WREN OUTLINES ROAD PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT

As your Member in the Ontario Legislature I am happy to outline to you the Department of Highways program for this year. This Does Not Include access roads which are another Dept.

On the Trans-Canada Highway in the category of CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION we will have a total of 64.1 miles of construction work; 26.8 miles in grading culverts and granular base plus 37.3 miles of paving. On the Red Lake Highway (105) two new structures will be built over FERRAULT FALLS and PICKEREL CREEK.

Under CAPITAL WORKS in the Maintenance Division a lot of work will get underway. Under the heading GRADING AND GRANULAR BASE the REDDITT HIGHWAY (No. 128) will be so worked for a distance of 14 miles south from Redditt. The RABBIT LAKE ROAD (No. 598) will be improved over a distance of 2.6 MILES.

Highway No. 72 SOUTH FROM SNOUX LOOKOUT for a distance of 29.5 MILES will get GRANULAR BASE. The same granular base will be applied on the Red Lake Highway (105) over 15 MILES from a point 15 miles south of FERRAULT FALLS to a point 30 miles south of that location.

The CARRY-OVER WORK (Contracts already underway) is likewise heavy; 32.9 MILES of Grading, Culverts and Granular base will be completed on the Trans-Canada. The new HOSPITAL BRIDGE at KENORA plus a half mile of graded and paved approaches will follow through to completion. The widening of the UPPER FALLS BRIDGE on the Red Lake Highway will be completed as well as the STRUCTURE OVER THE CHUKUNI RIVER on the Red Lake Highway.

Thus work will proceed on 107 miles of new capital highway work on the Trans-Canada, 64.1 on new work and 32.9 of work started but to be completed this year. Our Municipalities will spend \$226,900 which has been approved by the Department of Highways for subsidy. (In addition work in unorganized areas will proceed under the various Statute Labour Boards). The breakdown of municipal expenditures is as follows.

Dryden Man Killed Saturday In Car Accident

A highway accident Saturday claimed the life of a Dryden man and sent his wife to hospital. Instantly killed was Johann Heinz, 46. Taken to hospital was his wife Mrs. Anne Heinz. Two other passengers in the car, Holfe Tillman and Irwin Abromet, both of Dryden were uninjured. The accident occurred on the Manitoba Highway, sixty miles from Winnipeg at Richer, Man. at approximately three o'clock. R.C.M.P. report that the car skidded on the icy pavement and rolled over. Mrs. Heinz was taken to a nearby hospital where her condition is reported as good.

Kenora Youth Gets 3 Year Pen Term

A Kenora youth was sentenced in Magistrate's Court this morning to serve three years in penitentiary for breaking, entering and theft from Westario Motors. He also received three other sentences to run concurrently with the first one, 1 year for theft of an automobile, 3 years for breaking and entering Newman's Jewellers and 1 year for breaking and entering White Rose Service Station.

Other cases heard this morning dealt with a variety of offences under the Traffic Act and the Liquor Control Act.

Two local youths found guilty of racing on the highway, were each fined \$50 and costs or 15 days and had their licence suspended for 60 days. Failure to yield half the road cost a Kenora man \$25 or 3 days and a careless driving charge resulted in a local man paying \$50 and costs or 15 days. Illegal passing of a vehicle on the highway cost a local motorist \$15 and costs on 3 days.

REWARDING WORK WITH CRIPPLED CHILDREN RECOUNTED AT ROTARY

A heart-warming message of hope and courage, was given to members of the Kenora Rotary Club today by Miss Rose Frim, R.N., who outlined to Rotarians some of the problems faced in the continuous and sometimes desperate fight for health and normal living being waged by crippled children in Northwestern Ontario. Miss Frim recently was appointed supervisor of District 16 by the Ontario Crippled Children's Society with headquarters at the Lakehead.

Guest, too, at today's luncheon meeting was Miss Shirley Falconer, local Easter Seal Queen, introduced by Mr. R. H. Elliott, Shirley, who was a victim of the 1953 polio epidemic, is winning the fight to regain the use of her legs and feet. An operation last summer at Fort William was successful and it is hoped that after a final operation next year, this pretty 10 year old Miss will be able to run and play like other children, said Mr. Elliott.

Miss Frim used the case histories of four young boys and girls to illustrate her talk, young people of Sault Ste. Marie with whom she worked for the Society. While expressing appreciation for the splendid financial support which Rotary makes to the Society, the requirements of the children go far beyond financial considerations, said the speaker, naming social, educational, recreational and other needs, which combined, give the child the "gift of citizenship." Mental obstacles often present the sternest challenges to those who desire to help, said Miss Frim, relating the difficulties faced by a young girl who was, at first, most sensitive to her physical handicaps in the

presence of other children. She described, in most appealing terms, the struggle for happiness of youngsters who are deprived of the use of limbs, of speech, and of other abilities.

To create personal interest in the well-being of these young victims should be the challenge to us all, said the speaker.

Miss Frim was introduced by C. A. Roberts and thanked by Tom Saul, who stated that Rotarians were proud of the association with the work of Crippled Children and those who so ably work with the Society.

Jack Penner informed the Club that about half the Easter Seal envelopes which have been mailed out have been returned, and that some \$1,332 had been received to date. He was confident that the

The building is included in the estimates which total \$31,542,000 a sharp increase from 1958 when the total was only \$51,000,000.

Possibly the large number of Swedish residents of the Township in the early days found it easier to say PELLATT, he said.

THISTLES LACKED DEPTH AND OTHER THINGS . . .



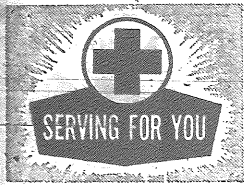
was presented with a lovely corsage and brooch and earring set. The following program was presented.

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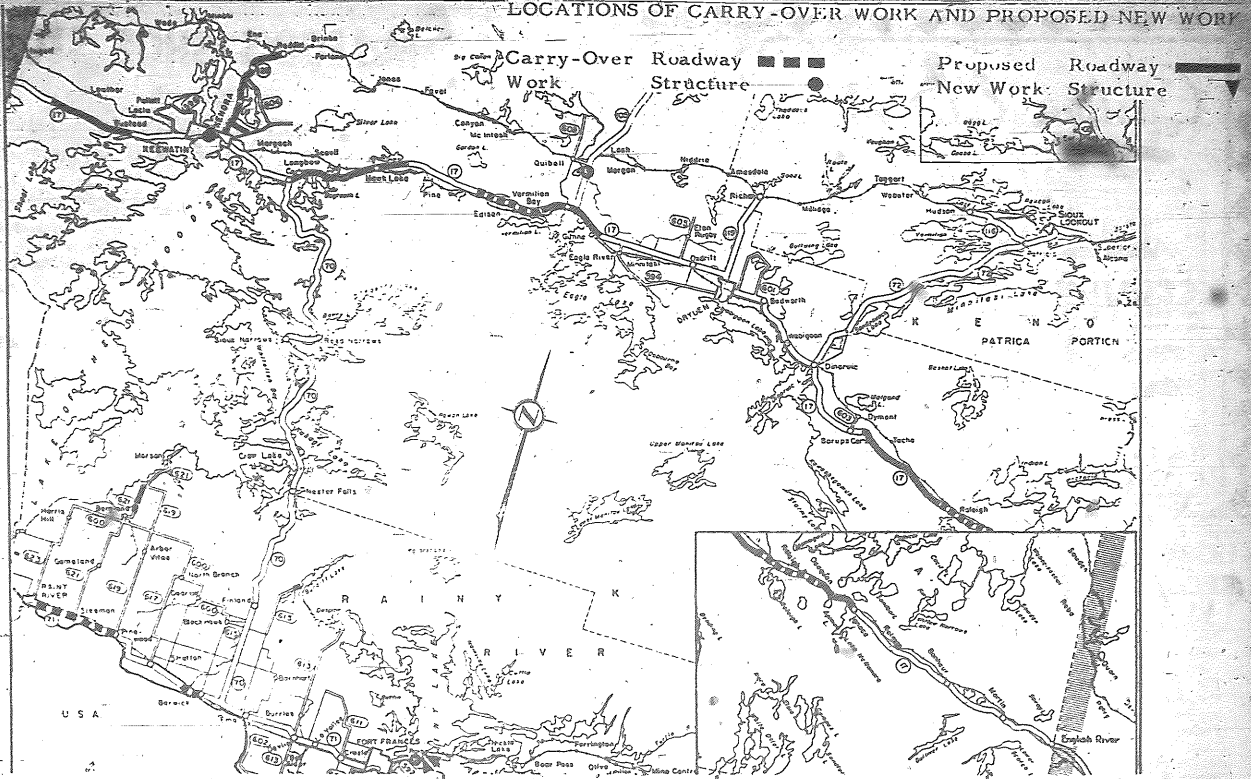
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Heart Patient Starts Fifth Life

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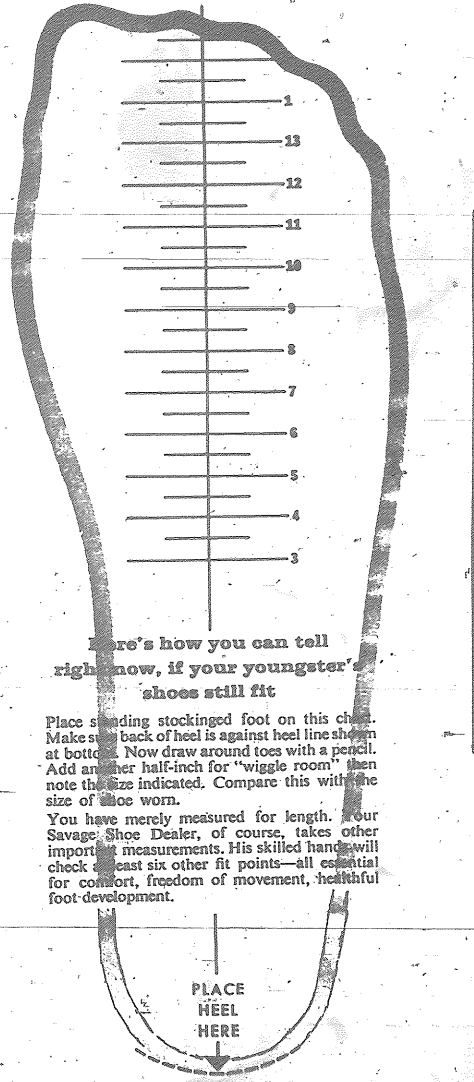

Two Confused Tots Adjust To Idea Of New Mother, Dad

David and Patsy came into the care of a Children's Aid Society in Eastern Ontario when he was seven and she was five years old. Their mother had suffered for years from a mental illness and finally had to be committed to a mental hospital. There was no hope of recovery. The father cared greatly about his children, and he tried desperately to plan for them. He took them to relatives on a farm, but here they were cruelly rejected, even mistreated. When the father discovered what was happening to his children he went for them and brought them to the agency for foster placement.

The children's story is told in the current issue of the Journal of the Ontario Children's Aid Societies by Muriel McGowan and Eileen Duffy. After this unfortunate experience they tell

how the children showed decided symptoms of deprivations and anxiety. David showed many signs of being a severely disturbed youngster: night terrors, temper tantrums, he'd dashes, staring into space. Patsy was more happy-go-lucky, with a sunny, affectionate disposition, though bewilderment and fear lurked under the surface. Both children had good average intelligence and were responsive to kindness and attention.

They were placed in the reception home for a few days until a foster home was found with a very warm, understanding couple. For a year and a half David and Patsy had the healing experience of a happy family life. Then the blow fell. The foster mother became pregnant, and against her wishes, but on her doctor's advice, had to ask that the children be moved.

The father, who had been clinging to the hope that he could somehow make a home for his children, now faced the realization that this would never be possible for him. He felt that they should have the opportunity of being placed for adoption, and agreed to permanent wardship. With casework help, he was able to tell the children that he had asked the agency to find them a new mummy and

daddy and a home of their very own.

ADOPTION PROCESS BEGINS

It was unthinkable that the children should again be placed immediately in another foster

home where they would begin to try to form new attachments, only to be broken later, so they were placed in the C.A.S. reception home and introduced to the adoption worker as the lady

who was going to find them a new mummy and daddy.

The worker spent a great deal of time with David and Patsy. She took them for many outings

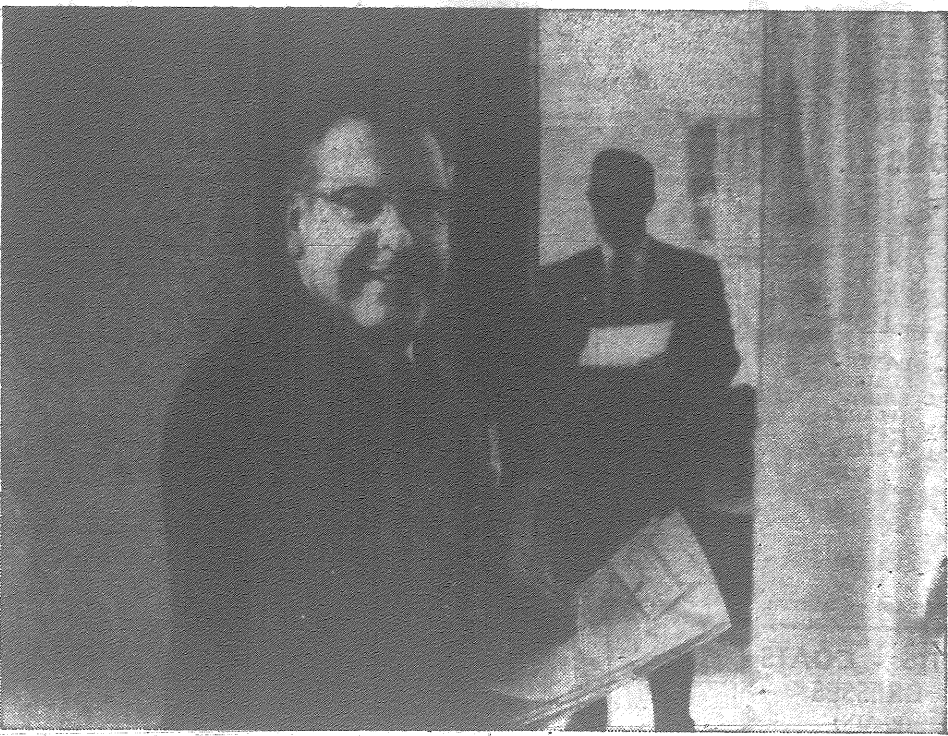

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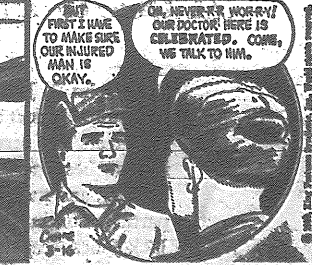

- shopping, swimming, picnics, rides and walks. In many little ways she made them feel that they were important to her. This filled a vital need of the children during this period, suffering as they were from the double loss of their beloved foster parents and their own father.

She helped them to talk about their parents and their previous experiences. Patsy could not remember much about her early life, but David could, and mentioned how his mother used to put him out on the verandah and leave him there all day and get terribly mad and yell at him. The worker told him that was because she was not well. David added: "My dad always took care of us though."

"Your mother and dad both love you," they were told, but because she is ill and he can not look after you, your father asked us to find you a home. Did he tell you this?" Both Patsy and David answered, "Yes, because he wanted us to be together and have a new home."

Patsy wanted to know if they would have to leave the new home if the mother should have a baby. "Not this time," they were assured.

In a short time the children grew in their acceptance of the idea of adoption, though they did not move steadily in the new direction without a backward glance. Both children made two little plaques which they said they were saving for their new parents. They both became anxious to go to their new home, and said that is what their father wanted for them.

SELECTION OF ADOPTION HOME

Meanwhile a home was under consideration which seemed suitable for these children. Mr. and Mrs. Raye were visited and told a great deal about the background and personalities of the children. The fact of the mother's illness was discussed frankly with them, and they accepted it in an intelligent, thoughtful way. They were keenly interested in the children, and an arrangement was made for them to meet casually. They liked the children immediately and were anxious to proceed with the placement.

THE CHILDREN CHOOSE THEIR PARENTS

The children were taken to visit the Rayes, being told merely that these were the worker's friends they had met in the restaurant. They had a delightful time, and eagerly accepted the invitation to return for supper the next day.

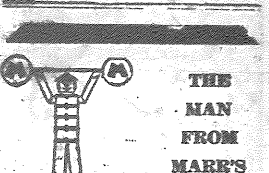
