### BORDER SEWAGE DISPOSAL PROBLEM TO BE STUDIED BY JOINT MEETING

Fort Frances — Although doubts that there are any qualified assessment experts in Fort Frances were expressed at the regular meeting of town council Monday night, it was decided to advertise the position in hopes of obtaining local applications. Council has lost the services of two assessment commissioners in the past month, first by releasing Ross Marsh, then by the resignation of R. S. Burrell. The latter resignation was accepted with regret last night because Burrell has secured a position with the federal department of Indian affairs.

Pearson appeared before council to request sewer service for a new West End playground. He was told the request will be considered when plans for the playground are presented to council. It will be located on Lillie Avenue, above the lower river.

Breck Chernaske, a town fireman who served in the assessor's office until recently, applied verbally for the commissioner's duties. He was told by Mayor J. T. Livingstone to submit a written application after the position is advertised.

### John Ashin, Red Lake Victim Of Drowning Accident

John Ashkin, age 23, a Treaty Indian of the Lac Seul band, was accidentally drowned early today in the waters of Howey Bay, Red Lake. Ontario Provincial Police report that the unfortunate young man apparently attempted to walk onto the ice of the Bay, by placing a long plank from the shore over open water, onto the ice. Falling off the plank, he was unable to regain shore. The accident happened at 12.05 a.m. near the north end of the main street of Red Lake.

The body was recovered. No inquest will be held. The deceased is survived by his father, George Ashin. He was not married.

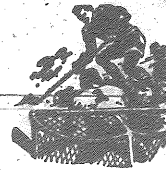

## Hole In The Ice Wasn't Big Enough To Pull Fish Out

Fort Frances—The fishing season unofficially opened Friday night at the Canadian Tyre store where Fort Frances anglers gathered to smack their lips over walleye fillets and swap yarns in a tall story contest.

Partners Marvin McLymont and Pat Barr were the hosts, and the fish fry was so successful they said they are already planning one for next spring. Two hundred fillets of walleye obtained with assistance of fishermen were prepared and served by Bud Mallory with assistance of Les Busby.

A garden manure spreader was won by veteran fisherman Harry Flanagan who submitted a Paul Bunyanesque whopper. Topping all other entries, he told about two big fish from his experience. One of his fish swallowed a moose the other had to be cut in four pieces for weighing. It could only happen in "Lost Bay" of course.

For sheer frightfulness, Flanagan's story was the "most". He wrote "last winter I took my car

and went to Lost Bay after real big fish. I took my boat winch off my boat trailer with a 1/2 inch cable attached and a good sharp anchor for a hook. I cut a three foot hole in the ice and baited my hook with moose meat. I was waiting in my car, when the car began to hop and bounce. I put the car in gear and the brakes on. Then I jumped out with my .32 special deer rifle to shoot the biggest fish I ever saw, but saw that the hole in the ice was not big enough to pull the fish through. So I took the reel to shore and tied it to a good big pine tree. I left the fish and cable there until the ice went out.

"Then I took my rifle and aluminum boat to get the big fish. I had to shoot him and tow him to the Five-Mile dock where an auto wrecker hauled him to the fish house. There they had to cut him into four pieces to weigh him on the scales. So stay out of Lost Bay with wooden boats as it is very dangerous."

Carl Kistner came close to the prize with his story about the man who caught a fish so big at the Five-Mile dock last summer he couldn't find a scale large enough to weigh it. So he took a picture of it and the picture weighed five pounds.

Otto Polenske was another runner-up with his yarn about the Chicago fellow who went to Shag's camp on the Manitou for ice fishing, caught one so large that it took three men all day carrying water to fill up the hole after they pulled him through.

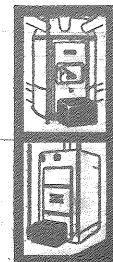

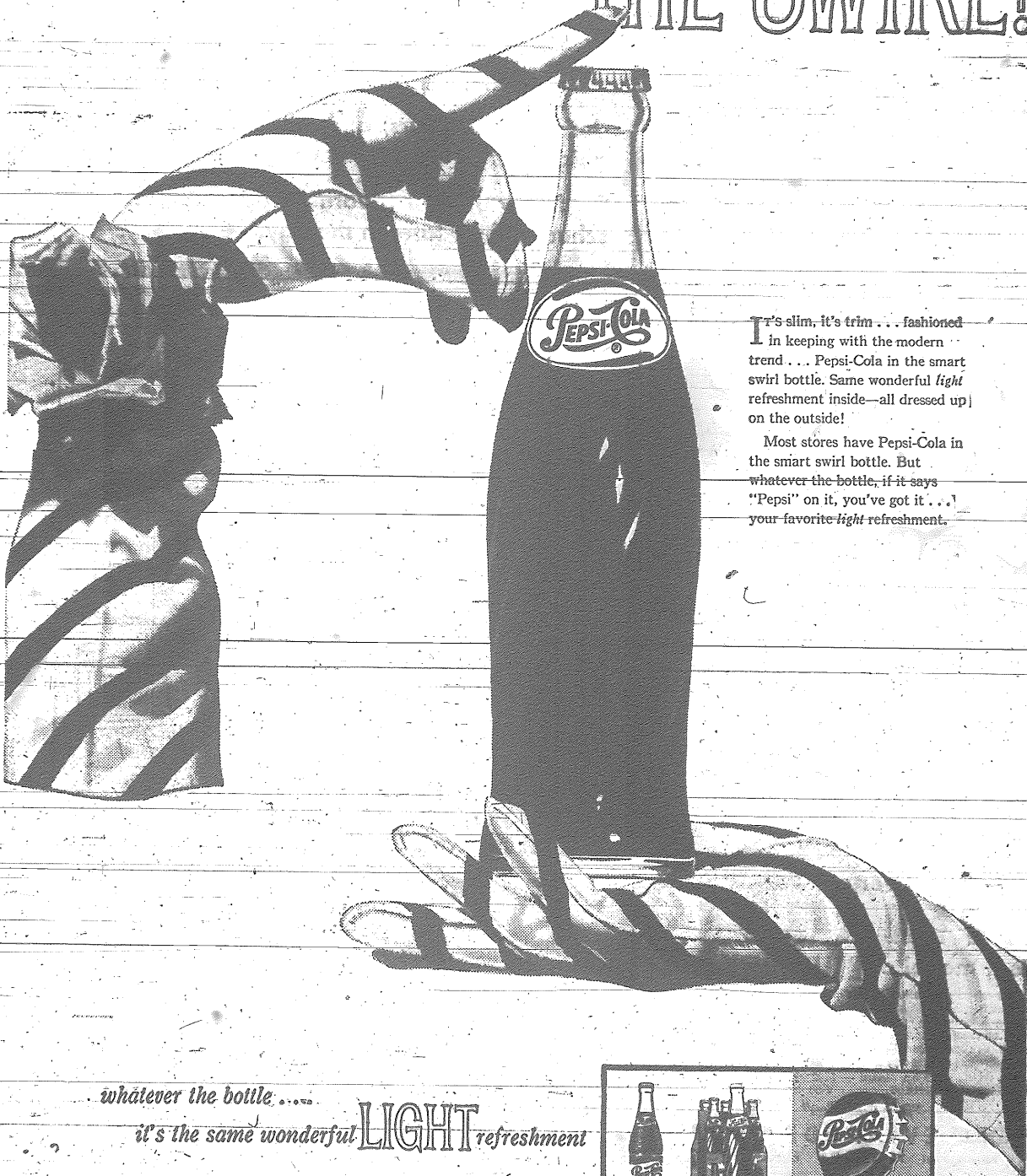

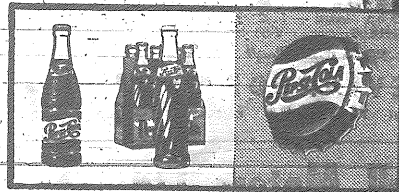

# Record Numbers Expected To Use Parks This Year

Toronto—Looking to an all-time record this summer in the number of people using provincial parks, Ontario Lands and Forests Minister the Hon. J. W. Spooner has reported that "never in the history of this province have so many thousands of people used and enjoyed the facilities of our parks system as during the summer of 1958."

The Minister said that a survey of 55 parks where entrance and camping fees were collected

showed that 928,000 automobiles entered in 1958, carrying 3,232,000 people. Vehicle permits issued numbered 207,751 which, he said, would indicate that, on the average, each licensed vehicle entered one of the provincial parks on more than four occasions during the season. The record showed that each individual made greater use of the parks last year than in 1957.

"In addition to the 56 parks mentioned," said Mr. Spooner, "11 more than in 1957, which had been developed to a standard where entrance and camping charges were made, 24 other parks also were available to the public but had not been developed to a point where we felt that services justified charges. Several of these will be in complete operation with all conveniences standard in the other provincial parks this summer.

"Besides the parks in which substantial development has taken place," he added, "there are in Ontario 18 park areas either reserved or acquired, which will be developed during the years ahead as demand requires. Also, there are an additional six acres proposed which are now being examined.

As an indication of the increase in provincial-park use, the Minister cited some figures revealed in a 1958 use survey. Issue of 74,725 camping permits last year was a 70% increase over 1957. Vehicle permits issued - 207,751 - showed a 38% increase over 1957. Interpretive programmes in the parks, including nature museums, nature trails, lectures etc. attracted 146,681 park visitors, 22% more than in 1957.

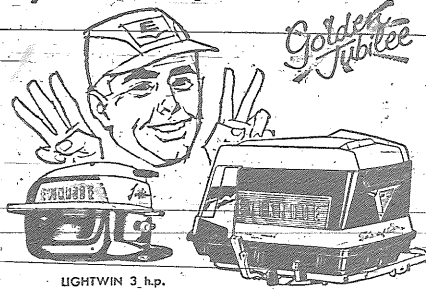

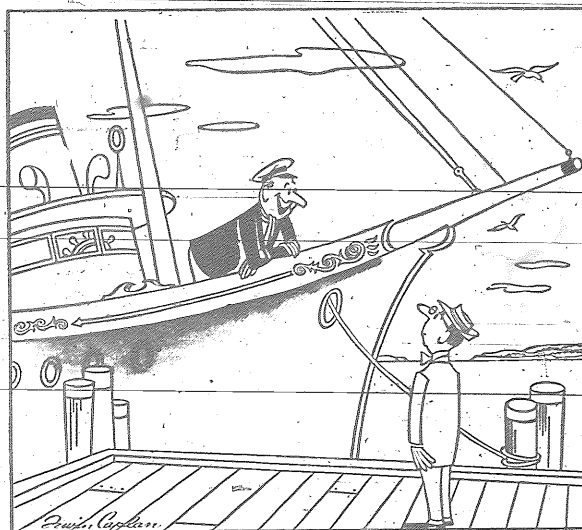

**42 WOMEN REDUCE BY HALF A TON**  
New York.—A physician reports he has hypnotized 42 overweight women into losing more than half a ton.  
The study, conducted by Dr. Lawrence B. Winkelstein of Mount Vernon, N.Y., dealt with women of 10 to 60 pounds overweight. All weighed less at the end of the treatment period, usually 14 weeks, than they did at the start.  
The smallest loss was 9 1/2 pounds and the greatest 58 1/2 pounds.  
A report on Winkelstein's study appears in the May 1 is-

sue of the New York State Journal of Medicine. He said that while many non-medical books on hypnosis reported its use in diet control, thorough scientific studies had been lacking.  
Only women who appeared easily suggestible under hypnosis and who showed no glandular basis for their excessive weight were used in the study. Most had had no success with other weight-control measures.

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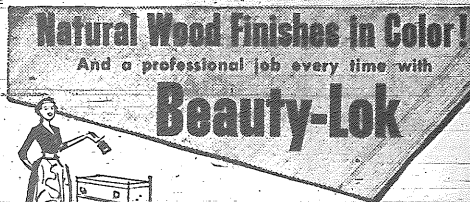
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**NEWS BRIEFS**

Tree Planting Time Is Near For L & F Forestry Personnel

The coming of the Spring means many things to many people; tulips in bloom to the gardener, the opening of trout season to the fisherman, and everyone knows on what a young man's fancy dwells, but to Re-forestation staffs of the Department of Lands and Forests it means tree planting season.

The seeds that were gathered four years ago and sown have not produced trees big enough to plant out in the field, where they will grow produce timber for the next generation.

In the Kenora District this spring a total of 300,000 trees will be planted on Crown Land, on areas which would not otherwise

produce a stand of valuable timber within a reasonable length of time. On many areas when the present stand is cut adequate reproduction of desirable species occurs naturally but on those areas where regeneration is not adequate it must be secured by other means. Usually this is by planting, and since machines cannot work in rough, rocky areas or in heavy slash, it must be hand planting. So, starting in the next week or two, some sixty men will be employed with shovels and pails of trees, starting forests for their grandchildren.

Gogama — Deer populations may be down because of the hard winter, but partridge hunting looks good for next fall, according to Lands and Forests officials here. Deep snow and severe cold do not seem to have affected the ruffled grouse, conservation officers say, and there were plenty of birds going into the winter.

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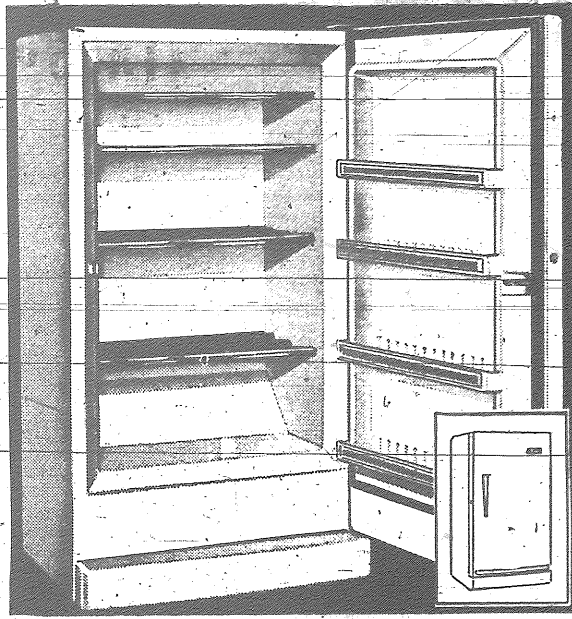
