## Teaching Of Slow Children, Topic At H & S Meeting

The above topic which can be applied to several branches of the teaching profession was ably presented to the membership of the West Ward School Association at their regular meeting on Wednesday, February 25th by Mrs. Muriel Smith a teacher on staff of the Public School Board, Kenora.

The speaker outlined that many of the parents feel that their children are doing fine, others level criticism that the teacher is a misfit because little Johnnie or Mary does not seem to be able to learn a thing. Where does the responsibility lie? Taking the entire matter into hand, let us look for awhile at the child who begins school. At all outward appearances, he seems to be normal but of a quiet nature, however, after the first month he or she does not, and is unable to keep pace with his classmates. Is he then not an exceptional child? Adverse criticism again crops into the picture. From the level of the student body with whom the child associates, the child at this time is subjected to a mental torture which in turn isolates him. At play he shys away from the rest of his or her classmates, at home he refuses to even answer any questions that may be asked about school.

We can ask ourselves at this point, should he or she be branded as a retarded child. The answer to the above question can only be answered in a sensible sort of way. What can be done for

this type of student, should he or she be left as an open target of having to progress in his years by outgrowing his educative level and progressing by the size of his classmates. Serious consideration has to be given to the subject. Not only are the children themselves involved, members of the Board of Education on advisement have a responsibility. Parents of children in this group have to be enlightened on the subject also.

In closing the speaker brought to the attention of the members that this is not only a job to be tackled by a few interested persons but one that should be backed by the entire community. A helping hand at an early age can bring on an entirely different outlook in later life not only on the part of the exceptional child, but the community as a whole, in that someone was able to look ahead in earlier years, so that a future citizen could be helped to fit themselves into a normal way of usefulness.

Business of a routine nature proceeded the talk by Mrs. Smith after which a social half-hour followed.

### How Parents Can Help Child Begin His Education

Parents with children who will be five years old by December 31, will within a few weeks register their children for Kindergarten, which begins in September. Let us take a look into the inborn characteristics of these children and find out how you, the parents, whom we shall refer to in this article as VIPTP (Very Important Person The Parent).

It is important that your child receive the best possible education. He will be in class with other children. Every one of these children is different from every other child. Each child has different interests and abilities, each comes from a different family and home background. You can see that the teacher's task is not an easy one. By working with the teacher, you can do much to help her give your child the very best education. There are certain characteristics that are typical of different ages. These include four different parts of child development: physical, mental, social, and emotional. There are several things to keep in mind: Behaviour changes come gradually. A child doesn't wake up on his fifth birthday entirely different from what he was when he went to sleep the night before. Although we think of certain behaviour as typical of five-year olds, each child is different from every other child. He has certain traits which make him "himself." Each child develops at his own rate. There can be no growth chart that is right for every child.

Frequently you ask how you can help your child at home. Our experience for the past six years of teaching five-year olds have taught us much about them. We would like to pass some of the knowledge gained to you hoping that it will help to answer your questions.

The five-year old is inquisitive. He is eager for information within limits of his interests. He wants to investigate, experiment with and explore the things ar-

Mr. Bill Benedickson, M.P., has made available a copy of a letter recently received from the Minister of Public Works, the Hon. H. C. Green, which is of particular interest to readers. The letter, which is self-explanatory, is as follows:

Ottawa, 4 March, 1959.

Mr. W. M. Benedickson, M.P., House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario.

Trans-Canada Highway, Ontario, Vermillion Bay to Manitoba Boundary

Dear Mr. Benedickson: I wish to acknowledge your letter of 17 February, addressed to Mr. G. B. Williams of this Department.

The latest information we have received from the Province states that the route of the Trans-Canada Highway in this section will continue to be by way of Provincial Highway No. 17.

On reconstruction minor revisions in location are made to comply with standards for alignment and gradient of the Trans-Canada Highway Agreement; however, in general it follows the existing route. Because of this situation no general route map has been submitted to this Department, and deviations are only shown on the detailed plans and profiles submitted prior to tender calls.

As you know, this highway had a bituminous surface to Provincial standard, prior to the execution of the Trans-Canada Highway Agreement and the Province may meet the terms of this Agreement without reconstruction of these sections. The initiative on the section they will reconstruct rests with the Province.

From our latest reports, it would appear that their programming for reconstruction will cover the section from Vermillion Bay to Longbow Corners; however, this section would not be completely reconstructed and paved by the end of construction under the Agreement in December, 1960. We have, however, advised the Province that the sections they propose to have under construction should be pushed for completion by this termination date.

From the Manitoba boundary easterly for 18 miles, construction is now underway, or planned for completion by 31 December, 1960.

The section from 18 miles west of Kenora to Longbow Corners under present planning will then be left paved to the existing Provincial standard. The exception will be the rebuilding of the bridge over the east branch of the Winnipeg River at Kenora, which is now under construction.

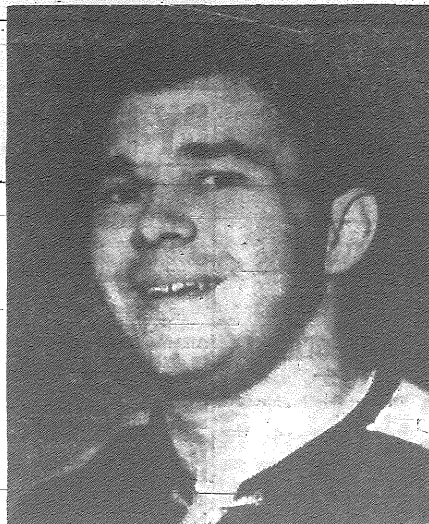

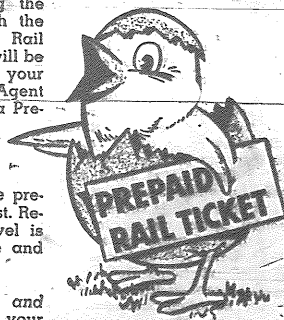

scientists chart the true shape of the earth and locate its centre.

Dr. Lloyd Thompson of the air force's Cambridge research centre in Bedford, Mass., said the feat "opens a whole new field of geodetic, gravity and geophysical applications."

The ARDC did not say specifically that one of the applications would be more accurate maps for missilemen.

But it noted that airborne gravity measurements would permit map makers "to precisely locate islands, measure exact distances between continents and accurately plot the entire world." Right now, it said, "intercontinental relationships are not accurate."

Highly-accurate maps showing the precise location and distance of enemy cities are needed for aiming intercontinental ballistic missiles at targets 5,000 or 6,000 miles away. Tiny map error would cause a wide miss at that distance.

Thompson, who helped operate the gravity meter during the flights, also said such airborne measurements would disclose gravity's tug at "satellite heights" where intercontinental missiles reach their zenith. This also would mean more accurate aiming.

Thompson said scientists still were "guessing" at gravity's effects at high altitudes despite data gathered by earth satellites.

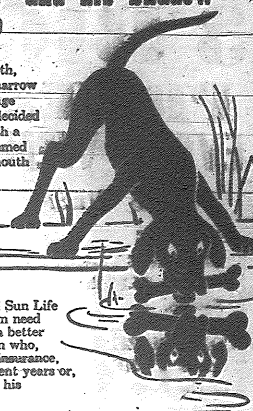
The air force said it would continue on airborne gravity measurement under a project called

"geodesy for navigauidance," another indication that the experiments are aimed at more precise navigation and missile aiming.

Until now, scientists have measured gravity with instruments on the ground or aboard ships, a tedious, time-consuming chore.

**New Maps To Guide Missiles**  
WASHINGTON — The air force disclosed it had taken a "giant step" toward producing more precise maps which would give U.S. missiles deadly accuracy.  
The Air Research and Development Command (ARDC) said the maps were made possible by measuring earth's gravity from an airplane for the first time. It said the historic flights, which took place in November, also would be valuable to U.S. satellite programs and would help

Pupils To Have First Train Ride

Coquitlam, B.C.—In this bustling railway town of 5,000 only 27 school children out of 900 have ever been on a train. But they'll all be aboard next Monday for a special train ride to Vancouver, 17 miles away.

The ambitious undertaking is being fathered by George Wingrove, Chief Clerk in the Canadian Pacific Yard Office here, and a member of the district School Board.

It is a forerunner to a program of CPR Safety Film presentations. A 10-car train will arrive in Vancouver at noon and continue through the railways tunnel under the city to their coach yards on Pacific Street. Here, under the guidance of teachers from James Park, Central, Glen and Cedar elementary schools, the children, from 12 years down, will get an insight into the safety features of operating a coach yard. They'll see the CPR's crack Transcontinental Train the Canadian, go through the giant washing machine, tour the back shops and return home in two hours time.

"The plan is meeting with enthusiastic support from everyone in our area", said Mr. Wingrove. He estimated that eventually 8,000 pupils from the area of Ioco, Port Moody, Fraser Mills, Coquitlam municipality and Port Coquitlam would enjoy the same educational jaunt to Vancouver.

**Population Growth Down in 1958**

TORONTO - Population growth slowed down in both Canada and the United States in 1958, but the Canadian percentage increase was higher than the American, the Bank of Nova Scotia says.

In 1958 Canadian population increased by 397,000 to 17,281,000, or by 2.34 per cent, compared with 3.3 per cent in 1957.

In the United States in 1958 population increased by 2,864,000 to 175,602,000, or by 1.66 per cent, the lowest rate of growth in 12 years, and compared with a gain of 1.73 per cent in 1957. Canadian births totalled 472,000 compared with 469,000 in 1957, giving a rate per thousand of population of 22.7 compared with 23.3.

United States births totalled 4,249,000 compared with 4,302,000, giving a rate per thousand of 24.4 compared with 25.1.

Immigration into Canada in 1958 fell to 125,000 from 282,000 in 1957.

"The decline in birth rates in 1958," the review says, "followed a marked fall in the marriage rate on both sides of the border in 1957."

"Since marriage rates continued to decline in 1958, a further drop in birth rates might well occur in 1959."

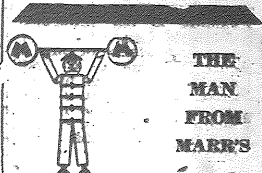

We are all members of society. We must learn to get along with our neighbors. People must live together happily in their own communities and in their own nations. Nations need to learn to live together in the world. Kindergarten is probably the first place where your child will be with a large group of other children. He is going to be with people for much of his life. He is still primarily interested in himself and in his things. When he talks, it is about himself, his possessions, his family. We adults know that the ills of the world would be less if adults knew how to get along with adults. We are still at work on this part of our education. Help your child to get along with other people. For a child to learn to live happily with children of his own age is important to his future success in school and to his success throughout his life. Probably no other single factor in sound kindergarten education is more challenging, more difficult, or more important.

Finally, VIPTP, the kindergarten teacher would appreciate knowing if some unusual event at home has upset your child before he comes to school. Such things as severe illness in the family, accidents or injuries, loss of sleep, excessive fatigue, overstimulation or an emotional disturbance. Plan regular visits with the teacher. Talk with her freely about your child. Every dedicated kindergarten teacher feels the same way as you do about your child. What ever you do or do not do, be sure that you encourage him to be truthful. One of the

wisest men who ever lived gave us the key for all parents to follow. "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

There's nothing that can be added to that Proverb. Our last word, "Give your child a chance." By Mrs. Veronica N. Kirk, B. Sc., ED.

ound him. His attention span is generally short. He lives in a here-and-now world. He likes to talk about himself and his experiences. In his play he imitates and impersonates the people around him. In his art he draws about himself. He will ask many questions. As VIPTP answer his questions as simply as possible. He is developing mentally.

He prefers to play in small groups of four or five children. At times he will want to play alone. He is more interested in achieving satisfactory results for himself than for the group.

He is trying out various ways of approaching other children. For example, talking, smiling, poking, sometimes hitting. He is learning to live happily with children of his own age. He has strong feelings about personal possessions. Many of the social problems of the five-year old, come because adults ask him to share playthings and to show consideration for the rights of others. To him it may seem all right to take another child's truck because he wants to use it in his play. Increased understanding and experiences with the group help to take care of these problems.

He is, generally speaking, well adjusted within himself, and has confidence in others. He seeks adult support and guidance. He is anxious to please you and many times it is easy to guide him by praising him for his good deeds. He enjoys being liked by others. He is sometimes aggressive or sometimes shy; both are natural. He needs a simple wholesome environment which will not overstimulate him or make too heavy demands on his self control. VIPTP, help him solve his problems in such a way that he will gain confidence in himself when faced with new problem situations.

The kindergarten child needs to gain independence, to grow in his ability to think and plan for himself. Give him small responsibilities around the home that belong just to him. Help him plan activities for himself. He needs to be given many opportunities for creative expression. The child's enjoyment and satisfaction and growth come from doing things, from having a part in the activity. He does not always finish what he starts, but that doesn't matter. The growth and improvement of the child is the important matter. VIPTP, when the child shows you something he has worked on, ask him to tell you about it. He thinks you see in it the same things that he does and the question, "What is it?" disturbs him. Whenever you and the child see animals; point out differences and likenesses. Read to him often. As he listens, he learns new words and how they are used. Play the piano or organ if you play music. Buy simple musical instruments for him to use as his very own.

The Kindergarten child needs to find satisfactory ways to show his feelings; to find some satisfying and harmless ways of expressing strong emotions. What must you do VIPTP? Well, observe certain things about nature in connection with your work, or as pure enjoyment: clouds, sunsets, weather, plants, trees, birds, season changes. Share your interest in, and knowledge of these things with your child; help him to notice too. Help the child to observe the world about him. Show him what things each family does for itself and what things the city does for people;

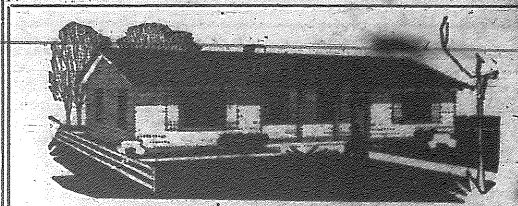

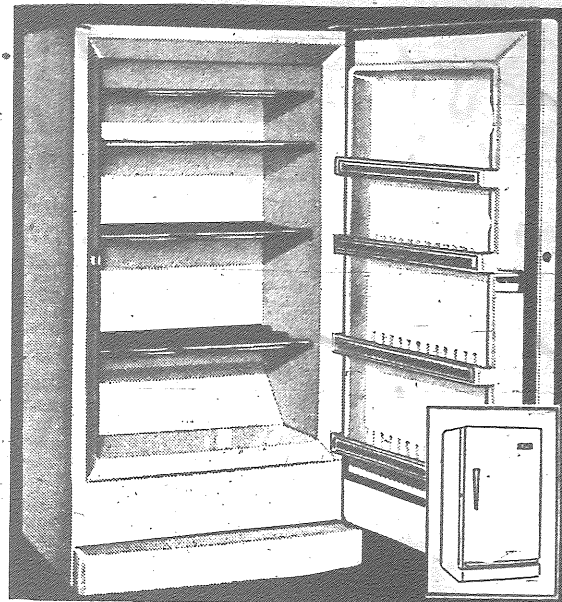
