KENORA DIST. RECEIVING EXCELLENT PUBLICITY THROUGHOUT UNITED STATES

Representatives of The Industrial and Publicity Board of Kenora have just arrived at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to attend the tenth annual Boat, Sports and Travel Show, sponsored annually by the Milwaukee Sentinel. They report considerable enthusiasm here with a waiting list of exhibitors anxious to get into this popular show at the last minute.

The Chicago show again broke all records for attendance, and the final total for the "Windy City" was 368,824, some ten percent over last year's record total.

The daily tally for Chicago will prove of interest to all merchants and resort owners in Kenora and district. Friday opening night

30,964; Saturday 47,923; Sunday 75,823; Monday 20,186; Tuesday, 23,605; Wednesday, half-holiday, 33,147; Thursday, 22,149; Friday, 31,012; Saturday, 31,149; Saturday 47,823; and the last Sunday 36,193; for the total of 368,824.

The Chicago Sport Show has the reputation for being the largest Sport Show in the United States, exceeding the returns of the New York Show, and the demand for folders was exceptional, while the enquiries for individual folders and resorts, beat all previous records.

It was amazing the hundreds who came to the Kenora booth, advising that they had visited Kenora and district in previous years and their knowledge of the area, the fishing and the various resorts was surprising and most gratifying.

A huge new auditorium is now being built on the Chicago lakefront drive, which will surpass anything yet available in this great city of conventions. It will have in addition to the huge auditorium a 900 room hotel and large convention facilities, stores etc. This should be available for an even larger show in 1961, and will then accommodate close on to ten thousand automobiles. The Amphitheatre now in use, has accommodation for 4,000 cars, but more space is needed on busy weekends, & it is located in the stockyard area, a crowded industrial area. The new location will offer easier access and greater facilities for the public and should be a big attraction.

All shows are reporting increased attendance, and there is a keen enthusiasm in sport, travel, and recreation which should indicate a good tourist season, providing the weatherman co-operates.

Other shows to be attended by the Kenora Board Representatives are Minneapolis and Dallas. Radio and TV shows have been made available to advantage, and the area is receiving excellent publicity at moderate cost.

Ireland, as Dublin bard William Allingham complained in these lines, has been an occupied country for a good many years now. And, for once, the English have nothing to do with it.

It's the little people — leprechauns, banshees, clurichauns and the like — who hold the good green island in thrall and there's devil a man can do a thing about it. Nor any who'd want to for that matter.

A CAPRICIOUS LOT

Their's a capricious lot, the wee folk, what with playing jokes all day, dancing all night and stealing into people's cellars for a droopie of two to quench their indormitable thirst. Sure it does no good at all to go against them; that is, unless you want to die prematurely and under what the newspapers would call "mysterious circumstances."

External Affairs Minister, Smith, Died Today

Prime Minister John Diefenbaker announced today to the House of Commons, the sudden death of External Affairs Minister Smith. He made the announcement some forty minutes after the opening of today's sitting. The Commons immediately adjourned until tomorrow as a mark of tribute to Mr. Smith.

Mr. Smith had been External Affairs Minister since September 13, 1957. No indication as to the cause of death of the sixty-two year old minister was made.

Opposition Leader Pearson and Hazen Argue, CCF House Leaders, echoed sentiments that the death of Mr. Smith was a tragic loss to the country.

Unconfirmed reports state that Mr. Smith died in his Ottawa apartment and that a heart attack was the cause of death.

Charged with the December 25th murder of OPP Constable Calvin Russel Fulford is Thomas Young of Ear Falls. Laverna Dorothy Boyd of Dryden is charged with the Boxing Day death of her husband, Frank Boyd. Charged with criminal negligence is Leo Leroux of Kenora. The charge follows the January 24th death of Joan Hatle of Kenora, who died following an automobile accident on the eastern outskirts of Kenora.

A warm welcome to His Lordship was extended by Mr. Vern King, President of the Kenora Bar Association. The speaker expressed regret that the heavy criminal docket and the season were not conducive to a pleasant visit. In reply, Mr. Justice Thompson stated that although this marked his initial trip to this area, he was not unaware of the Bar Association both by reputation and record of achievement.

All seats were filled in the spacious courtroom long before the 11.00 a.m. scheduled opening. It was found necessary to exclude all spectators in order that seats could be found for the 105 prospective jurors and numerous witnesses.

The charge to the jury lasted about 35 minutes, concluding at 11.50 a.m. It is expected that the trial of Thomas Young will be considered first, if a true bill is returned.

50,000 DEER FACING STARVATION

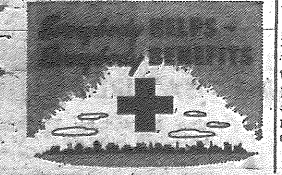
TORONTO — The plight of an estimated 50,000 deer facing starvation in Ontario because of this winter's heavy snowfall came up in the legislature.

Maurice Hamilton, (PC - Renfrew North) asked the government to call on conservation and wildlife groups across the areas affected to send in their members to cut down feed for the deer.

Provincial wildlife biologists last month estimated 50,000 deer would die because of the heavy snow. They were unable to move around in search of food.

Canadian Red Cross Hospital Visitors make regular visits to patients in more than 100 hospitals from Newfoundland to British Columbia. They are all volunteers.

The money raised by the Canadian Junior Red Cross has provided medical treatment and care for over 55,000 children.

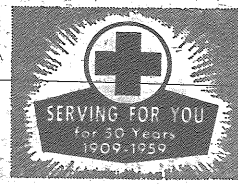

WHAT A GUY

JIMMY'S JINX FOILS BID FOR CURLING CUP

Last night at the Kenora Curling Club, Jim Guy proved again, what most people have conceded for some years - over the stretch Jimmy is a tough fellow to curl against.

Archie Davidson is probably the best authority on the subject. Last night he played Jim for top honors in the Club - and lost. Archie, on the record should be considered one of the best in the game, for he won the top section this week without a loss. Jim was the winner of section "B" and last night's play-off game for the Cup, was moved ahead a few days, due to a couple of the players leaving town.

The luck of the draw sent Archie into section "A" with 12 wins and Jim into section "B" with 13 wins, before the final round started two weeks ago. Archie played 4 and won all contests. Jimmy played out his five games, and won them all. The history of the game between them also favors Jimmy slightly. Prior to last night's play-off, Archie had managed to beat Jim only once this season, and not too many times in the past three years.

And when the measuring stick was extended, there was only a slight show of daylight between the stick and stone. It was that close.

It was a terrific game, which saw three points scored on the first five ends. Archie led 2-1 at the end of third, with the fourth and fifth ends being blanked by Guy. Jim picked up two on the sixth, to lead 3-2 and went ahead 4-2 on the 7th. Archie counted one on the 8th only to have Jim regain the two point margin with a single on the 9th. On the 10th, Archie succeeded

in protecting a stone in the 8 foot circle, and drew across the house when Guy's take-out failed, for a pair and a tie. On the extra end, Archie again buried a stone in the 8 foot circle, but Jim came through with a terrific shot, skimming by the guard and punching out the counting rock.

The final games in the regular schedule will be played tonight, with play-offs for the various sections to follow later this week.

NEW SPORT COMBINES SKIING, SHOOTING



The 1960 winter Olympics will have a new Nordic event, the Biathlon, a combination of cross country skiing and rifle marksmanship. During the Olympic trials now under way in Squaw Valley, Calif., Martin Rollai, a Hungarian refugee who will compete for a place on the U.S. team, shows one of the targets, a rough silhouette of a man's head. Contestants fire at the targets from varying distances at four stations on the course and are penalized two minutes for every shot that misses the target. A total of 20 rounds are fired.

D. B. S. Weekly Highlights

Dominion Bureau of Statistics

Merchandising

Sales of department stores in January were 8% larger in dollar volume at an estimated \$91,769,000 than in January last year. Sales were higher in volume in all provinces and all but three departments. Special weekly report shows a gain of more than 10% in such sales in the final February week, making an unbroken series of weekly gains through the month.

Manufacturing

Motor vehicle shipments from Canadian plants during February were more than a fifth greater in number than a year ago and with a smaller January increase, put shipments up 12% for the two months. . . . Steel ingot output eased off again in the first March week from the previous week and was at 84.3% of rated capacity of steel mills. February output of pig iron was 22% larger than a year earlier and steel ingot output 18% larger. . . .

Tax paid withdrawals of cigarettes in 1958 were 7.5% greater than in 1957. . . . Sales of building brick, structural tile and other clay products, except fireclay blocks and shapes, were larger last year than in 1957, the total rising nearly 20% and exceeding the previous peak year by nearly 12%.

External Trade

Final, detailed figures on imports for November show gains in purchases from Latin America, Europe and the remaining foreign countries in addition to the gains from Commonwealth countries and the slight changes in imports from the United Kingdom and United States shown in the preliminary report. Over the 11 months, when total value was down 9%, the value of imports was down from the United States, Latin America and the Commonwealth group (excluding the United Kingdom).

Food & Agriculture

Overseas export clearances of wheat in the current crop year were nearly 5% smaller to February 18 than in the previous year. . . . Production of the majority of processed foods last year was larger than in 1957.

Transportation

Total carloadings in February, with a slight drop in the final week, were practically the same as last year, but the January decrease put the two-month aggregate 1.3% under last year. . . . Net oil deliveries through pipelines last year were 5.5% smaller than in 1957, due mainly to a drop of 43% in exports.

Ontario Election Forecast For June

Ottawa—Paul Martin (L. Essex East) suggested in the Commons that Premier Frost will call a provincial general election for next June.

He made the forecast while questioning Finance Minister Fleming as to when the next federal-provincial fiscal conference will be held.

Mr. Martin requested the minister's comment on a report in Thursday's Toronto Globe and Mail that the premier had said in the legislature he was satisfied as a result of steps now being taken that he could look forward to such a conference at a fairly early date.

Mr. Fleming said he presumed this was a reference to current federal steps to arrange a meeting of provincial treasurers and himself on federal-provincial tax-sharing matters.

Mr. Martin then asked Mr. Fleming whether, "in view of the fact that Premier Frost is likely to suggest that there should be a dissolution of the Ontario House before June, he (Mr. Fleming) thinks there is any possibility of this conference taking place before the provincial elections to be held during that month?"

Mr. Fleming replied only that he hoped Mr. Martin had a better source for that information than the "Martin bureau of statistics," a reference to the Liberal MP's frequent use of statistics.

NEW FRENCH CAR BEING UNVEILED

Toronto—The Renault Caravelle, a four-seater sports model to complement the Dauphine sedan, was unveiled in Canada recently.

Officials of Regie Renault, the French automobile firm, said the

car will be introduced at the opening of the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show here. It will be on the market in late 1959 or early 1960.

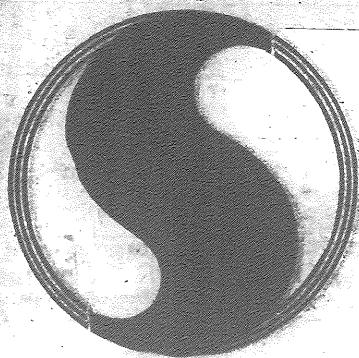

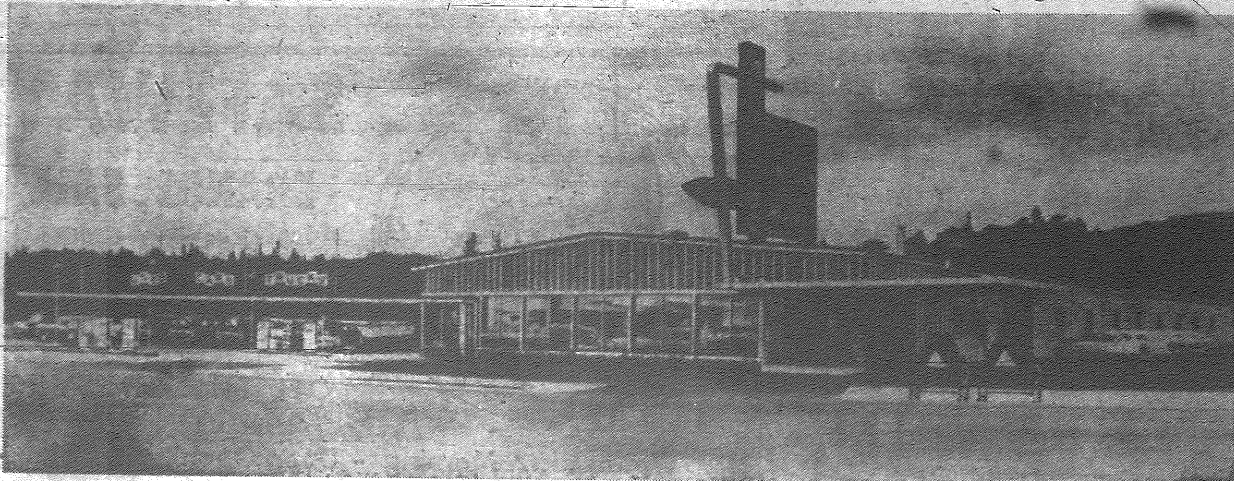

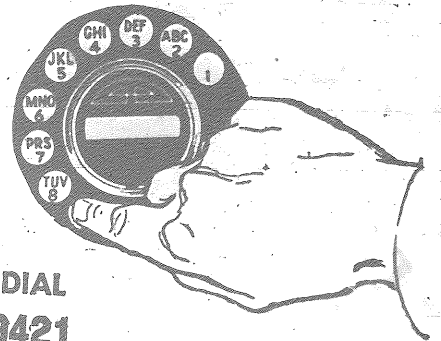

He has been inveigled to portray a judge in Otto Preminger's *Anatomy Of A Murder*. Here for a publicity whirl before reporting to the Michigan location, he bristled at the suggestion that lawyers emote in the courtroom.

"I have been willing to fight and to bleed because I was firmly convinced of the righteousness of my client's cause," he explained. "And I have lost and bled in pur-

suing these causes, but I have still been convinced of their righteousness."

NOT EVEN DARROW

Welch would not concede that Clarence Darrow, the most histrionic lawyer of the century, could be accused of acting.

"I am a great admirer of Darrow's, and I feel that he was so wrapped up with the belief in his clients' cause that he was carried away with emotion."

What induced Welch to abandon his law books for a movie script?

"The script itself," he con-

mented. "It was a faithful adaptation of the book, which I found to be an extremely accurate account of a trial. Naturally, it would be, since it was written by John Voelker, who is a justice of the Michigan Supreme Court."

"I would not be here today if it were not for the fidelity with which the role of the judge was written," he said.

His scenes will require five weeks work. Most of his scenes take place on the bench.

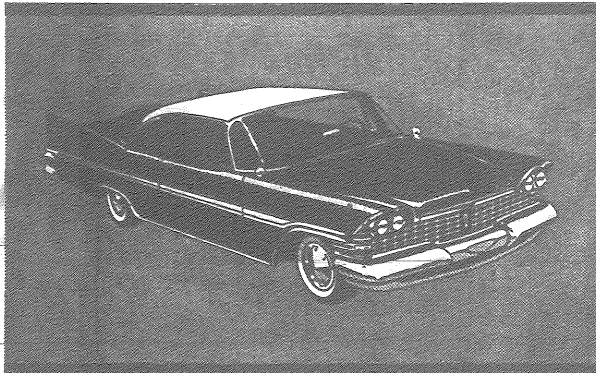

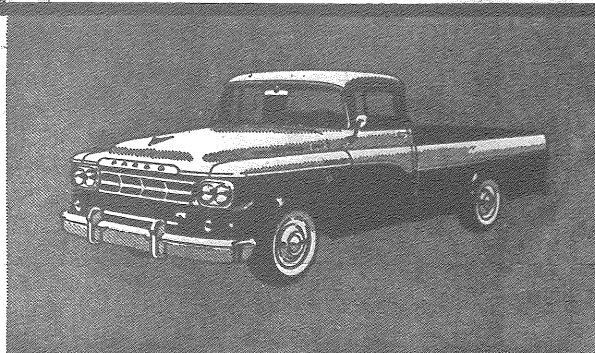

erations.

The Caland mine, under lease to Inland Steel Co. on a royalty basis, could sustain indefinitely the contractual minimum of 3,000,000 tons yearly, and Caland will commence shipping on schedule in 1960.

The long-range outlook for iron ore is of vital concern to the entire Canadian economy, Mr. Fotheringham said.

Estimates of potential Canadian iron-ore production are from 45,000,000 to 80,000,000 tons annually by the mid-1960's. By 1960 Canadian production could reach 90,000,000 tons with the following possible markets:

United States 70,000,000 tons, overseas 16,000,000; domestic 10,000,000.

Canadian reserves are more than ample, Mr. Fotheringham commented, but it may turn out that so are those of foreign competition.

"The steel-maker prefers to know the source of his basic materials 25 years in advance. He is already thinking in terms of 1980 and if we in Canada wish to assure ourselves of these very large new revenues, we should also be thinking in terms of 1980.

"There are in the same general Lake Superior area (as Steep Rock) deposits of medium and lower-grade ores, not yet economic but which will in due course become so. Full-scale development of these which are so far known or indicated could well create enough jobs to support an increase of 100,000 in the population of Northwestern Ontario."

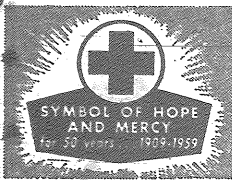
Steep Rock Mine Plans Production Boost In 1959

Steep Rock Lake, Ont.—The immediate sales outlook now fully justifies plans of Steep Rock Iron Mines to offer in 1959 about double the iron ore it shipped in 1958. M. S. Fotheringham, president, told the annual meeting today.

Shipments in 1958 were 1,156,358 tons with a gross value of \$13,512,658 compared with 2,348,538 tons valued at \$26,407,880 in 1957.

Expansion curtailed in 1958 to match economic conditions, has already been resumed and the cutback has not caused any significant delay in long-range plans Mr. Fotheringham said.

The company plans to increase production progressively to its announced objective of 5,500,000 tons annually from its direct-operated mines. Its reserves, he said, can sustain this rate for gen-
