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HIGH SCHOOL BOARD

MANY NEW TEACHERS REQUIRED NEXT TERM

The regular meeting of the Kenora-Keewatin District High School Board was held in the Council Chambers, Wednesday, March 11th. All members were present, as well as Mr. A. G. Richmond, Principal, and Mr. Mas. M. Hayes, Vice-Principal of the High School.

Mr. E. L. Carter, Chairman, welcomed Mr. Roger Prefontaine, Chairman of the Separate School Board, a visitor to the meeting.

Among communications received were the resignations from the staff at the High School, from Miss Alice Batho, Mrs. Anna Goddard and Mr. Peter Caruk. The Board regretted the loss of these teachers.

A letter requesting use of a classroom at the High School for the coming term was received from Jaffray-Melick School Area, but the Board was unable to grant the request due to lack of any extra space in the School.

Use of the High School Gymnasium was granted the Kenora-Keewatin Badminton Club for their Wind-Up Tournament to be held on Saturday, April 18th.

It was reported that the Public Address System recently installed

at the High School, as well as the Gas Controls needed attention to operate satisfactorily, and Mr. B. Martz, Chairman of Building, agreed to look into this matter.

Mr. F. Collins reported that word had been received that new regulations governing grants for the coming year had now been approved and would be forthcoming in the mail at an early date. As soon as these were received, the budget could be completed.

Mr. L. A. McLennan, Chairman of Management, reported that negotiations were still in progress with regard to Teachers' and Caretakers, and it was hoped that final settlement would soon be reached.

The Chairman of Property, Mr. A. Olson reported that relining of the coal-bin at the High School had been completed and estimates for further projects for the coming season were being tabulated.

The principal's report noted registration at the High School as eight lower than last month, but 24 above the corresponding month last year. Average attendance was

ESTIMATES FOR DISTRICT INDIAN SCHOOLS, THREE QUARTERS \$MILLION

W. M. "Bill" Benidickson MP for Kenora-Rainy River Federal constituency, reporting from Ottawa, advises that estimates of the Indian Affairs branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, provides for an expenditure, within the three Indian Agencies having headquarters in the constituency which will aggregate about three quarters of a million dollars. This will include new construction and also repairs, renovations, and improvements in educational establishments and also considerable help to housing.

At Sandy Lake in the north an item of \$30,000 has been set aside for construction of a two classroom school and two staff units, while at Fort Frances \$300,000 has been included to provide a start on the new dormitory building, three classroom block and staff units for an expected 120 pupils.

At St. Mary's School at Kenora \$15,000 is provided for a three bedroom staff unit, while a similar amount for similar construction is set for Sioux Lookout.

At McIntosh residential school \$20,000 will be spent to make

structural alterations, provide water supply and mechanical services.

A very interesting item appearing in the estimates is the sum of \$75,000 which is described as "Contribution towards construction of Joint School Facilities," which refers to an agreement entered into between the Department and the School Board of Jaffray Melick, which will provide educational facilities for 60 Indian pupils, and marks a new departure in dealing with the problems of integrated education.

The above noted items are for new construction, while the following items concern repairs and upkeep of buildings.

Repairs to day schools in Sioux Lookout area total \$3,000, while in Fort Frances \$2,500 and Kenora \$4,950 are assigned.

Repairs to the residential school at Fort Frances, prior to the occupation of the new school require \$5,000. Cecilia Jeffrey School gets improvements to the sum of \$6,500 and further repairs to Kenora residential school, probably St. Mary's - total \$7,500.

Sioux Lookout Residential school requires \$5,000, while repairs to the McIntosh Residential

school amount to \$25,000.

In his reply to an enquiry from Mr. Benidickson regarding the proposed expenditures in 1959-60 by the Indian department for the purposes of education and housing, the director of the branch advised him, that tentative plans provide for contribution from the Welfare appropriation of \$50,000 towards construction of 25 houses in the Sioux Lookout agency, \$15,400 towards construction of five houses in the Fort Frances agency, and \$31,500 towards construction of 19 houses in the Kenora agency. This is in addition to funds which have been assigned for repairs of existing houses in the three agencies.

Mr. Benidickson points out, as also does the director of the branch that these expenditures included in the departmental estimates, are, of course subject to approval of Parliament.

Mr. Benidickson expects to be advised at an early date regarding what reserves on which the department plans to construct houses.

Wednesday Sky Reveals "Celestial Spectacular"

Northwestern Ontario and Manitoba residents last night were provided with a celestial spectacular, when the planet Venus and a slim crescent moon seemed to almost touch one another. Many curious citizens phoned the M & N last evening to ask if someone was finally going to hit the moon with a satellite.

On checking with professor R. J. Lockhart of the University of Manitoba it was learned that every month the moon overtakes Venus, but at 5:00 p.m. yesterday she made her closest approach to the planet this year. Professor Lockhart said "Venus was actually millions of miles from the moon but to earth-bound observers only a point-seven degree arc separated the two."

He said, "It certainly provided one of the most brilliant and spectacular showings we've seen in some time."

Van Wallegem Brothers Bereaved In Death of Mother

Word has been received in Kenora of the passing of Mrs. Elizabeth Van Wallegem, widow of the late Jules Van Wallegem. The death occurred at Winnipeg, on Wednesday, March 10th, at her late residence, 276 Harrow Street and eight days after the death of her husband. She was in her 79th year.

She came to Canada in 1911 and was married in Winnipeg the same year. She was a member of St. Ignatius Church.

She is survived by seven sons, Jerome, Michael and Julian in Winnipeg, Lucien, Germaine and George in Kenora and Gerard in West-Bengal, India. Eighteen grandchildren also survive.

MRS. LAURA DEGAGNE, KEEWATIN PIONEER TO MARK 89th BIRTHDAY

DRIVER - TRAINING TESTS PLANNED FOR INSTRUCTORS

Regulations will be introduced, requiring that all driving instructors in the Province pass tests laid down by the Government, Transport Deputy Minister D. J. Collins announces.

Both prospective and established instructors will have to take the tests, but the latter may be given temporary licences while the scheme is being introduced.

Examinations for instructors will apply both to driver-training ability and character.

Mr. Collins said that these tests have been requested by quite a few of the instructors themselves.

Mrs. Laura de Gagne of Lake St. Keewatin will celebrate her 89th birthday on Saturday March 14th.

Born in Quebec near Hull in 1870 Mrs. de Gagne came to Keewatin in 1883 at the age of 13 and during the Riel Rebellion.

Her parents Mr. and Mrs. J. Desmaras with the rest of the family left Quebec with a group of French Canadians for the purpose of erecting a saw mill for D. L. and Bob Mathers. This mill was situated just west of where Keewatin now stands and is known as Slab Town.

To get to Keewatin it was necessary for those Pioneers to travel through the States to a point near Grand Forks where they boarded a barge north bound down the Red River to Winnipeg.

Canada Leads In World Hockey - Defeats Sweden

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia — Canada moved nearer to retaining the world Amateur Hockey Championship by defeating Sweden 5-0 today in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

The unbeaten Allan Cup champions from Belleville, Ont., now have won three straight games in the round-robin finals. Today's win also puts Canada in at least temporary possession of "first place with six points."

Czechoslovakia, unbeaten in two games, could regain a tie for first by beating Russia later today, but Russia is favored in this game.

In today's game against Sweden, Canada took a 1-0 lead in the first period, scored twice more in the second and added two more goals in the third.

The scoring was evenly divided between Wayne Brown, George Gosselin, Barton Bradley, playing-coach Ike Hildebrand and Lou Smrke. Bradley also assisted on Hildebrand's goal and picked up two of the three penalties. Red Berenson drew the other penalty in the cleanly played game.

Belleville's regular goalie, Gordon Bell, sat out today's game and was replaced by Merv Edwards who made only 17 stops in registering the shutout. The Swedish goalie, Karl Karstroem, had 40 stops.

Canada has two games remaining, one against the United States on Saturday and a windup match with Czechoslovakia on Sunday.

Mrs. A. Sorenson reporting for membership reported a membership of 43.

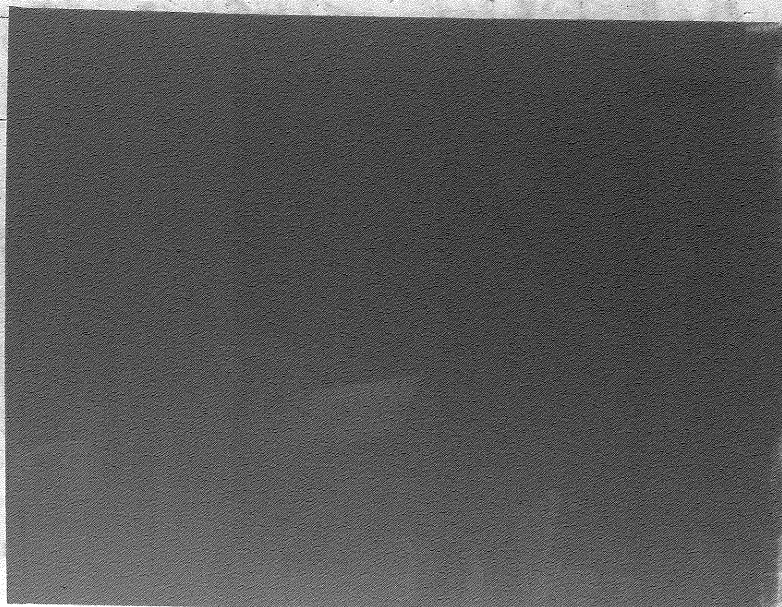

Ministers Get Raises

TORONTO —The legislature has approved pay increases for two recently-appointed ministers without portfolio.

John F. Roberts, London, and John H. Root, Wellington - Dufferin, will get another \$2,700 each added to their regular allowances of \$5,400.

Members got \$3,000 as a seasonal indemnity and \$1,500 each for expenses. The ministers without portfolio will receive an extra \$1,500 indemnity and \$900 expenses.

The cabinet's other minister without portfolio, Robert Macaulay, Riverdale, will not receive the increase because he gets the equivalent for representing the government on the Ontario Hydro Commission.

Regular cabinet ministers receive \$10,000 a year.

Albert Wren (Lib-Lab—Kenora) told the House Tuesday it was time other members got more money for their services. Ross Wheeler (L — Bruce) said he didn't mind the ministers getting the increase but thought they should be given specific jobs.

No Evidence Gas Shares Corruption

TORONTO — Attorney-General Roberts says there is no evidence to show there was bribery or corruption in the handling of shares of the Northern Ontario Natural Gas Company.

Shares of the province's natural gas controversy came into the House again when the minister rose to answer a question put to him Feb. 19 by CCF Leader MacDonald.

Mr. MacDonald asked at the time if any effort was made to get information from President John McGraw of Continental Investment Corporation of Vancouver. Mr. McGraw had refused, Mr. MacDonald noted, to come to Toronto to testify about 245,000 shares of Northern Ontario handled by his firm.

Mr. Roberts said Tuesday the transactions in question "are what might be termed ordinary, every-day transactions."

A LETTER TO THE PUBLIC

In the spring of 1958 when the company of Sir Lindsay Parkinson commenced work on the Chukuni River Bridge, situated on the Red Lake road, the conditions of work and wages were so deplorable that it was necessary to attempt making some corrections, and to do so was to answer the worker's plea for organization.

For an example, here is what the workers had to contend with, prior to any action from the union on the company. They were compelled to handle materials such as cresote, which had left the men with severe hand and facial burns. Unlicensed and inexperienced personnel were operating draglines and hoists, which to many of the men's disappointment, would result in frequent cold duckings in the Chukuni River.

At one time, last summer, a dragline had fallen through the bridge, and sent a crew of men down into the river below, and it was only a miracle that had saved them from drowning. There was much evidence of this form of negligence on the part of the company on this particular job, and following a complaint from the union to the safety inspector, an investigation finally revealed that there definitely was negligence on the part of the company, and as a result, the machinery in question had to be tied up until the operator qualified himself for a license.

This was a great disappointment to the management, because this action on the part of the union and the inspector had affected certain practices that enabled the company to make at the expense of the workers.

In regards to the Kenora Hospital Bridge Construction which is presently declared unfair by the union, there exists also a great deal of disregard for the health and safety of the working men, whether they know it or not. Also, the firm employs very, very few tax-payer residents of this area of Kenora, and does not pay the complete area rates as per Section 108-6 "PAYMENT OF WORKMEN," in Department of Highways Ontario-General Conditions of the contract DHO Form 100-Revised April 1st, 1958, is as follows;

"The contractor shall pay the workmen employed . . . not less than the prevailing rates of wages, and the contractor shall cause each sub-contract . . . to observe this provision and . . . shall pay the workmen . . . at rates not less than the local prevailing rates of wages."

Prior to action taken by the carpenters union, men were laid off or fired, and not pulled off the job as the public is made to believe.

Further more, in the opinion of a company representative, we in Ontario are just a bunch of 'scruffs,' yet Sir Lindsay Parkinson had succeeded in building bridges with our tradesmen and salting away the profits.

This reminds us of the old time colonialism which had enslaved the workers to a point such as what the practices of this contractor indicate, and we as Canadians and Trade-unionists will never pull any punches on important issues such as this, and will at all times strive to correct such conditions that are detrimental to the working classes of this present day society.

The people of Kenora had waited a long time for the new Hospital Bridge, . . . and employment on same when this construction commenced, and thus far those hopes are squashed, and the efforts that the Carpenters Local Union 1669 is putting into correcting the situation, is not only our fight alone, but every one else's also, who lives and pays taxes here, is having certain rights defended. So Kenora get behind your rights and attempt to have them recognized.

The Premier of Ontario, the Hon. Leslie Frost, has been advised of the situation on this project and has been requested to take the necessary action on the safety hazards and employment conditions which exist.

deg. The party then came on to Keewatin by C.P.R. which was

then a single track. The entire trip took 10 days to complete. On arrival in Keewatin these Pioneers made temporary shelters for their families until the mill was completed and sufficient

lumber available to build their homes. Shortly after this the men built two churches, Protestant and a Roman Catholic. The present site of St. Louis R.C. church is the original landmark on the hill where all told three churches have been built and has been the place of worship for the Catholics in the Keewatin area for nearly 75 years.

At the age of 19, Laura Desmaras was married to Charles de Gagne in Rat Portage now Kenora. Being no roads or transportation in those days the wedding party walked to Kenora along the C.P.R. tracks and returning the same way after the ceremony. The whole community turned out for the reception which was held in the Mill Yard followed by old time dancing and French Canadian Folk songs.

In 1918 Mrs. de Gagne was left a widow with 11 children, seven daughters and four sons. The surviving daughters are (Jonnie) Mrs. A. Hanlen of Seattle, Wash., (Rose) Mrs. O. Faulknor of Quartz Hill, California, (Laura) Mrs. Emil Couture of St. Boniface, (Orees) Mrs. Paul Lavoie of Norwopod. The deceased daughters are (Edna) Mrs. Hugh McKinnon of Kenora and Ottawa, (Georgina) Mrs. Paul Tailfore of Montreal and (Blanche) Mrs. Percy A. Woods of Spruce Lake near Keewatin. The four sons are Louis on No. 17 Highway, Laurie, Edward and Paul at home with their Mother. Mrs. de Gagne is still enjoying fairly good health and spends her time looking after her home and the boys. She has 31 Grand Children and 36 Great Grand Children.

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Satellites To Photograph Earth

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLA.—Nine giant camera satellites will be fired into orbit aboard powerful Atlas missiles starting next September, informed sources say.

Persons close to the project reported the camera satellites, weighing about a ton, will be blasted into short-lived orbits to take pictures of most of the earth's surface, including the heartland of the Soviet Union.

The program, called "Project Sentry," will use a two-stage Atlas ICBM as the booster for the bulky payload.

There were no details on the camera itself or how it would perform, but it was learned that the project was shifted to the Cape from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

Sentry is just one of a number of important space roles being assigned the workhouse Atlas which soared into orbit on its own last Dec. 18.

In June, the 360,000 pound thrust rocket will be the first stage vehicle for a probe to the planet Venus. Later, Atlas will have the job of shooting the first man into space.

It was learned that the decision

to move Sentry to the Cape was made to take advantage of the extra 1,000 m.p.h. kick provided by shooting in the same direction as the earth's rotation. The satellite must reach a speed of more than 18,000 m.p.h. to attain orbit.

Weight Tax Considered

TORONTO — Transport Minister Yaremko said Monday the Ontario government is considering a weight tax on heavy trucks.

The minister was replying in the legislature to a statement by CCF leader MacDonald that any increase in gasoline tax would shift an unfair burden on private car owners. Mr. Yaremko said the government is aware of that.

Mr. Yaremko said transports of more than eight tons represent only 3.1 per cent of the total vehicle registration in the province but contributed more than 30 per cent of the total registration fees.

The minister also said the reduction of Ontario traffic deaths to 1,112 in 1958 from 1,279 in 1957 was better than any other province and 45 of the 49 United States.

Under the new demerit system in Ontario, said Mr. Yaremko, "If a man refuses to obey the laws then he will simply be taking himself off the road."

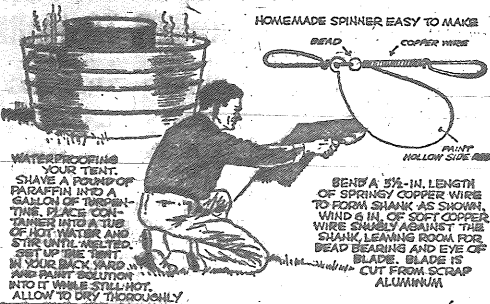


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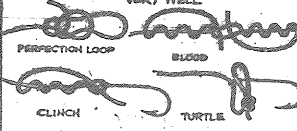

Fort Frances Work Project Gets Airing

Instead of getting a bargain, the Fort-Frances town council commented Monday night the winter work assistance being received from the federal and provincial governments is a gainless proposition.

THE MUNICIPALITY took advantage of the 75 per cent subsidy offered by the senior governments to move a waterline out of

the road of the planned Portage avenue subway.

But Councillor Len Connor, chairman of public works, informed the council that the deal has turned into a case of the town subsidizing the federal government.

Whereas councillors expected to get some of the unemployed married men of the community off the municipal relief roll, the men being sent to the job by the National Employment Service include some bachelors without dependents. Only men sent by the NES are eligible under the winter works program, Connor explained.

THE WORKS chairman said he

didn't know what the council could do about the situation "unless we ditch the whole deal and put our men on it."

The council earlier had lined up several projects to reduce its welfare load and put relief claimants to work but it is likely these will now be laid over. Councillors commented the NES is more interested in putting to work men who are drawing unemployment insurance benefits than giving jobs to other men no longer on the federal payroll.

In other business transactions, the council:

- Approved purchase of replacement and new machinery totalling \$41,035. Although the list of equipment covered included a new grader for \$25,000, the grader may not be purchased immediately.

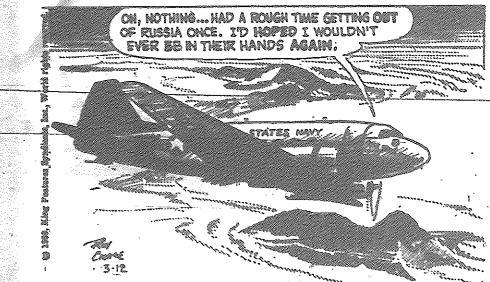
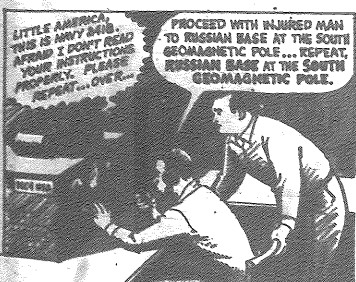
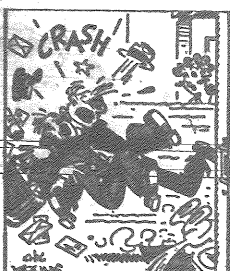
OBJECT OF THE BY-LAW was to have the total purchase approved by the Ontario municipal board. Equipment definitely scheduled for purchase include a one-ton truck, for about \$3,000; a compressor, \$4,970; and an asphalt mixer, \$8,065.


- Discussed need for a new power substation recommended by Bela Toth, electrical engineer. Toth also suggested a meeting with electrical officials of the O-M company to find out how far Fort

Frances electrical expansion can proceed without taxing O-M power resources. The town purchases power from the paper company.

- Learned from councillors who met unions of town employees last week that negotiations are still continuing.

- Discussed with J. C. Smith, attorney, the plans of Husky Oil company to open a combined restaurant and service station of King's Highway. Smith emphasized that council should move fast to approve Husky plans or lose an industry that will probably support 12 families
