## A Link With The Past

Frank Schilling of 118 Rupert Road found a token, Monday, which proved to be a real link with the history of the early Kenora days.

He was digging his garden and dug up what he thought was a nickle. At the second look he found out that it was a coin made of copper. This urged him to wash the object to get a good look at it. The supposed nickle turned out to be a token from the old King Edward Hotel of Kenora which burned to the ground in 1917.

The King Edward Hotel was built where the telephone office is today and took in the space where the Salvation Army Citadel is located.

The coin bore the words, King Edward on one side and on the other side the numeral "5" in the centre, surrounded by leaves and underneath the words, "Good for Five in Trade."

It seems in the old days if you played a game of pool you received a token which entitled the bearer to three free drinks at the Hotel bar, or if you bowled you received a token entitling you to five free drinks.

The King Edward Hotel was a rather fine home away from home that boasted of 45 comfortable rooms and the proprietor was Tom Welsh. The year 1917 was not a good year for the hotel business in Kenora or we should perhaps say it was a disastrous

year for hotels as three of them were destroyed by fire. They were the King Edward, the Central and the Hilliard.

Mr. Alf Lavoie of Pinecrest supplied some of this history of former Kenora hotels.

## John Black, 86, Resident Since 1899 Died Monday

John Black, beloved husband of Rose Jane Black, of 615-First Street South Kenora and a resident of this town since 1899, died suddenly at the Kenora General Hospital, Monday afternoon, April 20th. Born in Casterville Ontario, February 10, 1874, he was in his 86th year.

He received his education in Eastern Ontario and came west as a young lad. He worked in Winnipeg for a short time prior to coming to Kenora. He joined the services of the CPR as an Engineer in October, 1899 and retired March 1, 1939. He was a member of the B. of L. E. Pequona Lodge No. 414, A.F. and A.M., was a member of Knox United Church and of the Board of Stewards of his church.

He is survived by his widow, the former Rose Jane Nichol; one son Gordon of Mount Royal, Que-

bec; one daughter, Mrs. A. J. (Ethel) Bingham of Cleveland, Ohio and two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Wilson of Victoria B.C. and Mrs. Florence Norwick of Buffalo, New York.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Thursday afternoon, April 23rd at two o'clock. Rev. R. J. Leighton of Knox United Church will officiate and interment will be in the family plot, Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

## Additional Rural Mail Service For Keewatin Residents

As a result of some enquiries directed to W. M. "Bill" Bendickson MP for Kenora - Rainy River, regarding the placement of "group boxes" on the rural route No. 1 at Keewatin, to serve a number of Keewatin residents living within the town limits and one-half distant from the post-office, the Member had been informed by the Director of Postal Operations, Mr. Sarto Chartrand, that authorization has been given for the provision and placement of five units, which will serve some fifty families.

Units will be placed at three locations, two groups of two and one of one unit. These will be serviced by the rural courier as they are placed and occupied. Persons who signed the petitions will be assigned individual boxes by the postmaster at Keewatin. This service will eliminate the need for residents to walk through all weather conditions to conduct postal business, and it would be remembered that the courier carries stamps and also picks up mail at each box.

Residents who have been expecting placement of group boxes should be advised that much of this equipment has to be made as it had only been standard postal equipment within the last three years, and several other locations throughout Canada are also to be served.

## Leslie Wilson, Former Editor Died At Coburg

Word has been received in Kenora of the passing of Mr. Leslie Wilson, former resident and editor of the Miner and News. The death occurred at Coburg Ontario on Friday, April 17th. He was 76 years old.

The late Mr. Wilson came to Kenora in 1941 and left to reside in Coburg some six years later. He was married in 1944 to the former Mrs. Millie Brown of Kenora who survives him.

Prior to coming to Kenora, the late Mr. Wilson was editor and owner of the Coburg Sentinel-Star. He operated the paper until 1930 when it was sold to the Mundy Printing Company of Oshawa.

Funeral services and interment took place in Coburg.

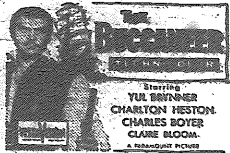

Here and There—

Manufacturing:  
Estimated value of manufacturers' shipments in February was 2% above the revised January figure and 6% above that for February last year. In the two previous years the February value was down from January but in the five years earlier was higher by an average of 4%. Cumulative shipments for January and February were 2.4% below the year-earlier value, and the value of new orders 6% greater. Steel ingot output moved upward in the week ended April 11 to 88.2% of rated capacity . . . Shipments of most major concrete products were larger this year than last in the first two months . . . Production of refined petroleum products was about one-seventh larger in January this year.

Mining:  
Iron ore shipments in February continued the up-surge of January with a gain to treble last year's, raising the two-month total to more than twice the 1958 figure.

Merchandising:  
Department store sales in March were about 2% above March last year, and showed a 5% gain in the week April 4 . . . Shopping centres rose in number to 91 in 1957 (latest year available) from 64 in 1956 and number of stores in these centres to 1,289 from 898. Sales of shopping centre stores accounted for 3.6% of the total sales of the kinds of stores located in these centres.

Education:  
Current revenue of public school boards across Canada was 13% larger in 1956 than 1955 and expenditures from current revenues rose a like percentage. Two-year increases were 25% and 27%, respectively.

Transportation:  
Railway carloadings in March were more than 2% larger than a year earlier, leaving the three-month total about 500 cars smaller at 828,516 cars . . . Net deliveries of oil through Canadian pipe lines during January increased nearly 12% over January

last year to a record total of 28,159,769 barrels . . . Urban transit systems had almost 2% fewer passengers in February this year than last, but their total revenue was larger.

The combined income of Canadians engaged in manufacturing in 1958 was just under \$5 billion, or about 31 per cent of all Canadian wages, salaries and supplementary labour income for the year.

To accommodate ocean-going freighters that will make use of the new St. Lawrence Seaway the Welland Canal is being deepened from 23 to 25 feet, depth of the Canadian Sault Ste. Marie Canal is just over 18 feet.

Campbellsville, Ky. — Nature has blessed the rural Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church with a supplement to the collection plate.

An oil well on the church property produces 300 barrels daily. The church received \$8,500 for

the lease and gets one-eighth of the production.

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## LET'S TALK CARS

### HOW TO FIX A STICKING STOPLIGHT SWITCH

If you've ever had the stoplight switch stick on your car you know that it can quickly discharge the battery . . . and even result in a towing charge. So, today I thought I'd give you a few pointers on how to fix a sticking stoplight switch just in case you ever have this problem in the future.



The switch is often located under the hood at the base of the steering column or on the dash. Actuated by the hydraulic fluid line, it's usually a small 1-inch hexagon-shaped block into which two electrical wires are inserted. Before replacing the switch with a new one, remove one of the wires to break the circuit to the stoplights.

Next, tap the body of the switch lightly several times with a pair of pliers or a screw-driver handle . . . and replace the wires. Then, if the lights still don't work properly check the wiring to make sure there aren't any bare wires . . . and make sure that the mounting is secure.

After doing this tap the body of the switch again . . . and then try the lights again. If they still don't go off and on when you work the brake pedal remove the wires and tie them out of the way so there won't be a short circuit. Unscrew the stoplight switch, and replace it with a new one. Then all you have to do is plug in the two wires and the repair job is done.

I hope this information will be of some help to you sometime, because not only can a sticking stoplight switch be dangerous it can result in unnecessary repairs. 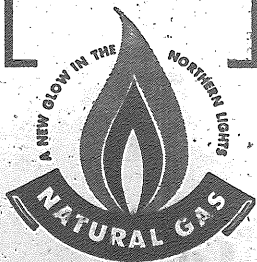

## New Stamp To Mark Queen's Visit

The Honourable William Hamilton, Postmaster General, today announced the design of a new postage stamp to be issued in honour of the visit of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip to Canada this year. The commemorative stamp will be placed on sale to the public on June 18th, the day on which the Royal Couple will arrive at the airport at Torbay, Newfoundland.

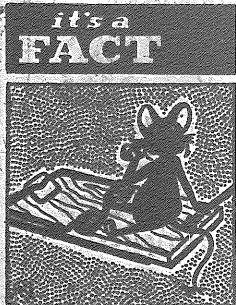
The design of the stamp includes a likeness of Her Majesty taken from the well-known painting by Pietro Annigoni, which was commissioned in 1954 by The Worshipful Company of Fishmongers and which now hangs in their Hall near London Bridge. The dark red stamp is of the five-cent denomination, measures one inch wide and one and one-half inches high, and is printed in vertical format in panes of fifty stamps each.

Seat belts in cars cost money . . . which is one superficially good reason why people do not go for them. Be'ts also take a second or two to buckle into position . . . and many people believe their time too precious to squander in this way. So, by and large, seat belts are not put in very many cars; and those that are installed, are often left unused.

However, the Ontario Safety League would like the public to look a little beyond these two objections to belts, to see if some of the benefits might not outweigh the disadvantages.

### Dive-bombing

## Gulls Outwitted By Artist

ISLAND PARK, N.Y.

This is a story about a man named Jerry Martin and a painter named Gaspare Bua who restored peace and quiet to the Martin household by outwitting some dive-bombing seagulls.

It started a couple of months ago when Jerry Martin built himself an attractive and comfortable dwelling on the south shore of Long Island.

Keyhole channel nearby is a small inland neck of water a few miles from the Atlantic Ocean. The seagulls there have been having a tough time of it for years. The reason:

**FEW HARD SURFACES**

The seagulls promptly tried it out, and it worked fine.

But Martin complained about the noise of all the clams dropping in his roof.

around and offered suggestions to halt the clam-shelling.

The suggestions included such nifty and unfriendly proposals as: (1) put up wind-spining propellers to scare the birds away; (2) put a peak on the roof so the clam shells will bounce off without cracking open; (3) paint the roof with something offensive to the seagulls, and (4) put up a scarecrow.

### ENTER BUA

Bua came into the picture at this time.

Bua proposed that he paint a seascape on the roof of Martin's home. He did, too.

Today, the roof looks like a beach. It has rolling breakers, yellow sand and pale blue sky off in the distance.

The gullible gulls know you can't crack open a clam shell by dropping it on the beach, so they no longer use Martin's roof as their bombing target.

## "Eskimo's" Case More Confusing

EDMONTON —The case of 23-year-old Melvin Beaulieu became more confusing after RCMP and Anglican Church officials said they know nothing of the man.

Beaulieu, who described himself as an Eskimo, was due to arrive here by train Sunday but both the police and the synod office of the Anglican Church said they knew nothing of him.

Beaulieu said at Swastika, Ont., last Thursday that he once was an interpreter at Aklavik, N.W.T., but the northern health services at Edmonton, a federal agency, said they never had heard about him.

A spokesman said Beaulieu is an odd name for an Eskimo and added the name suggests a half-breed.

He added: "It seems strange that an Eskimo or an Indian who would come under the federal department of Indian affairs should be wandering around."

Beaulieu talked to reporters at Swastika after hospital treatment at Stratford. Timmins diocesan headquarters of the Anglican Church gave him a train ticket to Edmonton.

**No Change In Price Of Beer**

Toronto—Ontario beer drinkers were assured today that the price of their favorite beverage would remain unchanged, despite the increase in sales tax contained in the recent federal budget.

R. W. Hillmer, President of Brewers' Warehousing Company Limited, said today that each of

the province's brewing companies had advised him that no price change would be sought at this time.

"The sales tax is traditionally a consumer tax, and is passed along to the public in the form of an increased price," Mr. Hillmer said. "But in this instance the companies have decided to absorb the tax increase. I might point out that the sales tax increase falls particularly heavily on this industry because the tax must be paid not only on the sale price, as is normally done, but on the heavy excise duty as well."

Mr. Hillmer said that whether or not this policy could be maintained would depend on volume of sales.

"Of course it might logically be expected that sales volume will increase as a result of changes in excise duty on alcoholic beverages in the federal budget," he added.

(The budget increased excise duty on liquor, but left the duty on beer untouched. As a result,

hard liquor prices have already been raised substantially.)

"The brewing companies recognize the special need to keep their retail prices as low as possible," Mr. Hillmer said. "This is in line with the long-term policy of the industry."

He pointed out that according to the Government Consumer Price Index the prices of most commodities have increased by 98% since 1939, while the price of beer, excluding taxes, has increased by only 20%.

Mr. Hillmer said that the decision to hold the line had been taken despite heavy cost increases. Since the beginning of World War II the average wage of brewery workers increased by 225%, material costs by 77%.

"In the light of these soaring costs, absorption of the sales tax increase by the individual companies will be an additional financial burden," Mr. Hillmer said. "However, it is hoped that rising sales volume will offset the substantial financial loss on the tax increase."

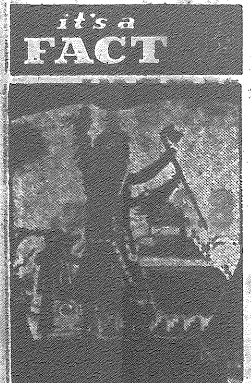

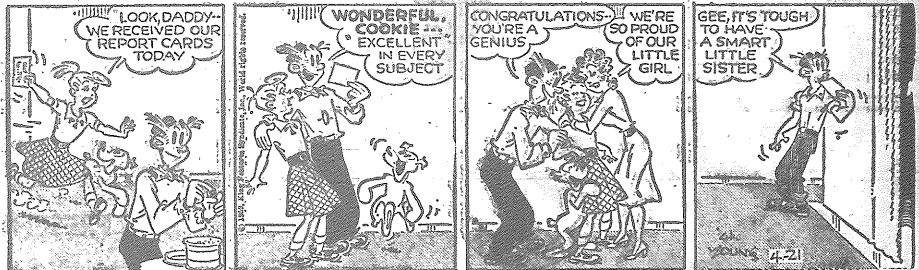

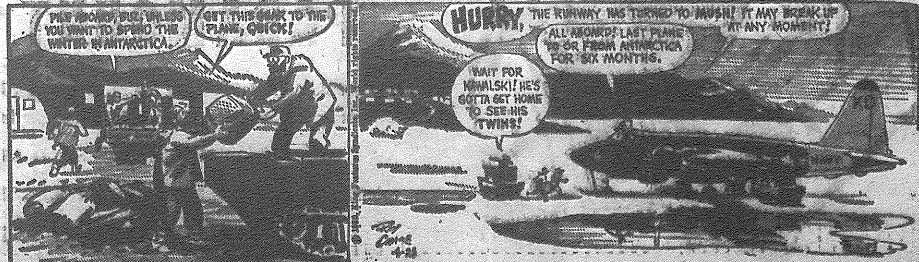

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**Facts About Potato Quality**

Ottawa-Do you want your potato to cook to a dry mealy texture, white or creamy in color and pleasant to the taste, asks H. Davies of the Frederickton Research Station, New Brunswick. The quality table potato, so described can be obtained if you buy the right variety, plant it at the right time, give it the right amount of the right fertilizer, the right kind of insecticide and fungicide, harvest it at the right time and store it at the right temperature.

Of course, the weather could ruin the crop but assume that

the location is somewhere in eastern Canada the weatherman is working for you, here is what you do.

Choose the Keswick, Green Mountain, Netted Gem, Kennebec, Fundy or Avon varieties for high dry matter content and good cooking qualities.

Don't use more than say 1,500 pounds of fertilizer per acre, particularly if it has a high potash content which decreases the dry matter content.

Give the tuber as long a growing season as possible and remember that it matures better if you don't kill the top artificially. A storage temperature of about 40 degrees F. is best for table stock as it gets sweet and soggy under colder conditions. For chip or french fry use, the potato should be stored close to 55 degrees F.

**Girls Can Avert Traffic Accidents**

A gulf of bitterness that can never be crossed flows between many next-door neighbours. The boy from one house killed or mutilated, the girl from the other when she was hurled forward through his windshield. Her parents can never forget, nor forgive.

Yet she may have been partly, even mainly to blame for the crash that took away her youth and scarred the minds of four parents. Many a pretty girl who has never touched a wheel has steered a car to splintering collision.

If a boy is attracted to a girl he feels an overwhelming desire to secure her approval at every possible moment. In a car a natural reaction is to try to excite her admiration for his superior skill and "courage." As long as she keeps up her part in this game, with little gasps and fluttering eyelashes, the danger of serious collision mounts. If she shows she is not impressed by "kid stuff" driving she may avert an accident that could kill or maim several people and permanently destroy the self respect of the boy driver.

Every passenger in a car has a responsibility towards the driver, and all other road users says the Ontario Safety League. A responsibility to see that his own behaviour does not contribute to unnecessary distraction, or tension. 

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




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
