SPRING ASSIZES

BOYD MURDER TRIAL OPENED THIS MORNING

At 10 o'clock this morning an all male jury was selected to hear a charge of murder laid against Mrs. Laverna Dorothy Boyd of Dryden. She is charged with the Boxing Day shooting of her husband Grant aged 28.

T. A. O'Flaherty is prosecutor for the Crown, while W. Dubinsky of Fort William is counsel for the accused. The accused broke into tears, as she pleaded not guilty to the charge.

His Worship then asked counsel for the accused, to instruct his client, that if at any time during the trial she wished to leave the courtroom she could do so. Jurors selected for the trial are George Van Walleghem, Michael Bachynski, H. W. Allan, Hugh Bartlett, Donald Sweeney, Kenneth Wisbart, Edward Wolanin, Herbert Fisch, Clayton Bailey, Henry Korba, Henry Krutz and John Durham.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson then instructed the jury as to their responsibilities.

Defence counsel asked that all witnesses be excluded from the courtroom until called upon to give testimony.

Mr. T. A. O'Flaherty then addressed the jury to explain that the Crown was going to attempt to prove that Grant Boyd died from a gunshot wound on Boxing Day.

FIRST WITNESS

The first witness called at the trial was Mrs. Carolyn Swerhun, who testified she had known Grant Boyd for 11 years.

She said she met him in June of 1938 in Port Arthur and that

in August of the same year, she left Port Arthur to come to Dryden where she was employed as a gas station attendant at Boyd Brothers Service at \$40 per week.

She said she lived with her son and her sister at Kelley's Cabins in Dryden.

She testified that on Christmas Day she worked until 9 p.m. when Grant drove her home where they stayed alone until 6 a.m. During this time "they talked", she said.

At 5.30 a.m., witness continued, Mrs. Boyd phoned a message to Grant, that one of the children was sick, and that he was to return home.

Witness said Grant Boyd left her at 6 a.m., and that was the last time she saw him.

Witness told of one fight with the accused when Mrs. Boyd came to Kelley's Cabins.

She was determined to knock the husband out of me, and I told her to stay out of my business.

Witness said she slapped Mrs. Boyd, who retaliated by pulling her hair.

She continued, "Grant pulled us apart, and then slapped Mrs. Boyd."

Witness denied she ever slept with Grant Boyd at Kelley's Cabins.

Witness said she came to Dryden on her own accord.

TAXI DRIVER'S TESTIMONY

Murray Adis, a Dryden taxi driver, told of going to the Boyd residence at 6.30 on Boxing day, and of taking Mrs. Boyd and a child to the Dryden General hos-

pital. He said he took Mrs. Boyd home alone at 7 a.m.

He testified that he had taken Mrs. Boyd to Kelley's Cabins on two occasions.

MOTHER ON STAND

Mrs. Hazel Boyd, mother of Grant Boyd, said she had a Christmas supper at her house at which 10 or 12 attended.

She said Mrs. Boyd was there all day, while her son Grant was (Continued on Page 4)

E. W. Shaw, 84, Died Saturday

Edwin Walter Shaw, was called to rest at Pinecrest, Saturday evening, March 21st following a lengthy illness. Born in Bracebridge, Ontario, June 17, 1877, he was in his 82nd year.

He received his education in Barrie and came west to Winnipeg in 1896 where he was employed as a CPR Dining Car Steward. He was also a caterer in the restaurant business in Winnipeg and Edmonton. He was well known in Winnipeg curling circles and was a member of the Thistle and Elmwood Clubs. He came to Kenora ten years ago and resided with his daughter, Mrs. G. E. Munroe, prior to going to Pinecrest in 1957. He was a member of the Anglican Church.

Predeceased by his wife in 1915, he is survived by two sons, Bertram Shaw of Calgary Alta., and Earl of Lethbridge, two daughters, Mrs. G. Earl (Grace) Munroe of Kenora and Mrs. R. E. (Mary Louise) Thompson of Lockport, N.Y., U.S.A.; one brother, Milo Shaw of Vancouver; thirteen grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

JURY OUT 3 HOURS

YOUNG FOUND GUILTY, TO HANG JUNE 30

At 3.55 Saturday afternoon, after deliberating for nearly 3 hours, an all male Ontario Supreme Court Jury returned a verdict of "guilty of murder," against Thomas Young, 27, of Ear Falls, Ont.

The accused was immediately sentenced by Mr. Justice Thompson to be hung June 30th of this year.

The charge resulted from the Christmas Day slaying of Constable Calvin Russell Fulford of the Ear Falls detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.

The Crown presented evidence for almost five days, in attempting to prove the constable died from gun shot wounds inflicted by Thomas Young.

Defence counsel T. Brett called only one witness, Thomas Young, the accused, during the lengthy trial.

At the Saturday morning session of the trial, Young told of his movements on the 23rd, 24th and 25th of December last.

He will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Miss Minnie Stokes Called To Rest Saturday Night

Miss Minnie Georgina Stokes, sister of Frank E. Stokes, Third Street South, Kenora, passed away at the General Hospital, Saturday evening, March 21st, following a short illness. Born in Exeter, Devonshire, England, April 7, 1875, she was in her 84th year.

She came to Canada in 1913, worked in Kenora for a number of years, then went to Winnipeg and Detroit, Michigan, returning to Kenora in 1957 to reside with her brother. She was a member of the Anglican Church.

In addition to her brother, she is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Alice Rogers and Mrs. Olive Avery, both in England.

Funeral services will be held in St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral, Tuesday afternoon, March 24th at two o'clock. Canon L. M. Watts will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be: Arthur Davies, Sam Dannel, Jack Miller, Frank Harper, Len Whiting and Frank Tanner.

He told the court that after leaving Chris Williams, he "killed" a bottle of wine, and could remember nothing, until he found himself walking along the highway with a rifle in his hand, and a revolver in his hip pocket.

He claimed he was very drunk.

Most of the witnesses including relatives of Young at the trial were from out of town, over a dozen of them coming from Ear Falls and Goldpines, two hamlets near Red Lake, Ont. Many other witnesses came from Eastern Ontario to present technical and medical evidence to the court.

A steady spectator at the trial was the wife of the slain constable. The brother of the late constable was also present as was Mrs. Fulford's father.

In charging the all male jury the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson told them they could bring in one of three verdicts:

1. Guilty of murder
2. Not guilty of murder, but guilty of manslaughter
3. Not guilty

As the jury returned to the courtroom, the accused held his chin with his right hand, a familiar stance of his during the trial.

Following the verdict the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson told the accused he had been given a very fair trial. He then told the jury they had brought in a proper and just verdict. He commended the jurors for their difficult job, and for the able manner in which they conducted their duty.

Prior to passing sentence, Mr. Justice Thompson asked Young if he had anything to say. In a calm voice, he replied "no."

He told of the growth of the organization both at the National and International level, stating that since the International Jaycees was organized in 1946, they are now represented in 89 countries. To Study Fishing Licence - Point System For Hunter

Fishing licenses for Ontario residents and a point system for hunters similar to the highway demerit system may be instituted soon, Lands and Forests Minister Spooner told the Legislature's committee on game and fish.

"The day is not far off when we will get into an organization like that," he said. "It will be a new phase of government control."

No specific plan was described but the minister indicated it was not unreasonable to expect hunters to lose their licenses for violations of hunting regulations. He mentioned "six points" during his talk to the committee but did not elaborate.

Fishing licenses, an explosive innovation if initiated, were foreseen as a source of revenue to help pay for more conservation officers.

"It would raise a lot of money but just how the public would react is what concerns me," Mr. Spooner said. "We're looking over the whole subject of licenses."

Almost a dozen outdoor groups and individual letters were heard by the committee urging that violators should have hunting licenses revoked.

However, it was pointed out that there was no way of preventing a hunter whose license was revoked from going into a hardware store and getting another one.

Stiffer penalties were described by the minister. He said the minimum fine would be raised from \$10 to \$15 and magistrates would be urged to impose higher fines.

A 30-day jail term and three-year suspension of licenses for jacklighting deer was urged by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters. It also asked a three-week deer season as an experiment instead of the usual two weeks at present.

KITCHEN CLASSICS

SIMNEL CAKE

(Easter Cake)

Yield - 1 cake (9-inch square or 10-inch round)
 ¼ pound blanched almonds
 ½ cup fine granulated sugar
 1¼ cups (about) sifted icing sugar
 1 egg
 ½ teaspoon almond extract

1 cup currants, washed and dried
 ¼ cup slivered or chopped mixed candied peels
 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
 2¼ cups once-sifted all-purpose flour
 or 2¾ cups once-sifted pastry flour
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 ½ teaspoon salt
 1 cup butter or margarine
 1¼ cups fine granulated sugar
 5 eggs

For the Almond Paste: Grate almonds or put them through food chopper twice, using a rather fine blade. Add the ½ cup granulated sugar and icing sugar; mix well. Make a well in the centre, add the egg and almond extract. Start beating the egg with a spoon, gradually drawing in the dry mixture. When it becomes stiff, knead with the hands to a smooth, putty-like paste, adding additional icing sugar if necessary. Set aside until needed.

For the Cake: Grease a 9-inch square cake pan or a 10-inch round cake pan - choose a pan at least 2 inches deep - and line the bottom with greased waxed paper. Preheat oven to 300 deg. F. (rather slow).

Combine currants, candied peels and lemon rind in a large bowl. Combine in sifter, the all-purpose or pastry flour, baking powder and salt; sift over fruit mixture and mix well.

Cream butter or margarine well; gradually work in the 1¼ cups granulated sugar. Add the 5 eggs, one at a time, beating in well after each addition. Stir in

flour-fruit mixture and combine thoroughly. Spread half of the batter in prepared pan.

Roll out the almond paste into a sheet a little smaller than the pan being used; place over batter in pan and cover with remaining batter. Bake in preheated oven about 1¼ hours. Stand cake in its pan on cake rack for

10 minutes; turn out, peel off paper and allow cake to cool completely on rack.

For a gala Easter cake decor, double the amount of almond paste... use half of it as directed above. Roll out remaining almond paste to the size of cake top, having it a little thicker around the edges. Brush top of cold

baked cake with a little egg white and cover with the rolled-out almond paste. Mark edges with a fork to resemble a nest and fill hollow part with small Easter eggs; stand cotton-wool chicks around the edge.

Store the cake in a closely covered tin or wrap it in foil or other kitchen paper.

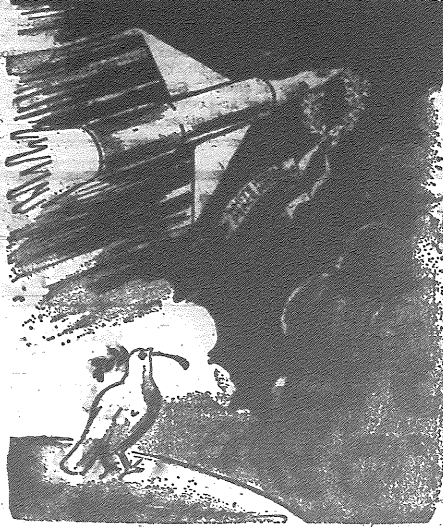

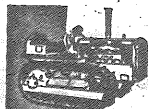

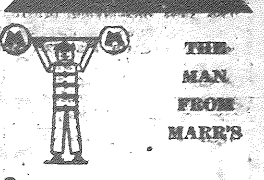

250,000 Ft. Of Gas Mains To Be Laid In N. Ontario

More than 250,000 feet of new gas mains will be laid in Northern Ontario this Summer, to bring thousands of additional families within reach of natural gas service.

The 1959 pipe-laying program of the affiliated companies of Northern Ontario Natural Gas Company Limited and Twin City Gas Company Limited is scheduled to begin in May, when frost clears from the ground.

Most new construction will occur in Fort William, Port Arthur, Timmins, Sudbury, North Bay and Orillia, according to NONG Chief Engineer, A. M. Hove.

The construction program will be small compared to last year's effort, when new construction systems were installed in 32 communities from Kenora to Orillia, to bring the North its first natural gas service. A total of 3,215,867 feet of pipe was laid during this 1957-1958 construction period.

The bulk of this year's construction effort will be to extend the coverage of distribution systems installed last year, to include residential areas now located on the fringe of the present gas line systems. 180,000 feet of two-inch pipe, 50,000 feet of four inch pipe and 20,000 feet of six-

inch pipe are scheduled to be installed.

Construction should be completed "within days" in most areas, Mr. Hove said, to make natural gas service available as quickly as possible.

Householders will be informed in advance when construction crews will be working on their streets, he said.

Four times as many customers should be served this year, Mr. Hove said. During 1957-58, nearly 5,000 services were installed. During 1959, approximately 13,000 additional service lines are scheduled for installation.

John Ogibowski Called To Rest

John Ogibowski, a resident of Kenora since 1926, died at the Kenora General Hospital, Friday evening, March 20, following a lengthy illness. Born in the West Ukraine, November 14, 1876, he was in his 83rd year.

He received his education in the Old Country and came to Canada and Kenora in 1926. He was a member of the St. Nicholas Greek Catholic Church.

He is survived by his widow and a son Peter, both in the Old Country.

Funeral services will be held in St. Nicholas Church, Tuesday morning, March 24th at ten o'clock. Rev. Father A. Simbalist will officiate and interment will be in the St. Nicholas cemetery.

Hunting Dates Set 3 Years Ahead To Help Holidayers

Hunting dates for moose, deer and upland game birds have been set for the next three seasons to permit hunters to plan their vacations in advance, Lands and Forests Minister Spooner, told the Legislature's committee on game and fish.

For many years, hunters have been seeking an earlier announcement of seasons in order to plan holiday times. Mr. Spooner said the three-year season method was an experiment.

Dr. W. J. K. Harkness, chief of the department's fish and wildlife division, said there seemed to be no sound biological reason for departing from the present pattern of seasons in Northern Ontario, where they have varied very little from year to year.

Hunting dates for 1959, 1960 and 1961 are:

MOOSE:
In Lake of the Woods area, residents only may hunt from

Oct. 1 to Dec. 24 in 1959 and 1960, from Sept. 30 to Dec. 23 in 1961.

In Rainy River District residents only may hunt from Oct. 22 to Nov. 25 in 1959.

DEER:
In Rainy River District residents and non-residents may hunt from Oct. 22 to Nov. 25 in 1959 and 1960, from Oct. 21 to Nov. 25 in 1961.

North of the northernmost CNR line west from the Quebec boundary to the Manitoba boundary, including all of the Kenora District, residents and non-residents may hunt from

Oct. 1 to Nov. 25 in 1959 and 1960, from Sept. 30 to Nov. 25 in 1961.

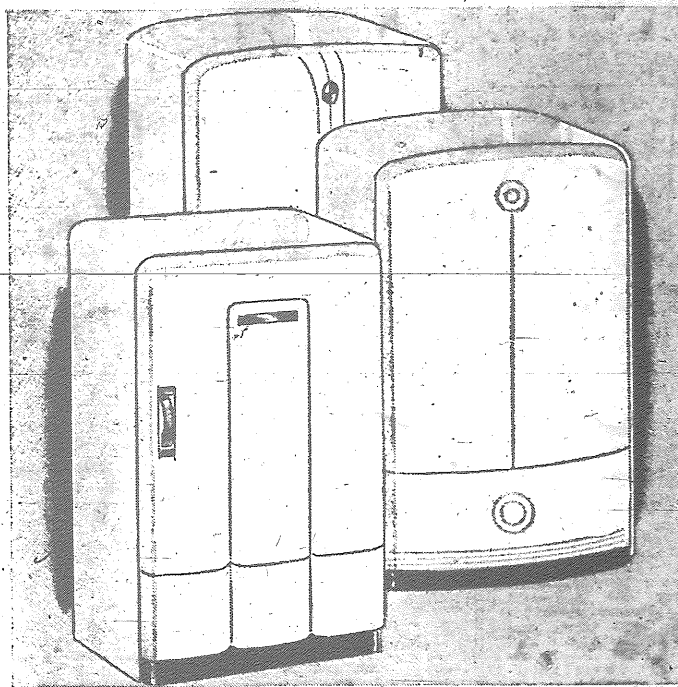
