COMMUNITY LEADER

JUDGE EARL POPHAM DIED EARLY TODAY

Earl Cameron Popham, County Court Judge for Kenora since 1934 and community leader was called to rest early Friday Morning April 10th at the Kenora General Hospital, following a lengthy illness. Born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, July 1st, 1892, he was in his 67th year.

The late Judge Popham, through the years contributed greatly to the betterment of Kenora and was actively associated in all phases of community life, being a member of civic bodies, service clubs, fraternal orders and recreation and sport clubs.

Called to the Ontario Bar in 1924, he joined the late Col. H. A. C. Machin in the practice of law and later former his own practice in Kenora. He was appointed King's Counsellor in 1934, Crown Attorney in 1936 and was appointed County Court Judge in 1938. He received his education at Wesley College, Winnipeg and received his B.A. from the University of Manitoba in 1913. He was called to the Manitoba Bar in 1920 and received his L.L.B. in 1921.

The late Judge Popham was the first president of the North-western Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce; Past President of the Kenora Board of Trade; Past Master of the Lake of the Woods Lodge A.F. & A.M. and former D.D.G.M. of the Masonic Order for the Western District; Former president and District Governor of the Kinsmen Club; A director and president of the Kenora Rotary Club; Chairman of the Victory Loan Campaigns during the Second World War; Prior to his appointment as judge, he was actively associated with both the federal and provincial Liberal Association; he was a former president of the Kenora Athletic Association, Honorary president of the Kenora Ski Club and actively associated with the Kenora Golf and Country Club. He saw service during the first world war, serving overseas from 1915 to 1919 and was discharged as a Captain in Motor Transport. He was a member of Knox United Church. He is survived by his widow, the former Eleanor May Groff of Winnipeg; two sons, Clarke and Hugh of Winnipeg; two daughters, Mrs. William (Joan) Cooper of Deep River, Ontario and Shirley of Brantford, Ontario; one brother Dr. Harold Popham of Winnipeg. A son Ross Cameron predeceased him in 1934.

Funeral services will be held Monday afternoon, April 13th at two o'clock in Knox United Church. Rev. R. J. Leighton will officiate and interment will be in the family plot, Lake of the Woods Cemetery. The Brown Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Curling Club Building Report

Following is the report presented by Bill Johnson, President of the Kenora Rink Company at the 71st annual curling club meeting. It was only one week ago that we had the shareholders meeting of the Kenora Curling Club Ltd., and I must say it was unfortunate that we did not have the turnout that is here this evening.

At our shareholders meeting we had an attendance of approximately twenty shareholders, and it was one of the most enthusiastic shareholders meetings I have ever attended. The main subject of interest was our much discussed new club rooms.

This evening I would like to report to you on the progress made over the years since the installation of artificial ice. In 1954, many of you will recall, at our annual meeting in April, we discussed the possibility of artificial ice. At this meeting a committee was formed to get prices, and look into the possibility of having an ice plant installed, and I think much to the surprise of all of us, we had this artificial ice before our curling season started in November 1954. To accomplish this we undertook to sell debentures for \$25,000.00, and also stipulated that all curling club members must be a shareholder in our club, which he could buy for \$20.00 over and above his club membership, or if they wished, they could purchase this share at \$5.00 per year over a four year period. Previous to 1954 I recall that a very small percentage of our curlers were shareholders, sometimes as few as 30 to 40 of our approximate 240 members.

Today all of our curlers are shareholders and very much interested in the affairs of the Curling Club as well as the Curling Club Limited.

I am happy to report this evening that our debenture issue has been redeemed to the extent that today we owe only \$16,000.00 with the possibility that we will reduce this to \$11,000.00 by Oct. 1, 1959. This was made possible through the co-operation of the Curling Club, who turned over an additional \$3,500.00 this past year.

For your information, this was made possible through the foresight of your executives over the years from 1949. When this club was built in 1935 we curled for a very small membership of \$10.00 per year, which gradually was increased to the extent that we started to show a small profit in the year 1949 and 1949.

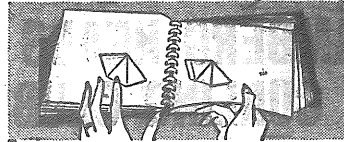
It was decided to set up a reserve fund for the purpose of emergency, or to improve our curling facilities as and when our Curling Club saw fit. This fund grew considerably over the years so that last year your Curling Club Executive was able to turn over \$3,500.00 which made it possible to call in more debentures and reduce our debt to \$15,000.00.

At our shareholders meeting a resolution was passed recommending to the directors to engage an architect to prepare preliminary plans for our new club rooms. This will be done and I might suggest that if any of you curlers, through your travels, have any suggestions which you would want incorporated in our new club rooms, I would suggest you put them forward.

We are fortunate that in our club we have several builders, plumbers, electricians, and heating men who are very active, and I have every reason to believe that with their help and consideration, we will come up with a plan which we would all desire, and be second to none.

I might also mention that when we undertook to put in artificial

ora has been honoured with this Council contest.

The winner tomorrow will go forth to the regional contest to be held this year in Winnipeg on May 2nd and 3rd. The region referred to is the North Central and includes five clubs from Winnipeg, two from Kenora, and also clubs from North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska and Northern Illinois.

The winner from the regional level will go to the International to be held in Minneapolis in July. Winners at this level will represent the Toastmistress Clubs as a whole. International Toastmistress Clubs are found throughout Canada, the United States, Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan, Thailand, Guam, North West Germany, Scotland, Morocco, Bermuda, Puerto Rico and Venezuela.

There is a large delegation coming from Winnipeg to sup-

port their contestants and the Kenora Clubs hope that the public will come out to support their members. The contest is to be in the form of a luncheon to be held at the Kenricia Hotel on Saturday, April 11th, at 12.30 noon. Tickets are available from members of Lake of the Woods or Trillium Toastmistress Clubs. The speeches will be judged by five outstanding Kenora citizens who are not affiliated with Toastmistresses. These names must be withheld due to contest rules.

Noted Speakers Address Ontario Home-School Meet

In reflecting upon the highlights of the 40th Annual convention of the Ontario Federation of Home and School held recently at Toronto, and at which Mrs. J. Olfman of Kenora was a delegate, it is most fitting and proper to point, with pride, at the three outstanding speakers, whose very personalities and spoken words, created an aura of brilliance to the convention as a whole.

Mr. H. H. Simpson, president of the Canadian Home and School and Parent Teacher Federation, delivered the keynote address at the opening session "Home and School in Action". He traced the history of Home and School noting that Ontario was first to organize a council. There are at present, in Ontario, he stated 145,000 members of which 1,575 are elementary school associations, 72 secondary schools, and 45 councils. He emphasized the fact that Home and School is not a club, nor a ladies' aid to the principal, but an association whose object is to obtain the very best in the way of education for each child according to his needs and capabilities.

Mr. Z. S. Phimister, Director of Education of Toronto, who is acknowledged as one of the outstanding leaders in Canadian education, spoke at the April 1 banquet. His topic was "Education 1959". Mr. Phimister compared our system of education with that of Russia, having visited there with the express purpose of studying the subject. He pointed out that the democratic ideal and the communistic ideology are competing for the minds of men, and we must teach our children the true meaning of democracy, as effectively as the Russians have taught communism to theirs. Our job is to teach and instill a belief that service to mankind is the major purpose in life and not the quest for personal wants such as consumer goods of which we now have an overabundance. Mr. Phimister also stressed the fact that in the USSR, education is recognized as a major force in making the nation strong.

Prominent at the April 2 banquet was Mrs. Billie Davis, wife of George Davis, a missionary, now living in San Jose, Costa Rica, from where they serve in Central and South America. Mrs. Davis is originally from the U.S. but is known internationally as a speaker and Christian Educator for educational organizations, schools, colleges, clubs, churches and Sunday School conventions. She lectures on teaching methods, visual aids and child psychology. Her address was titled "Equality of Opportunity," speaking with a student's view point in public education. Mrs. Davis defined education as "learning to be something better than you are," and also used the comparative method of citing our good fortune in having all educational facilities as compared with the underprivileged in South and Central America where education is not available; where schools, libraries, and churches are a veritable luxury. The capacity audience, was enthralled with her eloquence, fluency and subject matter. She received a tumultuous standing ovation which lasted for many minutes.
