DELEGATE TELLS IMPRESSIONS OF TORONTO EDUCATION SESSIONS

Easter week saw education-minded people from all parts of the province converging on Toronto for the main convention of the year, that of the Ontario Education Association. This Association will celebrate its Centenary next year, and in the ninety-nine years of its existence has been instrumental in forwarding the cause of Education in our province.

All Kenora school boards had representation at the convention, even though these delegates had rather to travel than any others there. Many local teachers also attended, giving of their holiday time in order to attend the special sessions in which they were interested.

As representative of the Kenora-Keewatin District High School Board, your reporter (Mrs. H.E. Fawcett) was most interested in the Urban Section sessions of the Ontario School Trustees and Ratepayers Association, but

did wish that one could be in several places at once, as it was not possible to attend many of the interesting meetings listed in the program because of conflicting times.

The O.S.T. & R.A. Department sessions began at 9.00 a.m. Monday March 30 with registration in the Sheraton Room of the King Edward Hotel. Directors meetings followed, and after a break for lunch came the official opening at 1.30 p.m.

NUMBER ONE SPEAKER

The keynote speaker was Dr. Kenneth McFarland, Educational consultant and lecturer for General Motors of Canada. In 1957 he was named America's Number One Speaker in a survey conducted by the Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. McFarland, though a man of high academic accomplishments, is obviously no pedant, and through three-quarters of an hour of homespun philosophy and common sense, kept the large audience entertained while putting across the many impor-

HIGH SCHOOL BOARD PRESENTS 1959 BUDGET

At the regular meeting of the Kenora-Keewatin District High School Board held Wednesday evening, Mr. F. G. Collins, Chairman of Finance, presented the annual budget. The Board will request the Municipalities of Kenora and Keewatin for a combined total of \$158,000, including debenture charges, as the Municipalities costs for the year 1959. This request compares favorably with 1958, in that it is an increase of only \$8,000 over last year.

Resignations were accepted with regret from Mrs. Edythe Brown, Home Economics teacher, Miss Louise Dickson, teacher of Mathematics, Mr. Stuart Hayward, Science Teacher and Mr. R. H. Goddard, history and Physical Education teacher.

Miss Sheila Davison, a teacher on Staff of High School, was granted leave of absence for two years, in order to accept an assignment from the Department of National Defence to teach overseas.

Five new contracts covering replacements have been issued. Mr. L. A. McLennan, reporting for the Management Committee, stated that negotiations had been completed with Kenora-Keewatin District High School Caretakers of Local Union No. 191 and the new agreement was in effect.

Mr. E. J. Carter, reporting for the Property Committee, stated that further work had been done

on the school grounds and a further clean-up had been made to the West of the School.

Mrs. Fawcett, having recently attended the Ontario Educational Association Conference in Toronto gave a brief and interesting report and outlined some of the resolutions pertinent to our Board.

Accounts were passed in an amount of \$21,905.42.

Mr. Collins reported on the High School Public Address System and Mr. Martz reported on C&S Controls, in Rooms 215 and 217.

In the absence of Principal, Mr. A. G. Richmond, who is in the East on Board business, Vice Principal, Mr. C. M. Hayes, attended the meeting.

ORIGIN OF PLACE NAMES

A glance at the map of the Southern part of Lake of the Woods shows two adjacent bays with similar names - Sabaskong Bay and Sabaskoshing Bay. For some time reports the Department of Lands and Forests at Kenora, we had thought that this was a map-maker's or printer's error, until a rather embarrassing episode proved that they were definitely two different bodies of water. Many place names are descriptive and these are in that category.

Our Indian friends have always been noted for their sparing use of words and this is a good example of such economy. In the early days, before the Indians had too much contact with white men, if you had asked one of them where he was going, instead of saying "The Bay with the Small Marsh at the end of it," he would have grunted "Sabaskoshing." Similarly "The Bay with the Big Marsh at the end of it" would have been "Sabaskong." And so the early map-maker took the easiest way out and marked down the Indian names. How else could he shorten such a mouthful to be legible on a small scale map. Simple - and correct too, the large and small marshes are in the right places.

It is as well to get these names straight now, because with the white man's predilection for changing the face of nature by building dams, diverting streams for Hydro, the marshes may change places, and some writer on the origin of place names.

50, or 100 years from now, may surmise that the map-maker of yesterday had got his wires crossed.

Demand Teachers For Oral-French.

Toronto—The Ontario Federation of Home and School associations will request the Ontario department of education to establish training for the teaching of oral French in the elementary grades of English-speaking schools.

Delegates to the 40th annual convention at the Royal York passed the resolution of the North York Home and School council, by an overwhelming 477 to 16 vote.

The resolution asks that the request to the department be made "without unnecessary delay." It requests "courses and certificates to enable teachers to qualify for the teaching of oral French."

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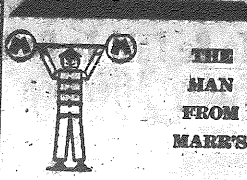
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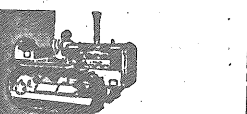


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Familiarization Tour For Jet Prop Britannias

Vancouver, B.C. - The First Canadian Pacific Airlines jet-prop Britannia airliner to fly from Vancouver to Montreal, left here Monday on a familiarization flight in preparation for the company's new mainline service commencing May 4.

Purpose of the flight is to familiarize flight crews with trans-continental communication and navigation facilities, and ground crews at terminals enroute with Britannia operation.

As well as landing at Winnipeg, Toronto, and Montreal, the scheduled stops on the new CPA Canadian Empress Service, the familiarization flight will call at the alternate terminals, Regina, Windsor, Ottawa and Quebec City.

In command of the flight is Captain George Jarvos Burnaby, B.C. other members of the 15-man crew on board the Empress of Hong Kong include six pilots, two engineers, one electrician and five cabin attendants.

On the return flight, departing Montreal April 11, the aircraft will land at the North Bay and Lakehead alternate airports. During both east and westbound flights, all pilots on board will familiarize themselves with local landing and take-off conditions. They will also practice instrument approaches at all regular and alternate airports.

REGAINS LOST SPEECH, HEARING

Toronto - Eleven years ago John Sandras, 55, lost his speech and hearing when Communists kidnapped his son while walking down a country road in Greece with his parents.

Mr. Sandras thought his son was dead. Three years ago he learned he was alive. He said he immediately regained his speech and hearing.

Saturday, Mr. Sandras stepped off a plane and greeted his son for the first time since the kidnapping during the Greek civil war.

Vangeli Sandras, 23, who spent eight years in a Hungarian children's camp, was brought to Toronto in 1956 by the Canadian Red Cross. He wrote to his parents in Antartikori, a village in northern Greece, telling them he was in Canada.

Percival F. Rushton To Be Laid To Rest Friday Afternoon

Funeral services for the late Percival Frank Rushton well known Keewatin citizen who died Wednesday, April 8th, in Deer Lodge Hospital Winnipeg, will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home, Friday afternoon, April 10th at two o'clock. Rev. Albert Dunn of Keewatin United Church will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery. Pallbearers will be: Carl Johnson, Cecil Robertson, Frank Burton, Wm. Mazeppe, Mike Didyk and Jack Miller.

The late Mr. Rushton was born in Worcester England, March 27 1896 and was in his 64th year. He came to Canada and Keewatin in 1903. He was employed by the Lake of the Woods Milling Co. retiring in 1929 due to ill health. A veteran of the First Great War, he saw service overseas with the 76th Battalion Canadian Field Artillery. He was an honorary member of the Retired Men's Association, a member of the Keewatin Branch of the Canadian Legion and the United Church.

He is survived by his widow the former Annie Didyk, one son Frank of Montreal; four daughters, Mrs. J. W. (Phyllis) Gray, Mrs. Sid (Doris) Speight both of Kenora, Mrs. E. S. (Grace) Speight of Keewatin and Mrs. P. F. (Mildred) Chidley of London, Ontario; one sister Mrs. L. D. Wright of Kenora and eleven grandchildren.

Our EDITORIAL VIEWPOINT

SIGNS ON THE LAKE

We fortunate residents of this Lake of the Woods country have unconsciously accepted a revolution in transportation, without realizing the full import of these changing times.

The Lake of the Woods, 100 years ago was the main thoroughfare to the western plains. Until 20 years ago, people in this area travelled more by boat than by any other means. This brief span of time witnessed the advent of the automobile, and the demise of the large inboard motor boat.

Now, while our progressive citizens have travelled far and wide, both by highway and skyway, increasing numbers have re-discovered the pleasures and wonders offered by our very own Lake of the Woods. This has come about by the widespread use of the outboard motor. Comparatively scarce before the war, today's high-powered motors open to all the hundreds of miles of waterways around our 14,000 islands. Indeed, it would not be an exaggeration to suggest that the outboard motor has proved to be the key to opening up the vast reaches of the Lake to growing numbers each year.

Those most familiar with the Lake have a keen respect for it. An awareness of the possible dangers involved reduces the hazards. One of the causes for concern is the very real danger of getting lost.

How far could you travel along unfamiliar highways without benefit of road signs? Members of the Chamber of Commerce, recognizing the predicament of those unfamiliar with Lake travel, proposed to study the feasibility of similarly marking the main channels at the north end of the Lake.

This would be a wonderful boon. If the Chamber adopts this project, larger islands would be marked as well as main routes to and from Sioux Narrows, Clearwater Bay, Shoal Lake, etc.

As matters stand today, few would venture such trips, even though their boats are capable. The Miner and News has received several inquiries concerning the formation of a boat club. Such a group could provide transportation for Chamber of Commerce sign painters. Certainly there is an awareness of the growing needs and opportunities of boating.

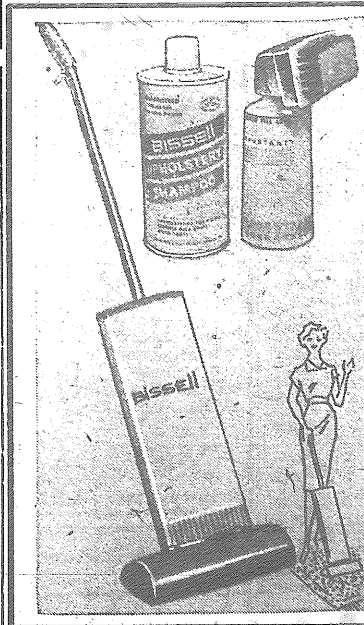
Old-Fashioned Sugar Squares
1 1/2 cups soft butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon powdered ginger
2 tablespoons butter/milk
Cream butter with one cup sugar. Add eggs and beat until light. Add sifted dry ingredients and buttermilk and mix well. Spread in greased 15 x 10 x 1-inch pan, and sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Bake in hot oven, 400°, about 20 minutes. Cool and cut into 24 squares.

tant points of his speech - "Three-Dimensional Confidence".

Since it is not possible to set down his entire speech, I would like to share with the readers some of Dr. McFarland's most pertinent comments from the notes I was able to take down.

He said that "Geniuses use more of what we all have. They have a success personality, and the key to a success personality is CONFIDENCE. The word 'confidence' comes from the Latin words meaning 'believe with'. We must be motivated by a firm belief in ourselves based on the best that is in us; and must look within ourselves for success, and also look within ourselves for the causes of failure. Too many to-day want to improve circumstance, but do not want to improve themselves."

He said that we as people con-

cerned with education must get back to teaching basic things, especially: 1. You don't have to have fun all the time. 2. It is natural to be lonely occasionally, for man, as God's creature, made in His image, is overbuilt for this world."

PROGRESSIVE EDUCATION
The good Doctor then made a few telling thrusts at progressive Education as represented by the "Creative, Original, Objective, Fun" school of thought.

He commented "There is no use being creative about the multiplication table, original about spelling, or objective in the practice of medicine. "It is more fun to succeed than to fail, even though it requires hard work. Unless a student is compelled to delve below the surface of a subject he will not be interested in it, for there can be no interest without information."

Dr. McFarland mentioned visiting Russia thirty-five years after the revolution, and discovering that they were producing less

beef than when they were under the Czar, yet there are left-wingers here who would trade our way of life for Communism. The kind of people who, on seeing a successful self-made man, say "Look what he makes rather than" Look where he came from - look what he has done!" "We must combat this threat by educating our young people to develop CONFIDENCE, and COMPETENCE to better serve others.

Easter means Courage and Truth, and these we must instill above all else, if we are to retain the democratic way of life," Dr. McFarland concluded.

AWARDS

Monday evening, delegates gathered in Convocation Hall at the University of Toronto, for the O.C.E. General Assembly, where presentations were made to many of the past executive who had served the Association faithfully and well through the years.

Of interest to our area was the presentation of the Green Awards. This is an award for those teachers who have made Railway Car teaching their life work, and they must be dedicated men indeed, to stay with such an arduous and lonely type of work. One of those so honoured was Mr. Philip Fraser, who has charge of the school car on the C.N.R. north of Kenora.

Dr. Davidson Dunton, former Chairman of the C.B.C. Board of Governors, and now head of Carleton University at Ottawa, was the guest speaker at this gathering.

Tuesday was a busy day, during which reports were given, resolutions presented and officers for the 1959-60 term elected.

SPEECH FINALS

In the evening there was a banquet in the Crystal Ball Room, followed by the finals of the Elementary Schools Public Speaking Contest.

Sixteen young people took part, among them the Kenora contestant, Miss Charlene Clark of King George School who did a very commendable job. We were proud of her.

The contest winner was Christine Reilly of Humber Valley School in Etobicoke. She was presented with a magnificent silver cup by W. Ross Strike

Q.C., First Vice-Chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, and a set of Books by the Grolier Society, as well as a seventy-five dollar cheque (also from Hydro).

John Code, and Joseph O'Connor, who placed second and third also received cheques and small silver cups.

On Wednesday the first meet-

ing of the new executive was held, the presentation of resolutions was completed, and most delegates to the Ninety-Ninth Annual Convention O.E.A. at least those in the O.S.T. & R.A. section, again set out for home.

ORIGIN OF PLACE NAMES

Marjorie Bellamy relates the following story of the origin of the place name Minaki as told to her by Canon Maurice Sanderson from an old Indian legend.

In the days before the Indians began to adopt the ways of the White man in the care of children, Indian mothers laced their babies in what was called a "Moss-Bag" and instead of using diapers as now, they used moss.

The moss they used was soft and absorbent, and cheap. For it could be had for the picking and it was destroyed after use. But it could not be found just any place at all, for it grew on low wet land, usually in muskegs.

One such bed of moss was at what we now call MINAKI; and it lay in that tract of bush land between what is now the railway and the Minaki Lodge. It was in that muskeg that the Indian mothers gathered the moss that they used for their babies. That tract of land is now drained and forms part of the Golf Course. Old timers will remember how earth was brought from Manitoba by the train loads to cover the rocks that cropped up all over the higher land, and to fill in the low land that was once a muskeg.

Before all this happened, however, it was a favorite place for Indians to land as they passed back and forth in their birch bark canoes to gather the moss for use as above stated. The word they used for picking or gathering moss was MIN-AH-KEE, (pronounced as spelled.) This was shortened to MINAKI when the railway station was given its name.

There could be another reason for calling the place Minaki, from the two Cjibway words - ME-NO, and AH-KEE, Me-Noo - fine or pleasant; and Ah-Kee - land, shortened to Minaki; and so pleasant Land. Take your

choice, but for goodness sake don't call it MIN-O-KI; as I have heard so many summer campers call it.

MORE CARS PRODUCED

Toronto — Canadian motor-vehicle production last week is estimated at 9,901 vehicles compared with 7,804 the week previous, says the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

Production consisted of 8,198 cars compared with 6,310 and 1,703 trucks compared with 1,494.

Production this year to date is estimated at 118,989 vehicles compared with 103,720 in the corresponding period last year—made up of 100,174 cars compared with 88,236 and 18,815 trucks compared with 15,484.

Chrysler 1,314 (1,049); 13,840 (14,392); Ford 2,502 (1,765); 28,499 (24,429); General Motors 4,190 (3,307); 55,472 (48,615); Studebaker-Packard 192 (189); 2,363 (800).

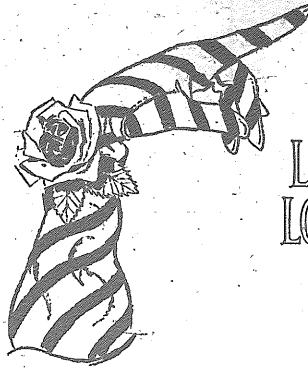
A great amount of test work was accomplished during these five days and Robbie McInnes successfully passed his Marksman's Badge.

Defensive driving: a plan for safety

Defensive driving—a highway philosophy in which the operator always maintains a safety zone around his car—

First step in becoming a defensive driver is to stop being aggressive. This is easier said than done, McAim's points out. The auto was built to "go" and it's only natural for people to use this characteristic to the fullest. Beaming master of hundreds of horsepower does strange things to personalities. It gives them a sense of power and often changes mild courteous people into discourteous, thoughtless ones. Therefore it's important to master one's emotions.

The second step is to be on the defensive against other drivers. McAim's points out that drivers you meet on the road differ mentally, physically and emotionally. They may never have learned to drive an automobile correctly, being self-taught. Or they may have picked up bad driving habits from amateur teachers.

It is safer not to expect them to do the right thing. Some may actually need your help to get safely through traffic. It doesn't pay to get angry at them. In fact, it may be expensive.

Here are a few defensive driving rules:

- A defensive driver maneuvers through traffic along the easiest possible route in relation to the position and possible movement of other vehicles.
- He isn't drawn into copying another driver's mistakes.
- He doesn't try to "get even" with show-offs.
- If necessary he will make up for others' faulty driving.
- He will yield the road, even though it should have been done by the other driver.
- He sizes up traffic conditions far ahead, is always on the alert for the unexpected and takes necessary timely action to avoid involvement.
