## JURY FINDS

# LAVERNA BOYD, "NOT GUILTY," OF MURDER

At 5:45 Wednesday afternoon an all male Ontario Supreme Court jury returned a verdict of NOT GUILTY of murder against Mrs. Laverna Dorothy Boyd 28 of Dryden.

The acquittal was received with loud clapping, and Mrs. Boyd who had been crying softly broke into loud uncontrolled sobs. The matron who was a source of comfort to Mrs. Boyd throughout the three day trial helped her from the packed courtroom.

Mrs. Boyd had been charged with murder in the Boxing Day shooting of her husband Grant at their Dryden residence.

During the trial, the Crown called 17 witnesses, while the defence called only two, including Mrs. Boyd, who was on the witness stand most of Wednesday morning.

Yesterday afternoon the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson presented a charge to the jury lasting 1 hour and 45 minutes. He outlined points of law to the jury, pertaining to the case. He told them they could bring in one of three verdicts, (1) guilty of murder, (2) guilty of manslaughter, or (3) not guilty.

The jury took one hour and thirty minutes to reach their verdict.

## 9 WITNESSES HEARD

# CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE TRIAL OPENS TODAY

The trial of Leo Leroux of Kenora, charged with criminal negligence opened at 9 o'clock this morning before an all male Ontario Supreme Court Jury.

The charge resulted from a motor vehicle accident in the early hours of January 24 last, which claimed the life of Joan Hatfile of Longbow Lake. Ten witnesses were called at this morning's session which is being presided over by the Honourable Mr. Justice Thompson.

Corporal Herb Roller of the Kenora Detachment of the OPP told of taking pictures at the accident scene and these were then shown to the court.

Corporal Roller said he believed, lights on the truck cab were on, but did not know if there were any other lights on.

### OPP EVIDENCE

Constable George Orosy, also with the Kenora Detachment of the OPP told of receiving a call at 12.55 a.m. on January 24th and of arriving at the scene of the accident some ten minutes later.

He said the three-ton truck involved seemed to be well lighted. He told of finding a maroon and white Chevrolet sedan at the scene. There were, he said, two bodies lying beside this car, and he went to their aid.

Evelyn Shouldice, he testified, was complaining of pains in her back and Joan Hatfile appeared to have no pulse beat.

He said the two girls were put in the ambulance, and the accused who was wandering around the scene was put in the police cruiser to keep warm.

Constable Orosy said the accused had some blood on his face at the time.

He also told the court of finding only one skid mark this being 18 feet in length leading from the half-ton truck to the centre of the road.

The Crown presented a sketch of the accident scene drawn by the witness.

The witness then told of finding glass on the highway which appeared to have come from a car windshield. At this point in the trial, the defence attorney Harry Walsh of Winnipeg said his client admits the death of Joan Hatfile arose out of the accident. Mr. Walsh said this would

dispense with the hearing of medical evidence.

### CONSTABLE MILLER

Constable Eric Miller of the OPP told of proceeding to the scene of the accident, where he engaged in directing traffic.

He said he observed a 3 ton truck loaded with pulp, and that this truck seemed to be well lighted.

He said parking lights were on the half ton truck, but that

# GRAND JURY REPORT

The following is the report of the Grand Jury empanelled at the Spring Assizes of the Supreme Court of Ontario:

**Land Titles Office:**  
Badly in need of redecorating and plastering. Lighting facilities inadequate, obsolete for office work. Basement stairs are badly in need of repair. Storage space for files is at present handled, inadequate. Basement rest rooms facilities very poor for female staff. Enlargement of premises seems to be required to handle amount of work done and separate heating system suggested.

**Kenora General Hospital:**  
Hospital very clean and well kept considering the condition of the old structure. On inspection of old premises, we find they are decidedly a fire trap. Laundry room totally inadequate. We would recommend several other problems be attended to, but we understand that new building plans will correct these troubles. We would also recommend going ahead with these building plans as soon as possible.

**St. Joseph's Hospital:**  
On inspection of this hospital we find it extremely clean, good facilities and equipment. Safety measures for fire prevention adequate, particularly in old section. This institution seems to be very well supervised.

### Grand Jury Reports

(Continued from Page 1)

#### St. Mary's Indian School:

This school seems to be well and efficiently managed. Girls' dormitory badly over-crowded and in need of roof repairs as well as replastering and redecorating. Boys' dormitory nice, bright and clean, although over-crowded. Work shop not in use at present because of failure of furnace. We understand that requisition has been put in for new heating system which is badly needed and will be installed as soon as possible.

Sewage disposal as reported by last Grand Jury temporarily repaired but is now in worse condition than at that time. We recommend that steps to have professional and immediate attention be given to this matter. We

feel that the present condition is dangerous to the health of the residents of the school. Further, the nature of the sewage disposal outlet, being so close to the water intake of the Town of Kenora, it is also dangerous to the health of the citizens of Kenora.

We also feel that because of the number of persons now accommodated the buildings are too small.

#### Pinecrest Home for the Aged:

We found this Institution to be in excellent condition, well managed, supervised and staffed. We also found that the main dining room facilities are too small for the number of residents. The Superintendent expressed grateful appreciation to the citizens, service clubs and other organizations for the efforts put forth on behalf of the residents of the Home. The res-

idents seem very happy and contented.

Cecilia Jeffrey Indian School: On inspection we found that previous recommendations have been taken care of. The present principle, Mr. Robinson, advises us he is quite satisfied with progress made and that the new school buildings have taken care of previous overcrowding.

Provincial Goal: We found this Institution extremely clean and well kept, supervision very efficient. Although badly overcrowded at present, new building now in progress will take care of this condition. We found new equipment, such as new washing machine and stove on the premises, but as yet still in their crates.

#### KENORA TOWN JAIL

We found the new premises adequate, very clean and well kept. We would suggest that the matter of janitor service for the premises be looked into with a view to taking care of this matter.

#### COURT HOUSE

On inspection of Court House we find that the heating system does not seem adequate or suitable to heat both Court House and Registry Building.

Provincial Police offices in basement badly crowded for filing space etc. Rest room facilities totally inadequate. Boat house repairs as suggested by last Jury not completed. Cell space not adequate.

Main floor of Court House, badly in need of redecorating, especially Court Room. WOMEN'S WASH ROOMS SHOULD BE INSTALLED. TOP FLOOR BADLY IN NEED OF LADIES' REST ROOM FACILITIES.

Entire building, both inside and out, should be both redecorated and painted. Owing to the great increase in Police personnel over the years we feel that if separate police premises could be found that other problems in connection with the Court House could be solved.

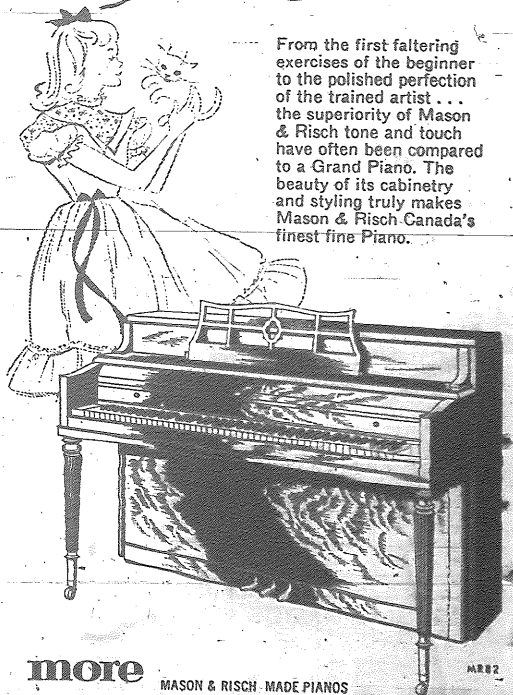

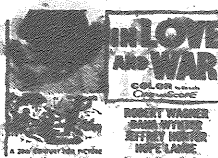

## Dept. Of Lands And Forests Reports On Highway Kills

Mr. Frank E. Sider, District Forester, Department of Lands and Forests at Kenora reports the following:

"You're just about to go to bed and possibly at the same time turning over in your mind things you will do the following day. The phone rings; you answer—'Hello, is that the Game Warden?'"

"Yes, it is. What can I do for you?"

"Well, I was driving home and I hit a deer."

"I hit a deer"—you've heard it before. During the year 1958 you heard "I hit a deer" 28 times.

No matter, all particulars are taken and off you go. When the driver had stopped and looked back at the animal, he was just in time to see it crawl off the road into the bush. That was exactly one hour ago.

One hour, plus the time it takes for you to find it again. An age for any living thing to be lying injured.

Finally the spot is reached where the deer was hit. Blood on the road, and a trail into the bush. Flashlight, rifle, and knife, end in you go.

The deer has managed to drag itself only 25 yards off the road, and is lying down under a tree, its right hind leg horribly twisted, and a gash on the flank. It has to be shot, and it doesn't feel the pain any more. The next thing is to dress it out, after which it is donated to a hospital, or some other welfare organization.

How many others are hit by vehicles and never reported? Some to die slowly, alone in the bush, while others are dispatched by the predator.

In the year 1958, observations were kept on approximately 200 miles of paved highway by Conservation Officers in this district. As well as the 28 deer killed, there were 8 Beaver, 10 Ground Hog, 16 Grouse, 33 Rabbits, 31 Skunks, 25 Squirrels, 9 Chipmunks and 2 Whiskey Jacks.

There is no record of insectivorous or song birds, as very often they are either blown off the road or are lodged in the grills

of the offending vehicles.

Don't forget—these figures are only covering 200 miles of the Province. How many miles of paved highway are there? What percentage of our wildlife are we losing every year in this manner? Won't you be careful the next time you are out driving? A careless moment or excessive speed could not only endanger your own life and cause severe damage to your vehicle, but may spell hours of torture for a mortally wounded animal.

## PRELIMINARY PLAN FOR PROPOSED TOWN OF MOOSONEE

A preliminary has been drawn up for the proposed town of Moosonee which is expected to develop with the establishment of a seaport announced recently by Premier Leslie M. Frost.

Chairman C. E. Reynolds of the Ontario Northern Transportation Commission said the plan is for a town of 4,000 to 5,000 people and would cost \$1,500,000.

The plan provides for circular residential streets, commercial, industrial and educational facilities, a wide green walk and park and garden areas, as well as shipping warehouses near the docks.

**MOLASSES-COCONUT BALLS**

- 2 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup light molasses
- 3 tablespoons light corn syrup
- 3 tablespoons hot water
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 teaspoons vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 1/2 cups (about) tender thin flaked coconut
- 7 squares semi-sweet chocolate

In a saucepan, combine all ingredients except the coconut and chocolate. Place over medium heat and cook, stirring occasionally, until a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball in cold water (to a temperature of 240 deg. F.). Remove from heat. Cool without stirring about 10 minutes (or to a temperature of 150 deg. F.). Stir in coconut. Beat until mixture becomes creamy and forms into a soft mass, about 1-minute. Shape into bunnies or Easter eggs. While candies are cooling, heat semi-sweet chocolate over hot water until partly melted. Then remove from heat and stir rapidly until entirely melted. When chocolate feels cool to the touch (or when cooled to a temperature of 83 deg. F.), dip cooled coconut candies quickly in the chocolate; then place on waxed paper to harden. Store, covered, in a cool place. Makes about 16 large balls or about 5 1/2 dozen small balls.

Decorate with butter frosting, marshmallow ears, tiny candies, and additional flaked coconut.

**Roaches Are Starting to Fight Back**

TORONTO — German roaches are starting to fight back, delegates to the Canadian Pest Control Operators' Association meeting were told Monday. Robert L. Showalter, executive assistant of the National Pest Control Operators' Association, said the little pest, which if given a chance will infest restaurants, hotels and homes, had been kept under continent-wide control since 1946. However, a few years ago, a small group of roaches in the southern United States began to

fight off the deadly chlorinated hydrocarbons used against them. Since then the roach has moved steadily northward with built-in immunity presenting pest exterminators with the challenge of finding new control methods. Experiments are being made with a fine dust-like chemical which absorbs all the oils from the insect.

Canada will have to face the problem too, but because of a cooler climate, not to the same extent as in the United States, said Mr. Showalter.

### Religious Leaders To Give Lead In Safety Campaign

A Province-wide traffic safety campaign, designed to persuade motorists and pedestrians to accept moral responsibility for driving and walking safely, will begin April 1st under the sponsorship of the Highway Safety Branch of the Transport Department.

Clergymen and lay leaders in the churches of all faiths will be asked to give sermons on traffic accident prevention at Sunday services, and to give talks to church groups on other appropriate occasions. They will also be encouraged to write articles on this important subject for their parish publications.

A revised kit of traffic safety materials, similar to the one that was sent to the clergy at the time of the 1958 Moral Responsibility Campaign, will be produced by the Highway Safety Branch and distributed to church leaders throughout the Province.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture has undertaken to co-operate in stimulating interest in the programme through its affiliated county and district federations, commodity groups, farm educational organizations and

co-operatives. "All citizens, whether on foot or behind the wheel, are morally responsible for obeying the traffic laws and rules of the road," said Commissioner of Highway Safety W. B. G. Reynolds in announcing the campaign. "This programme is intended to convince drivers and pedestrians that they can avoid accidents by observing the Golden Rule of traffic safety—drive and walk as you would have others drive and walk."

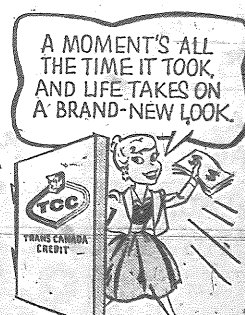
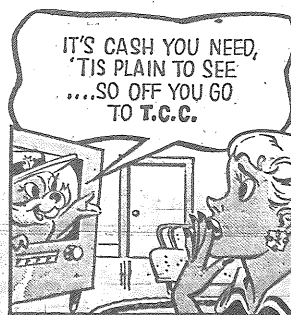
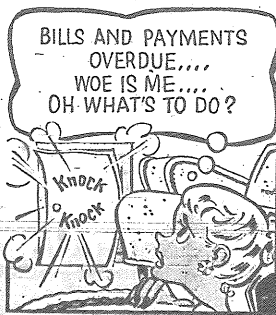

He testified that at approximately 12.30 he came upon the accident. Witness testified he had seen the car involved in the vicinity of Hertz Motel. Witness then said he passed the car of the accused, 300 yards on he said he saw headlights on the left side of the road, and as he came along the left bend, he saw the two parked trucks.

Witness, continued, when his car was even with the 3-ton truck, the accused's car was even with his in an attempt to pass. Witness then said the accident happened putting the accused's car in a skid. Witness said he stopped his car on the south side of the road.

Robert Latimer, passenger in Johnson's car, said he saw the lights around the bend, that the driver had slowed down, then he said, the accused's car crashed. We stopped, he said, and ran back to the accident. The trial continues this afternoon.

 The wrecked automobile had no lights. He said two flares had been placed on the road following the accident, but that he did not know where they came from. Constable Miller testified, he saw the accused in hospital on January 26th, and again on January 31st when he was discharged.

**FATHER TESTIFIES**

Joseph Shouldice told the court that on the evening of January 23rd the accused in company with his daughter Evelyn had driven him downtown. He said he got out alone at the Legion Hall and later met them at 9.30 p.m. in the ladies beverage room of the Kenricia Hotel where Joan Hattle was present. At 10 p.m. he said, the three of them left for home leaving Joan Hattle at the hotel.

At home his daughter received a phone call to pick up her son at the Thistle Rink. This being done the accused and his daughter again left the house.

Mr. Shouldice said he last saw the accused at 10 p.m. on that night.

**EVELYN SHOULDICE**

Evelyn Shouldice told of being picked up at her home, by the accused at 7.30 p.m. on January 23rd. They drove her father down town she said, from where she and Leroux went to Queen's Motel for coffee and hamburgers. She said they came back to Kenora at 9 p.m. and went to the Kenricia Hotel where they met Joan Hattle, and later her father. After driving her father home and picking up her son she said they then went back to the Kenricia Hotel to meet Joan Hattle. The three of them then

proceeded to the Lakeshore Hotel in Keewatin arriving at 11 p.m. and leaving at midnight. She said Leroux had two beers at the Lakeshore Hotel. She said they then proceeded to drive Joan Hattle to Longbow Lake with all three in the front seat of the car.

She said, "I remember going around a corner and seeing two lights, and that's all I remember until the next day in St. Joseph's Hospital."

Miss Shouldice said the accused and his driving both were normal.

**TRUCK DRIVER**

Edward Cederwall told the court he was a CPR employee, but hauled with his truck in his spare time. He testified that on the night of the 23rd he went to a camp 30 miles east of Kenora to pick up a load of pulp. On the way home, he continued, the truck started "heating up". He stopped at Reddens Camps to put in Antifreeze but developed trouble a further two miles west. He got a ride into Kenora to pick up some more anti-freeze and water and phoned his brother to drive him back. They came out in a half ton truck, he testified.

Witness said that he again had heating trouble, half a mile east of Kenora. My brother was ahead, he said, I blinked my lights and he came back at approximately 12.15 a.m.

Witness continued that his brother parked behind his truck on the same side of the road. The head lights were on low beam, three lights on the roof and one on the rear view mirror were on as well as flashing lights on the left side of my truck, he said. After putting anti-freeze in my three ton truck, I went back to my brother's truck to get warm for maybe two or three minutes. Witness said lights were on his brother's truck. "Next thing I knew," he said, "we were hit."

Witness continued, I saw a reflection of lights coming from the west. The half ton truck was pushed in an easterly direction down the highway he said, and that he had to get out through the window. He told of seeing a man on the pavement and two girls in the car, one in the back and one in the front and of placing the two girls on the pavement. Witness stated that the front left portion of the wood rack was damaged and the load of wood had been moved back two feet.

**BROTHER GIVES EVIDENCE**

Eric Cederwall, owner of the half ton truck, testified that his brother's big truck was fully lighted. He told of his brother coming back to his truck to get warm. Next, thing I knew, he said, I heard a crash and had the wind knocked out of me. The truck was pushed onto the highway, facing north and south. He said he helped his brother remove the women from the car.

**JOHN JOHNSON**

Mr. Johnson, next witness told of driving from Kenora to Sioux Narrows, with Robert Latimer.

Growing Apples With Dwarf Trees

Why grow dwarf apple trees? Larger trees require more spray, bigger machines, and taller ladders, states Stewart Carpenter, Extension Specialist, Ontario Department of Agriculture, and thus are more expensive to cultivate. Hence the interest in dwarf trees, to keep costs down. There are presently some dwarf apple trees in Ontario.

There are three popular root-stalks for dwarf trees: the Malling 2, which produces a tree two-thirds to three-quarters the size of standard trees; and the Malling 9, which reaches a height of eight feet.

The Malling 2 can be planted 25-30 feet apart. It is well anchored and needs no support but is recommended only for areas of Southern Ontario free from extremely low temperatures. Both Malling 7 and 9 are not well anchored, and require support to prevent toppling with a heavy crop. Malling 7 can be planted from 20 to 25 feet apart and Malling 9 from 10 to 12 feet apart. Their winter hardiness is similar to Malling 2. Of the three, Malling 9 is the best choice for the home gardener.

Additional details are included in Ontario Department of Agriculture Circular 334, "Dwarf Fruit Trees for Orchard Use." It is obtainable at the office of the county agricultural representative, or from the Fruit and Vegetable Extension Service, Horticultural Experiment Station, Vineland, Ontario.
