# KEEWATIN COUNCIL PASSES TRAFFIC BY-LAW

The regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Keewatin was held Monday, April 13th, 1959 with Mayor Walter Hodgkinson presiding.

A letter from the Department of Transport dealing with the present speed limit on the Trans-Canada Highway through the Town of Keewatin and the recommendation that a by-law providing for a revision of speed limits be given consideration received considerable discussion. Council recommended that the speed limit from the west boundary of the town to the western entrance to the town proper be 40 miles per hour and the limit from the western entrance through to the eastern boundary be 30 miles per hour, and instructed the Clerk to advise the Department of Transport of their decision.

The clerk was instructed to renew the insurance coverage on the telephone office contents as covered by the Eclipse Insurance Agency for a further period of one year. Mayor W. Hodgkinson

and Councillor L. Francis were delegated to represent this municipality on the zone committee of the Northwestern Ontario Development Association for the years 1959-1960. A communication from the Department of Labour relative to the annual inspection of boilers which had been completed was referred to the Board of Works. The chairman advised Council the faulty boiler will be replaced by an auxiliary boiler now on hand.

A communication from the District of Kenora Municipal Association re the Eighteenth Annual Convention to be held in Keewatin May 22nd and 23rd next was received and considerable discussion resulted pertaining to the finalizing of arrangements. The application from Mr. A. G. Mackie for the purchase of part of the south end of Tenth Street was referred to the Finance Committee for their study.

A telegram from The Minister of Municipal Affairs relative to new regulations concerning School Grants was moved filed.

Advice was received from the District of Kenora, Magistrate's Court as to the fines during the month of February and a cheque for \$53.28 was enclosed to cover this corporation's portion. ## 3.2 Inches Of Snow Most Welcome

You can't prove it by most people, but last night's snowfall was most welcome by many people. Talking with the man who keeps track of water levels and such, he said this morning: "I am quite happy with the snowfall. It measured 3.2 inches and brought the season's total to 62.7 inches, or just about average."

The spokesman for the Water Resources branch added that the accepted average is 10 inches of snow equals 1 inch of rainfall. However, last night's fall was exceptionally wet, and might be in the nature of one eighth water. Powerhouses on the Winnipeg River, which are using about 9,000 cu. ft. of water per second this month, require all the water which the Lake of the Woods can deliver. The snow was welcome to Forestry officials who have to worry about tree hazards after snow leaves the bush and prior to nature's green protective mantle.

The level of the Lake this morning at Kenora and Keewatin was 1057.20 feet, or up two inches since the first of this month, and up 2 1/2 inches from the year's low of 1056.93 in February.

## Gov't Making Arrangements For Magnetic Survey

In answer to an enquiry made by the Federal M.P. for this district, W. M. "Bill" Benidickson, to the Deputy Minister of the Dept. of Mines and Technical Surveys concerning Ottawa government appropriations for 1959-60 for this survey in the Province of Ontario, more particularly the constituency of Kenora-Rainy River, the following information has been received from the Deputy Minister.

"We are currently making arrangements with the Ontario Government for a combined aeromagnetic survey operation in the Kenora-Rainy River districts in 1959-60. The greater portion of the costs for the operation to be borne by the province of Ontario. The Canadian Government will then be responsible for the follow-up geological investigations in 1960-61 and 1961-62."

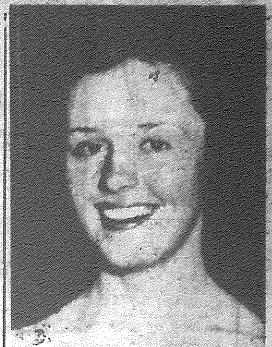
# LESLIE BODGER WINS COVETED TUDOR TROPHY

Leslie Bodger, Kenora's talented young musician, won the acclaim of the British adjudicators at the Winnipeg Music Festival and the coveted Tudor Trophy. The winning of this trophy climaxed a series of wins for this young singer who prior to the Tudor Trophy competition held Friday evening in the auditorium, had won three first awards and one second place in various classes of this festival, known as the largest competitive festival in the world.

Friday afternoon Leslie won the Operatic Solo Class. Last Tuesday she placed first in the Sacred Solo with 86 marks; was first in the Mezzo Soprano Class and second in the Folk Song competition. Last night she competed in a class made up of winners of male and female vocal classes.

The winning of the Tudor Trophy also marks a first for Kenora, since this is the very first time a major Manitoba Festival trophy has ever come to this town, if not the first time it has ever gone outside the Province of Manitoba.

**Employment Improves**

OTTAWA — Job opportunities have improved in a number of Canadian industries. In recent months, the bureau of statistics said,

It touched on this in a routine monthly statement showing that the usual post-Christmas decline in industrial employment was a little less severe last January than in some previous years. "Data supplied by establishments covered in the monthly survey suggests that the underlying employment situation in a number of industries has improved in recent months," the bureau said.

"For example, employment in trade declined less from December to January this winter than in the winters of 1956-57 and 1957-58."

The bureau's statement dealt only with industrial workers.

Last March 23 the bureau and the labor department said in a joint statement that Canadian employment generally rose and unemployment declined during February. Unemployment at February 21 was estimated at 537,000, down 1,000 from a month earlier and down 26,000 from 563,000 a year earlier.

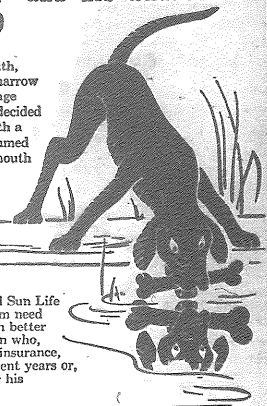

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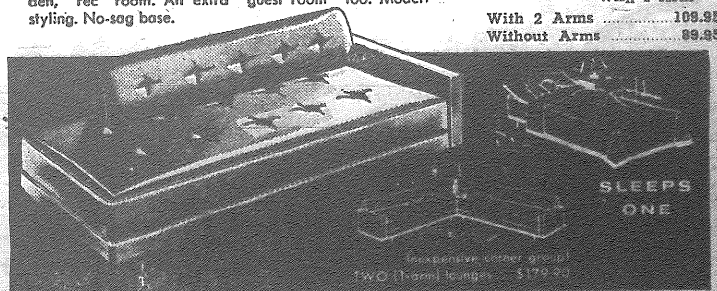

Wade was wearing a raincoat so Baron couldn't see his uniform.

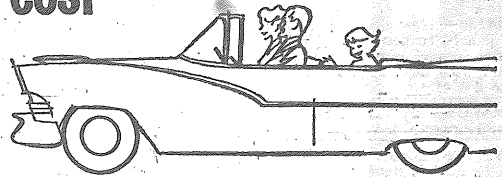

**Opens Fourth Home  
 For Unwed Mothers**

**MONTREAL** — A young  
 nun from Sherbrooke, Que., has  
 founded her fourth home for un-  
 married mothers here as a centre  
 to help girls from upper- class  
 Canadian families.

Sister St. Mechilde of the  
 Roman Catholic Misericordia Or-  
 der said the home can accom-  
 modate only eight but it fills a  
 big void in social service.

She said it was to help girls  
 "from substantial families who  
 would normally send the girls off  
 to Europe or somewhere out of  
 the country until the babies were  
 born."

"Sending these confused,  
 frightened young women to a  
 place where they know no one—  
 not even the language—at a time  
 when affection, understanding  
 and family backing is desperately  
 needed can be doubly terrifying."

**STANDARDS LOWER**

She said when the girls are  
 sent to Europe their children are  
 given up for adoption to  
 European agencies and this fur-  
 ther hurts the mother's peace of  
 mind because European adoption  
 standards are far lower than  
 Canada's.

"But if the child is given up  
 for adoption here the mother is  
 assured that it will be well cared  
 for and placed in a good home  
 and this helps her along psy-  
 chologically."

The new home, located in Mon-  
 treal's outskirts, is financed by  
 the families of the girls admitted.  
 The other three homes set up by  
 Sister St. Mechilde are supported  
 by the province—the girls pay  
 nothing.

The program at the new home  
 also differs from those at the  
 other homes, said Sister St.  
 Mechilde.

"It has less planned activity  
 and more privacy since most of  
 the girls admitted have travelled  
 a lot, are well - educated and,  
 often, successful career women."

There are no nuns at the home.  
 It is staffed by two lay hostesses  
 who are trained nurses and social  
 workers with knowledge of psy-  
 chology.

The Misericordia Order op-  
 erates a hospital here but Sister

St. Mechilde said the girls can  
 have the hospital of their choice  
 for deliveries.

"We take girls from every  
 religion, too," said she. "And the  
 decision to keep the child or give  
 it up for adoption is left entirely  
 to the girls."

The centre is named after  
 Rosalie Jette, the founder of the

### MONGREL WAR HEROINE DIES AT 18

ILFORD, England—An 18-year-old British war heroine who had the tip of her nose shot off in combat lay buried Friday in the national pets' cemetery.

Taps were sounded Thursday for Tich, a mongrel warrior who served as a mascot for the British 8th Army in North Africa, Italy, and Austria in the

Second World War.

For five years, the little black lady rode into battle perched on the hood of an army truck carrying her master, rifleman Tommy Walker.

She was wounded five times helping Walker evacuate casualties of the King's Royal Rifle Corps. In 1943, a shell fragment blasted off part of her nose.

Walker won the Military Medal for bravery. Tich gained the Dickin Medal, highest award for animals.

Tich and her master were demobilized together in 1945. They retired to civilian life in

northern England.

Walker, 45, wept as the little canine coffin was lowered into the ground of the pets' cemetery in suburban London.

The puppy he had bought for a few pennies in Egypt was gone, but she had left her mark on the British army.

Tich took time off from combat to mother 50 puppies of various mixed breeds. Many are following in mother's paw-prints as army mascots.

He let Shannon off with a warning.

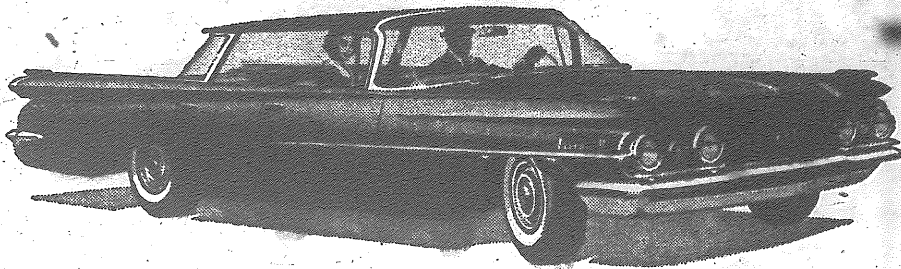
### WILL AUCTION HISTORICAL DOCUMENTS

LONDON — Several valuable documents concerning the early history of Canada will be auctioned Monday by Sotheby's of London at a sale of Americana. One of the most interesting items is a copy of John Florie's translation of Jacques Cartier's account of his first two voyages to the east coast of Canada in 1534 and 1536-37, the earliest recorded explorations of the gulf and river of St. Lawrence.

Only six other copies of the translation, published in London in 1890, are known to exist. One is in the British museum, the other five are in public libraries in the United States.

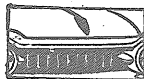
In his introduction, Florie urged the establishment of an English colony in Canada to facilitate the discovery of a northwest passage to Asia.

## REPORT

**PERCHANCE A RAY OF LIGHT?**

On Tuesday and Wednesday of this week (April 14 and 15) a delegation from Northwestern Ontario, headed by Mr. Black of the Northwestern Ontario Chambers of Commerce and joined by Albert Wren, Clare Mapledoram and George Wardrope met with the Government on several vital problems of many years standing. As a result of the pressing representations the Minister of Planning and Development set up a Committee of Government service which will meet at the Lakehead on April 23rd, there to confer with interested people all across Northwestern Ontario and with the four Members of the Legislature. The five main points of emphasis were: 1. Effect of freight rates; 2. Raw material for secondary forest industry; 3. Reciprocal licensing of transport vehicles with Western Provinces; 5. Completion of Trans Canada Highway.

For the first time in history the Province sent a representation headed by the Provincial Treasurer to support N.W. Ontario protests against freight rate applications. With your approval I have pressed this for a long time.

Premier Frost asserted in no uncertain terms that secondary industries (tie plants, treating plants, sawmills, etc.) would be assured of raw material despite the fact that the entire North is contained within pulp and paper company limits.

Immediate study will be made of Manitoba's plan to aid small industry. This is important to our tourist industry. We have achieved recognition of the fact that this industry needs help for capital outlay. We are not getting near the share of travel trade we should be getting because we haven't sufficient of the right kind of accommodation. The state of the travel industry, dollar wise to Ontario is not good. It must be improved. It can be done best by financial aid to those in the business.

An early announcement was promised by the Minister of Transport about reciprocal licensing to spur traffic through our part of Ontario to the west instead of through the U.S.A.

All delegates forcefully pointed out the need to get busy on the Trans-Canada Highway from the Lakehead west.

**CLOSE LIASON**

I work in close liason with the Government and these delegations on matters of importance to our country. There is no opportunity lost to "gain the best for the most" and I am pleased that much of my speech material in the House on Northern Affairs is to be used by the Government committee. I shall continue to work hard to bring northwestern Ontario into its own.

**AERIAL MAGNETOMETER SURVEY**

The Minister of Mines has announced a vast program of aerial survey of the Patricia section to reveal likely areas of prospecting. The joint effort will cost about \$400,000. These aerial surveys do not find minerals or tell you what is there; it does show up the best place to look for commercial orebodies. Once likely areas show up roads will be built in to expedite exploration.

**TENDER CALLS GOING OUT**

Start on highways work outlined in my report about the 1959 highways program is evident. Tenders are called for paving east and west of Vermilion Bay and for crushed gravel for

grade work north on 105. Within a very few weeks the whole program will be in operation, the Minister of Highways assures me. It will not be necessary to make "announcements" as I have already outlined the program to you, except for any major additions to the program.

**ACCESS ROADS PROGRAM MOVES ON**

Tenders are out for work on the Minaki road and for the connecting link between Ignace and Savant Lake area. Additional extensions from the Lac Seul access out of Sioux Lookout awaits

agreement between the two governments and Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company on details and routes. The access roads committee met this week on these problems.

**MUNICIPAL TAXES MOVE UP**

Despite added grants to schools and to municipalities VERY FEW municipal taxpayers in Ontario will enjoy lower taxes. You cannot expect relief until a proper re-allocation of responsibilities are worked out from the Dominion-Provincial level and then passed down to municipal government.

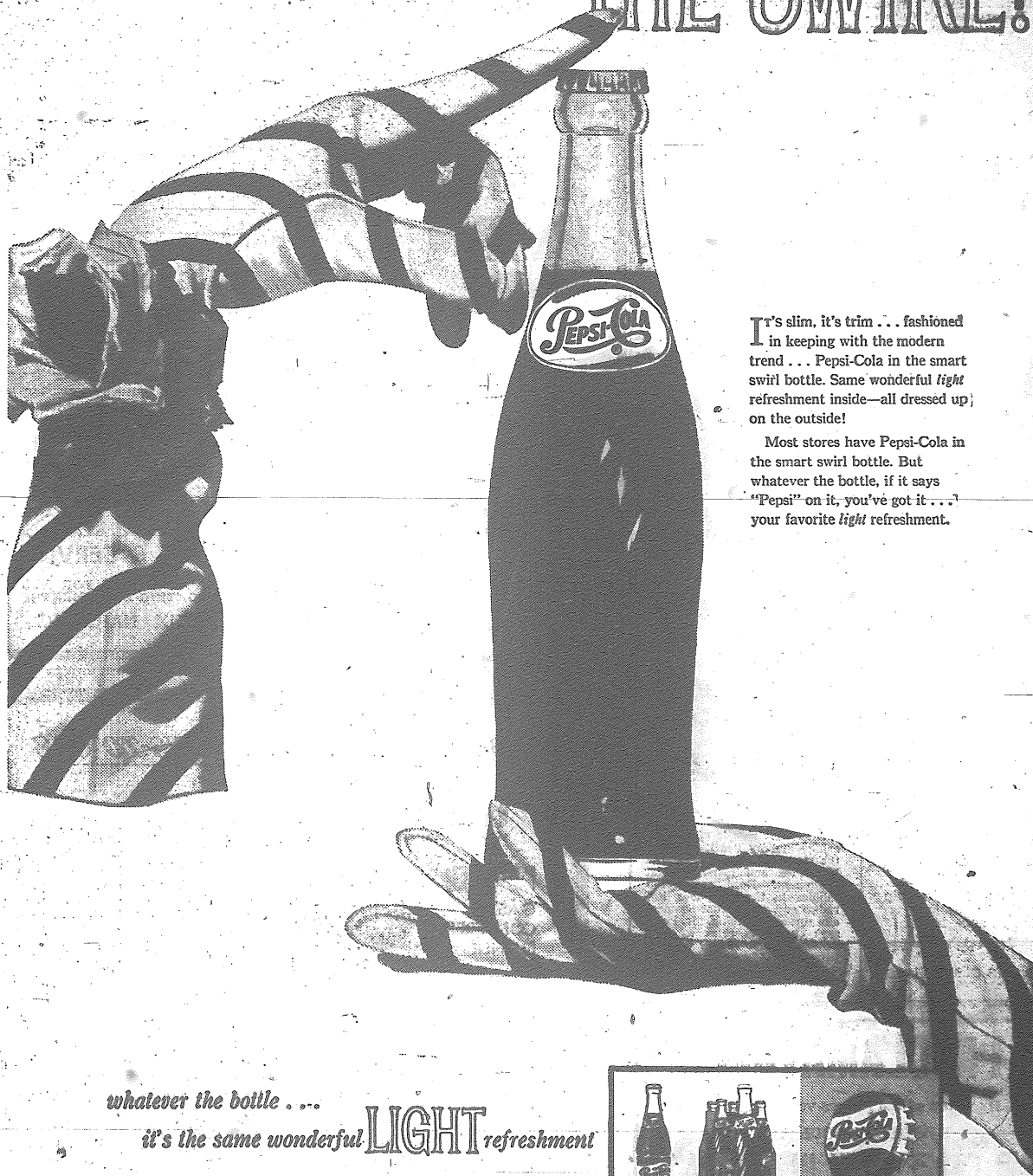

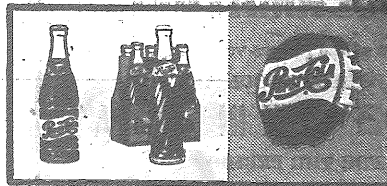

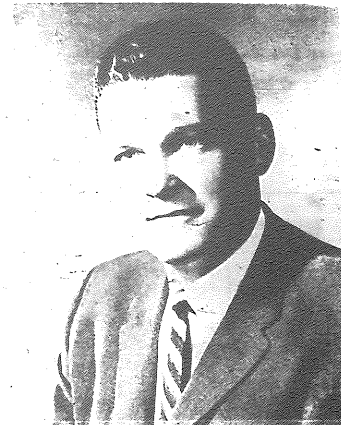

## TUBE REVEL AIRED IN COMMONS

LONDON — The case of the wayward subway train chugged into the House of Commons Thursday.

Labour members protested the impromptu drinking party staged last month by 200 of the society set in a subway car.

No arrests were made. Police ejected the celebrants — debutantes, students and army officers in civilian dress — after they swigged champagne, shouted, sang, fought and finally pressed the emergency button to bring the train to an unscheduled stop.

Ernest Forgybough declared the fracas brought "great embarrassment and inconvenience to the law-abiding travelling public."

Former Labourite defence minister Emanuel Shinwell asked whether the subway system's bosses were allowing such incidents to occur without making any protest.

A government spokesman said city police did not patrol the subway system, which has its own police and did not call in the "bobbies" on this occasion.

## FINDS POEM AFTER SEARCH FOR 50 YEARS

MEAFORD, Ont. (CP)—It took 50 years but F. Stanley Knight of Meaford, Ont. has the complete version of a poem that has haunted him all that time.

An advertisement in the personal column of the Toronto Globe and Mail produced the answer to the problem that had baffled him for half a century.

Mr. Knight in his advertisement offered a reward of \$100 for the complete poem which included these lines:

"Lord know the heart of those  
who prate  
Afraid to dare or spend.  
Declining to a narrower state  
More easy to defend.  
Not this the watchword of our  
sires,  
Who breathed the ocean's  
breath.  
Not this our spirit's ancient  
fear,  
Which sought could quench  
his death."

"I first read those lines about 50 years ago, but they were all I could remember," Mr. Knight said Wednesday. "Today a lady in Eastern Ontario, who saw the ad, called me and she had the complete poem."

The poem was written by Archdeacon Frederick George Scott of Quebec, who died in 1944. The Anglican clergyman, who was senior chaplain of the Canadian Expeditionary Force in the First World War, also was a prominent Canadian poet.

With or Without Nut Meats  
Sift: 1 cup Sugar. Beat until light: 6 egg yolks. Add the su-

gar gradually and beat these ingredients until they are very light and creamy. Add: 1 teaspoon vanilla, or ½ teaspoon grated lemon rind. Roll graham crackers until they are very fine. Combine and add to the egg mixture: 1 cup graham cracker crumbs, 1 teaspoon any baking powder. Add: (1 cup chopped English walnut meats). Whip un-

til stiff but not dry: 6 egg whites, ¼ teaspoon salt.

Fold them lightly into the cake batter. Bake the cake in an ungreased 9 inch tube pan, or in 3 layer pans, in a moderate oven 330 deg. Place a cooked cake filling between the layers.

(4 Servings)  
Place in pressure cooker:  
3 tablespoons bacon fat or

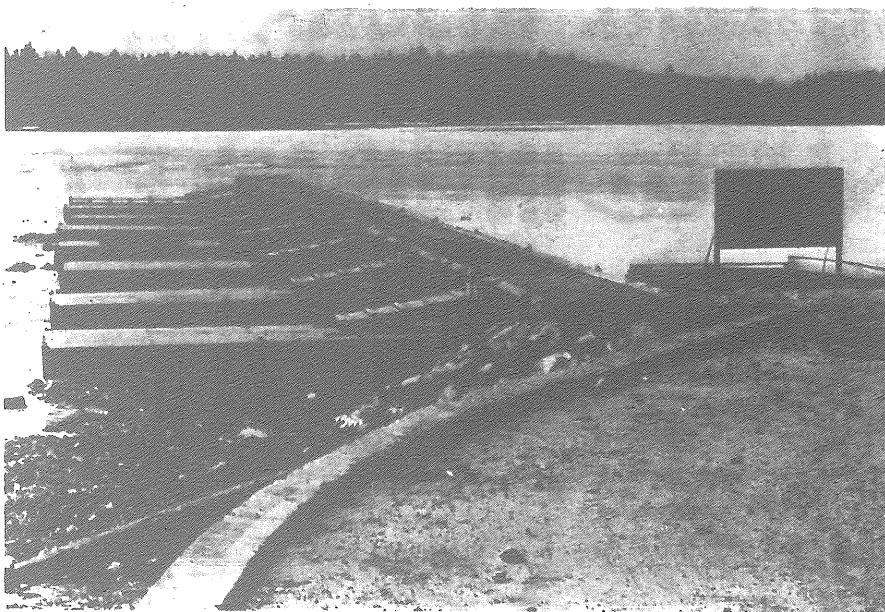

Authorization to place the usual advertising in the Kenora-Keewatin District High School Annual Year Book was granted. A cheque covering a grant in lieu of taxes under Section 5 of the Municipal Grants Act was received. A letter from the Secretary of the Ladies' Auxiliary Kenora General Hospital requesting that May 13th, 1959 be proclaimed Hospital Day was received and the request granted. A report covering receipts and expenses of the Kenora Music Festival Association (Drama Section) was received and the usual grant of \$15.00 was authorized, in aid of that Association's 1959 Festival.

A request from the Keewatin Citizen's Credit Union Limited requesting that Council consider the erection of a sidewalk in front of their office was referred to the chairman of the Board of Works Committee.

Council was advised of the intention of the Municipal Memorial Building Committee to abolish the present position of Caretaker and to provide the Manager with an increase in salary in an effort to reduce the operating expenses. The above mentioned increase will be provided to compensate the Manager for the additional duties and expenses which he may experience. Authorization was given their recommendation for the installation of a counter for the kitchen adjacent to the auditorium, a Public Address system, and a three compartment sink as required by the Liquor Control Board of Ontario in connection with banquet permits which authorize the sale of beverages in the auditorium. Repairs to the two billiard tables on the main floor was also authorized. The Chairman of the Board of Works advised the drain on Ottawa Street which carries the flow from Sixth Street has been completed. The man-holes for these two drains will be completed in the near future. The street cleaning has been completed throughout the municipality with the exception of very few of the side streets and this should be completed shortly. Numerous holes in the roads have been filled temporarily and as soon as material is available a permanent repair will be completed. Drainage south of Lake Street was referred to the Board of Works as well as the required repair to some sidewalks.

Council was unanimous in their decision to maintain the Parking Lot adjacent to the Municipal Memorial Building for free Municipal Parking not to exceed 8 hours. An increase in salary of the two police officers effective March 16th, 1959 was granted and Mr. S. J. Lough was appointed Relief Constable. Chairman of the Light and Telephone Committee advised of the progress made regarding the proposed street lighting plan and the extension of the telephone exchange. Numerous accounts totalling \$93,982.70 were received and authorized to be paid.

Due to the high cost of the maps available from the Aerial Survey Co. Ltd., the quotations enclosed were moved filed. The Clerk was authorized to make the necessary transfer of the east half of lots 10, 11 and 12, Block 11, Plan 18 to Mr. A. Quinn for the sum of \$250.00. Numerous

other applications for property were referred to the Finance Committee for their investigation and recommendation. A Monthly statement was received from the Manager of the Municipal Memorial Building for the information of Council and another from the Manager of the Memorial Arena for the 1958-1959 Season.

In the year ending March 31, 1959, the CBC will have a deficit estimated at \$42 million.

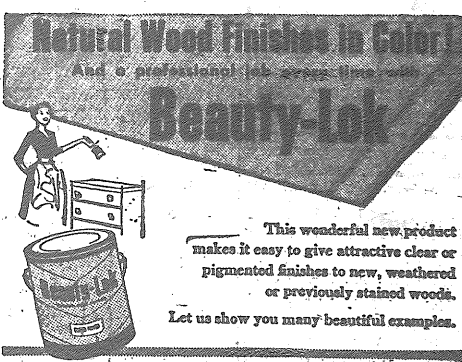

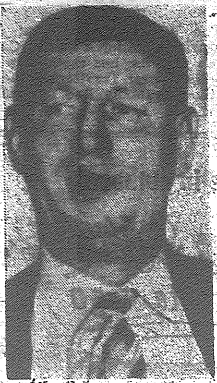

**EXTERNAL TRADE**

Canada's commodity export trade in February was marked by a mixture of substantial increases and decreases for some of the leading commodities, and by increases to the United States and United Kingdom, but decreases in totals to other Commonwealth countries, Europe and Latin America. Net result was a small decline in total value for the month. Final figures on imports for 1958 show a decline of 8% in value from 1957 and vol-

ume, with average prices narrower, higher, down only a little less. The decrease was all in the first nine months, imports in the final quarter rising about 4%.

**PRICES**

The consumer price index declined by 0.2% during February to 125.5, making the fourth successive decrease from the peak of 126.3 at the first of November. All of the month's decrease was due to lower food prices. Since November this index has fallen 2.6%. Price index of 30 basic industrial materials rose 1% during the three weeks ending March 20.

**MANUFACTURING**

Steel output in the week ended April 4 eased downward a little to 105,134 tons of ingots from

106,712 tons the previous week for a rate of 86.6% of capacity. Production for the first three months was nearly 23% larger than last year. Number of motor vehicles turned out by Canadian plants in the first quarter was 15% larger this year than last. More refrigerators and freezers were both produced and shipped in February than a year ago. Sales of paints and varnishes in the months were 8% higher.

**MERCHANDISING**

Department stores had a sales gain of more than 10% in February, with increases in all regions except the Atlantic Provinces and all except two of 29 specified Departments. Motor vehicle sales in January were up 4.5% in number of units and almost 10% in value. British and European ve-

hicles accounted for all of the rise in number of units with a gain of 36.5%. Total retail sales in January were 6% above last year's.

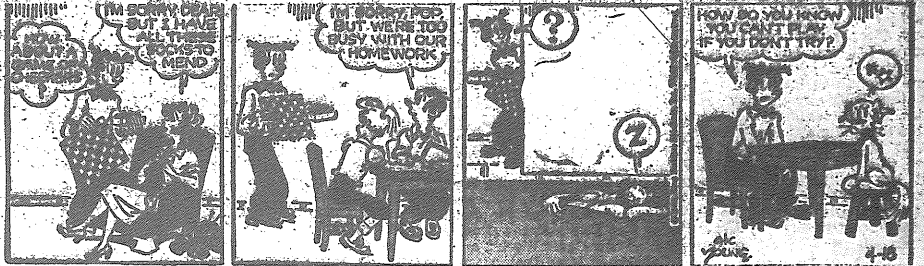
**MINING**

Natural gas sales increased more than a fifth in quantity during 1958 with biggest gains in Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba. Sales of manufactured gas dropped to a third the previous year. A sharp rise in February put asbestos shipments for the first two months well above last year.

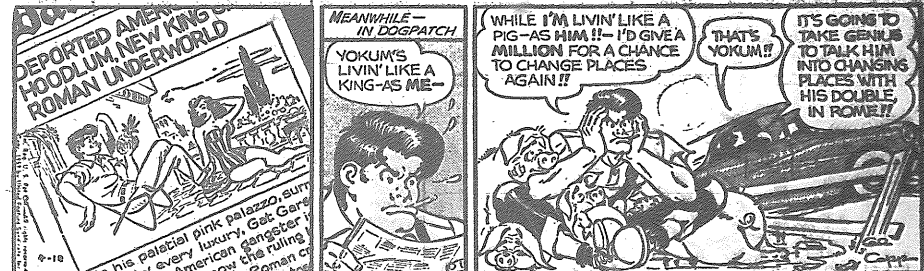
