## AT 10th ANNUAL BANQUET

### 9 LAKELAND DRIVERS EARN SAFETY AWARDS

Saturday evening, at the Kenora Hotel, Lakeland Dairies honored their drivers at the 10th annual Safe Driving Award Banquet. Nine drivers boasting a total of 47 accident free years of driving were recipients of awards presented by Inspector T. Corsie and Cpl. M. Stewart of the Ontario Provincial Police.

Those present at the dinner and receiving awards were: Bill Stevenson - 9 years; George Noble - 8 years; Fred Lachapelle - 7 years; Stu McLeod - 3 years; Bill Silk - 2 years and Hugh Hudson - 1 year. Absent but earning awards were: Garfield Moore - 9 years; Bill Gan - 7 years and Wally Barber - 1 year.

Chairman of the evening, Lady Van Walleghem paid tribute to the drivers of the firm and also to Ernie Caron who had been with Lakeland Dairies for four years and who is leaving shortly to reside in Winnipeg. On behalf of the management and staff, he presented Mr. Caron with a rod and reel.

Corporal Stewart, guest speaker, complimented Lakeland Dairies, stating that they were one

of very few firms to join the Ontario Safety League, and they now have been members for ten years.

The speaker then outlined the history and growth of the Provincial Police. He told his audience that in 1877, the strength of the force was one detective, by 1909 the number was 150 and today there are 1,850 officers in uniform.

The greater part of the work of the provincial police is with highway traffic, he said, since the department took over the enforcement of the Highway Traffic Act in 1940.

Corporal Stewart suggested that individuals should share the concern of the authorities in accident control. Concerning the point system, he said that the department hopes for an improved record and that chronic offenders will be the most penalized. The new point system is designed to save lives, he stated. The Ontario highway toll for 1958 recorded 1,112 deaths and 30,100 injuries, he said.

When making the safe driving awards, Corporal Stewart asked each driver to use his influence on three or four friends in an attempt to keep traffic accidents at a minimum.

Inspector T. Corsie paid tribute to the Lakeland drivers commending them for their excellent records, examples for all to follow.

### Laurenson Creek To Be Dredged

Part of Laurenson's Creek is to be dredged in the very near future, according to word received by Mr. W. M. Benidickson, M. P. The following letter received by him from the Minister of Public Works is self explanatory.

April 9th, 1959.  
Mr. W. M. Benidickson, M.P.,  
House of Commons,  
Ottawa, Ontario.

Dredging - Laurenson's Creek, Kenora, Ontario.

Dear Mr. Benidickson:—  
I wish to refer to your letter of March 5, 1959, and to my interim reply of March 13, 1959.

Investigations recently completed by officials of the Department indicate that some dredging is required near the outlet of Laurenson's Creek. It is intended to dredge a channel 800 feet long by 20 feet wide to a grade elevation of 1054.00 between the First Avenue and the western end of the retaining wall and to remove some 24 old timber piles.

The overall request for extending the channel upstream as far as Eleventh Avenue cannot be economically justified at this time, by the traffic using this section of the creek. The severe water level condition of last summer was one of the lowest on record and is not expected to occur again for several years.

It is intended to have this dredging carried out by contract as soon as possible.

Some one hundred guests attended the luncheon meeting held at the Kenora Hotel. Members from five Winnipeg Toastmistress Clubs, Chateleine, Elizabethan, Hypatia, Maple Leaf and Winnipeg Club and the two Kenora Clubs, Lake of the Woods and Trillium were present, each with a representative in the speech contest.

Miss Eva Bevis of the Winnipeg Toastmistress Club topped the seven speakers. Mrs. Eleanor Fawcett of Lake of the Woods Club Kenora, was second. Miss Bevis will now represent Council No. 1 in the Regional Speech Contest to be held in Winnipeg May 3rd, and which will feature winners from the Northern United States as well as the Canadian Clubs. Mrs. Gerald Saunders of the Lake of the Woods Club, Kenora, chosen as the most outstanding

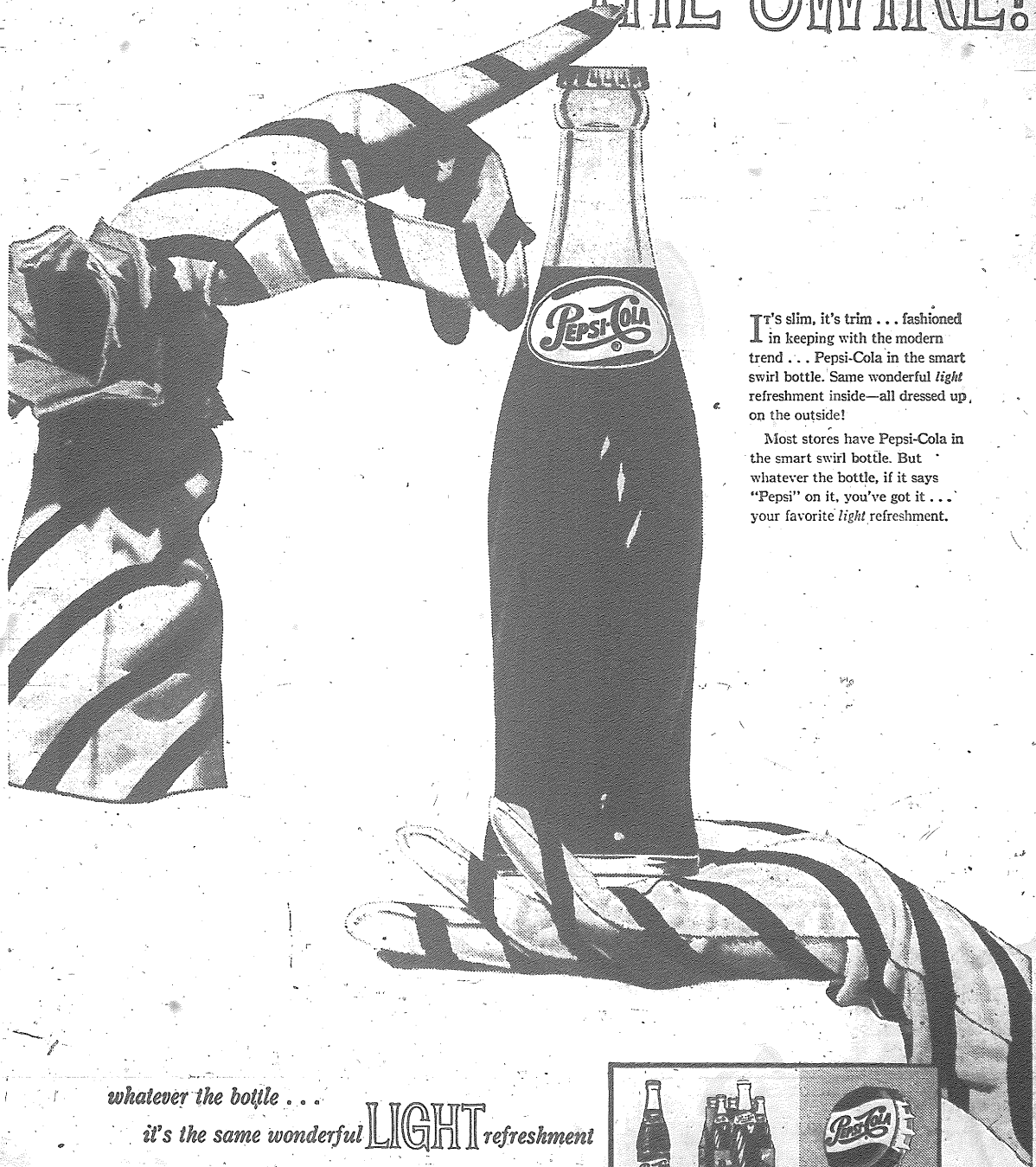
member for the year was Toastmistress for the day.

**LAWN SEED**

OTTAWA, April 7, 1959 — When you reach out for that cheapest package of grass seed for the lawn this year, remember that fewer than 20 grasses of 4,500 species in the world are suitable for Eastern Canadian lawn purposes.

The reminder is issued by J. H. Boyce of Forage Crops Division of the Canada Department of Agriculture who deplors the tendency to go for the cheapest seed. He says the saving of a few cents at the sowing stage can lead to the loss of many dollars in renovation costs at a later date.

Recommended for eastern lawns are Kentucky blue grass (both commercial and Merion), rough-stalked blue grass, creeping red fescue, Chewings fescue and some of the bent grasses, notably colonial. Reputable seed firms sell mixtures of these durable species and Mr. Boyce estimates that by paying perhaps an average of \$10 more to seed a lawn with good seed, considerable cost is saved in later maintenance and renovation.

He also urges good soil preparation and fertilization.

**Prospectors May Purchase Claim Tags Before Staking**

Because of the passage of an amendment to the Mining Act by the Ontario Legislature at its recently-concluded session, prospectors may now, if they wish, purchase claim tags before actually staking claims and attach them at the same time they set up their claim posts. The purpose of the change is to avoid the necessity for a second trip into the bush to affix the tags after the claims have been officially recorded. Under the new arrangement, the cost of the tags is deducted from the fee for recording.

Those prospectors who elect to work by the old method may still do so, but the time allowed for tagging the claims is reduced from one year to six months. The amendment to the Act al-

so made some changes in the allowances for certain types of assessment work. Provision was also made for the appointment of an official to carry out some of the more urgent duties of the Mining Commissioner during his absence from duty at any time.

**Abitibi Power Station Brings In Fifth Unit**

As part of its multi-million dollar expansion program in the Northwestern Division, Ontario Hydro brought a new fifth unit into operation at its Abitibi Can-

yon Generating Station early this week.

Rated at 45,000 kilowatts, the unit replaces one removed to the DeCew Falls G. S. during the wartime emergency. The replacement represents the first stage of a hydro development program in the area. Over the next ten years it is planned to develop

economic hydraulic sites north of Cochrane which may ultimately total 1,000,000 kilowatts.

First of the new projects, Otter Rapids, situated some 23 miles north of the Abitibi plant is now under construction and is expected to be in service in 1961. This plant is expected to develop a total of 131,000 kilowatts.

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# \$370,000 For Cancer Research

More than \$370,000 was voted for cancer research in six Ontario universities at a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the National Cancer Institute of Canada. Altogether, fifteen fellowships for a total value of \$50,800 and twenty-one grants for fundamental research amounting to \$920,800 were awarded.

The two largest grants, which have a combined value of \$161,000 go to help support a large range of fundamental biological, biophysical and radiation physics research in the Department of Medical Biophysics of the University of Toronto which is housed in the new Princess Margaret Hospital.

Eight other grants to the University of Toronto amount to \$82,000 and include projects in tissue culture, the relation of viruses to cancer development, the effects of tobacco tar, biochemical investigation and other aspects of tumour growth.

Projects in the University of Western Ontario received support amounting to \$50,000, while the Ontario Agriculture College, the Ontario Veterinary College, Queens University and the University of Ottawa each received smaller grants.

This is the largest amount ever granted for fundamental cancer research in Ontario and is dramatic evidence of the increased activity and interest in this field over the past few years.

Altogether the National Cancer Institute of Canada granted over one million dollars for the sup-

port of 83 projects and 26 fellowships in its nation-wide cancer research programme. More than eighty percent of the Institute's money is provided by the Canadian Cancer Society from funds collected during the April campaign.

Dr. H. E. Rawlinson of the University of Alberta, president of the Institute explained that "The development of cancer research in Canada since the Institute was organized for this purpose in 1947 has been most gratifying. At that time we were hard put to find a dozen scientists with the training and ability for this work. Largely through our system of fellowships that sent our people to leading cancer research centers in Britain and the U.S., we have been able to build up an outstanding group of investigators."

He explained that cancer research in Canada might well be said to be entering its "second phase". Up until recently most of the work has been done by professors and doctors working in various universities and hospitals across the country. This will be continued, but at the same time increased support is being given to cancer research. This of course, means a greatly increased burden on the Cana-

dian Cancer Society to provide the money. Mr. Carl B. French of Toronto, president of the Society, stated that "We recognize this as a challenge. But since the prime function of the Society is to "decrease mortality from cancer" we must and will meet that challenge."

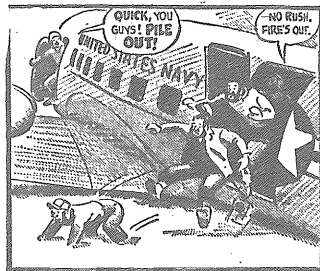
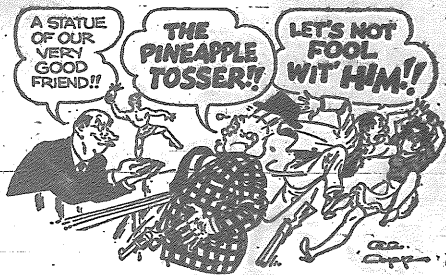
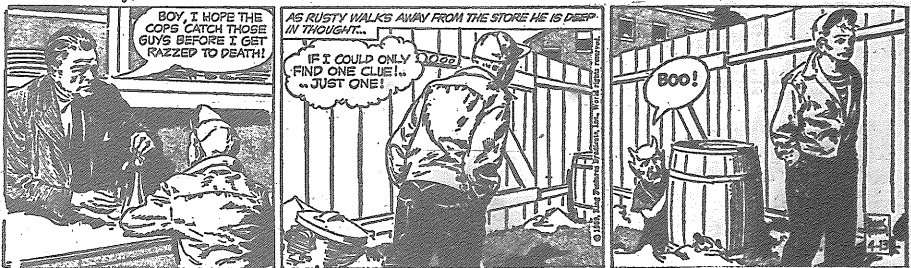

Ontario may never have the rabbit plague of Australia, but something similar could happen if there were not a group of people watching to prevent the wholesale spread of any animal species.

The latest potential problem is the fur-bearing rodent, the nutria, whose original habitat was South America. At present at large in Michigan and Ohio, it is causing considerable con-

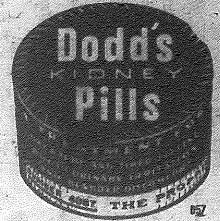
cern as to its possible effect on native wildlife. Being adapted to warm areas, it does not thrive very far north and may never be of concern in Ontario, but the public have been asked by the Federation of Ontario Naturalists to watch out for it. The nutria looks like a beaver, except that the tail is 12-17 inches long, is rounded tapering and sparsely haired. Total length of the animal including tail is 30-42 inches. 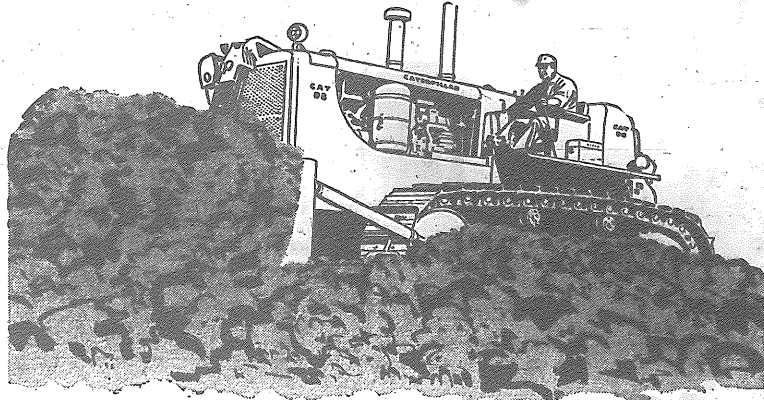

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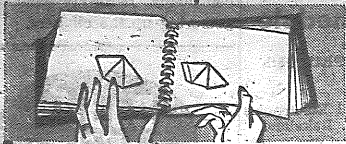

**Ford Car Production Highest Since 1954**

TORONTO - Ford Motor Co. of Canada said today its Canadian dealers delivered more new cars to customers in the first three months of 1959 than in any first quarter since 1954. The three-month total of 26,177 cars was 27 per cent higher than the 20,575 figure for 1958, and 8 per cent above the total for the first three months of 1957, a pre-recession period.  
Last month alone the company's dealers delivered one-third more passenger cars and 25 per cent more trucks than in March, 1958.

In the first three months of 1959 the company produced 30,336 cars and trucks in its Canadian plants, an increase of 43 per cent over the first quarter of 1958.
