IN TROPHY FINALS

DOREEN REIMER, NANCY MARR WIN ROSE BOWLS

Climaxing three days and two nights of competition for vocal and instrumental honors in the 16th annual Kenora District Music Festival was the finals for the five major trophies held Wednesday evening at the high school. Winners were the unanimous choice of the three adjudicators, Mrs. Berythe Birse, Mr. Filmer Hubble and Mr. Glen Harrison.

The two Rose Bowls and accompanying scholarships of \$100 given by the Rotary Club and the Lions Club went to Miss Doreen Reimer of Kenora and Miss Nancy Marr of Dryden. Miss Reimer a school teacher won the vocal Rose Bowl while Miss Marr, seventeen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Marr, Dryden was awarded the Instrumental Rose Bowl. This marks the first time that a Rose Bowl has been

won by an out of town competitor.

Fifteen year old Diane McKay of Kenora was awarded the J. J. H. McLean Trophy for grade 9 piano and the \$50 scholarship given by Mr. Zenith Katz.

The Registered Music Teachers Trophy for best junior instrumentalist grade 8, went to a young Kenora violinist, Maurice Pochailo.

Ian Barnard of Keewatin won the Tudor Trophy for best junior vocalist. This trophy also carried a scholarship of \$50 presented by Mr. Katz.

Following the presentation of the trophies, the young artists were loudly acclaimed by the audience.

The festival is continuing today with Friday evening to feature a concert of selected artists.

Campaign For Overture Concerts Now Underway

William Marshalok Norman Resident Died Wednesday

William Marshalok, well known resident of Norman, died at the McKellar Hospital, Fort William, Wednesday morning, April 29th, following a lengthy illness. Born in the West Ukraine, January 14, 1876, he was in his 84th year.

He received his education in the Old Country and came to Kenora in 1913. He was employed by the Searle Grain Company and by the Keewatin Lumber Company from 1913 to 1945. He was a member of the Greek Catholic Church.

Predeceased by his wife Helen, in 1951, he is survived by three sons, George and Steve of Norman and Nick of Fort William; three daughters, Mrs. K. (Mary) Konoski of Kenora, Mrs. A. (Annie) Krimm of Detroit, U.S.A. and Mrs. W. (Dora) Tutalour of Atikokan, Ontario. Twelve grandchildren and thirteen great grandchild-

ren also survive.

Funeral services will be held, Saturday morning, May 2nd at ten o'clock in St. Nicholas Catholic Church, Rev. Father A. Simbalist will officiate and interment will be in the family plot, St. Nicholas Cemetery.

The all-day session will conclude with a dinner in the evening at the Kenricia Hotel.

Mrs. C. Holm, president of the Kenora Film Council said today that preparations for the meeting are almost complete. The new ex-

time next summer, Health Minister Dr. M. E. Dymond announced recently.

For some time now, the Department has been concerned with the possible hazards to public health from the increasing use of sources of ionizing radiation. Although at the present time the average person is receiving a lifetime total radiation far below any health hazard level, it is advisable that steps be taken to reduce any unnecessary exposure to an absolute minimum.

The new laboratory will replace an existing one which is not equipped with the same sensitive measuring equipment.

Dr. Dymond denied that the new laboratory was being rushed into service as a result of reports to the effect that radioactive fallout is increasing.

As previously reported through the radio and press, the Kenora Community Centre Building Fund has reached the "point of no return," and the committee feel that they can not give up now.

Following a revision of our proposed objective, the fund has now reached 45% of it's objective in pledges and cash. Within the past few weeks, members of the committee have gone out to seek new pledges and have met with wonderful success. The reception has changed considerably since the original canvass. 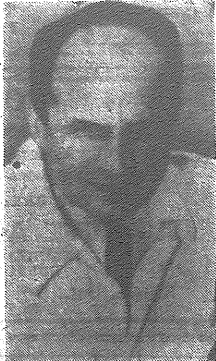

Ontario Plans Scholarship Fund To Honor Queen

To mark the visit to our Province of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the Queen of Canada, who will officiate at the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway in which Ontario has invested about a quarter of the cost, it is proposed to do the following:

Her Majesty's permission will be sought to name a scholarship fund after herself, the fund to be named "The Queen Elizabeth II Ontario Scholarship Fund." In this fund will be placed \$500,000. It will be a special fund, in the use and administration of which we propose to set up a committee of the Presidents of Ontario universities. They will from time to time determine, in the light of the needs of a developing Ontario both materially and from the human side where the emphasis should be placed. The fund will be so designed that it may be added to as time goes along and its permanency and its usefulness assured. Flexibility will be provided so that the fund may encourage students in social studies, the sciences, mathematics, medicine or any other phase of work which the universities of Ontario feel from time to time should receive encouragement. So that this flexibility will not be interfered with, it is not proposed at this time to spell out definite objectives which might be outmoded in a few years, but rather to leave this to the consideration of the heads of our Ont-

ario universities who will be gathered together in committee and in the meantime the objectives being flexible and in general terms. The general objectives being to encourage those phases of education which from time to time are important and should be emphasized in the light of Ontario's needs as they change and develop.

This Scholarship is quite different from, and quite additional to The Ontario Bursary Plan, the Federal-Provincial Bursaries, the Ontario Scholarship Plan and any other existing form of student aid.

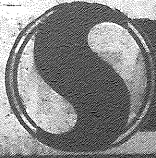

COMMITTEE OF 3 SET TO STUDY FLUORIDATION

A committee of three has been appointed by Premier Leslie M. Frost to conduct an investigation into fluoridation.

Chairman is Mr. Justice K. G. Morden of the Ontario Court of Appeal. The other two members are Mrs. Egmont Frankel and Dr. G. E. Hall, President of the University of Western Ontario.

The Premier said that the committee will have at its disposal the facilities of government research departments, as well as those of universities and of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons.

Stressing the competence of the three members of the committee, the Premier said: "One of the problems in this investiga-

tion is to have it done by those who have qualities and qualifications without pre-conceived ideas, and I think this committee has those qualities."

The Premier also emphasized that no such enquiry had yet been undertaken in any other jurisdiction.

Kitchen Classics

The apples that wait for Spring - British Columbia Winesaps are plentiful on the market right now, so be sure to use them often in family meals and for snacks.

When you must have dessert, make it one that is not damaging to the figure. Applesauce Snow adds up to 72 calories the serving - quite low when compared to the usual temptations; such as a piece of pie or iced cake, both of which are close to 300 calories.

APPLESAUCE SNOW
1 envelope plain gelatin
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup water
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice

1-3/4 cups applesauce
2 egg whites
Mix gelatin, sugar and salt in top of double boiler. Add water. Place over boiling water; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat; add lemon rind and juice and applesauce. Chill until fairly thick. Add unbeaten egg whites; beat until mixture begins to hold its shape. Turn into molds; chill. Makes 8 servings.

When packing lunches for school or work always remember one-third of the day's meals must come from the noon lunch and that it should be as well-balanced as any other meal. Cup custards are ideal for lunch boxes and this one is particularly refreshing. It takes care of milk and the fresh fruit in one good-tasting dessert.

APPLE CUSTARDS
6 to 8 apples
1 teaspoon each grated lemon and orange rind
1/2 cup sugar
Dash salt
2 eggs
2 cups milk

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Put apples in saucepan with a very small amount of water and orange and lemon rinds. Cook until mushy; force through sieve. There should be about 2-1/2 cups pure. Add sugar; cool. Add slightly-beaten eggs, salt and milk. Pour into custard cups. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Set in pan of hot water and bake in slow oven 325 F. about 50 minutes, or until set.

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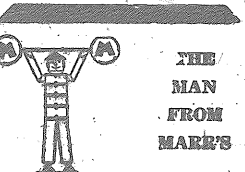

For something special, try luscious fresh apple tarts in cheese pastry. Make the pastry in the usual way by combining 1 cup all-purpose flour, ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup shortening, ½ cup grated cheese and about 2 table-spoons water. Line tart pans with the pastry; prick the bot-toms and bake in hot oven 425 F. until golden brown. Fill with this spicy apple and raisin filling and cap with whipped cream.

APPLE TART FILLING
About 8 apples
1-½ cups sugar
1-½ cups water
3 sticks cinnamon
6 whole cloves
½ cup seedless raisins
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Dash salt

Peel and slice apples; places in saucepan with sugar, water, spi-ces, raisins and lemon juice. Sim-mer until apples are just barely tender. Remove spices.
Mix 2 tablespoons cornstarch with a little water; mix carefully with apples so as not to break them up too much. Cook gently until thickened. Chill. Fill shells about ½ hour before using.

Oily rags and mops stored in a closed place may cause a fire by spontaneous combustion. It is safer to store such articles out of doors, and to wash them after each use, if possible.

Potatoes are a good source of vitamin C or ascorbic acid, which is essential to healthy gums, teeth and other body tissue. Potatoes are best when well-scrubbed and baked or boiled in their skins.
