Men Teachers Discuss Pertinent Plans At Assembly

Mr. P. K. Dickens, principal of Central School Kenora and Mr. John Braun of Dryden have returned from North Bay where they attended the Public School Men Teachers Federation meetings which were held March 31st and April 1st.

Mr. Dickens and Mr. Braun represented District 16, which stretches from Ignace to the Manitoba border and north, including Red Lake. This Easter assembly marked the first time that the meetings have been held this far north, Mr. Dickens stated. The 1960 assembly is slated for Windsor.

Many noteworthy items were discussed and policies formed at the meetings, a full account of which appears elsewhere in this issue.

Dept. Lands-Forests Establishing Tree Nursery In District

The Department of Lands and Forests at Kenora reports that it is in the process of developing a new Forest Tree Nursery in the Kenora District of Northwestern Ontario.

This nursery is being located on the east side of Thunder Lake, approximately 15 miles east of the town of Dryden, in Zealand Township.

A nursery Headquarters will be developed on the site including suitable buildings to provide office, shipping, maintenance and storage facilities as required for the production of nursery stock.

In developing this site for the production of seedling trees, the land will be divided into three-acre compartments. These compartments will be cleared of trees stumps etc., & cultivated. Belts of trees will be left between compartments to act as windbreaks. The soil of the area, a medium to fine sand, is generally well suited for nursery work. Some parts will be improved to an optimum level of fertility for the production of trees by the addition of locally collected acid peat and a regulated program of fertilization.

The trees to be grown in this

nursery will be used for reforestation work in this part of Ontario, and will include species common to the area such as White, Red and Jack Pine and White and Black Spruce. Large areas of land, west of the Great Lakes, suitable for the production of forest crops will require additional stocking with seedling trees. This work can best be carried out by using stock produced in the area, without the necessity of bringing in stock from more southerly nurseries.

The nursery has a potential capacity of 10 million trees annually. It is expected that this production will meet the nursery stock requirements of northwestern Ontario for many years to come.

Sidney Alcock, Former Resident Died At Sudbury

Sidney Alcock, former well known resident, died suddenly in Sudbury, Ontario, Thursday, April 2nd. Born in Kenora, June 8th, 1906, he was in his 53rd year.

He received his education in Kenora and was employed at the CPR yard office prior to going to Sudbury where he was a security guard for the E. S. M. Cape Co. Mines. He was a member of the Anglican Church.

He is survived by his widow, the former Thelma Reid, one daughter, Mrs. Wm. (Noreen) Alton of Kenora; two brothers, Fred of Kenora and Harold of Penticton, B.C.; two sisters, Mrs. Belle Ames of Kenora and Mrs. W. H. George of Keewatin, also one grandchild.

The remains will arrive in Kenora Sunday morning. Funeral services will be held Monday afternoon, April 6th, at two o'clock in St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral. Rev. J. W. Whitford will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

The Brown Funeral Home is in charge of local arrangements.

5 Provincial Parks Serve Kenora Dist.

Now is the time of year, as the snow banks disappear and the water starts running, one starts to think of getting out into the clean fresh air after a long cold winter. When one begins daydreaming of fishing, camping and picnicking it's a sure sign of spring, and what better place is there to do these than in the vacation land of Ontario.

How well the people of Ontario realize this. According to the Statistical Report of Ontario Provincial Parks 75% of the campers visiting Provincial Parks in 1958 were from Ontario.

To meet the desire of the public to live play and relax in the Provincial Parks of Ontario, parks across Ontario are steadily expanding to meet the demand of the public who wish to spend a camping vacation.

In the Kenora District there are five Provincial Parks—Sioux Narrows and Rushing River on Highway 70, and Twin Lake, Blue Lake and Aaron Park on Highway 17.

Sioux Narrows Park is 46 miles south of Kenora on Regina Bay of the Lake of the Woods. In this vicinity lie many famous Indian battle grounds and even yet Indian relics are occasionally found. Although still under development, this park has been found very attractive by many visitors.

Rushing River Park is 17 miles south of Kenora on Dogstooth

Lake and Rushing River. This park is very scenic with an attractive waterfall and is extensively used by people in the Kenora area who wish to picnic and relax in the pleasant surroundings.

Twin Lake Park is 27 miles east of Kenora. Though small in size it has proved to be a very popular spot to camp and picnic.

Blue Lake Park is 65 miles east of Kenora. This park has one of the finest sand beaches in the area. People visiting this park will always remember the clean golden sand beach and the cool clear water of Blue Lake - a paradise where all members of the family can enjoy themselves.

Aaron Park is 12 miles east of Dryden on Thunder Lake. For a number of years this park was maintained by the Department of Highways and later turned over to the Department of Lands and Forests. Though still under development, this park is a very popular place for people in the area who enjoy camping, fishing and picnicking.

New Strawberry Varieties

Twenty varieties of strawberries are grown in 4,000 acres in Ontario each year.

For many years the most popular variety of strawberry in Ontario has been Premier, discloses Stewart Carpenter, Extension Specialist, Ontario Department of Agriculture. But virus diseases and root rot have caused wide variations in yields of Premier, and new varieties become

available will have certain advantages over it.

What program should a grower follow; particularly one who is growing strawberries for the first time? It is a good plan to grow the variety which has been grown successfully in the area. But then some new varieties might be tried: Valentine (early, firm, good quality, freezes and ships well, but susceptible to virus infection); Earlidawn (early, firm, good quality, but should not be planted following tomatoes, potatoes, eggplant, or pepper, owing to susceptibility to verticillium wilt); Catskill (large, firm, good quality); Empire and Eric (later than Premier but of equal quality, and brighter and firmer); Sparkle (later than Premier but of good quality, large, firm, freezes well); Cavalier and Redcoat, both of similar season to Premier.

Growers interested in trying any new varieties of strawberries should get in touch with the Fruit and Vegetable Extension Specialist of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in their area.

February Gold Bulletin

The Ontario Department of Mines reports that for the month of February, the eight gold producing mines in the Thunder

Bay - Patricia Districts of Northwestern Ontario namely, Campbell Red Lake, Cochenour Wilans, Madsen Red Lake, McKenzie Red Lake, New Dickenson, Pickle Crow, Leitch, MacLeod-Cockshutt, milled 132,723 tons of ore containing 49,501 ounces of gold and 3,868 ounces of silver valued at \$1,693,590.00. These figures are up slightly over the month of January and the corresponding period in 1958.

For the month of February the 36 producing gold mines in the province reported milling 727,843 tons of ore, containing 213,648 ounces of gold and 29,949 ounces of silver valued at \$7,317,564. In the corresponding month in 1958 the same mines reported milling 727,170 tons of ore containing 210,646 ounces of gold and 35,370 ounces of silver valued at \$7,248,333.

The daily averages were 25,994 tons of ore milled 7,630 ounces of gold and 1,066 ounces of silver produced, with a value of \$261,342. There were 10,907 wage-

earners employed during February, and the average grade of ore was \$10.05.

B.A. OIL COMPANY PREDICTS BRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR 1959

The outlook for the petroleum industry in 1959 is more encouraging, E. D. Brockett, president of British American Oil, states in the company's annual report. "It is expected that, even without an increase in export markets, crude oil production in western Canada will reach the 1957 record level of 500,000 barrels per day," Mr. Brockett reports. A further improvement is also anticipated in the demand for refined products, although heavy pressure on earnings resulting from competitive forces is expected to continue.

British American's consolidated net earnings for 1958 amounted to \$20.5 million, or \$1.00 per share, a decrease of 36 per cent from the \$32.2 million, or \$1.74 per share earned in 1957. This reduction in profits was a result of lower selling prices for refined products, increased operating

costs and decreased production of Canadian crude oil. The lower per share earnings figure was partially the result of reduced earnings and also the result of the issue late in the year of two million common shares.

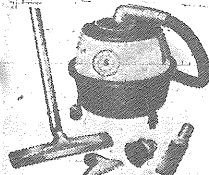

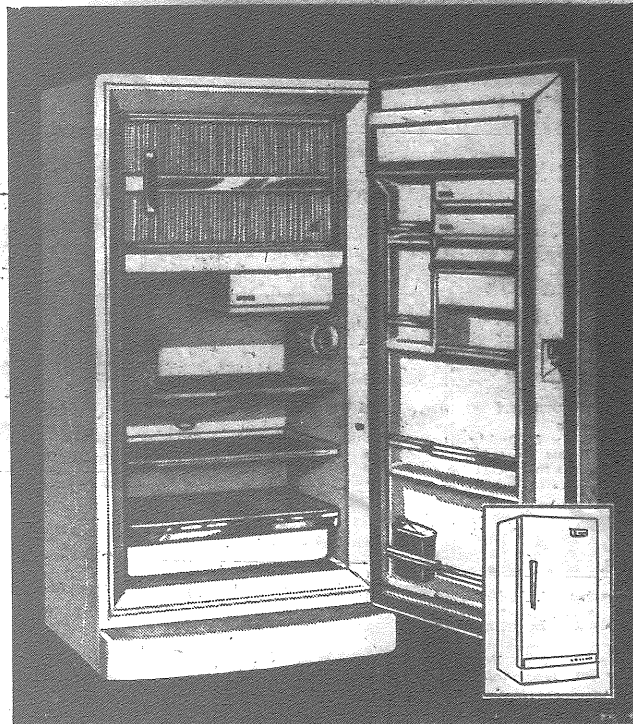

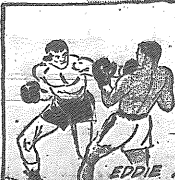

Local C.A.S. Worker Tells Of "Happy Healthy Emily"

Seeing a delicate, underweight baby girl literally loved into growth and radiant health is one of the satisfactions which has come to a social worker with the Kenora and District Children's Aid Society. When Miss Doris McGlashon had the job of steering this baby through the adoption process, she ran into the problem of its uncertain health.

Baby Emily's mother had to decide upon the very best course to be taken for the welfare of her child. She was young, only eighteen, and of good farm parents residing in the east. She was essentially a steady, good-living young woman, but at a time of stress in her life she had been too easily led into error. Wishing, of course, to do what was right for her family, but first of all to make the best decision for the innocent child, Miriam, as she can be called for convenience, came to the Children's Aid Society for counsel before her baby was born.

The staff member who took Miriam's case, as always, refrained from offering a pat solution, or giving hard and fast advice on such a serious matter. She did, however, point out the various courses open to her and the kind and extent of help she could get with her problem. After a number of consultations and a great deal of serious thought, Miriam decided to give her baby for adoption knowing that there were many homes longing for a child where it would get loving care and a father's name.

When little Emily arrived on the scene, prematurely, she was tiny, delicate, and it looked as if her very life hung in the balance. When Miss McGlashon spoke to a couple who had applied to adopt a child and had satisfied the requirements for adoptive parents these two felt that they could not give up their decided preference for a boy and chose to wait until the offer of a boy came. The next eligible couple feared to take on the responsibility of caring for so frail an infant. The thought of taking the baby, only to lose her, weighed in their decision to wait.

Then the chance to adopt the baby was offered to Jon and Martha who had been waiting a long time for the fulfillment of their dream. When shown tiny Emily, the young couple loved her at once. Risk? Yes, there was great risk in taking this helpless little preemie, but it was a risk they decided to assume and to face with hope and determination. The baby's mother was of the same European extraction as the adopting parents, and this was an added tie.

Miss McGlashon's first visit to Emily was a revelation. The

baby's little room was a picture of daintiness, and there was an air of orderliness and loving care about the entire home. Beaming with pride, Martha lead the social worker to a carriage, lifted the hood, as if unveiling a masterpiece, and gazed happily at the sleeping child. Emily was indeed a masterpiece. In the short time she had been with Jon and Mary she had gained weight and strength and her face had filled out and was beginning to show signs becoming of the little beauty that her foster parents had known from the start that she was bound to be.

Every subsequent visit showed the happy baby gaining and growing sturdier each day. On one visit Miss McGlashon reminded the adoptive mother of a technical requirement that had to be fulfilled before the adoption became final. For a moment Martha did not understand and thought there was a possibility of losing Emily.

"Only over my dead body will they take this baby away," she proclaimed, and there was no doubt that she meant it.

The CAS representative quickly explained that it was a minor matter, easily complied with. It has all been arranged now, and Martha and Jon live unperturbed with Queen Baby ruling in her snug little kingdom.

Frankfurter Casserole

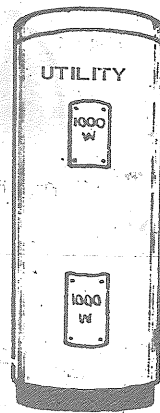
- 2 large red apples

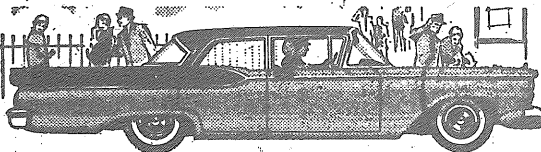

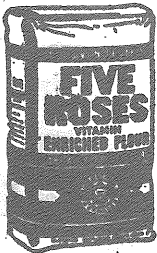

Doubt Atom Blasts Could Warm Arctic

A U.S. weather expert says that a series of nuclear explosions in the Arctic can warm up the weather for much of the world but Canadian experts are far from sure and some strongly doubt the feasibility of the idea.

Harry Wexler, head of the U.S. weather bureau research section, said the Arctic ocean can be opened to shipping and the region can have its temperatures raised 15 to 20 degrees.

The proposal is "scientific doodling" said Keith McLeod, superintendent of public weather forecasting. Dr. Andrew Thomson, director of Canadian Meteorological Service, doubts man's ability to create sufficient energy to change weather.

Explode 10 H-bombs of the 10 megaton type and gigantic clouds of steam will form to condense and freeze, said Mr. Wexler. The resulting fog would insulate the region and start a heat build-up. Radiation would be cut down by 80 or 90 per cent, and if the plan were continued for several winters the Arctic ice-pack would disappear.

But such weather tinkering, he warned, might start a new ice age in northern sections of continents bordering the Arctic and reduce the Arctic rainfall in regions such as California and the Mediterranean.

Merely Playing
"He's merely playing with an idea," said Mr. McLeod. "It's all pretty theoretical and the forces involved in the execution of the plan are formidable. However, Mr. Wexler must have a reason for making the estimate."

Dr. Thomson said "weather takes enormous amounts of energy to change its character and one hesitates to think it possible to change climate by explosions." Too little is known yet to predict the effect of H-bomb explosions on ice, he said, adding: "The vast amounts of water in the Arctic would quickly absorb the heat, and explosions will not change the

climate of the Canadian Arctic."

Head of the University of Toronto department of physics, Prof. W. H. Watson said: "The important thing is the exact height the bomb is released. It is a very complicated process. But my opinion leads me to doubt the explosion of bombs would have any noticeable effect on the weather unless they were exploded close to the ground."

Many Disadvantages
Dr. J. T. Wilson, director of the University of Toronto's geophysics laboratory, thinks there are too many disadvantages in the idea.

"There are enough reasons for discouraging the explosion of any further nuclear bombs already," he said. "The disadvantages might far outweigh the advantages."

A weather forecaster at Mal-

ton, John Knorr, said he was wary of anything which might interfere with the natural processes of the atmosphere.

"Forecasters would appreciate not having any more problems added to those they already have to contend with," he said.

In the past, most of the revolutionary ideas for changing the weather came from the Russians.

Last year Prof. Grigor A. Avayuk suggested heating the Arctic to remove the ice cap. He suggested artificial heat or "other methods" without talking them but was thought to be referring to Russian experiments.

The previous year Alexander Maiklin of the Soviet Academy of Sciences suggested a dam

across the Bering straits and using atomic power to pump water from the Arctic ocean into the Pacific, thus drawing the warmer Atlantic waters into the Arctic.

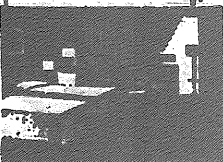

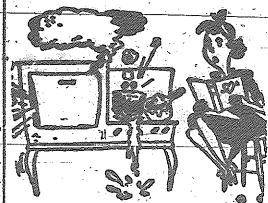

Kitchen Classics

Winesap apples are the leaders of the fresh fruits now available.

Right now, it's time for baked ham. Dressed in a new apple-sauce glaze, your baked ham can be pretty as a picture, delicious to eat.

APPLESAUCE GLAZE
1 cup applesauce
2/3 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon dry mustard
2 tablespoons mild vinegar
Combine applesauce with brown sugar, mustard and vinegar. About half an hour before ham is done, take from oven and remove rind, if any. Score the fat surface in diamond shapes and spread applesauce glaze over the top and sides of ham. Finish baking.

For the encore meals that follow a baked ham dinner, why not try a new, hearty kind of a apple salad? Add generous chunks of the ham to a combination of apples, celery and lettuce, and you have a stick-to-the-ribs dish.

APPLE AND HAM SALAD
2 cups diced unpeeled apples
2 cups diced cooked ham
1/2 cup diced celery
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Dash pepper
Dash garlic powder
1/4 cup mayonnaise
Combine apples, ham, celery, salt, lemon juice, pepper, garlic powder and mayonnaise. Toss lightly. Serve on lettuce, garnish with fresh parsley. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

Preserve cupboard running low on home made pickles? Then here's one that can be made any time of year. Try this spicy relish with poultry or ham, or curry dishes.

Winesap apples are perfect for this because they hold their shape so well with cooking.

APPLE RELISH
1 tablespoon prepared mustard.
1 cup sugar
1/3 cup cider vinegar
3/4 cup water
2 sticks cinnamon
1 piece whole ginger root
4 medium apples
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1/4 cup chopped nuts

In saucepan, combine mustard and sugar. Add vinegar, water and spices. Bring to boil, simmer 10 minutes. Pare and core apples, cut each in eighths, then in halves crosswise. Remove cinnamon and ginger from syrup, add apples, raisins and nuts. Bring to boil, simmer 10 minutes.

Cool. Makes about 3 cups.
In Canada, apple pie and apple crisp are possibly the best loved apple desserts. But European countries have their favorites, too. In Holland, they eat cake any time of day and night and spicy ones such as this are their favorites.

DUTCH APPLE CAKE
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 cup shortening
1 egg, unbeaten
1/4 cup milk
2 1/4 cups thin apple slices
3/4 cup brown sugar
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Drop in shortening, egg and milk. Beat 2 minutes on electric mixer at low speed (or about 200 strokes by hand). Spread batter in greased 8-inch square pan. Arrange apples in overlapping layers on top of dough with pointed edges toward center. Sprinkle with mixture of brown sugar, butter and spices.
Bake in hot oven 400F about 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm with plain or whipped cream. Leftovers may be re-heated and served as coffee cake.

For those who have a tendency to an anemic condition, iron-rich foods should be included in the diet. Beef, the variety meats, whole grain cereals and dried apricots and raisins should often appear on the menu.

Wins Met Contract



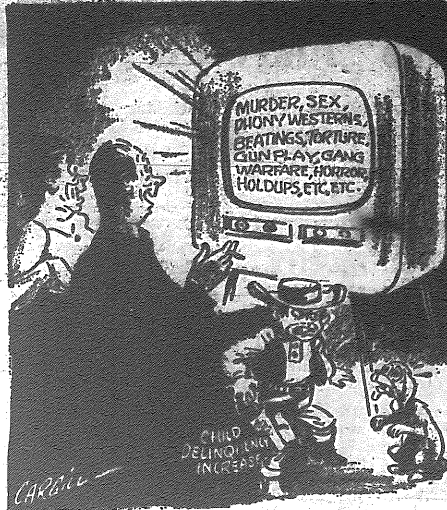

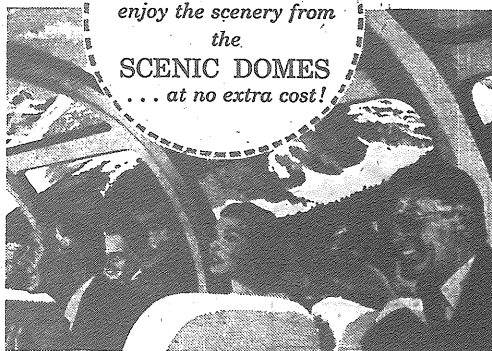
