### Free Blood Clinic Needs 1,200 Bottles Weekly

The Red Cross Free Blood Transfusion Service was started in 1950 and, up to the end of December, 1958, had supplied more than 226,000 bottles of blood to more than 140,000 hospital patients in Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario. It is a 24 hour a day, seven days a week service to the hospitals in this area. Someone is on duty at all times at the Red Cross Depot in Winnipeg ready to answer a call for blood.

The transport corps of the service moves the Red Cross mobile clinic from place to place to collect the blood for this free service. The mobile clinics are staffed by specially-trained nurses who take the donation and by a number of nurses aids who care for the donors and who see that all equipment is kept properly antiseptic. A laboratory techni-

cian tests the donors blood before the donation is made and takes charge of all blood after it has been donated.

The voluntary work done by many local ladies is most important in the operation of successful clinics. They provide nursing assistance, registration of donors and take care of the special refreshments given to donors after they have made their donation of blood.

You too can become a volunteer by becoming a blood donor at the clinic to be held on May 5th at the Legion Building.

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**Development  
Committee To Meet  
At Lakehead**

Five senior officials of the Ontario Department of Planning and Development comprise the newly-appointed Northern Ontario Economic Development Committee that will hold hearings at Port Arthur and Fort William next week.

The committee will assess and report on economic problems particular to Northern Ontario, receive suggestions and recommendations from representative groups and act in continuing liaison between these groups and Ontario Government departments.

Appointment of the committee followed last week's conference at Toronto between Government ministers and Northwestern Ontario representatives on the regional economy. The conference itself was an outgrowth of the 1959 presentation of proposals by the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce.

Agenda for the hearings is under preparation and is expected to embrace freight rates, transportation and highways, forest and mining industries, housing and planning, agriculture and marketing, tourism and other

subjects. Regional groups such as the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce, Municipal Association, Development Association, other organizations and spokesmen are expected to submit written or oral recommendations and suggestions.

The committee will meet in Port Arthur, April 28 and 29, at the Prince Arthur Hotel, and in Fort William, April 30 and May 1, at the Royal Edward Hotel. It is emphasized by the committee that its forthcoming four-day visit is a preliminary one during which it hopes to come to grips with some of the overall economic problems on which urgent action seems indicated.

Appointed by Hon. W. M. Nickle, minister of Planning and Development, the committee is a blend of broad experience and leadership in economic develop-

ment and youthful energy with outstanding records in related fields.

Chairman is F. J. Lyle, B.A. Sc., consultant to the department of Planning and Development. Donald E. Holland is assistant to the director, Trade and Industry Branch.

H. F. Crown, supervisor of field officers, Conservation Branch, Planning and Development Department, is a graduate of the Ontario Agricultural College. Donald F. Taylor is chief planner, Community Planning Branch, Department of Planning and Development. Cyril T. C. Armstrong is assistant director and branch engineer of the Housing Branch of the department. J. M. Trowbridge, of the Department of Economics, has been named economic advisor to the committee.

officials, and others who provided material to the pupils for their books."

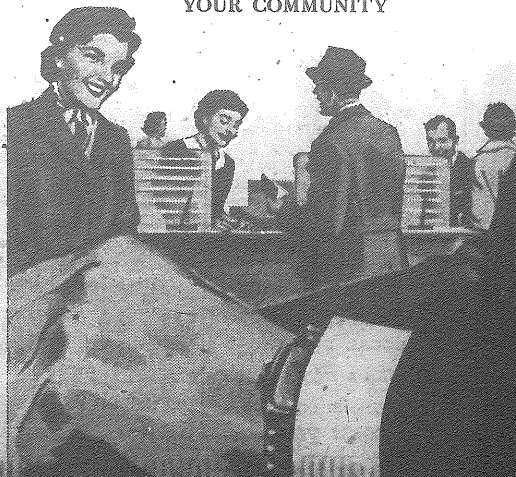

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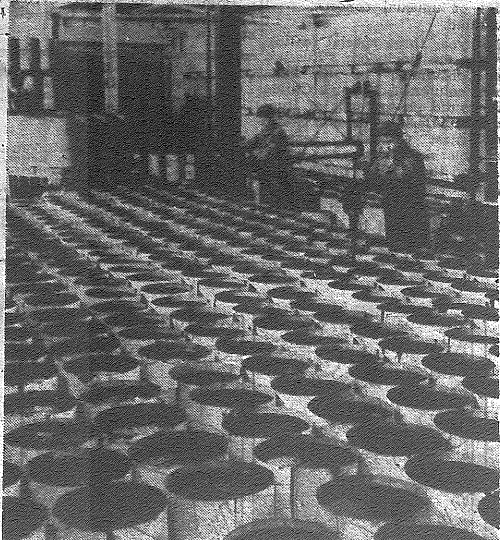

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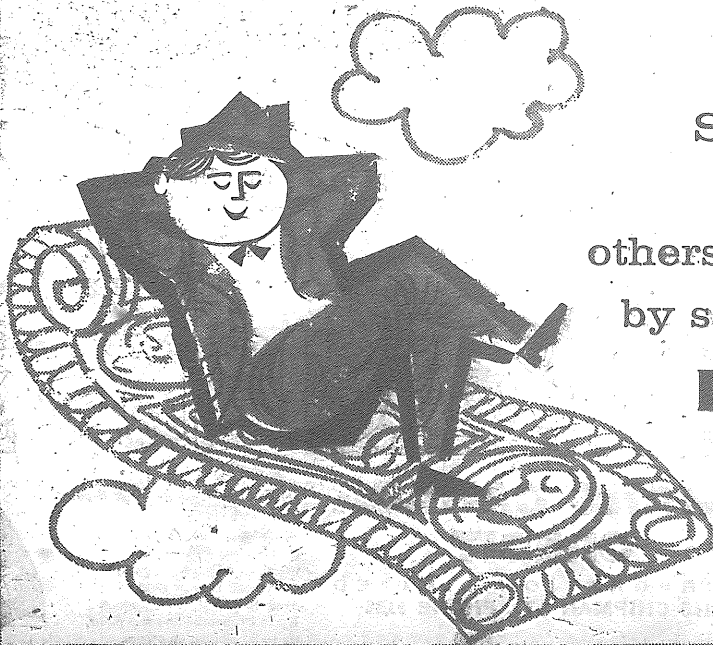
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# Britannica Book Of The Year Has Been Released

Toronto — Canada's economic leap into the place of 4th biggest trading nation, plus her political stature in world matters, is well recognized by the generous space accorded her in the 1959 Britannica Book of the Year, released this week.

This annual encyclopaedia, a million-word alphabetical history of 1959, is the product of about 600 contributing specialists and contains some 1,000 articles. It has more than 500 photographs, charts, maps and cartoons, and almost 1,000 pages.

Items under 'Canada' range from accidents, agriculture, archaeology, arctic to uranium, wheat, wines and zinc. Canadian champion hockey teams (and outstanding players) are recorded; also hospitals, the Geophysical Year, music and the merchant marine. Some 146 main subjects are listed under 'Canada' alone, with numerous other references.

Documented also are the accounts of rockets that blazed into outer space; the Odyssey of the first submarine under polar ice; the struggle of the Free World and Communism in the world trade arena; the tides of nationalistic revolt that rocked nations, and the repeated prongs of Russia into new sensitive areas, and Western effort to counter them. Events are reported from the arts and sciences, business and sports; the theatre and the music world, and politics, and the economic pause and recovery in North America - in fact, the major news stories of 1958 are recorded here in encyclopaedia fashion.

The Britannica Book of the Year is prepared with two types

of users in mind. First, it is an essential part of the Encyclopaedia Britannica lifetime program - keeping owners of the encyclopaedia up-to-date and thus protecting their investment in their sets.

Second, it is widely used as a reference work in its own right, since it covers for each year the same types of material that the encyclopaedia covers for recorded history. On the basis of its annual distribution the publishers believe that this is the most widely sold title in English, outside

the Bible.

The number of copies of the 1959 Britannica Book of the Year printed this year, in total volume would fill 102 freight cars. A high proportion of the copies go to owners of the 24-volume Encyclopaedia Britannica and of the 15-volume Britannica Junior for younger readers to keep them abreast of current affairs. The work is a standard one in libraries and many schools.

The 1959 Year Book continues Britannica's practice of 'printing by-lined articles of special interest. These run to as many as

25,000 words and are in effect short-book-length treatments of topics of unusual concern, well illustrated.

This year three special feature surveys are included: "Russia's New Consumers," by the well-known columnist, Marquis Childs with candid photographs of Russian life; "Alaska: The 49th State," by Ernest Gruening, senator from this new state; and "The West and the Arabs," by the historian Arnold Toynbee.

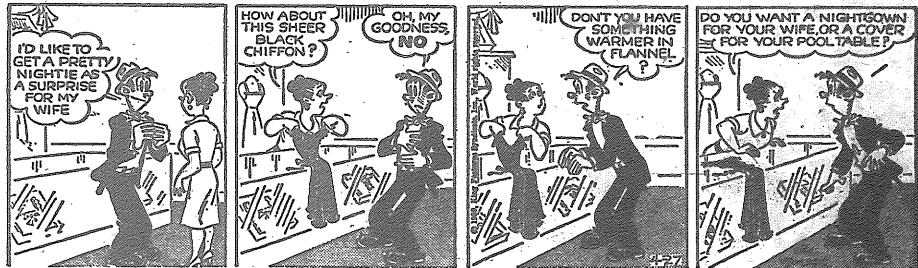

**KITCHEN CLASSICS**

If you are among those who have always thought that Waldorf Salad could not be improved upon, you may have a surprise in store. This recipe is prepared with plump raisins and cheese, plus a nip of horseradish in the dressing.

Be sure to leave the Winesap apples unpeeled because their red covering looks pretty, tastes good.

**NEW WALDORF SALAD**

1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon horseradish  
1/3 cup seedless raisins  
3 Winesap apples  
1/2 cup diced cheese  
2 tablespoons toasted nuts  
Mix mayonnaise, lemon juice and horseradish. Put raisins in small strainer, rinse with hot water, drain. Add to dressing along with apples sliced in thin fan-shaped pieces. Mix and place on salad greens on individual plates. Sprinkle with cheese cubes and nuts. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Fresh pork continues to be one of our best meat buys. Even spareribs, so often beyond the budget-balancer's means are lower in cost than they have been in some time. Next time you buy a couple of strips, try them this interesting way.

Brown the ribs in a shallow roasting pan in hot oven. Remove the ribs, drain off any surplus fat. Place a good layer of sauerkraut on bottom of roasting pan, cover with a layer of sliced peeled apple, sprinkle with brown sugar. Place the ribs on top, return to moderate oven and continue baking until meat is very tender.

For a quick supper dish, you can't beat another tasty pork and apple combination. This time it is

sausage and apple in a meal-in-one casserole.

**SAUSAGE PIE**

1 lb. bulk pork sausage  
20 to 28 oz. can pork and beans  
1 can tomato soup  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 Winesap apples, pared and sliced  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
Biscuit mix

Brown sausage, drain off excess fat. Add beans tomato soup and salt. Heat to boiling point. Pour into greased baking dish. Cover with apple slices. Sprinkle with brown sugar. Make up biscuit dough as directed on package, using amount of liquid recommended for drop biscuits. Drop small mounds on top of apple slices. Bake in hot oven 450 deg. F for 25 to 30 minutes, or until biscuits are nicely browned.

**APPLE MOON CAKE**

1 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 egg, beaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2-1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 cup flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 tablespoons butter  
2 or 2 unpared apples, cut into eighths

Cream 1 cup sugar and shortening. Add egg and vanilla. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Add to mixture alternately with milk. Spread in greased 11 by 7-inch baking dish. Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon, cut in butter. Sprinkle over batter. Place apple slices on top, skin side up. Bake in moderate oven

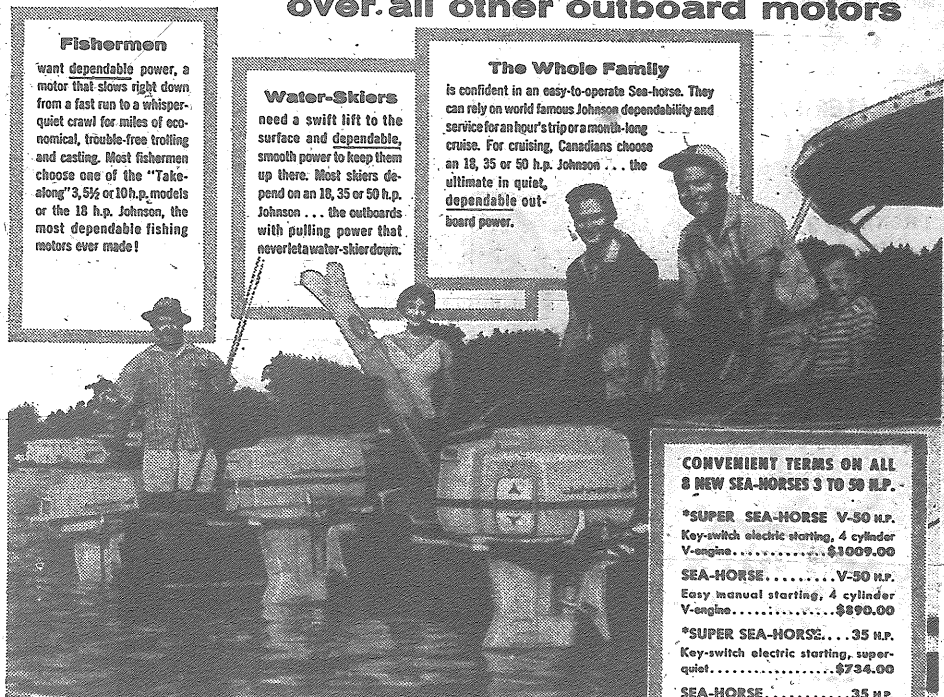

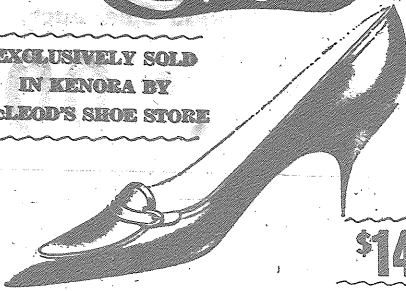

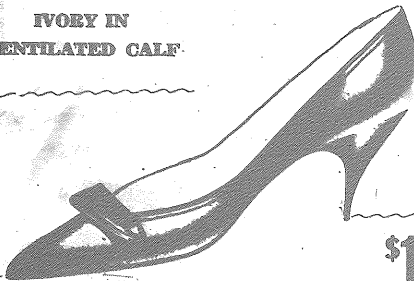

Jere silently led Mrs. Kilhefner to his home, around the block in back of the bank. He pointed to a door.

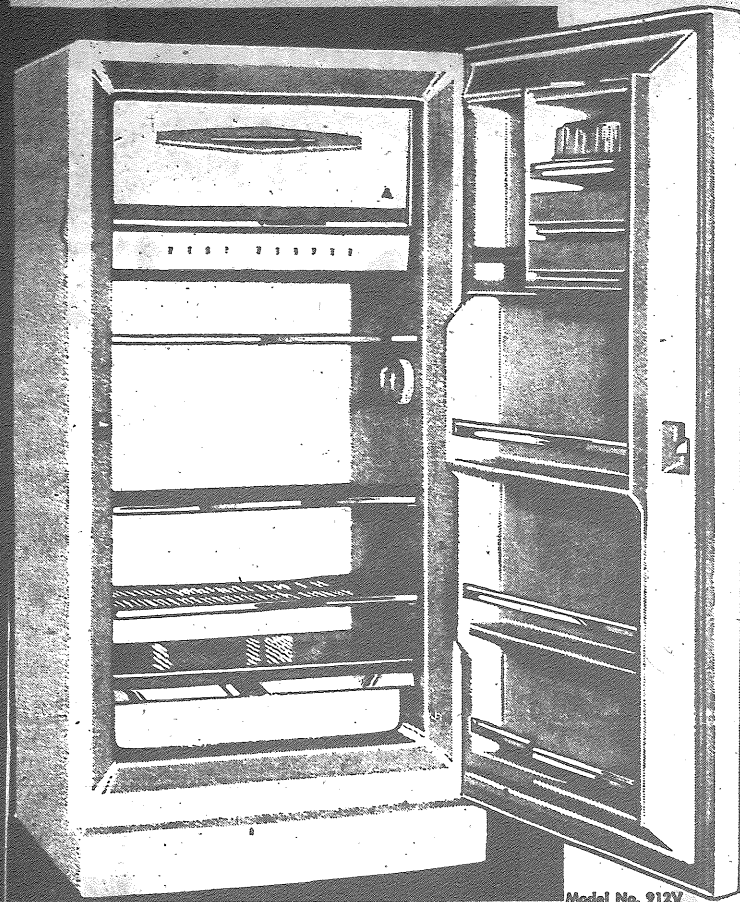

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**Turbine 'Copter First In Ontario**

First North American electrical utility to own and operate a helicopter fleet, Ontario Hydro today announced another "first" in its purchase of a turbine-powered 'copter.

The diesel-fueled Alouette II, scheduled for delivery in May, has a payload 2 1/2 times that of the models now used by Hydro.

Investigations indicate the world's first production turbine helicopter will save at least \$17,000 a year in spraying operations to keep brush clear of transmission lines in remote Northern Ontario areas.

In many cases rights-of-way are difficult to reach except by air for chemical spraying to kill vegetation. Although the Alouette II, costs more to operate, it will result in economies by spraying a much larger acreage on one run.

Plans also call for its use to transport heavy equipment to survey sites and other projects.

The aircraft has caused widespread interest in the United States. Among its advantages are instant starting and take-off, and its cruising speed of 100 miles an hour.

One of Ontario Hydro's seven helicopters will be sold. The others will continue power line patrols, aerial photography, survey work and assistance in stringing lines across gorges and rivers.

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
