Mr. and Mrs. Kron have four children, Mrs. Andrew Stoltz of Regina, (Esther) Mr. Rudolph Kron, present manager of the family firm, Miss Thyra of the Swedish Embassy in Ottawa, and Miss Lilly, of Kenora.

THE NEW APPROACH

Ted Early, recreation director for the Town of Dryden, addressing 250 boys and their dads at the first annual Father and Son banquet of the Keewatin Minor Hockey Association recently, told his listeners that at an extremely crucial play-off game a couple of weeks ago, the largest turn-out of parents in six years, watched these eager kids play for that all-important cup. There were exactly 22 parents in the stands. Dryden, of all communities in this whole area, enjoys the best organized program of sports. Mr. Early's point, that only 22 parents showed sufficient interest to attend a crucial (in the minds of the children) game, forecasts unhappy conditions ahead. Take out Mr. Early and those 22 interested parents; and very little remains.

That same situation exists in Kenora, Keewatin and all other places where a comparatively few undertake a program, with initial success. When these leaders have retired, the activity collapses; though the need remains.

What may very well be the key to the problem of perpetuating these worthwhile endeavors may have been found in both Kenora and Keewatin. At least there is good reason to think so. A month ago 375 Cubs and Scouts and their dads enjoyed a night out together in the Kenora Legion, where a turkey dinner was served, and the lads and their dads talked about things which interested the boys.

The first annual dinner of Keewatin's Minor Hockey loop, with a record 250 in attendance, indicated that a concrete step, which offers surprising results, had been taken. In the words of Mayor Hodgkinson, it was not an event which separated the men from the boys; rather it was the reverse. The winning smiles and the common purpose must have inspired the majority of the fathers to realize that all which was required to cement a new understanding with their boy was just a little show of interest on his part. Surprisingly enough, the dads found the experience most enjoyable.

No doubt this recipe is not new, but it always works. From these dinner meetings will come new leaders with new ideas. We are sure that both the Scouts and Cubs, together with Minor Hockey in Keewatin can expect a better year ahead, thanks to the initiative shown by their respective leaders.

We commend this approach to other groups who find interest, falling.

OPENING OF NAVIGATION EXPECTED TO BE EARLY AGAIN THIS YEAR

Driver Training Courses To Get Help From Dept.

Driver training courses in Ontario schools will get more help from the Province, Transport Minister John Yaremko, Q.C., announces.

Available to school boards offering driver training as an extra-curricular course will be speakers and teaching aids, including books and other material published by the Transport Department.

"The whole picture will be examined this year," promised Mr. Yaremko, "to develop a method of financial support and prepare a complete programme. The value of driver education has been proved. Graduates have, as a minimum, a 50 per

cent better record than the same age group untrained, in offences and accidents."

Mr. Yaremko said his Department and the Education Department were interested in the programme used by Michigan, and that they will make a study of it.

Will Ban Trinkets From Windshields

Trinkets such as kewpie dolls, baby shoes, boxing gloves, toy kangaroos and other similar objects will not be permitted as windshield decoration under an amendment to the Highway Traffic Act which was introduced recently in the Legislature by Highways Minister Fred M. Cass.

The new amendment will prohibit hanging of any object obstructing a driver's view. The existing prohibition against plastering windshields with stickers is to be maintained.

Other amendments have been introduced to reinforce the safety provisions of the Highway Traffic Act. One will compel use of headlight low beams at night.

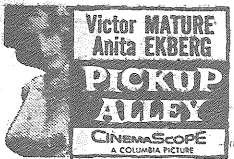

A Message For Our Day

It is fascinating to note how our Lord's resurrection appearances satisfied various types of temperament. There was Mary, the lover; Peter, the penitent; the Emmaus road thinkers; Thomas, the unbeliever; and others about whom we do not have detail. The Risen Christ's appearances convincingly satisfied their need of assurance and faith.

Let our attention centre on Thomas; his absence when Christ met the disciples on Easter day; his later refusal to believe their testimony; his stipulated conditions on which he was prepared to believe, and Christ's acceptance of those conditions; his coming to believe without the fulfilling of his human conditions; his irrefragable confession of faith - "My Lord and my God." Then Jesus expressed His last beatitude which links us and all generations with that resurrection record - "Blessed are they that have not seen and yet have believed."

Here are some lessons that arise for us. It was in fellowship with others that Thomas came to know Christ and the power of His resurrection. In isolation most people miss Christ. In fellowship

with the Christian Church we are more likely to find Christ and confess Him to be our atoning Saviour and risen Lord. When that happens it means that historic Easter is confirmed in personal experience. Like Thomas, we make a personal profession of faith.

Ladies Discuss Wpg. Convention Of April 27-29

A meeting of the Kenora Liberal Ladies Association was held in the Council Chambers Wednesday, April 1st at 8 o'clock with Mrs. P. Dubenski presiding.

Attention was drawn to the forthcoming National Federation of Liberal Women's Convention to be held at the Fort Garry Hotel, Winnipeg on April 27, 28 and 29th. A National Convention is held every three years at which all liberal women from every part of Canada are welcome. Panel discussions on national affairs are conducted, resolutions are presented and free discussions encouraged. A feature of this convention in Winnipeg will be an address by the Honorable L. B. Pearson, National Leader of the Liberal Party on Tuesday, April 28th.

As members of the N.F.L.W., the objects of the Federation were read and discussed. The

objects are:

1. To encourage the organization of Liberal Women throughout Canada.
 2. To uphold the cause of Liberalism.
 3. To raise the status and advance the political education of women.
 4. To aid in securing and maintaining good government.
 5. To encourage a broad spirit of Canadian nationality within the Commonwealth of Nations.
- A strong representation of Liberal Ladies is hoped for at the Provincial Nominating Convention to be held April 11th at Dryden. Plans for the May 6th meeting of the Association were made.
- There will be a guest speaker whose subject will be "The Duties and Responsibilities of those employed at Polls during Provincial and Federal Elections".

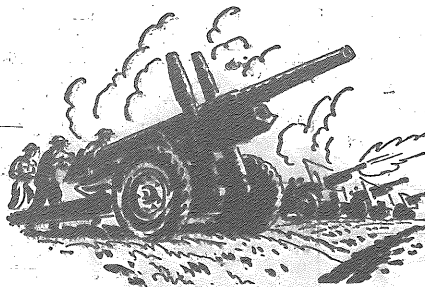

UNITED CHURCH CONGREGATION CONSTITUTED AT NESTOR FALLS

On Thursday, March 26, 1959, at a special service of worship held in the Nestor Falls School, the United Church congregation of this community was constituted. The service was conducted by the minister, Rev. A. E. Dunn, B.A., B.D., of Keewatin; and Rev. R. J. Leighton, B.A., B.D., Chairman of the Kenora - Rainy River Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, preached the sermon and read the declaration of constitution. Mr. G. Brimble, Treasurer of Presbytery, read the Scripture, and J. M. Forbes led in prayer.

The sacrament of Baptism was administered to 56 children and adults by Rev. A. E. Dunn. Sixty-nine were received into membership by profession of faith and

by transfer of certificate, the reception being conducted by Rev. R. J. Leighton.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was conducted by Rev. A. E. Dunn, with Mr. G. Brimble, Mr. K. Hansen, Mr. A. H. Coles and Mrs. J. M. Forbes as assisting elders. Mrs. A. H. Coles acted as organist.

The service is one which will long be remembered both by those of the congregation and by the visitors who assisted. It marks a distinct step forward in the progress of the congregation, which has been meeting for some years, but which only last fall petitioned Kenora - Rainy River Presbytery for constitution as a United Church congregation. The church at Nestor Falls is served by Rev. A. E. Dunn during the winter months, and will probably be in the care of a student minister during the summer.

Expand Services In 10 Year Plan For Alcoholism

A ten-year programme providing for expansion of services for the treatment of alcoholism in the Province is announced in the eighth annual report of the Alcoholism Research Foundation of Ontario.

The Foundation is largely financed by an annual grant made by the Ontario Legislature through the Health Department. Ontario was the first province to undertake a programme aimed at solving the problem of alcoholism.

The new 10-year programme would provide more facilities for active treatment and more for research. Its implementation will require ultimately four times the

space used by present quarters in Toronto. New facilities, it is stressed, should be close to University of Toronto and nearby teaching hospitals.

The report stresses, too, that it is unlikely that the problem of alcoholism could be controlled simply by multiplying special clinics. Main reliance is still placed upon research based educational work which would give more treatment knowledge to professional people and others who have to deal with alcoholics in the various communities.
