## Mrs. Marie Elders Of Sioux Narrows Died Today

Mrs. Marie Elders of Sioux Narrows and a life time resident of this district died at St. Joseph's Hospital early this morning, March 6th, following a short illness. Born in Kenora in 1912, she was 47 years old.

She received her education at St. Mary's School Kenora and was a member of Sacred Heart Church, Sioux Narrows. She was married at Kenora in 1932 to Arthur Elders.

She is survived by her husband, two sons, John and Robert of Sioux Narrows; six daughters, Mrs. W. (Louise) Hagen of Sioux Narrows, Mrs. R. (Helen) Brandt of Ross, Manitoba, Mrs. H. (Theresa) Smith of Kenora and Mary Jane, Margaret and Cecilia at home. One sister, Mrs. Josephine Grayeyes of Duck Lake, Sask., also survives.

Funeral services will be held in Notre Dame Church, Kenora, Monday morning, March 9, at 9:30 o'clock. Father R. Ferron will officiate and interment will be in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, Kenora. Prayers will be said in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home, Sunday night, March 8th at eight o'clock.

## ORIGIN OF PLACE NAMES

Frank E. Sider, District Forester at Kenora reports to the Miner and News that the new road to Minaki is much in the news lately and he had occasion to drive over it last week. Not that the right-of-way cutting has been completed yet, he states, there is a gap which is impassable because the cutting gangs are still working, but a bulldozed track has been made to the south shore of Catastrophe Lake. The trail then leaves the right-of-way and follows the length of the lake to a timber company road which reaches the C.N.R. track at Wade. Thence it follows the C.N.R. line along a winter trail until it joins up again with the road right-of-way near Minaki. In case there is a rush to try out this new scenic highway, it should be mentioned that the trail is almost impassable for the low-slung modern car and the railway crossing near Minaki has now been removed so that a trip to Minaki is no longer possible.

The reason for the foregoing long introductory paragraph is that when crossing Catastrophe Lake, Mr. Sider wondered about the origin of its name. Upon making enquiries it was learned that about 1908 when work was in progress on the building of the C.N.R. line, men and materials were transported by the Winnipeg River and across country from Kenora. There was a wagon trail to the vicinity of Wade which used the waters of Catastrophe Lake much as the present Minaki trail uses it. It seems that

on one trip the barge was loaded with steel rails and also had nine men aboard. A sudden storm arose, the barge sank and all nine men were drowned. Hence the lake was named Catastrophe Lake.

And Minaki itself - how did it acquire this short pleasant sounding Indian Name? The settlement was first called by its obvious name, Winnipeg River Crossing. Even today the townsite is officially designated as Winnipeg River Crossing Townsite, but the people thought that too long and clumsy a name and changed it to Willett in honour of the Resident Engineer in charge of construction at the time. Later when the Railway Company started construction of their famous hotel it was felt that a more distinctive and attractive name would be better for business. Their happy choice fell on the Indian name for the place which translated, means Pleasant Waters.

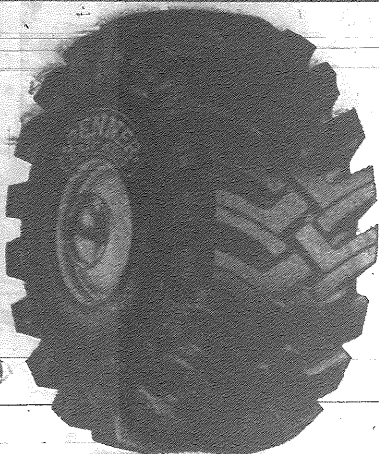

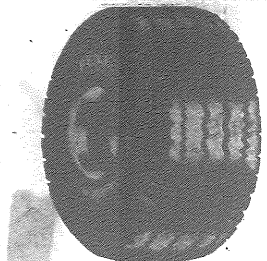

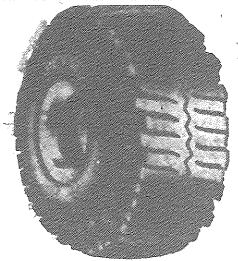

### Farm Safety Survey Gets Underway

The first province-wide farm accident survey to be carried out in Ontario started the first week in March.

Undertaken by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, through the branch offices of the Department in Ontario counties and districts, the survey will seek to record and classify all accidents occurring on Ontario farms between March 1, 1959 and February 29, 1960. The results obtained will assist the Department in planning a safety education program for Ontario farmers and their families. The Department will be assisted by local persons and organizations.

The survey is a further step in the Department's safety program which it has conducted for several years with the 4-H and Junior Farmer organizations, and through exhibits, publications, and co-operative programs with the Ontario Provincial Police.

"I have no doubt that Ontario farm people will welcome this undertaking which seeks to diminish the number of farm accidents and the economic loss that inevitably accompanies them," states the Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario. "I know they will do all in their power to assist the Department in this project, and thus contribute to a better social and economic life in this province."

### A Check On Unscrupulousness

At this time of year, it is not unusual to hear remarks passed about persons who would rather draw their unemployment insurance benefits than work. The implication is that there is no particular difficulty about doing so.

The fact is, however, that every person who is in receipt of benefit must declare, every time he receives money from the Unemployment Insurance Commission, that he is able, ready, and willing to work. Moreover, anyone refusing an offer to suitable employment is likely to be disqualified from receipt of benefit.

In order, however, to test the sincerity (or insincerity) of a person's declaration that he is able, ready, and willing to accept work, the UIC must have a suitable job opening to which that person can be referred. Here is an area in which employers might well work more closely with the Commission.

The Commission's National Employment Service is designed specifically to find the right worker for the employer's job and the right job for the unemployed worker. Matching the worker to the job is a highly skilled occupation and the NES has the staff to be of great assistance to employers in this regard. Incidental to providing this

service to workers and employers, the Commission would be placed in a much better position to check on the availability for employment of claimants. Canada's unemployment insurance plan was created to help the unemployed through periods of genuine unemployment. We are all losers when those who are unscrupulous abuse the plan.

Nearly two-thirds of Canada's traffic fatalities are pedestrians, according to the All Canada Insurance Federation.

Officials of the Federation, which represents more than 250 insurance companies, say that many of those killed are children, and offer the following precautions for pedestrian safety:

- 1) Make sure that children are taught safety rules and regulations at an early age.
- 2) Children are quick to follow the example set by their parents and relatives in crossing streets so always obey the traffic rules.
- 3) Encourage children to play in schoolyards and playgrounds - never on the street.
- 4) Don't call to a small child from across a busy street; he may become confused and run

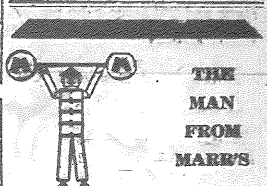
