Evergreen School Choir Wins Dr. W. J. Gunne Cup

The Evergreen School Choirs grades 1 and 2 conducted by V. Spurr, were awarded the Dr. W. J. Gunne Cup for Junior Graded School choirs at yesterday afternoon session of the Music Festival. Mr. Glen Harrison awarded the choir 83 and 83 for the test piece "A Song About Ears" and "The Grasshopper". In class 163 classroom choirs grades 3 and 4 the Albert School choir room 8 Dryden, came first with 169; 85 and 84. The conductor was Marion Humenick. The King George VI School choir, room 8, conducted by Helen Favreau came second with 167; 84 and 83.

In class 164, the Riverview School room 12 of Dryden tied for first with Central School room 10 conducted by Miss L. Oshiro with 164 marks each.

The North Ward School, room 6, conducted by P. Davie, placed second in this class.

Benidickson Asks For Report On Navigation Lights

Resulting from some individual complaints and a resolution of the Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters Association concerning navigation lights on the Lake of the Woods, suggesting that such lights be maintained at least till November 1st, W. M. "Bill" Benidickson, M.P. for Kenora - Rainy River took the matter up with the responsible officials at Ottawa in the Dept. of Transport.

Mr. Benidickson has been informed by the department that the lights in question are automatic and are removed at the end of each season for inspection and overhaul and that in 1958 the removal of the lights was effected on October 27th, 28th, 29th and 30th.

However the director of Marine Services stated that one light on Tomahawk Island was reported out of order by the department officials on 14th October due to a faulty light.

The director of Marine services, as reported to Mr. Benidickson

has notified the Outfitters' Association, and a suggestion has been made that if certain specific lights are required after the normal close of navigation, the department on such notification will investigate the possibility of delaying the removal of the lights to a later date, giving consideration to weather conditions.

Blood Donated Is All Needed In Local Hospitals

The blood you give on Tuesday at the Red Cross Blood Clinic will definitely be used to help save a life.

According to figures released in Winnipeg, at least 75% of all blood collected in this region is used right here by hospitals in free whole blood transfusions to all who need them. While whole blood can only be kept for 14 days, any that has not been used in this period is processed to plasma and sent to the Connaught Laboratories in Toronto for extraction of the many derivatives. The derivatives are then returned to us for free distribution to hospitals in the area. Some of the derivatives are: Serum Albumin; invaluable in combatting shock; Fibrinogen, essential to blood clotting; Gamma Globulin; useful in protection against measles in particular circumstances and against jaundice.

Not one drop of blood is wasted. Because of this 14 day limit on whole blood, the supply must be continuous. This means that we in this area must meet our quota next Tuesday if the steady supply is to be kept flowing.

Elderly Trapper Feared Drowned

Ontario Provincial Police today expressed concern for the safety of a 75 year old trapper, Edward Koxington, who has not been seen since April 20th when he was walking between Yale Lake and Straw Lake. The area in question is in the remote section east of Nestor Falls. The elderly man resided in a cabin on the shores of Straw Lake and it is feared that he may have gone through the ice while returning home.

Ice conditions make it impossible to conduct any search. A brother at Baudette, Minn. has been notified.

Fire Destroyed Aircraft Wing, Damaged Shed

Fire of unknown origin last night destroyed a wing from a Norseman airplane, which was undergoing repairs in one of Ontario Central Airlines Ltd. sheds at the Lakeside winter base. No member of the Company's staff was in the building when the alarm was turned in to the Kenora Fire Department at 8.31 p.m. The possibility of faulty electrical equipment is being studied as the cause of the blaze.

In addition to the wing, which had been taken off the frame of the aircraft and taken into the repair shed some time previously, the interior of the building was badly damaged. No estimate on loss has yet been made.

Local Pair To Spend 6 Months On Morals Charge

Magistrate J. V. Fregeau this morning sentenced two Kenora men, ages 21 and 26 years, to serve 6 months in jail after convicting them on the charge, "do an act contributing to a child becoming a juvenile delinquent." The Magistrate sharply reprimanded the pair for their part in this morals charge.

Two Red Lake men, involved in separate fights, each was sentenced to 6 months upon conviction of the assault charge. Sentence was suspended in both cases.

Numerous liquor offenders were given usual fines or jail alternatives. Charges involved illegal possession, drunk and obtaining liquor while under the age of 21 years.

"I supported him because I sincerely felt he was the best person locally to represent Fort William at Ottawa."

Mr. Limbrick went on to say that he could not support any of the existing parties in the provincial house because of "the heavy imbalance of legislative members in the southern and eastern portions of Ontario."

Become Yes Men

Mr. Limbrick said members for Northwestern Ontario become "little more than yes men" to their party and can secure few benefits for their home constituency.

"Men dedicated to seeing Northwestern Ontario get its fair and just share, unhampered by party affiliation, must be elected if we are to get the action deserving and profits derived from the re-

sources of our area," he said.

Mr. Limbrick said he was accepting the challenge of organizing a movement to be called the Northwestern Ontario Action League.

He said the party platform would consist of a pledge "to fight unceasingly for a better Northwestern Ontario; have this area recognized as an integral part of the province and erase the stigma of being a step-child of Ontario."

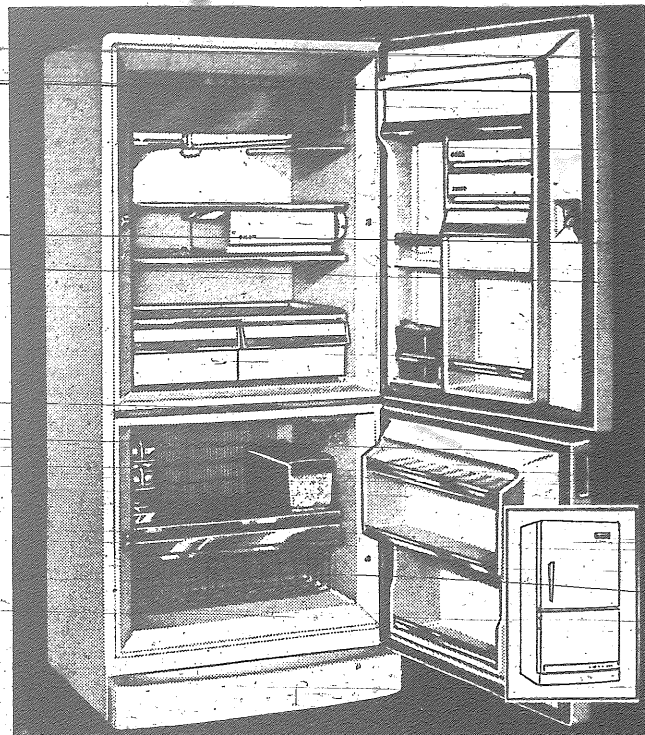
He said he would extend the new party throughout the area and arrange for candidates in all electoral districts after gaining a foothold in Fort William.

Mr. Limbrick's entry into the field assures Fort William of a four-way race in the next election.

Progressive Conservatives have pledged their faith in Clare Mapledoram, M.P.P. William Johnson carries the CCF banner and a Liberal candidate will be selected May 6.

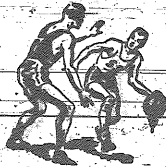

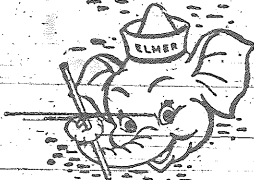

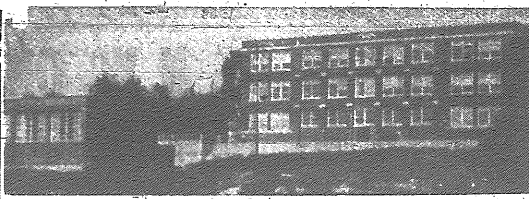

High Freight Rates Affect Paper Industry

Toronto.—Ontario's forest industry is considering putting its support behind the growing demand for a review of Canada's freight rate structure, it was announced here by C. R. Mills, R.P.F., manager of the Ontario Forest Industries Association.

The OFIA is made up of 55 pulp and paper companies, saw-mill operators and independent pulpwood producers who are engaged in timber operations on nearly 30,000 square miles of Crown forestland in the province.

Mr. Mills indicated that the freight rate situation had been raised at a recent meeting of the OFIA's transportation committee in North Bay.

"The recent increase in freight rates has greatly concerned the forest industry," he said, adding that they materially affect the price of all forest products.

"The forest industry in Ontario alone pays more than \$40,000,000 annually on freight charges to Canadian railways for the transportation of materials going into and out of the mills and woods," he stated.

The forest industry's concern affects all four rail lines oper-

ating in Ontario, the Ontario Northland, Algoma Central, C.N.R. and C.P.R., Mr. Mills pointed out.

He noted that there was a trend toward stronger competition between truck and rail transportation, with trucking becoming increasingly effective.

LET'S TALK CARS
A BIT ABOUT BATTERIES

There's been a lot of talk lately about waterless batteries. But it's a subject I'm not going to become involved in - at least for the present. However, I will say that any battery will operate for awhile without additional water . . . and even the so-called waterless batteries will generally last longer if water is occasionally added.

But while I'm on the subject of batteries I would like to pass along a word of caution. That is when you're doing extensive engine work on your car be sure to disconnect the storage battery as a safety measure.



This will prevent someone from accidentally touching the starter button, while you're working under the car. It will also eliminate the possibility of your closing the starting circuit by touching the starting motor terminals under the floorboards with a long-handled wrench or crow bar.

Also, before re-connecting the battery cables be sure to clean and coat them with petroleum jelly . . . and make sure that the ground connection is clean and tight. A final word of caution is to never hold a lit match over a storage battery that has uncappped vents. If the battery has been "charging" an explosion may result which could seriously burn you.

It pays to be cautious, too, when you're shopping around for a used car. You won't get stuck with any camouflaged crocks on our lot. Every car has been thoroughly checked and adjusted to give you more miles of trouble-free, economical driving. Drop around anytime and look over our fine selection.

Ernest Eley, Superintendent of the Manitoba District at Winnipeg since 1946, is appointed General Superintendent of the Prairie and Pacific regions.

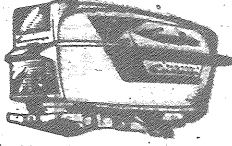

C.P.A. Inaugurates Domestic Service With Ceremonies

Montreal.—The first man to fly a powered aircraft in the British Commonwealth and the Prime Ministers of four Canadian Provinces will join Canadian Pacific officials on Monday to inaugurate the fastest air service between Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

Ceremonies will be held in each of the four cities as Canadian Pacific Airlines launches its daily Britannia service across Canada both eastbound and westbound.

Hon. J. A. D. McCurdy, former Lieutenant - Governor of Nova Scotia who flew a flimsy prototype of the modern airplane over the ice of Bras Dor Lake in Cape Breton Island on Feb. 23, 1909, will be a passenger of the first westbound Canadian Pacific flight across Canada in company with his daughter, Mrs. P. E. Haddon of Montreal.

In Montreal, before the west-bound plane takes off, Premier Maurice Duplessis of Quebec will cut a ribbon signifying the commencement of service.

As the plane pauses at Toronto in its westward flight Premier Leslie M. Frost of Ontario will officiate at the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Ceremonies at Vancouver and Winnipeg will be related to the departures of the Eastbound plane. At Vancouver, Premier W.A.C. Bennett will officiate at a ribbon-cutting ceremony which will be attended by G. W. G. McConachie, president, Canadian

Pacific Airlines J. N. Fraire, Vice-President, Pacific Region, Canadian Pacific Railway, and civic officials.

At Winnipeg, Premier Dufferin Roblin of Manitoba, will cut a ribbon while the Eastbound plane pauses on its flight through from Vancouver.

The 400-mile-an-hour Britannias will cut the existing flying time from Vancouver to Montreal by one hour, 25 minutes; from Montreal to Winnipeg by 45 minutes; from Toronto to Vancouver by one hour, 15 minutes and from Vancouver to Winnipeg by one hour, 35 minutes.

Actual flying times for the Britannia Jet-props, the largest and fastest aircraft in service in Canada, are: Toronto-Montreal, one hour, 15 minutes; Winnipeg-Toronto, two hours, 55 minutes; Vancouver-Winnipeg, three hours, 25 minutes.

C.P.A.'s schedules for the new daily, east-west service reflect

two novel features of special interest to Canadian air-travellers: 1. The Britannias will carry tourist as well as First Class passengers.

2. The airline will offer the only non-stop service available between Vancouver and Winnipeg. C.P.A. will make 623 seats available eastbound from Vancouver every week, and a similar number westbound from Montreal Winnipeg and Toronto will have the same capacity in both directions.

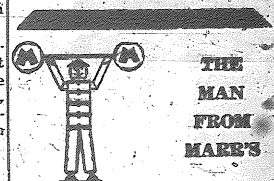
For the comfort and convenience of passengers, the 100-seat Britannias, now in service on the airlines Intercontinental routes, will carry only 89 passengers - 51 tourist and 38 First Class on Cross-Canada service.

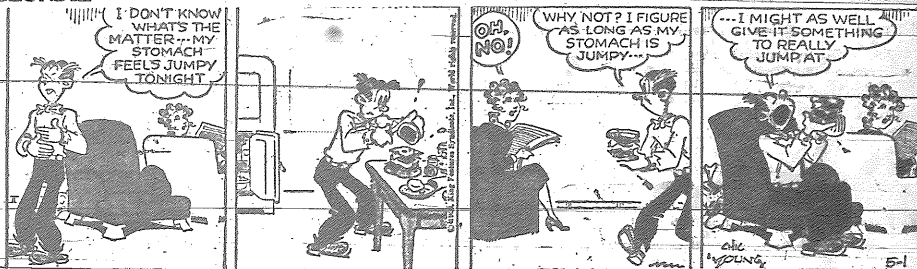

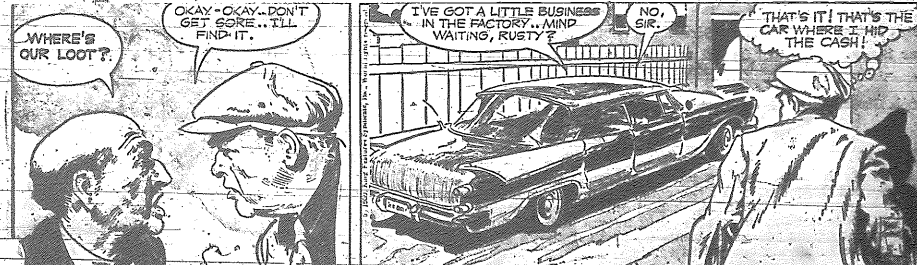

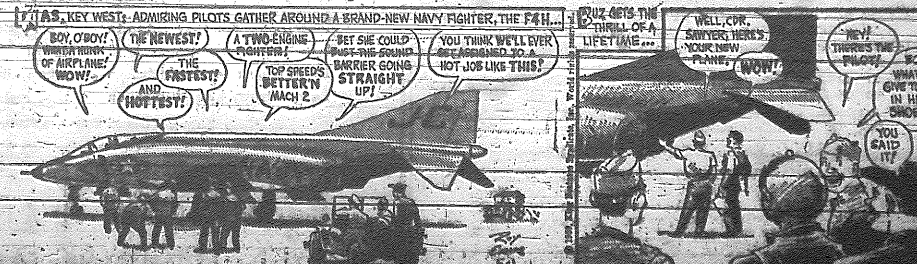
