TOWN COUNCIL PASSES BYLAW FOR 1959 TAXES

At last night's meeting of the town council, third and final reading was given the bylaw to authorize the levy and collection of taxes for the year 1959. (See detailed report of tax levy elsewhere in this edition).

Council agreed to a request of the Police Association for a Board of Arbitration hearing concerning the conditions of a new working agreement.

Referred to council as a whole was a communication from the Minister of Municipal Affairs advising that the Federal-Provincial Works Stimulation program, 1959, has been extended from April 30, 1959 to May 31st, 1959.

TENDERS

Tenders for uniforms and shoes, shirts, ties and caps for the fire and police departments were awarded to Arthur Pitt Ltd., Zeal and Gold, Jack Waterson Ltd., Tom Hinton, Olman's Clothing Centre and the Bootery.

PUBLIC WORKS

The following requests were referred to the Public Works committee for consideration: a petition from residents of Fifth Street North for road improvements of grading and drainage and requesting consideration be given to installation of sewer service; the KKDHS board requested the raising of two manholes in the Pond area since the board is contemplating raising the level of the area; a petition

from residents of the 800 block on Sixth Avenue South asking for sidewalks; a petition from residents of the 800 block on Second Street South asking for paving.

Mrs. J. L. Roy Will Represent Kenora CAS At Convention

Mrs. Joseph Roy will represent Kenora at the annual convention of Children's Aid Societies which will be held in Toronto at the King Edward Hotel on May 7 and 8. The appointment of Mrs. Roy was made at the monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society of the District of Kenora which was held last night in the office of the society with Mr. W. B. Powell, chairman of the board, presiding.

The greatest activity during the past month centred around the CAS protection services and the placement of permanent wards on adoption probation, the report of the local director, Mr. W. J. P. Thompson, showed in Mr. Thompson's absence, the report was read by Mr. Powell. Four adoptions were finalized, two placements were made, and at the present time the CAS is in the process of drawing up final papers for the adoption finalization of two more wards. Other finalization documents are before the court.

The treasurer's report showed relatively light clothing and medical and dental expenses, the former totalling \$664.77 and the latter, \$226.42. Foster boarding home accounts for 159 children totalled \$4,672.76.

The case of an unwed mother who sought counsel from the Children's Aid Society had a happy outcome when it became possible for the young woman to marry the father of her child. They are now repaying the foster care which the CAS had provided for the baby.

Cancer Unit Blitz for Funds Wednesday Night

NUMBER OF ANGLERS TO VISIT AREA SHOULD SET NEW RECORDS

Mr. J. A. Sherrett, Tourist and Publicity representative for Kenora reports that enroute to Dallas, Texas, the Minneapolis Boat, Sports and Travel Show finished on Sunday evening with a new record attendance of 140,606, and as in previous shows all indications point to an exceptionally good tourist season, with demands for folders of all kinds at a new peak.

The Minneapolis Show, however, produced a tremendous demand for "camping" accommodation - the Minnesota holiday makers apparently planning innumerable family vacations, in which the tenters and mobile home owners are planning numerous visits to the Kenora district in the coming season.

There was, however, a great demand for American Plan and Housekeeping accommodation, and it looks as if Kenora District will enjoy the greatest influx of Minnesota citizens in many years, provided we get some favourable weather conditions.

In publicity trips through Wisconsin and Minnesota, the Kenora representatives found weather conditions varied and unsettled. Around Milwaukee, Fond du Lac, and Madison, the snowfall was the greatest in many years, and in some instances exceeded the snowfall in the Kenora district. In others, such as northwest Wisconsin, the snowfall was the smallest in years and around Rice Lake and other popular resort areas only six to ten inches of snow was experienced all year, only two hundred miles away from Milwaukee.

Resort representatives from Fort William and Port Arthur, were strongly advocating that "campers" and "tenters" should be restricted to large extent in the Provincial Park areas, especially those who would not en-

gage guides. They feel that the smaller resorts which offer the facilities of outfitting, including guides, should be given some protection against the unrestricted wandering around of "campers" into remote areas, where there would be no supervision of their activities. This will be presented to local resort owners at an early date.

The long unseasonable winter has made U.S. vacationists eag-

er to get north for fishing, and this spring the number of anglers in the area should set new records.

The figures at the Minneapolis show indicates that interest did not diminish despite the long ten days of the show, which was open from 1 p.m. daily until midnight. The tally was as follows: Friday night, opening show, 9,324; Saturday 20,395; Sunday 16,932; Monday 14,867;

Tuesday 15,295; Wednesday 13,396; Thursday 13,075; Friday 16,297; Saturday 23,886; last Sunday 17,129; for a total of 160,606.

The Dallas, Texas show opens Saturday for nine days.

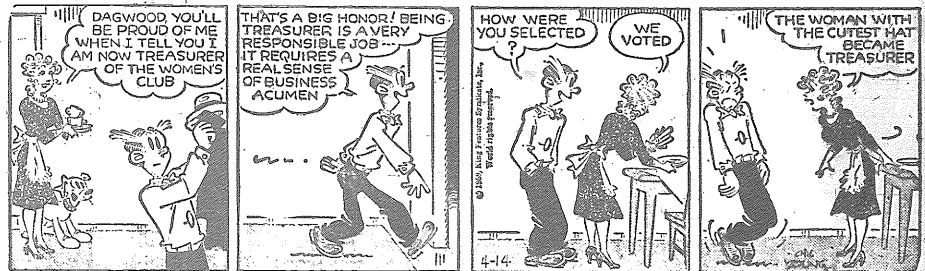

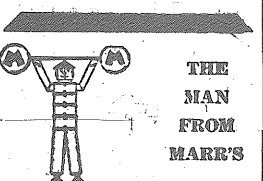

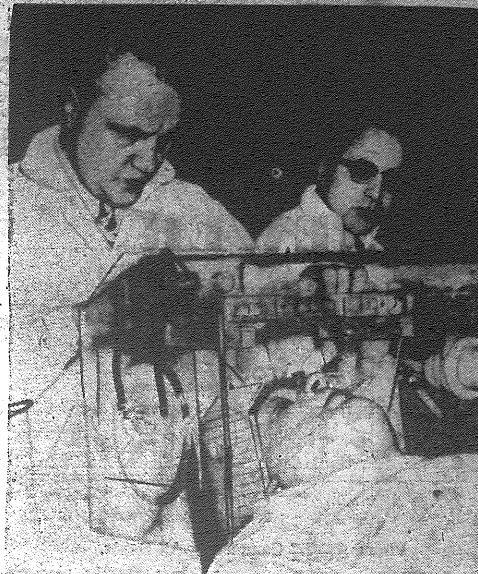

DEEP OPERATION WITHOUT KNIFE



Prof. Lars Leskell, left, and an assistant adjust a shield in Uppsala, Sweden, before performing the first brain operation without opening the skull. Prof. Leskell used the American-invented "atomic knife" method in which he severed two nerve tracts in the brain of a man 55 with a powerful beam of protons from a syncho-cyclotron. The operation was performed by television to keep the doctors away from the atomic radiation.

Dollars For Cancer Research

Cancer research is on the march. The world never before has seen so many brilliant minds employed on a single health problem. The Canadian Cancer Society alone, through voluntary contributions from the public, is supporting more than 100 scientists in research centers throughout the country. The objective of all these scientists is to find a way of saving the lives of the 22,000 men, women and children who now die each year of cancer. There has been a marked change in the attitude of scientists about cancer in recent years. The president of the Canadian Cancer Society has put it this way: "Not so long ago young scientists seemed to see over the door of a cancer laboratory, the familiar words—'Abandon Hope All Ye Who Enter Here.' Today there is hope. Hundreds of young scientists trained since the war are in cancer research. There is a feeling of urgency in the scientific community that is new and unique. Enough of the dust of ages of ignorance has been swept away to reveal the scope and the size of the cancer problem—and how it may well be solved."

Many millions of dollars have been spent on cancer research since the Canadian Cancer Society launched the first major attack in 1949, when it undertook the responsibility for raising funds for the National Cancer Institute of Canada's research programme. Since that time it has provided more than \$5,000,000 for cancer research. It has been a profitable investment, for between them these two volunteer agencies have established cancer research on a firm basis

in Canada. Research has vastly improved, and expanded methods of treatment and diagnosis of cancer. Scientists are now at the point where they can chart an all-out attack on cancer. And they are pinpointing immediate targets. Do viruses cause cancer in Man? Some are known to in animals, and in humans the search goes on. What is the relationship of hormones to cancer? Scientists now know a relationship exists. They are investigating, too, the question of possible natural and acquired resistance to cancer; and they are studying thousands of chemicals to find some that will control cancer growth.

The National Cancer Institute has given fair warning that as more facilities become available and more scientists are attracted to the programme more money MUST be provided for cancer research. The Canadian Cancer Society accepts this challenge and passes it on to the Canadian public.

The local drive for funds will be held Wednesday, April 15th.

basement and connect it with sewer, water and gas; Mr. G. S. McMillan registering a complaint respecting the use of property in the area lying to the south of eighth St. S. and East of Sixth Ave. for the accommodation of trailers and suggesting that consideration might be given to prohibiting the use of property in that area; Builders Kenora Ltd., making application for a 10-year lease (renewal of their option for a further period of 10 years) on 100' x 100' or such lesser portion as may be acceptable, provided that a minimum of 60' frontage is made available along the water front on First Avenue South and running westerly from the West Limit of Fourth Avenue South projected southerly, which area the applicants propose to fill for off-street parking and the establishing of the provided dock to serve their lake customers, and indicating compliance with the regulations in respect to any building erected in the said area.

A letter of the Planning and Development Dept. of Ontario acknowledging the Clerk's letter to the Dept. respecting the Kenora Public School Board's requirements of land in the proposed new sub-division and informing that the revision plan of the sub-division has been prepared and will be available shortly for local approval.
