Bodger, and well known local singer and pianist, last night added another laurel to her list of accomplishments when she won the Grade B soprano class in the largest competitive festival in the world, the Winnipeg Music Festival. Miss Bodger, is now eligible for the Tudor Trophy competition which will be held next week.

Leslie, a grade 12 student at the high school, has been a consistent winner through the year's in the Kenora festival piano and vocal classes and has won all the major awards of the district festival.

Last year she was awarded the vocal Rose Bowl and in 1957, the instrumental Rose Bowl. Prior to 1957, she won the Tudor Trophy for junior vocal and the Registered Music Teacher's Trophy for junior instrumental.

To this reporter's knowledge, Leslie's win in the Winnipeg festival marks the first time that a resident of Kenora has won a major class in this festival.

Home and School in Action was the theme of the Ontario Federation of Home and School Associations' Incorporated, 40th annual convention held on April 1 and 2 at the architecturally beautiful, and distinctly symbolical Canadian new wing of the Royal York Hotel at Toronto.

The purpose was to provide an opportunity for representatives from all associations, councils and members of the board of directors to meet together to conduct the Annual Meeting Business of Federation; present and exchange ideas, experiences, and information; hear speakers, and leaders interested in education and familiar with home and school work; strengthen the bonds between member associations of the Federation, as well as meet co-workers from all areas of Ontario.

MAGIC NUMBERS

Magistrate's Court

C. OF C. TO CONTINUE EFFORTS TO REVISE LOCAL LIQUOR REGULATIONS

The Kenora Chamber of Commerce is not prepared to allow the matter of cocktail licences to be shelved. At the regular meeting of the Chamber last night, a letter from the Town of Kenora was read, in which Council indicated that it was not prepared

to agree to the holding of a vote without the support of a petition. Several speakers last night voiced strong objection to the manner in which liquor is controlled.

Ken McInnes said that the Chamber should 'keep the issue alive . . . if the time was not opportune now, then serious study should be undertaken to bring about the desired results.

Mr. Jack Donor wondered if the Chamber 'lacked the intestinal fortitude to pursue its desired course of action. He felt that a 'half-hearted' approach would not result in progress for the Chamber's announced policy. "If we are in-favour, we should get out and fight for it," Mr. Donor stated.

Bill Rourke suggested that changes in Government regulations should be sought to render needless the taking of a vote. He stated that in Winnipeg close to \$5,000,000 had been spent since Provincial liquor laws changed two years ago. He thought the same beneficial results to local eating establishments would follow, once cocktail lounges were legal.

A discussion of Fort Frances Chamber attempts to effect a change at the Border City brought about a decision to investigate that body's progress. It was agreed, also, to take a poll, by mail, of the entire membership of the Chamber (299 members) to determine the wishes of the entire group in the matter.

"GIGI" Wins Nine Academy Awards

"Gigi", M-G-M's triumphant musical which opens at the Paramount Theatre Wednesday and runs till Saturday marks the first time that the theatre management has booked an award winning film so close to the Academy Award presentations.

"Gigi" walked off with five Oscars last night, including the top one for the best picture. Other Oscars won were for:

Best Director (Vincent Minnelli), Best Song (Gigi), Best Art Direction, Best Screen Play Adaptation, Best Color Cinematography, Best Costume Design, Best Film Editing, Best Musical Score.

Maurice Chevalier who co-stars in the picture was also presented with an award.

Susan Hayward won the best Actress Oscar and David Niven the Oscar for best actor. Supporting awards went to Burl Ives and Wendy Hiller.

Based on the novel by Colette "Gigi" with Leslie Caron, Maurice Chevalier and Louis Jourdan in starring roles, concerns an impressionable young girl brought up in Paris and taught the "facts of life" by her grandmother and an aunt, both of whom have lived a rich and full life without benefit of matrimony. Their attempts to persuade the independent minded Gigi that champagne and jewels are more important than love backfire when the young girl blossoms into a glamorous woman who finds that saying "No" to Louis Jourdan enables her in the end to get both security and respectability.

This naughty-but-nice story is

set to music by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe in their first score since "My Fair Lady," in songs that have swept the nation ever since "Gigi" first opened.

An Arthur Freed Production for M-G-M, in CinemaScope and color, filmed largely in Paris, "Gigi" was directed by Vincent Minnelli. Together with Miss Caron, Chevalier and Jourdan, the cast stars Hermione Gingold, Eva Gabor, Jacques Bergerac and Isabel Jeans.

sed emotional welfare of children everywhere.

Through conferences, open sessions, special speakers, publications and Cortis Memorial Library Book display as well as a consulting service, there emerged a clear realization of what the opportunities and responsibilities are in Home and School and that its objects are mainly - to promote the welfare of children and youth; to raise standards of home life and to promote and secure adequate legislation for the care of children and youth.

What a great many may not know is the fact that National and Provincial Federations wield a tremendous influence over all phases of education at all levels. The predominating subject at

convention dealt with in great detail was education, since for the past number of years, at least the debate pertaining to it has been going on at all levels with increasing momentum, in the sense of the number of speeches made and, articles and books written, as well as the many meetings and conferences held.

C OF C PROJECT

LAKE TRAVELLERS MAY SOON FOLLOW SIGNS

If discussions commenced last night bear fruit, the Kenora Chamber of Commerce will have "a project of our own" The Chamber, recognizing the growing numbers of small boat owners cruising on the vast areas of the Lake of the Woods; aware of the growing horsepower of motors and the consequent speed of travel; concerned with the fact that the 14,000 islands pose navigational problems which can be solved only by the best boatmen, may undertake to mark the main channels with large signs.

The idea was advanced by Bill Roarke, who noted that few would dare to try to find Sioux Narrows, although the distance is only 45 miles by water. He noted that all roads are well marked, for if they were not, motorists would not be able to travel far from their point of origin. Large signs, painted on rocks or placed

in conspicuous places, could indicate the names of channels, main islands and routes to and from well known places suggested the speaker.

Chamber members thought highly of the idea, and may undertake the programme, to be spread over a period of years, through the use of volunteer labor. Large arrows might well be stencilled on rocks, indicating the direction of Kenora, Clearwater Bay, Sioux Narrows, etc. with other necessary information printed below. The district affairs committee of the Chamber will bring in a report on ways and means next meeting.

FRENCH PRAISE WINE AS GERM KILLER

Paris.—A French high committee of studies on alcoholism stated today that wine is a powerful germ killer whose action is comparable with that of penicillin.

That conclusion was among those reached in a 223-page report submitted to Premier Michel Debre.

The committee said a Professor Masquelier of Bordeaux university's medical faculty proved wine can kill bacteria. It mentioned the bacilli of typhoid fever, colon bacillus and staphylococcus.

The report said a dose of two cubic centimetres of red wine killed 2,000 staphylococci in a laboratory experiment in 15 minutes. The action of the wine as a germ killer was said to be very similar to the action of penicillin.

The first flag flown in Canada was early England's flag, the red cross of St. George on a white background, later incorporated in the Union Jack.

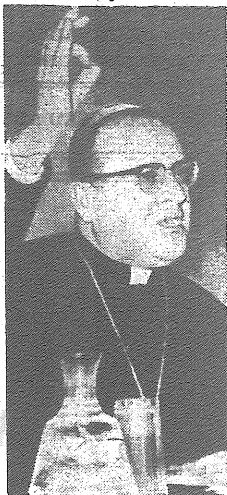

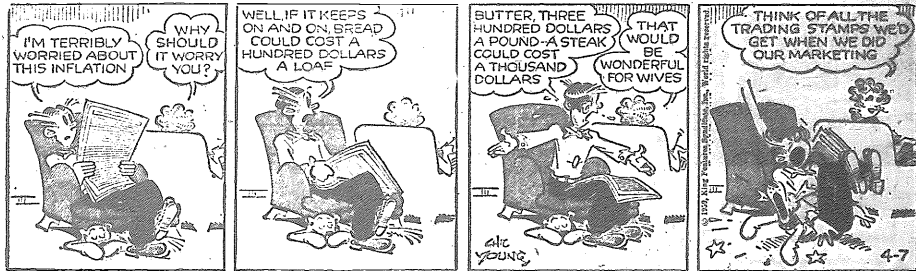

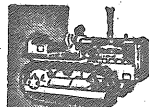

CANCER INCIDENCE STUDY

Cancer of the breast is almost twice as common among French Canadian women living in Quebec City as it is among women of Saskatchewan. On the other hand, Saskatchewan residents get twice as much skin cancer as those who live in Quebec City.

These facts are among those brought to light by a recent cancer incidence study of French Canadians made by Dr. A. J. Phillips, of the National Cancer Institute of Canada, and Dr. C. Auger, of Laval University and a comparison of the results with those of an earlier incidence study in Saskatchewan.

This along with other research conducted by the National Cancer Institute is supported by the Canadian Cancer Society. The Institute's statistician, Dr. Phillips, points out that "studies of cancer incidence among ethnic groups may provide important leads for laboratory research."

He explains that while the overall cancer death rate appears to remain constant for most countries, there are striking differences in cancer incidence for different sites among different peoples. The Bantus of South Africa, for instance, have an extremely high incidence of primary cancer of the liver, a condition so rare in Canada that it isn't even listed in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics sites. North American Indians have much less skin cancer than the rest of the population. Cancer of the breast - the most serious type for Western Women - is virtually unknown in Japan.

"It is possible to surmise as to the reasons for some of these differences," Dr. Phillips says. Liver cancer among the Bantus is generally supposed to be caused by their diet. It is known that too great exposure to the direct rays of the sun, wind and dust can lead to skin cancer; perhaps this accounts for the increased incidence in Saskatchewan. Other differences are completely baffling.

The French Canadian study was limited to persons living in Quebec City, where 94 per cent of the population is of French origin. Dr. Auger, who is professor of pathology at Laval University, established a positive diagnosis of all cancer cases over a one

year period - 321 males and 408 females.

The survey showed other differences between the Quebec group and the Saskatchewan group besides that found in breast and skin cancers. The incidence of stomach cancer in males was 23.8 per 100,000 in population in Quebec and 32 in Saskatchewan. Cancer of the colon was twice as common among the French Canadians (21.1 to 10.2). The incidence of cancer of the cervix was also about twice as high in Quebec. Prostate was just about even for the two provinces.

The total incidence rate for the year worked out to 214 per 100,000 population, which compares with 203 per 100,000 found in Saskatchewan by Dr. T. A. Warson in 1950. Dr. Phillips points out that statistically this difference is not significant when one considers the difference in the date of the two studies. So far the incidence rate for the whole of Canada has not been determined exactly, but studies are being undertaken in a number of provinces.
