday, was elected vice-president of the Ontario Credit Union League at the closing sessions of the 1959 convention held in Toronto.

Mr. Davidson has had a long and varied experience in credit union affairs and brings to this position a wide knowledge of the work. He organized the first Credit Union locally in 1943, when the Notre Dame Credit Union was organized. He was elected an Ontario Credit Union League director in 1945 and has been re-elected to the board every year since then, culminating with his present election of vice president of a union which incorporates 1,300 credit unions with 42 full time league employees compared with 100 unions and no full time employees in 1945.

Mr. Davidson was the organizer of all credit unions in this district. He is also a director for Ontario Credit Unions, to represent Ontario at National and International gatherings of Credit Union officials.

## Easter Seals, Proud Record Of Service-Mayor Ratuski

To more than 13,500 children and teen-agers in Ontario, afflicted by accident, disease or from birth by crippling conditions that usually mean despair and dependence on others, March is the month of hope.

Easter seals go on sale today, through the members of 221 service clubs, as the means by which the people of Ontario join in the vast task of making life better for youngsters, who would otherwise find it harder, if not impossible, to become self-reliant and independent citizens. This year the service clubs have set a provincial objective of \$800,000 from the sale of Easter Seals. In Kenora the Rotary Club is directing the Easter Seals drive.

Down through the years Easter Seals have paved a way for a programme which now provides twenty-two specially trained nurses, who serve as liaison with the service clubs across the province, seeking out crippled children and directing them to treatment centres, providing them with home nursing skills, and teaching parents what to do to help their handicapped little ones take advantage of medically prescribed plans of rehabilitation.

In five camps, unlike any other camps in the country, hundreds of youngsters will have a chance

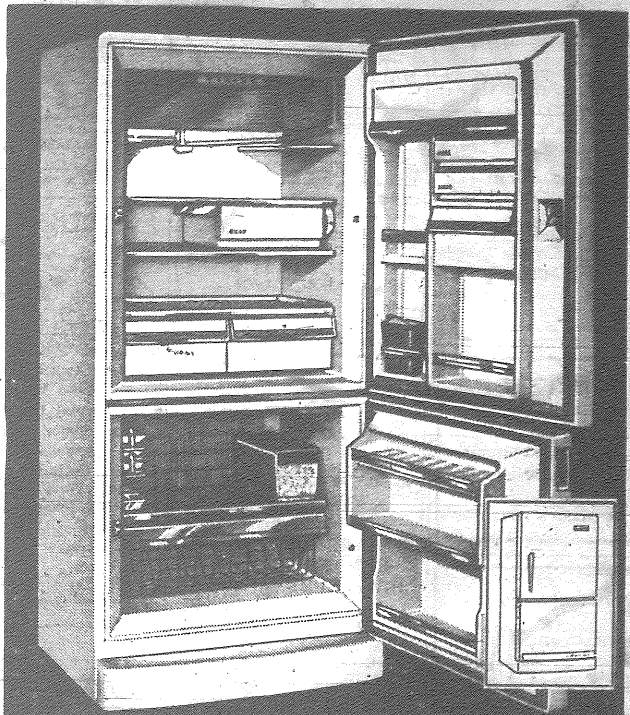

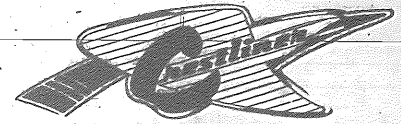

"You hear some people gripe about older folk. Many elderly people are a great deal livelier than some young ones I know. Old people have something to contribute to Victoria."

## Slow Pokes Outnumber Speedsters

Toronto — Think the highways are crowded with speed demons? Or that those little foreign sports cars always ignore speed limits?

A provincial expert says you're wrong. It just appears that way.

John Walter, director of planning and design in the highways department, says slow pokes far outnumber speedsters on Ontario highways.

He told the Ontario Good Roads Association about a survey taken last July at 15 speed stations in Southern Ontario. "Relatively few high speeds were noticed but there were a surprising number of 'low speeds.'"

Mr. Walter said the average was 49.8 miles an hour. Buses were the fastest, averaging 53.2 miles an hour, while foreign sports models buzzed along at an average 49.9—slightly above the

49.4 for ordinary passenger cars. One baffling note: Average speeds were the same on two and four-lane highways. They were lower on three-lane routes.

As a result of Canada's growth in population there are now 500,000 more customers than a year ago, says R. B. MacPherson, Economist for the DuPont Company of Canada.

at summer vacations barred to them otherwise because they cannot play exactly as other children do. In these camps counselors with knowledge of what to teach the kids to enjoy life, to learn how to care for themselves and give many of them hope which their conditions, or even their over-protective parents, have not aroused.  
Easter Seals, too, enrol the services of leading physicians and surgeons who give their time and skills at the clinics, which the Society and the service clubs organize at strategic centres in Ontario where local doctors may bring their young patients for examination and recommend a treatment. From the clinics the children go to hospital, if necessary, or back to their homes for a programme of planned therapy or training supervised by the Society's nurses.

In the field of cerebral palsy, the Society's Easter Seals have made possible advances that are dramatic even tho the task is painfully slow and expensive.
