CJRL To Broadcast District Hockey Finals Tonight

Tonight, at approximately ten o'clock Radio station CJRL will bring to local listeners the last two periods of the Northwestern Ontario Minor Hockey Finals which are being played in Fort Frances between Kenora's Lake of the Woods Indians and the Fort Frances juveniles. If the Lake of the Woods team wins tonight, a second game will be played tomorrow night and also broadcast. Jack Thompson, CJRL sports director will be the announcer.

The Lake of the Woods Indians, the district champions, having defeated Dryden previously are also current holders of the Chapple Cup. If they win their two games, they will retain the cup, emblematic of Northwestern Ontario Midget Hockey supremacy.

Also playing in the finals in Fort Frances this afternoon, is another team from St. Mary's School, the St. Mary's Midgets. A third team from Kenora, the Vandonland Co-Op Bantams will also see action today in the border town when they play in the Bantam finals.

Border Area TV Closer With FCC Licence Approval

International Falls — The federal communications commission gave the go-ahead sign to Minneonto Television, Inc., to construct a series of translator stations.

Officers of Minneonto and backers of the community-owned system received the word jubily. Word came through from Washington late Wednesday of the favorable ruling by the FCC on Minneonto's application.

Directors of the company promptly summoned their engineering advisor, John Klingsworth, Minneapolis.

They will review the proposal of Kindsworth's company to construct the entire system, as well as study overall engineering problems connected with the project, John Furuseth, attorney for Minneonto, said.

Furuseth said the Minnesota securities division will now be asked to release funds deposited by supporters of the project and held in escrow in the two local banks. The money was deposited toward the purchase of stock in the company. Stock certificates will be issued.

Approximately \$105,000 is available at the present time, this representing the total amount deposited by supporters of the project from the original purpose to the new plan.

The Minneonto Co. originally contemplated constructing a stan-

dard television broadcasting station here and then abandoned this plan in favor of the translator system. This required filing a new application with the FCC, which has now been approved.

Four complete UHF receivers and transmitters, including towers and antennas will be installed at these points: Virginia, Orr, Kabetogama and International Falls.

Programming of both Channels 3 and 6, Duluth, will be picked up by the station at Virginia and will be beamed to cover a maximum population area along Highway 53 leading north to the boundary.

Intermediate towers at Orr and Kabetogama will pick up and rebroadcast the programs, as will the fourth tower at the Border City.

Sets equipped to tune in UHF transmissions will receive the signals within about a 25-mile area.

Mrs. C. Richman Died Sunday

Mrs. Carrie Richman, 423 Third Street North, died suddenly at the Kenora General Hospital, Sunday March 29th. Born in the West Ukraine, she was in her 69th year.

She received her education in the Old Country and came to Kenora forty-two years ago. She is survived by her husband Leon, three daughters and two sons.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Wednesday afternoon, April 1st at two o'clock. Rev. Albert Dunn will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Dryden Council Turns Down Building Request

Dryden—Town council turned down a request from Kenora Area Health Unit officials, asking the town to construct a \$16,000 health unit building here. The above figure would also include necessary equipment.

Dr. R. D. P. Eaton, medical officer of health, pointed out last week that "any well-run business had to have good looking premises."

"We would like to have adequate space here but not have to pay speculative prices for the accommodation," he said.

What the unit would like, he stated was a steel building, finished off inside for offices, "and probably the total cost, plus interest, could be paid back in ten years."

Dr. Eaton felt the monthly rental for such a set up should be no more than \$150.

The M.O.H. said health unit space in the arena was "good of-

office space' but clinics had to be held elsewhere.

"We would like to be self-contained," Dr. Eaton commented. Also speaking on behalf of the Health Unit, tracing its history and pointing to its benefits to the community, was Dr. J. Whitaker, chairman of the Kenora District Health Unit.

Frost May Rush Vote Before Royal Tour

Fifth and probably final session of the Ontario's 25th legislature has prorogued. The 43-day session saw 155 bills made law by Lieutenant-Governor Keiller Mackay's royal assent.

Premier Frost is expected to call an election in the next few weeks. The present house was elected June 9, 1955.

The last recorded vote of the session was on an amendment by Liberal leader John Wintermeyer which criticized the budget procedure of the government. The amendment was defeated 77-12, the CCF voting with the Liberals.

Premier Frost is expected to begin a 10-day vacation before returning to Queen's Park to dissolve the legislature.

Most widely discussed date among cabinet ministers and informed Conservative sources is May 23, a Thursday. If the premier decides on a later date, it is expected to be June 4, another Thursday.

Liberals were speculating it would be a May election so it would not conflict with the mid-June arrival of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

In the legislature yesterday, the premier's face broke into a smile when Albert Wren (Lib., Kenora) said people were getting wise to "Old Man Ontario" and would "think twice" before sending members into the House on his coat-tails.

He said as many as 40 members of the legislature (98 members) were elected because of Mr. Frost's popularity.

Cautioning the premier to guard his health, Mr. Wren said the government could find itself in the same position "as a ship without a rudder."

"Utter chaos" would result in the Conservative party if anything happened to the premier, Mr. Wren went on. Such a situation was unhealthy for the province, he said, because the imbalance of party representation tended to create smugness and complacency.

Citizenship Branch To Be Set Up

The establishment of a citizenship branch in the Department of the Provincial Secretary was announced recently in the Legislature by Provincial Secretary Mackinnon Phillips M.D.

The new branch is designed to assist immigrants coming to Ontario with their special problems of communication and orientation, and to give information and counselling to Ontario Indians.

In this respect, it will work closely with the Federal Department of citizenship and Immigration and with other Provincial departments, such as Labour, which are concerned with the problems facing the Indians and the new Canadians.

Citizens Thanked For Support Of Building Fund

The citizens of Kenora and district have surpassed the quota allotted to them in the recent campaign to raise capital funds for the Ontario Society for Crippled Children Centre. The project which will cost an estimated \$4,000,000 will go ahead, thanks to the widespread support right across the Province.

Larry Johnson, chairman of the local campaign, conducted by the Kenora Rotary Club, today expressed sincere thanks to all citizens for their wonderful support of the appeal, which raised \$500 more than the \$3,000 objective.

The success of the Provincial drive means that crippled children will now be treated in the most modern centre possible, and future funds raised through the sale of Easter Seals will help children in this modern new centre.

Population Of 600,000 In Hawaii

The world's sweet tooth helped make Hawaii one of the greatest "melting pots" in the world.

When the first white men explored the islands in the late 1700's, Hawaiians numbered about 300,000. But civil wars and diseases brought from other lands slashed the native population.

With the growth of the sugar industry in the 1800's, the Islanders looked to other nations to supply the labor needed for plantations. Chinese were brought to the islands in 1832, followed by Polynesians from other South Sea Islands, Japanese, Portuguese, Germans, Italians, Spaniards, Puerto Ricans, Koreans, Filipinos, Russians and Poles.

Today there are only about 12,000 full Hawaiians and some 80,000 part-Hawaiians among the 600,000 Islanders.

You always know which people have found life a bed of roses—you hear them complaining about the thorns.

The role of the professional auditor in today's business world is not always pleasant, nor designed to gain popularity, but it is always of value to the client. Tom Saul told his fellow Rotarians at today's club luncheon meeting. The speaker, a member of the well known firm of Dup-woody, Saul, Smith & Co. said the public sometimes lacks a full understanding of the distinction between the trained and qualified accountant and those who, by a general knowledge of books undertake the duties associated with the business.

In a most interesting and informative address, the speaker outlined the duties, responsibilities and functions of a chartered accountant, noting that they fell into three main categories: (a) accounting, (b) consulting and (c) auditing. The failure of firms to engage the services of a professional auditor have often resulted in expensive and disastrous consequences, and Mr. Saul cited for his listeners several such examples.

The services of the professional accountant acts as protection to shareholders, investors and other creditors and at the same time acts in manner likely to serve as a deterrent to a possible wrong-doer. The chartered accountant must be completely independent, for only when such a situation exists can he be of value. It is because of the jealous manner in which the professional reputation is guarded that the chartered accountant's signature is accepted by taxation officers, bankers and creditors. Legal responsibilities of the professional auditor are spelled out in the statute books, Mr. Saul continued relating examples of prosecutions which have followed failures to live up to the code.

Goodwill is the chief stock-in-trade of the auditor, said Mr. Saul. The confidence which the profession has earned in Canadian business life is the chartered accountant's greatest trust.

The speaker was thanked by president Bill Marr.

Attendance at today's meeting was a low 77.78% while last week was below average at 90%. Don Warner received the usual birthday greeting and Rotarians welcomed a visitor from Brandon, John Blackwood.

Prairie Farmer Rescues Minister In Lively Debate

OTTAWA — A prairie member's neat rescue of a minister, and an old pro's friend'y satire helped enliven Commons Consideration of otherwise dreary details of government finances.

Walter Dinsdale (PC—Brandon), a soft-spoken Manitoba teacher, had a flash of memory, that swiftly extricated Finance Minister Fleming from a drawn-out wrangle with the Liberal opposition.

Under consideration were a host of government spending items. A \$2,300,000 aerial photography item got the Liberals wrangling with Mr. Fleming.

He explained that the money was to pay three aerial photography companies for extra work done last summer. The weather had been so "extraordinarily fa-

orable" that far more work was done than called for in the government contract for last summer.

The work is being carried out under a six-year contract that began in 1957 and will cost about \$6,000,000 altogether, he said.

If the work was done last summer, said William Benidickson (L—Kenora - Rainy River), why was the government waiting until this date in the fiscal year ending March 31 to ask for the money to pay the bill?

The Opposition was being asked to approve sums already committed, when it was an Opposition's duty to criticize and examine government proposals before the money was committed.

Kenora Community Centre Building Committee

KENORA — ONTARIO

To the Citizens of Kenora, Norman, Keewatin and Jaffray-Mellick:

I know that the many citizens of the district are anxious to know about the progress made so far by the Kenora Community Centre Building Committee. In this regard, I shall try to outline the various steps taken and the steps to be taken in order to assure successful completion of this project.

In conducting this project, our Committee have planned a three-stage programme. 1. Campaign for pledges and donations; 2. Processing of pledges through pay-roll deductions; and direct payments to the fund, special names and business canvass; 3. Arrange for loan on basis of pledges and arrange for building.

STAGE I

We must admit that Stage I of our campaign was a bit disappointing. In our initial canvass, we reached 20% of our objective. This was due in most part to 2 reasons. First, we felt that our canvass was very ineffective. About 30% of the homes were canvassed and even though we tried other methods to contact those who were missed, we felt that an additional canvass might have produced the desired result. Secondly, we had very few "turn-downs" but quite a number of the people canvassed expressed desire to see the building being constructed before they would agree to a pledge. This naturally makes it quite difficult for the committee to determine the success of our campaign.

STAGE II

Many of the pledges are now being paid direct to the treasurer at the Toronto-Dominion Bank. For those of you who have pledged and have not arranged for pay-roll deduction, we suggest that you make your donation direct to the Toronto-Dominion Bank.

Pay-roll deductions have been made or are now in the process of being made in most of the larger firms. Many of the employees have already had deductions made on their pay. However, to-day, we have a list of approximately 40 firms from whom deductions are not being made because there are only about 5% of the employees of those firms pledging. At a meeting recently held by the executive of our committee, we decided that a special committee should be set up to contact these firms in hopes of increasing the pledges from 5% to 80% of the employees. For an example, we would point out the case of one firm, where there are approximately 50 employees and only 1 pledge. Surely the balance of the employees did not turn us down. As a matter of fact, I have contacted several members of that firm, and their reason is that they were not contacted. This again proves the ineffectiveness of our campaign.

STAGE III

Since our original estimate on the cost of a Community Centre, we have had several quotations from various firms, which would indicate that we could build our entire centre for about two-thirds of our original estimate of \$300,000.00. Our skating arena which we originally estimated at \$250,000.00, can be built for as low as \$125,000.00. However, before we agree to anything along these lines, we would have to make a full investigation along with our consultants. If we included pledges from the business canvass, we would estimate that we have reached almost 45% of our goal. Before we can approach special names, we must be able to assure them that the majority of citizens are behind this project.

Likewise, before we can approach any source for a loan on the strength of the cash on hand and the pledges, we must be assured of full support from the citizens of Kenora district in the way of pledges, donations, and special projects.

CONCLUSION

Our committee, like any other committee, is plagued with the lack of help. Only a handful of faithful members have not given up in their quest to provide a Community Centre for the Kenora district residents, and all of them are very optimistic about the success of our campaign. We require more help, particularly in the secretarial department and in the canvassing department. Within the next few weeks, our Committee will be calling a public meeting in hopes that every interested citizen will offer their assistance in putting this project over the top. It would certainly be a shame and disappointment to many to see this project dropped, particularly since we have reached such an advanced stage.

In adding my own personal thoughts to this letter, I feel that if every service organization, sports and cultural group in our district concentrated their efforts on this one project for one year, we should have no difficulty in getting the project started this summer. If every businessman could stop for a moment to realize the impact of benefit to each of them from a project of this nature, then, I feel that we are on the right track to a successful completion of our Community Centre. We would welcome every offer of assistance financially and project wise from all organizations and business houses.

Let's throw selfishness to the winds for once in our community and work together on something that will benefit young and old in every walk of life. Whether it be for a Community Centre or a Hospital, let us pool our efforts, and instead of getting nothing through a systematic effort we can get both.

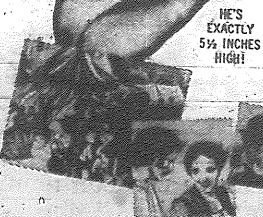

Weekly Highlights

Statistics Bureau of Statistics

National Accounts:

Canada's gross national product rose 2.5% in 1958 to an estimated \$92.2 billion from \$81.4 billion in 1957, but most of this increase was due to higher prices and in volume terms the increase is estimated to have been less than 1%. The slight volume gain which compares with an average of 4% for the years 1947 to 1958 - was due to higher production in the farm sector, the physical volume of non-farm production being unchanged from the previous year. Physical volume showed no change in 1957 from 1956.

International Trade:

Canada's deficit from current transactions in goods and services with other countries declined to \$1,112 million in 1958 from \$1,400 million in 1957, but still was larger than for any year before 1958. The import balance from merchandise trade was down sharply last year to \$174 million from \$405 million the previous year, but the deficit on "invisible" transactions rose by \$117 million to \$938 million, almost half being from income payments in foreign investments in Canada. Commodity imports rose nearly 7% in value in February over a year earlier, continuing an advance that started in the final 1958 quarter. February exports were down slightly, after a pronounced decline in January.

Result was a rise in the overall import surplus in February to \$64,800,000 from \$37,300,000 a year earlier, and in the two months to \$128,800,000 from \$47,000,000.

Labour:

Total number of persons with jobs in the third week of February was an estimated 5,547,000, a gain of 9,000 during the five weeks from the mid-January survey of the labour force and 152,

000 higher than in February last year. The number without jobs and seeking work was virtually unchanged from January at an estimated 587,000, but was 26,000 less than a year earlier. Due to this decline and the growth in the labour force, the seeking-work total eased down to 0.8% of the labour force compared to 0.9% a year ago.

Motor Accidents:

Deaths from motor vehicle traffic accidents were 16% fewer in January this year than last, at 171 against 204. Ontario and Newfoundland were the only provinces reporting more fatalities.

Industrial Production:

Measured by the Bureau's seasonally adjusted index, industrial output in January was 1.4% larger than in December. This was the fifth consecutive monthly increase and represented an advance of nearly 5% since August last year. All major components of the index showed increases in the month, ranging from 0.6% for total manufacturing to 4.6% for mining.

BUILDER BUNGLED

Newport, Ky.—Ernest Johnson put a new roof on his house, then fired up his stove and relaxed.

Soon his roof was ablaze and his home full of smoke.

Firefighters saved part of the roof and said the trouble was Johnson built the roof over the chimney.

MAN MAY BE ON MOON IN 4 YEARS

Pasadena, Calif. — A space scientist says a seven-stage rocket to take man to the moon within the next four years is in the planning stages.

The rocket, called Nova, was described at a conference here Thursday by Dr. Abe Silverstein, director of space flight development for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Silverstein said the first three stages will be 260 feet tall—about

equal to a 26-storey building. He gave no details of the final four stages.

The first three stages will power the rocket to the moon. It may carry two or three men. A fourth stage will slow the rocket down for landing on the moon, and the other three will return it to earth.

KITCHEN CLASSICS

ROLLED OAT AND MOLASSES BREAD

Yield—2 loaves

1-1/4 cups milk
2 teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup molasses
3/4 cup rolled oats
1/2 cup lukewarm water
1 teaspoon granulated sugar
1 envelope active dry yeast
3-3/4 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose

Scald milk; stir in salt, shortening, molasses and rolled oats. Cool to lukewarm.

Meantime, measure lukewarm water into a large bowl; stir in sugar. Sprinkle with yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, then stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and 2 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Stir in sufficient additional flour to make a soft dough—about 1-3/4 cups more. Turn out on a floured board or canvas and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1-1/2 hours.

Punch down dough. Turn out

on lightly-floured board or canvas and knead until smooth. Divide dough into 2 equal portions. Cover with a towel and let rest 10 minutes, then shape into loaves. Place in greased loaf pans (4-1/2 X 6-1/2 inches, top inside measure). Grease tops. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 45 minutes. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 deg. F.) about 30 minutes.

Battling with what Mr. Martin later described as "admirable imperturbability," Mr. Fleming said it would be an economy for the government to pay for the work done ahead of schedule.

Other Liberals began hammering away at Mr. Fleming until Mr. Dinsdale came to the rescue.

Enter Dinsdale

Mr. Dinsdale had found a 1955 occasion on which former Liberal Finance Minister Harris - in March, near the end of the fiscal year - asked the Commons for a certain \$1,000,000 or so. And, pointed out Mr. Dinsdale, it turned out that when he asked Mr. Harris what the money was for, Mr. Harris explained that there had been this northern aerial photography that wasn't covered in the government contract, and it was a chance for some economics.

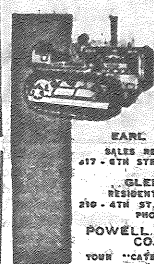

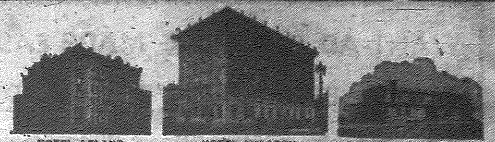

Canadian Westinghouse Sales, Earnings Down In 1958

Hamilton, Ont., — Canadian Westinghouse sales in 1958 dropped seven-percent to \$139,408,471 from the company's record high in 1957, of \$150,182,572, the 55th annual report to shareholders disclosed today.

1958 earnings of \$2,605,484 reflected a seventeen percent decrease from the 1957 figure of \$3,149,836. Earnings per share amounted to \$4.26, compared to \$5.16 in 1957 and \$2.95 in 1956.

Westinghouse president George L. Wilcox cited sharply reduced shipments of defence equipment, and railroad air brake products as chief factors in the 1958 sales drop. In the company's principal operating areas, however, involving heavy electrical apparatus, industrial and consumer electrical products, business was maintained at the 1957 level despite shrinking markets. Severe foreign and domestic competition exerted a significant influence on pricing, the report stated.

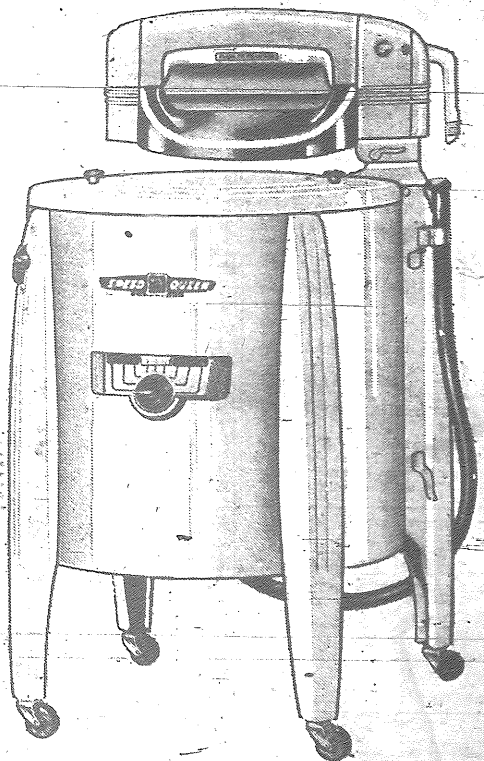
