

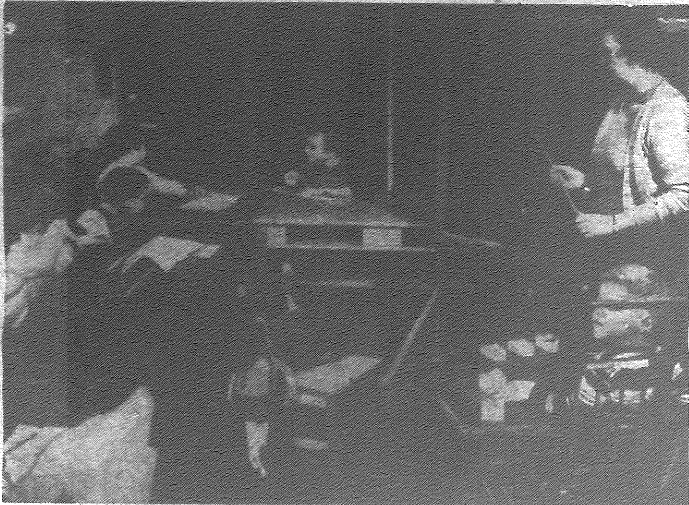

4-H Clubs To Start New Course

Training Schools for the next 4-H Homemaking Club project "The Milky Way" will be held at the Rabbit Lake Club House Kenora on Monday and Tuesday, March 23 and 24 and at the Ojibwa Community Hall, Wednesday and Thursday, March 25 and 26. Time 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day.

A club may be organized where there are at least three interested girls between the ages of 12 and 26. There must be a club leader and an assistant leader who will attend both days of the training school. A leader will be an older girl or a woman who is interested in girls and has some knowledge of food preparation.

In "The Milky Way" project the girls will study menu planning and the value of milk for every member of the family. They will prepare milk drinks, custards and other milk desserts and cream soups. Each girl will start a recipe file and keep a record book. Milk comes in many forms and a wide range of milk products is on the market. The study of the care and use of milk is one that should interest all girls of club age.

New clubs are always welcome. 4-H Homemaking Clubs provide excellent training in club organization and in various topics of home economics. Girls are encouraged to take part in home activities and to share responsibility as a member of the family group. These activities assist them with their personal growth and development and thus they will become better citizens of our country and the world.

O and M Have New 'Machine' Operating At International Falls

International Falls, Minn. - Minnesota and Ontario Paper Company's new No. 2 machine is now in operation, according to H. W. Schlafle, general manager. The first rolls of saleable paper for book and magazine use were produced Friday following brief test runs. The start-up was several days ahead of schedule.

The modern Beloit unit - 305 feet long and weighing approximately 2,000,000 pounds - was erected on the site of a machine which had been in operation for 48 years. Designed for high speed production of high grade specialty papers, the machine will further diversify the scope of paper manufacturing at the Falls mills. The machine produces a web of paper 148 inches wide at speeds up to 1,500-feet per minute.

Fifty railway carloads of equipment went into the machine, which incorporates some of the latest developments in design, including a removable fourdrinier section.

Approximately 200 Mando employees representing many mechanical skills worked seven days a week for nine weeks to install the machine. Its predecessor, a Casey & Jones machine in continuous use since the mill was built in 1910, was shut down Dec. 28 and immediately dismantled to make room for the new Beloit. Two other machines in the plant produce groundwood specialties and kraft papers.

dent of the District of Kenora Home for the Aged advising of the increased rate charged for residents would be \$120.00 per month effective March 1st, 1959 was moved filed. Council approved the Budget requirements of the District of Kenora Home for the Aged for the year 1959 and referred the budget to the Finance Committee for inclusion in levy for the year 1959. The advice from the District of Kenora Magistrate's Court advising as to this corporations portion of fines levied during January was moved filed.

A request from the Kenora Lions Squadron No. 645 for permission to hold a Tag Day April 25th, 1959 was granted as was a further request that a proclamation be issued designating the week of April 19th to 25th, 1959 as "Air Cadet Week in Keewatin." A Telegram from the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Toronto, Ontario concerning the possibility of spring floods in certain parts of the province was moved filed, also a communication from the Department and Development. Advice from the Office of the Fire Marshall was referred to the Chairman of Parks and Recreation concerning excessive snow loads due to the abundance of moisture in the snow at this time. The request for Progress Payment number seven, from the Board of Public School Trustees was moved filed as was the report from Queen's Park. The request from the Secretary of the Keewatin Figure Skating club for permission to store the "Props" which they have on hand was referred to the Chairman of Parks and recreation. Council granted the sum of Three Hundred Dollars to the Keewatin Citizens' Band for the year 1959.

Council requested the Clerk, in regard to a communication from the Aerial Survey Company Ltd., to inquire as to the cost of a map of the built-up area of the municipality for assessment purposes. Council authorized the increase of the the Retaining Fee of Fire Chief from \$200.00 to \$250.00 for the year 1959.

Inquiries are to be made as to the cost of a pavement breaker. Council was advised that the thawing of drains was progressing favourably and that the steam hose had been received and installed on the steam boiler used for this purpose. It was pointed out that water department costs were much lower this year than in years previous and because of this, consideration was given to the possibility of installing a pump on the blue water truck to speed deliveries equivalent to the new truck. Following discussion, the application by the Police Department for a increase in salaries was referred to the Fire and Police Committee of Council.

The Clerk advised Council of the decision of the Lake of the Woods Milling Company to appeal from the decision of the Court of Revision to the Judge concerning the assessment of their holdings made in 1958, also an application by the appellant for a remission of taxes on a portion of its property in the Town of Keewatin, under the provisions of Section 124 of The Assessment Act R.S.O. 1950 Chapter 24.

By-law number 677 was passed to provide for the 1959 expenditures on roads and street under the Highway Improvement Act.

New business included the report from the Manager of the Municipal Memorial Building for the month of February, a copy of the monthly report from the District of Kenora Health Unit. Both were moved filed. The request from Mr. R. Robertson re the possibility of a leasing of a portion of Wharf Street in the vicinity of his home was referred to the Finance Committee of Council. The communication from William M. Mercer Ltd., Consultants of Civic Pension Plans, Winnipeg was given considerable discussion and referred to a special meeting to be held at a later date.
