LET'S TALK CARS

CAR TRICKS

Now and again I like to pass along a suggestion or two I've picked up that may be of some help to you with a particular car problem.

Take, for instance, shallow dents your car might have acquired. These can often be 'popped out' with a good sized plumber's plunger. It's worth a try anyway. All you have to do is stick the rubber suction cup firmly over the dents after moistening the edges of the cupthen give the handle a steady pull.

Or, if acid corresion forming on your battery posts and cables is your partic-ular problem -- try this: Simply brush some ordinary milk of magnesia over them. This should halt corrosion and

make the cables easier to remove, when necessary.

And here's another trick that might prove valuable to vacationers or travelling salesmen. To keep clothes neat and wrinkle-free take a rubber ring (you know the type your wife uses on fruit jars at preserving lime) and b'ace it at the top of a rear window. Roll the window up tight, leaving most of the loop hanging inside. Not only is it rattle-free, but this fruit jar rubber ring is strong enough to hold several garments on hangers. What's more, it can't scratch glass or paint.

Well, as I've said before in this column, there's always an easier way of doing things. And whenever I hear of any little tricks that I think might interest motorists, I'll pass them along to you.

In closing, the best advice I can think of right now to prospective used car buyers is to pay us a visit soon.







The 90 - minute program was presented the same day that Mother d'Youville, an 18th century Canadian nun, was beatified in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Beatification is the Roman Catholic Church's highest honor next to eainthood.

In a letter Wednesday to Most everend Mother Clarida Fortin, the order's provincial superior, Roger Rolland, program director

for the CBC's French - language network, says "the production took the wrong approach because of clumsy attempts to present something original."

The CBC hopes, Mr. Rolland continues, that a program scheduled for May 14, showing film taken during the beatification ceremonies, 'will be more significant and will draw attention in a fitting memory to the wore in a fitting manner to the mem-ory of the founder of your or der."


Sunday's program, titled La Plus Belle de Ceans—She Who is the Most Beautiful — roused a -protest-from-Quebe viewers who felt it showed both Mother d'Youville and Montreal of the 18th century as loose and immoral

The program emphasised Mother d'Youville's life before she became a nun and many viewers apparently felt it concentrated

to heavily on the circumstances of her unhappy marriage which ended with the death of her hus-band.
