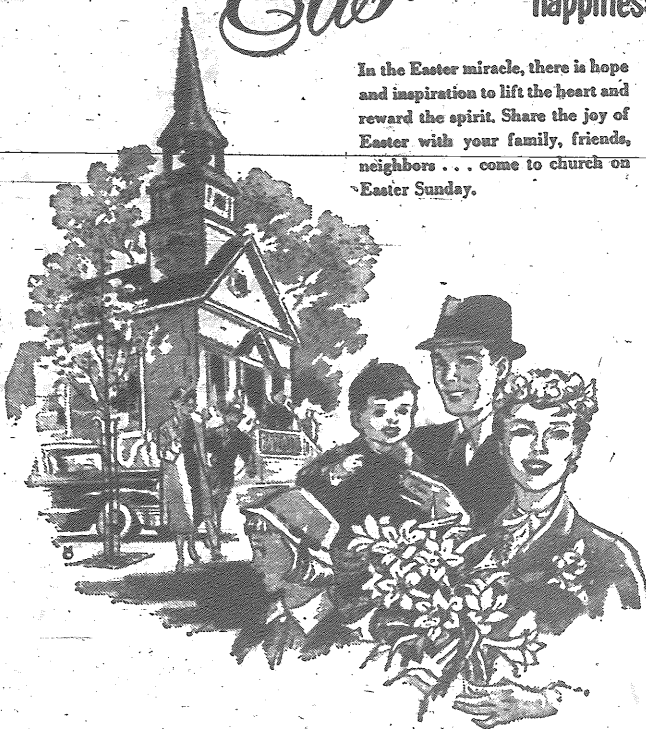

EDITORIAL VIEWPOINT

TELEVISION FOR KENORA

The announcement from Ottawa Thursday morning that permission has been granted by the Board of Broadcast Governors to the CBC to instal a television satellite station in Kenora, was not unexpected, but nevertheless, most welcome. This is a further necessary preliminary to the actual procurement of equipment and the construction of the station.

The granting of approval for a licence makes possible the further tangible steps preparatory to telecasting. Firm orders may now be placed for equipment. The very expensive task of cutting the microwave system to feed signal into the satellite can also move forward. This latter is the responsibility of the Bell Telephone Company.

When will the local satellite be placed in operation? The best advice the Miner and News could secure in Ottawa this week is that possibly seven or eight months may be required to complete the job. Presumably we may enjoy TV late this fall.

The second question being asked concerns the origin of programs. Will Kenora be fed from east or west? The answer is not immediately known to the CBC at this time. If circuits from the east are available at cut-in time, the satellite will carry eastern programs. On the other hand, it may be that western programs will be carried for the same reason.

While it is disappointing to learn that there will be a delay of three or four months longer than had been anticipated, the news that service seems assured for this year is cause for real satisfaction.

Will Fight Floyd Regardless, London Announces Today

Blackpool, England—Britain's biggest boxing row in years flared with a British heavyweight hurling defiance at officials who forbade him to fight America's world heavyweight king Floyd Patterson.

The country's boxing bosses—the British Board of Boxing Control—banned Brian London from meeting Patterson for the world title in Las Vegas, Nev., April 21.

They claimed the bout would not be in the best interests of British boxing.

London promptly announced he would go ahead with the bout anyway.

"I've got a big pay day coming \$75,000 and a chance to win the world title," the pugnacious, 24-year-old Briton said. "I'll risk suspension at home for that."

The BBBC said London probably will lose his license to fight in Britain if he defies them.

"It is now up to American authorities to decide whether they will permit an unauthorized British boxer to fight Patterson," said BBBC President J. Onslow Fane.

U.S. boxing bigwigs appeared ready to go along with London although their statements were cautions.

Dr. Ward Wylie, president of the National Boxing Assn., said: "The NBA will recognize any logical contender."

Observed national boxing commissioner Abe Greene: "We have a very friendly arrangement and understanding with the BBBC but we would want to know more about the circumstances which would prompt such a preemptory stand before we would concur."

Two members of the Nevada Boxing Commission also said they would permit the fight "unless we get a request from the BBBC giving a good reason for the ban and a transcript of the hearing at which he was banned."

The controversy stems from London's last fight, against Henry Cooper.

Cooper used a jabbing left to take away London's British title. London was made to look like a novice as he plodded smack into the nagging lefts of Cooper.

Experts argue Cooper should be the man tackling Patterson but Cooper lost his chance by asking for too much money—\$140,000.

Fort Frances To Stress New Road Route To The West

Fort Frances—The Fort Frances Chamber of Commerce has embarked on a campaign to have local highways re-named as sections of trans-continental routes.

Alert to impetus that long-distance motoring would give to local tourist promotion the Chamber is seeking to establish the proposed Fort William-Fort Frances Highway as a rival of the Kenora-Fort Frances road, officially designated an extension of the Mississippi Parkway.

The Ontario Department of Highways will be asked to change Highway 71, now linking Fort Frances and Rainy River, to No. 11 when the section between Fort Frances and Atikokan is completed. This would mean a connection between the highway East of Fort William and a Minnesota highway that is due to be tapped by the Ontario road when a bridge is completed this year at Rainy River. Since both the Fort William and Minnesota highways are now numbered 11, a new trans-continental route would pass through Fort Frances.

The other Ontario highway the Chamber decided should have its name changed is now number 70. Although it was officially marked as a Canadian extremity of the Mississippi Parkway.

There is now a Manitoba movement to have the Parkway, which runs North from the Gulf of Mexico, officially extend into the neighbouring Province. The Fort Frances Chamber plans to meet this competition by erecting Mississippi Parkway signs between Emo, and the Trans-Canada junction near Kenora.

Ft. Frances Mayor To Visit Toronto On \$2,300,000 Project

Fort Frances—Mayor J. T. Livingstone will visit Toronto soon in an attempt to lower a financial hurdle facing Fort Frances as the result of a provincial government edict to spend \$2,300,000 on a sewage disposal program.

In a letter from W. G. Noden, MPP, the town council learned that Dr. A. E. Berry, manager of the Ontario water resources commission, has said the program is "one that does not necessarily need to be done within one or two years but is a program that is planned for a long time, maybe 20 years ahead."

Until now, the council has understood that Dr. Berry is insisting the community quit dumping raw sewage into the international Rainy River immediately.

Councillors Otto Dalman and Ted Gladu commented that Dr. Berry's latest statement indicates a "softening up" on his part. They argued that the mayor

or should accept the suggestion of Noden and arrange a meeting with the government official. Aim would be to obtain permission to take more time in planning the expensive program.

Adding urgency to the mayor's trip, they said, is the refusal of the government agency to approve any new extensions to existing sewers until the construction of a new sewage treatment plant.

Mayor Livingstone at first vetoed the trip as possibly fruitless. He questioned the power of Dr. Berry to enforce his demands for the program, and asked "What could he do, send the provincial police for you?"

The mayor contended the province has made little progress in halting the dumping of industrial waste into Rainy River.

He said at the present time there are only 30 residents of Fort Frances petitioning for new sewers and questioned whether spending over \$2,000,000 is justified to satisfy that few citizens.

Councillor Dalman observed however, that many more homes in the community lack sewer service. The mayor replied that his own street has no sewer, and "if I were a selfish, self-centered type of civic official I would say put it in."

"Please don't get the idea I'm being pig-headed about it," Mayor Livingstone said in explaining his stand, "I just want to take care of the town treasury."
