Kenora's Police Chief Attending Lakehead Meet

Port Arthur—In case of a hold-up the most important thing for bank tellers or store cashiers to remember to keep cool. Deputy Police Chief George Blow, of Winnipeg said in Port Arthur Monday.

He spoke on public relations at the opening session in the Prince Arthur hotel of the second annual Western police chiefs convention. Police Chief William Allen is chairman of the sessions which conclude Tuesday afternoon. A civic luncheon was tendered Monday by Port Arthur.

Speaking on sections of the Criminal Code were Police Chiefs Larry Partridge, of Calgary and J. C. Kettles of Saskatoon. Police Chief John Pike, of Kenora, gave a paper on motor maintenance.

The Winnipeg deputy chief said immediate notes should be

made of what is observed at the scene of a hold-up. Identifying features include facial characteristics such as scars, dress, car color and licence number.

Winnipeg has found that recognition of fine police work is good for morale. Personal commendation by the chief, or days off is recommended.

In discussing the trespass-by-night section of the code, Mr. Partridge suggested commercial property should be included in the section as well as private property.

N.O.T.O., Province's Largest Tourist Organization

Keeping track of Ontario's largest tourist association is the job that falls upon the hands of a Dryden businessman.

Chosen for the post of secretary-manager of the Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters last July was Elwin L. Palmer, local theatre operator and mining man. He succeeded D. E. (Ward) Scott who left Dryden last year for Owen Sound, out of NOTO's operational region.

The Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters embraces the territory from the Manitoba boundary east to Farry Sound, Ontario. There are approximately 1700 tourist camps in this vast region and these are served by 23 local associations. Two more associations are in the process of being formed.

NOTO is the largest of three tourist associations in Ontario. Others are ATRO (Association of Tourist Resorts of Ontario), and OTCA (Ontario Tourist Courts Association). Atro takes over where NOTO leaves off on its eastern boundary and is more of an association for tourist resorts rather than tourist outfitters.

Red Cross Provides Water Safety Instruction

Every year more than 170,000 Canadians of all ages participate in Red Cross water safety classes in hundreds of communities and camps in every province.

These classes are conducted by Red Cross volunteer instructors who carry on a crusade to prevent needless loss of life and to provide instruction in the principles of healthy recreation and all phases of safety in and on the water.

Many Red Cross Branches also conduct special classes in water safety for the handicapped and the blind.

A campaign for funds in the form of a "Blitz" will be held in Kenora, Thursday night, March 12, from 7 to 8 o'clock. Members of local service clubs will act as canvassers.

Receiving Home Non-Conforming To Zoning By-Laws

In the matter of the establishing of a Receiving Home for the Children's Aid Society on First Avenue South, to which residents in the area, as well as solicitors for certain property have signed petitions against, the Town Planning Board has informed council that its resolution of January 12th stands. The communication received by council on that date stated that, "this board finds that a Children's Aid Receiving Home is classified as an institution and therefore is non-conforming with regulations of the zoning by-law.

Following representation by members of the Children's Aid Society, asking that the zoning by-law be amended, council referred the matter back to the Planning Board. At a special meeting of this body held March 6th, council was informed that "this Board feels that they have adequately performed their duty concerning the use of this property as a receiving home."

The Board also informed council that it had no objections to Mr. J. Curik establishing a trailer park on his Trans Canada Highway property.

They also recommended that the zoning by-law be properly constituted since it does not deal specifically with certain aspects of trailer parks.

ASKS LEASE ON LAND FOR \$200,000 MOTEL

A Winnipeg resident, Mr. A. Smith, appeared before council last evening seeking a lease or option to buy town owned property in Norman, which fronts a parcel of land, that he (Mr. Smith) has an option to buy. Mr. Smith told council of his plans to build a \$200,000 Motel and if possible a coffee bar and filling station. This would not be possible, he stated, if the property owned by the town was not available. Alderman Sewell pointed out that the Department of Highways had part claim on the property since it was situated in close proximity to the highway. Following considerable discussion, the matter was referred to council as a whole.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

Council authorized repairs and renovations to the library as recommended by the Library Board in the amount of \$30,000.00, providing the Board arrange to have the work undertaken by contract and under the supervision of a qualified architect.

Referred to council as a whole was the Board's estimate of funds for 1959 in the amount of \$10,530.00.

PINECREST

The Board of management of the District Home for the Aged advised that "effective March 1st, 1959, rate charged Residents be increased to \$120.00 per month or \$4.00 per day for portion of month. Such increase in light of operating cost."

A financial statement from the board showed Kenora's portion of operating costs plus debt charges for the current year as being \$24,360.50, which amount

Off Street Parking Lots To Be Ready By July 1st

At the regular council meeting held Monday night, Alderman A. E. Minor informed council that definite plans are underway to alleviate the parking problem prevalent in the downtown area. He asked council for immediate action concerning the old town warehouse, situated at the corner of Chipman and First Street, part of which is used as a store room for town records, equipment etc.

Alderman Minor was assured that work would begin immediately on placing these items elsewhere, and as soon as completed, demolition plans would commence. July 1st was set as the target date for the opening of this parking lot.

Tenders will also be called for the demolition of buildings on the recently purchased Link property on Matheson Street South, with a view to having this property readied as soon as possible for off-street parking.

PUBLIC UTILITIES

In line with the procedures being carried out by many hydro communities, competing with natural gas in the domestic water heating field, F. Greenslade, Superintendent of Electric and Telephones, suggested adoption by the town of a similar procedure, which involves encouraging domestic water heating by electricity on a broadened flat rate basis which would offer alternative methods in the case of cri-

Four Adoption Placements Made By Children's Aid

Concern over the growing need for a receiving home for the temporary care of children before their permanent placement in a foster or adoption home, was discussed at considerable length at the monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society which was held last night in the board office. Mr. W. B. Powell, the chairman of the board, who presided at the meeting, revealed that the Kimsman Club was well advanced in the alterations recommended by the Town of Kenora Fire Department to the building of 546 First Avenue South which is proposed as a site for such a home. Additional bath room facilities have been added as well, and very little remains to be done to bring the property up to the most stringent standards.

Four children were put on adoption placement during the past month, Mr. W. J. P. Thompson, the C.A.S. local director, announced in his report, three of these being placement wards of the society. Of the three, one was part Indian, another Treaty Indian, and the third was a five year old girl. There are now 47 children on adoption probation.

There are at the present time a total of 208 children in C.A.S. care. Mr. Thompson's report said, with 88 children from forty families involved in protection work by the staff. There were no new cases of protection of children born out of wedlock, and with one case closed during the month, the number now active stands at eight.

New members to the board, Rev. W. McLean from Dryden and Mrs. John A. Lund from LaCelle, were introduced by Mr. Powell and welcomed to the board.

The financial report showed expenditures of \$350.09 for clothing, and \$234.39 for medical and dental expenses. The account for boarding homes was \$4,548.29.

The board voted to allow the wards of the society to use small sums of their Family Allowance trust funds for pocket money.

OTCA is mainly an association designed for those catering to overnight accommodation. The three have banded together, however, to form an association called the Joint Board of Ontario Travel Associations of BOTA, giving them more power when presenting resolutions to the government. BOTA also provides a powerful voice in the government for the tourist industry.

Among Mr. Palmer's duties is to send out all Association information to tourist camps, including a regular bulletin. All inquiries from prospective visitors go to the local bureaus.

Like most active groups everywhere, the Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters hold an annual convention. This year it was held in Kenora. In the past, these conventions have been held in either January or February, while the Ontario legislature was convening or close to its sessions. NOTO plans its next convention for November 30, December 1,

and 2, advancing its dates for two reasons: 1—To obtain a better turnout . . . (Many outfitters are on vacation in January or February or are attending sportsmen shows). 2—To obtain quicker action on resolutions. Resolutions passed at the November 30, early December convention will go into the government's hands well in advance of any session of the Legislature, giving officials plenty of time to look them over.

At last month's convention, incidentally, 33 resolutions were passed, some with local interest and some with province-wide and national interest. Most of these resolutions will be presented at a game and fish meeting of the Department of Lands and Forests in Toronto March 17th and 18th. A resolution of interest and importance to the outfitter is one asking the government to make loans available to the outfitters for use in improving their camps. The tourist is now demanding much better accommodations. So far, mortgage companies haven't seen fit to loan money to outfitters. Manitoba has taken steps to boost the tourist industry and has set up a fund of \$20,000,000.00. Included in this is financing for the outfitters. NOTO feels Ontario should do the same.

There are five local associations in the Kenora, Rainy River District: Fort Frances - Nestor Falls area, Kenora-Sioux Narrows, Red Lake, Dryden, and Sioux Lookout. The area is considered one of the strongest in the entire province.

NOTO also has an active ladies' auxiliary and an associate membership - firms directly in-

terested in the tourist business. These firms have a little organization within NOTO and often present suggestions at the annual conventions. Mrs. Marg Shortts of French River is president of the auxiliary and Colin McDonald, Department of Travel and Publicity, is chairman of the associate members group. Ralph Webb of Laciu is president of NOTO itself.

Dr. Kano, founder of Judo said that the ultimate aim of Kodokan Judo is to perfect one's self and thereby contribute to the welfare and benefit of mankind. This self-perfection necessitates a spirit which seeks truth and it can only be achieved through constant striving and dedication to art. The highest state of spiritual life of the individual can be found where oneself and others are transcended and thus reduced to unity. For instance, "Kiichi-Sai" was the pen name of the late Professor Kano, meaning "Dwelling of Unity". Confucius, the great scholar and one of the World's four great religious teachers, said, "At seventy, I could follow what my heart desired, without transgressing what was right". The mental state represented by "Mutual Welfare and Benefit" indicates a noble culmination of morality such as could be attained only by such a great moralist as he.

Our Master Kano divides the objective of Judo into two phases: self-perfection and contribution to human welfare and benefit. He does so as a matter of convenience, but these two are different aspects of the ultimate ideal, namely, mutual welfare and benefit. So, to attain such an ideal is the ultimate end of studying and training in Judo. Our Master, however, explained such a spirit from the stand point of practical morality. For example, he enjoins his pupils not to use, in the exercise hall, any method that may injure the opponent because such violence to a person goes against the spirit of mutual welfare and benefit. Again he teaches that they should observe in their social life the principle of mutual aid and concession as well as the spirit of mutual welfare and benefit so as to regulate the relation of oneself with others. This is because he avoided, from his educators' standpoint, the discourse on the profound philosophical-principle of Judo, but instructed his pupils in terms of daily conduct, looking to their advancement, step by step, toward the higher level of the spirit. Nevertheless, the ultimate phase is that which points out the ideal state to be marked by the Judo-ka (Student). It is a world of harmony, a world of peace, and a world of love, or, an absolute state of existence, in which, as Buddhism teaches, "self and universe are in a body" and where self and others fuse into one. It represents a pinnacle of Oriental philosophy, it embodies the lofty ideals of Christianity, and is the supreme principle of mankind.

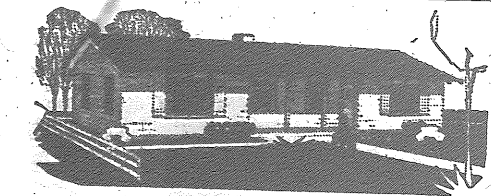

Thistles Deserved Their Hard Fought Victory

Once again the Kenora Thistles and the Fort Frances Canadians have clashed. This time the sound was a pleasing one for the Thistle followers and a sad sound for the border town tribe. A reversal of form for the Kenora Thistles gave them a deserving 4-0 victory over the Fort Frances Canadians on Saturday evening. It wasn't the greatest Thistle victory ever recorded, but it rings a note of brightness in the once gloomy Thunder Bay Intermediate Hockey wars. Indeed, it is a start for the Kenora Thistles.

Try as they might, the Fort Frances Canadians failed to score a goal against the Kenora Thistles on Saturday evening. This bears significance. The Fort Frances team have great goal producing forwards who were to be the balance of power in this

series. Those forwards missed many chances on Saturday. Time and time again they held the puck in Kenora's territory and time and time again they were turned back at the mouth of the cage by Allie Reynard and his defensive unit.

Take the second period. The Canadians organized a tremendous offensive against the Thistles and completely bottled the local red and white squad in the Kenora domain for ten full minutes. The visitors failed to score.

This may have been the big break in the Fort Frances spirit.

The Thistles looked strong in the first period and scored two devastating goals. Ray Westlund and Stubby Dubchuk scored on clean and well executed plays. Bill Pochallo's goal on his break-away attempt in the third period caught Harry Barefoot napping and the Fort goaltender actually watched the puck sail into the net.

Bill Devin's "fluke" goal, that was shot from centre ice, made Mr. Barefoot look bad. The puck wasn't shot with much gusto, but it managed to take that "crazy" bounce in front of the cage which Harry Barefoot was least expecting. The last two Thistle goals took all the life out of the Fort Frances attack and the final minutes of the game were used to preserve Allie Reynard's shutout.

As in all other Fort Frances-Kenora encounters there were a few outbreaks of boxing and wrestling antics. There were also some of the odd delays.

One fight delayed the game longer than one would expect. Big Ray Westlund was mixing it up with Jim Johnston along the boards when the refs, Ted Early and Frank Richards, broke it up. Johnston managed to lose his stick on the fans' side of the boards and had the game stopped to look for the darn thing. It so happened that a crafty Rideout boy swiped the stick right out of his hands when he was wrestling with Westlund and took off to "ditch" it outside the Thistle Rink. Johnston is probably still wondering how his stick happened to be missing from the scene after the fight was finished.

Bill Hanstead, the game's official scorer, reported to us later that the penalty box was a scene of bitter words throughout the contest and that it was a good place to hide a microphone to make a hockey blooper record.

One incident confirmed this. After serving a minute and forty-five seconds of his penalty Ray Westlund stood by the sin bin gate getting ready for an immediate release. 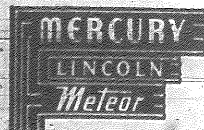

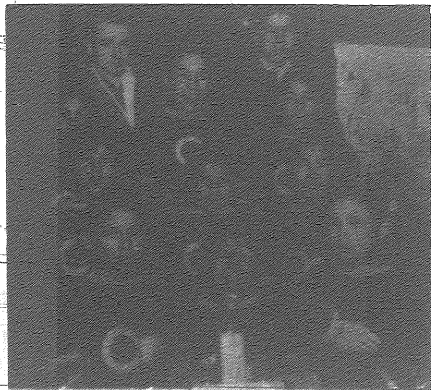

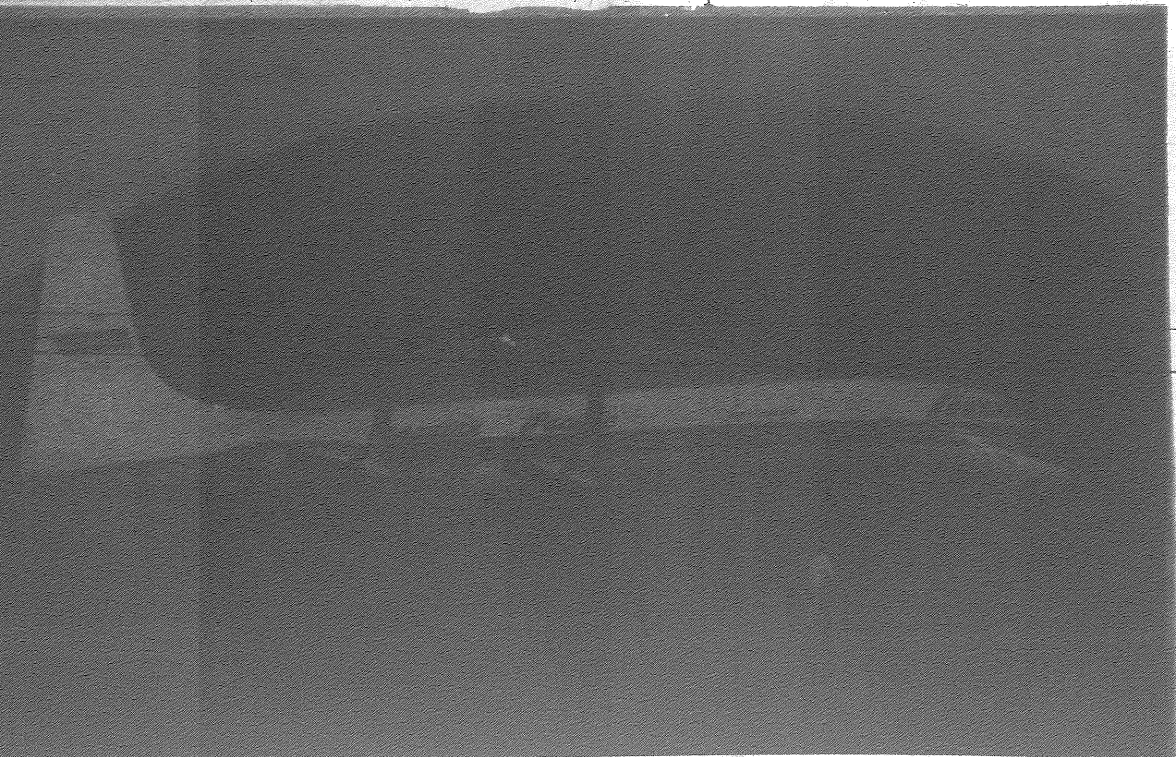

- (a) Retain the present system of supplying flat rate water heating at the present rates.
- (b) Supply Utility-owned and maintained units with a rental charge of \$2.00 per month for a 30 gallon tank, and \$2.30 per month for 50 gallon tanks in addition to our present rates AND recommending further "an extensive plan of promotion by way of advertising and customer contacts. 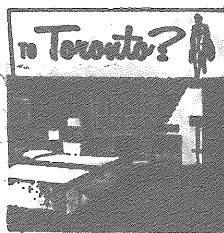

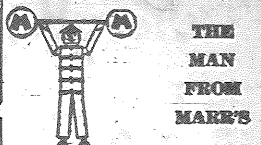
