TO RETIRE JUNE 30

Miss Jessie Francis, 38 Years A Teacher

A colorful and dedicated teaching career will end when Miss Jessie Francis, Principal of South Ward School, dismisses her Grade one class on June 30th of this year. After having taught two generations of Kenora pupils the three R's and many things besides, she is retiring after 38 years of continuous service to this community.

Miss Francis received her elementary schooling in Scotland. She came to Kenora with her parents where she graduated from High School in 1916. At that time the High School Department was in Central School and later in what is now the North Ward Public School. She completed her teacher training at North Bay Normal School and taught for several years in rural schools. In September 1921 she joined the staff of the Kenora Public Schools and the Board records still contain the Memorandum of Agreement between Miss Francis and the then Board of Education.

She has taught Grades 2, 5 and 6 at Central and North Ward Schools in addition to South

Ward, but her main love has remained in Grade 1. She has introduced more Beginners to the secrets of Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic than any other teacher on the staff.

During World War II she was appointed temporary Principal of South Ward School while the then Principal was on leave of absence for War Service. She then taught an Auxiliary Class for two years after 1945. In November 1950 she was again appointed to the position of Principal at South Ward School and has most capably fulfilled the duties of this office since.

Miss Francis lives at Suite 1, Linnell Block. She is looking forward to pursuing her favorite hobbies of handicrafts and sewing. It is also known that she intends to travel extensively after her retirement.

Miss Minnie Kemp, who has taught in Kenora for 7 years, first in the Primary grades and then as Reading Consultant, has been appointed to succeed Miss Francis as Principal of South Ward School.

CROWN RESTS CASE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Friday afternoon's session of the hearing of a charge of murder against Thomas Young of Ear Falls lasted less than two hours.

The Crown asked permission to briefly re-examine several of the technical witnesses.

Dr. McLean outlined to the court the causes of death of Clara Gordon, George Williams, Albert Young and James Gordon.

Other witnesses recalled were John Funk, of the Attorney General's laboratory, Constable Gazeby of the R.C.M.P. laboratory at Rockcliffe, Ont., and Corporal McGarva of the Kenora detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.

At this point, the Crown attempted to enter as exhibits, pictures taken the night of the slayings. The jury was excluded from the courtroom.

After 15 minutes of discussion with the Crown and defence attorneys, the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson ruled that the pictures would serve no useful purpose and would tend to have a prejudicial effect.

The Crown maintained the pictures would help the jury understand the evidence before them, but his Lordship ruled the photographs inadmissible as evidence.

At 3:15 the Crown rested its case and court recessed for 30 minutes.

Following this recess, Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty, announced that he had received further evidence, and asked to be allowed to re-open the case. This was granted.

The first witness called was Norman Nailer, the manager of the liquor store in Red Lake, Ont. He stated he was contacted by Corporal R. Bender of the O.P.P. at Red Lake, who asked to examine his records for the week prior to Christmas, with regard to the purchases of wine made by one, Gerald Bannatyne.

Mr. Nailer testified, his records showed that on December 23, last, Gerald Bannatyne purchased 12 bottles of Port Wine and also on December 24th, David Bannatyne purchased 5 bottles of Port Wine, and a John Young purchased 3 bottles of Sherry.

The next and final witness, David Bannatyne of Gold Pines testified that on December 24th he had purchased 5 bottles of Port Wine at Red Lake.

He told the court he left Red Lake by car with John Young Jr. and a third party.

Bannatyne further testified

that he indulged in fairly heavy drinking on the day in question, both at Red Lake and at Ear Falls.

He said that he first went to his father's house, where he became quite drowsy. He then went to the beer parlor for awhile, and arrived at his own house between 10.30 and 11 o'clock where he continued drinking all night with friends.

The Crown then rested its case and court was adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.

The address to the jury by the Crown and defence attorney will be delivered this morning, as will the charge to the jury delivered by the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson. The jury should begin deliberations this afternoon.

YOUNG TESTIFIES THIS A.M.

JURY TO DELIBERATE TRIAL LATER TODAY

Twenty-six year old Thomas Young on trial for the Christmas Day murder of Constable Calvin Russel Fulford was called to the stand, this morning by defence attorney T. Brett.

In a calm clear voice, he related events leading up to the time of his arrest. In the course of questioning by Mr. Brett, he stated that he had drank four bottles of wine. He claimed he couldn't remember certain events which occurred Christmas Eve. He testified that he could remember walking along the highway with his rifle and that he returned to the Albert Young residence where he found the two bodies in the kitchen.

He also said he had a revolver in his back pocket but he didn't know where he got it from. Witness continued, "I went back to my grandfather's house and went to bed. I was drunk," he concluded.

Young, when asked by defence attorney, Mr. Brett, to relate events of December 23rd and 24th said that he spent the day at his grandfather's home, leaving there to go to Gerald Bannatyne's home on the afternoon of December 24th.

Young testified that he had drunk some whiskey, wine and beer.

He then went to David Bannatyne's house, where he stayed for an hour then went back to

Gerald Bannatyne's home. He stated that he started drinking again and also borrowed four bottles of wine.

Young told court of his movements of December 24th stating that he had consumed the equivalent of four bottles of wine. He told of the argument at Chris William's house where a party was going on and where he had slapped his brother David's face. He said that Chris asked him to leave and that he couldn't remember anything else. He then said he couldn't remember anything until finding the two bodies in the Albert Young cabin.

Cpl. McGarva was called to the stand by the Crown. He told of going to Gerald Bannatyne's house and making a search for wine bottles. He told court that he found 9 bottles in the snow outside the house.

Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty and T. Brett for the defence gave brief charge to the jury. The Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson, presiding judge will give his charge at 11.15. He intimated that it would be lengthy. It is expected the case will go to jury around one o'clock.

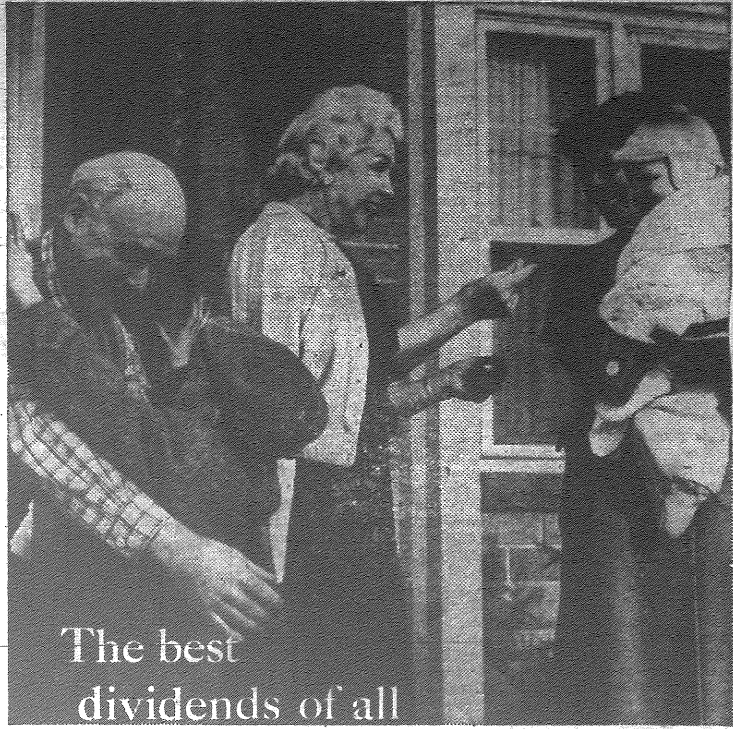

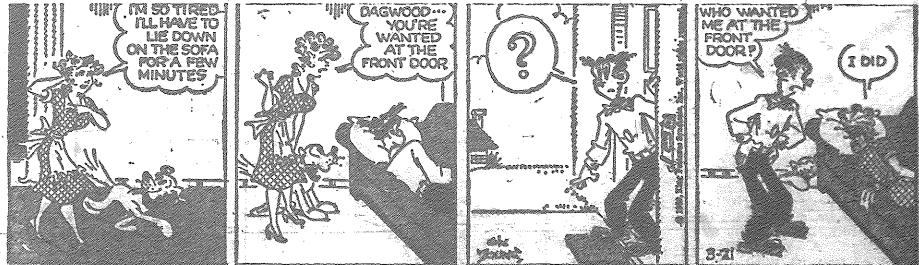

But how different their treatment of themselves with respect to health. Perhaps these last few years will set a record in the medical annals recording the high incidence of mental disorders. As a time when mental health statistics are forever indicating an upward trend in the number of nervous disorders diagnosed. When doctors office's are filled with people who cannot, or haven't as yet learned to deal with and face up to life.

People who are worried and anxious-some quite sick, others suffering from a variety of minor but very frustrating maladies. Diagnosis in each instance would suggest mental disorder of the mind.

There are many such people living in our own community, some are our neighbours and work colleagues... We seem to be in the throes of a gigantic wave of social restlessness. Restlessness usually comes when we want either that which is out of reach, or just yearning for

"something" the nature of which we do not really know. In either case it is an abortive search for a fulfillment of that which the aching mind most desires. Happiness-peace of mind-relaxation.

They are so intent on searching for the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow that they embark upon an adventurous search without first having begun to plan any logical course of campaign. They race off in their search for happiness with their eyes shut and of course must soon collide with a solid obstacle before they have gone too far. And with eyes shut they remain where they stopped in a state of darkness.

There has always been far too much thought-given to the commodity sought, and little or no thought given to what use they would make of it assuming that it were once found. Perhaps this is because they usually, in fits of selfishness, tend to push finer feelings onto one side and think only in terms of bodily needs - subconsciously allowing their animal instincts to obtain the upper hand, totally ignoring the other parts of their makeup.

In a world which the majority judge success by the amount of goods a man has accrued, the finer points of man are denied their full and proper place, and their function curtailed. In consequence a large number of people are comparable to a three cylinder engine that is missing on two cylinders. Awkward, faltering, lacking power and positive decision. Thus arises as a natural consequence the various maladies so common today.

The question then arises why, and how have so many people seemingly so suddenly become affected to the point where psychological treatment is required? Perhaps one reason is the ever increasing number of outside interests and attractions that forever beckon. And in pursuing these innumerable interests have either forgotten or are unconscious of their limited scope in relationship to the laws of health that will neither bear bending nor breaking.

The soul and spirit of man requires nourishment and sustenance that tinsel, lights and alcohol cannot supply. The soul requires communion with God, and to deny this communion is sinful. The multitudinous attractions around us hide God. We are tempted to indulge, our wills are far too ready to respond to the call of entertainment, and instead of mastering the body is subjugated to a position subordinate to the desires and passions.

Entertainment is not sinful. Sin creeps in when we lose the balance of life. If man is indeed composite each part of him must receive satisfaction. The will must be conditioned until it is strong enough to look after each and every one of mans requirements. The text, "Sin is couching at

the door, its desire is for you, but we must learn to overcome and you must master it" has a very real and a very urgent message for us today. To concede to the call of entertainment to the extent that only one portion of the self is appeased is to forget God.
