Taps Are For Turning Off . . . On Busy Highways

Taps are for turning off especially on busy highways! Taps on the brake pedal give warning flashes to the cars behind. Coupled with turn indicators and/or hand signals they give unmistakable indication of intention to slow down and turn off the highway.

There is nothing in the law to require a motorist to give this additional warning. It is just a matter of common sense and self-protection. And it is also something else that is very important . . . it is a matter of courtesy.

A driver should make his turn off a busy highway with all reasonable speed. A leisurely turn can back up the line of traffic unnecessarily. But firm braking at the last moment may invite a rear-end collision if the car behind has not noticed, or has not believed the turn signal. That is why warning flashes of the stop

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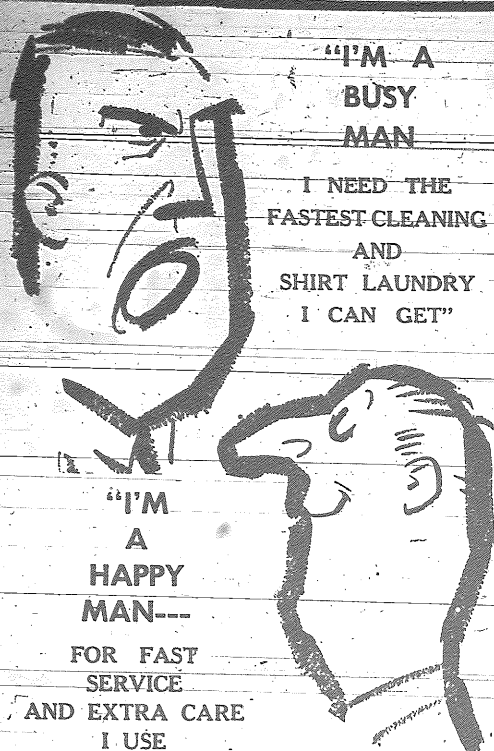

The baby's father, announcing his plans Wednesday night, declared:

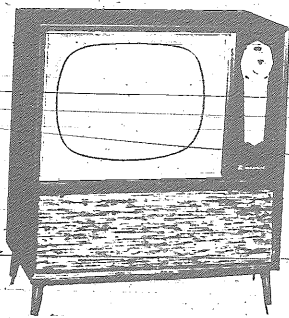
"The baby feeds you buy nowadays are too soft - a baby can never grow up tough on those sieved vegetables."

A jury of show officials went on record that "in our opinion, a greased pig scramble does not constitute any possibility whatsoever of cruelty to animals and we see no justifiable reason for eliminating it. We see no harm in this traditional western sport."

But the SPCA officers saw it in a different light and termed it "a cruel spectacle."

Vicenza, Italy. — Three persons have been killed by touching a dog leash turned into a high-tension cable.

Vittorio Bedin, 31, came out of his home yesterday after a storm, stepped on a chain used to tie his dog and fell dead. His wife, Bersilla, ran out when she heard his scream and also was killed.

Vittorio's brother-in-law used a stick to push the chain away from the bodies but it accident-

ally touched another relative who also was electrocuted.

Police said the chain became charged with electricity when it came in contact with a nearby high-tension wire knocked down by the wind.

The Bedin's dog was asleep at the fireplace during the tragedy.

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Special Committee For Industrial And Commercial Growth

TORONTO—A better balanced utilization of public lands throughout the northern parts of the province to meet requirements of industrial and commercial expansion, including the mining and timber industries, with attention also to the need for more parks, recreational areas, summer resort sites and hunting and fishing facilities, is the object of a thorough study

to be undertaken by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests with the Ontario Department of Mines.

To this end, Ontario Lands and Forests Minister, the Honourable J. W. Spooner, has announced that a Committee has been formed "to inquire into, investigate and make recommendations in respect of the disposal of public lands under the Mining Act and the Public Lands Act."

"My colleague, the Honourable J. A. Maloney, Minister of Mines, and I have asked the Committee to work under broad terms of reference," Mr. Spooner said.

"We believe that the existing mining and public lands legislation should be reviewed, having in mind the objective which is becoming increasingly important — to attain the best land use consistent with the development and utilization of the natural resources of Ontario."

"One of the subjects to which the Committee will direct its attention will be municipal assessments and taxation of mining lands."

Public hearings will be held at dates to be announced at Timmins, Kirkland Lake, Cobalt, Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie and the Lakehead and at other points to be decided.

The Committee consists of J. F. McFarland, Mining Commissioner, Chairman; Major-General Howard Kennedy, Vice Chairman; John Beattie, of the Ontario Mining Association, J. J. Rankin of the Prospectors' and Developers' Association and representatives of the Department of Lands and Forests and of Mines.

Mental Patients Possess Devils - U. K. Minister

Torquay, England — A British minister said today that many patients in mental hospitals should be exorcized because they are "possessed by the devil."

Sir Patrick Ferguson Davie, chaplain to the bishop of Exeter, said he was "persuaded by the evidence of people I believe in and also my own evidence" that haunted houses around this seaside resort should be exorcized and "so should many patients in mental hospitals."

Sir Patrick said that the trouble today was that "very few people take devil-worshipping as anything more than a joke."

Mr. Blackstock is presently director of health and physical education at Pickering College, Newmarket, Ontario. He has served in that position and as a member of the staff for many years.

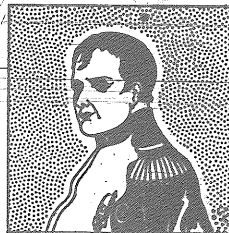

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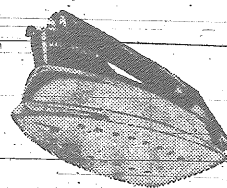
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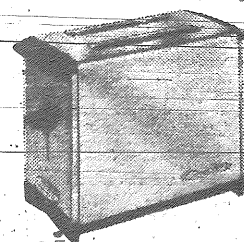

ASK FOR LONG TERM CREDIT FACILITIES FOR OPERATORS OF TOURIST CAMPS

Kingston—Long-term credit facilities to enable operators of tourist establishments to improve their accommodation was urged in a resolution passed Wednesday night by the Ontario Chamber of Commerce.

Passage of the recommendation overrode one by the policy committee for deletion of past

recommendations in this regard.

The resolution, proposed by Peterborough, recommends that the chamber establish a committee to investigate all phases of the tourist industry in the province and, in particular, study ways and means of making available long-term credit facilities to operators of tourist establishments for capital improvements.

A resolution already in the chamber's statement of policy and resolutions was specific in asking for provincial legislation to provide for long-term mortgage loans.

The resolutions committee said this was against the chamber's concept of freedom of enterprise commented that other small businesses might ask for such loans and added that the provincial government should not go into the loan business.

The Peterborough resolution did not spell out just how the credit facilities should be provided, but supporters of the loans didn't seem to object to any gov-

ernment action which might be required to accomplish the purpose.

Herbert E. Brown, speaking for North Bay chamber said he did not agree that government loans would be contrary to freedom of enterprise.

Four provinces already had similar legislation.

Representatives of Grillia and Pictou also spoke in support of the loan proposal, which passed by a large majority.

The resolution was one of several discussed at the policy session of the chamber's meeting.

300 ON HAND.
W. Irwin Haskett of Ottawa, president, welcomed more than 300 delegates, including accompanying wives.

Robert L. Curran of Sault Ste. Marie, was co-chairman of Wednesday night's meeting. The meeting, chiefly on representation, from Port Arthur and Atikokan—also overrode a policy committee recommendation for deletion of a resolution concerning access roads.

The committee felt that the Ontario government, in co-operation with the federal government, already has met the chamber's previous request for an accelerated program.

H. H. Styffe of Port Arthur said that while a good start has been made, there is still a long way to go before northwestern Ontario has enough access roads.

Gordon E. Browning of Sudbury said local representation to the government might be needed more than any Ontario chamber statement.

Robert Moffat of Atikokan and A. Moran of Porcupine supported retention of the resolution so as "to keep an eye on good intentions."

On suggestion of Walter Ruthford of Brantford the former wording, which asked the government to "accelerate" a program has changed to "continue its announced program."

The meeting also adopted a resolution that the chamber appoint a committee to report on the advisability of adopting reflectorized vehicle licence plates.

RESOLUTIONS DROPPED
Among policy statements deleted was one recommending an adequate and well-trained civil defence organization across Canada.

Also deleted was one favoring compulsory automobile insurance. The committee noted that 95 per cent of motorists in Ontario are insured.

On representation from Niagara Falls, a former resolution advocating municipal taxation of Hydro and other publicly-owned utilities and Crown properties was retained in chamber statements.

All policy-session decisions are subject to final ratification.

Cuddly Python Friend Of Mouse

Portsmouth, Eng.—A 45-year old widow, cuddled a five-foot-long python in her arms Wednesday when brought into court on a charge of "cruelly terrifying a mouse" with the snake.

"It's quite tame," pet shop owner Mrs. Phyllis Cooper told the judge. The mouse also was tame, she added, producing it and letting it run along the front of the witness box.

Mrs. Cooper was acquitted. The charge, brought by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, alleged she had cruelly terrified the rodent by putting him in the same cage with the python, a non-poisonous snake that normally squeezes and then devours its prey.

"These proceedings are unique," declared RSPCA prosecutor Gordon Jones. "In no other country could a mouse invoke

the protection of the law."

Mrs. Cooper said she often had put the mouse into the python's cage to prove her theory that wild animals in captivity with tame ones adjusted themselves. She brought both snake and mouse to court in their cages.

She denied the mouse was terrified on the day RSPCA superintendent Harvey Hindle visited her pet shop and saw the two pets in the same cage.

Hindle, however, said the mouse was "frantic and distressed and running to every corner with its tail up."

The snake Hindle said, lifted up its tongue and "vibrated" it at the mouse three times in 10 seconds.

Veterinary surgeon David Tennant testified if the mouse was running around the cage terrified it would either be because it recognized the snake as an enemy—or perhaps the cage was too warm.

As for the python, he was near-sighted and would have to stick out his tongue to recognize what it was that was dashing about in his home.

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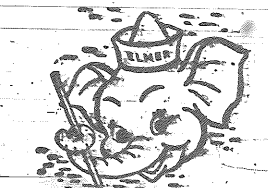
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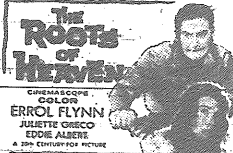

CAR TRICKS

Now and again I like to pass along a suggestion or two I've picked up that may be of some help to you with a particular car problem.

Take, for instance, shallow dents your car might have acquired. These can often be "popped out" with a good sized plumber's plunger. It's worth a try anyway. All you have to do is stick the rubber suction cup firmly over the dents after moistening the edges of the cup then give the handle a steady pull.

Or, if acid corrosion forming on your battery posts and cables is your particular problem... try this: Simply brush some ordinary milk of magnesia over them. This should halt corrosion and make the cables easier to remove, when necessary.

And here's another trick that might prove valuable to vacationers or travelling salesmen. To keep clothes neat and wrinkle-free take a rubber ring (you know the type your wife uses on fruit jars at preserving time) and place it at the top of a rear window. Roll the window up tight, leaving most of the loop hanging inside. Not only is it rattle-free, but this fruit jar rubber ring is strong enough to hold several garments on hangers. What's more, it can't scratch glass or paint.

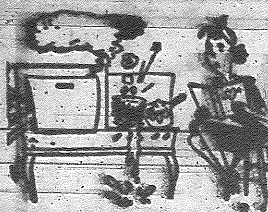

These rich and tender whirls are made from a baking powder biscuit dough and filled with a spicy mixture of apricots and almonds. The pinwheel effect is obtained by rolling up the dough like a jelly-roll and then slicing it. They are especially tempting when served hot. If they are made in advance they can be reheated just before serving. Apricot Whirls will find equal favor with the family when served for dessert or at coffee breaks.

APRICOT-WHIRLS

Yield — 1 dozen whirls
1 can (15 ounces) apricot halves very well drained
2 tablespoons brown sugar
¾ teaspoon ground cinnamon
¼ cup chopped blanched almonds
1½ cups once-sifted all-purpose flour or 2 cups once-sifted pastry flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup granulated sugar
¼ cup chilled shortening
½ cup about milk

Chop well - drained apricots finely. Add and mix in brown sugar, cinnamon and almonds. Grease an 8-inch square cake pan. Preheat oven to 425 deg. F. (hot). Sift together into a bowl the all-purpose or pastry flour, baking powder, salt and granulated sugar. Cut in shortening finely. Add and mix in sufficient milk to make a soft dough - about ½ cup. Turn out dough onto lightly-floured board or canvas and knead lightly 10 seconds. Roll out to a 9X12-inch rectangle; spread with prepared apricot filling. Beginning at a long edge roll up jelly-roll fashion; cut into twelve 1-inch pieces. Place the pieces, cut sides up, in prepared pan. Bake in preheated oven about 25 minutes. Serve warm or reheated.

Idea Of First Spaceman Given

Philadelphia — The first U.S. man into space probably will be a cautious driver on the ground. He likely spans his children

when they misbehave. He gets mad from time to time and may show it, but he can control his anger if he has to.

That's part of the picture of the seven U.S. space candidates as reported today by the chief psychiatrist who examined them, Capt. George Ruff of the U.S. air force Wright air development centre.

The first space pilot is free from impulse. He isn't likely to pop off to superiors or go absent without leave.

Dr. Ruff said the first space

man is generally a warm father — but he isn't family bound. He forms close relationship such as those in the family easily — but he can also detach himself from his family if he has to.

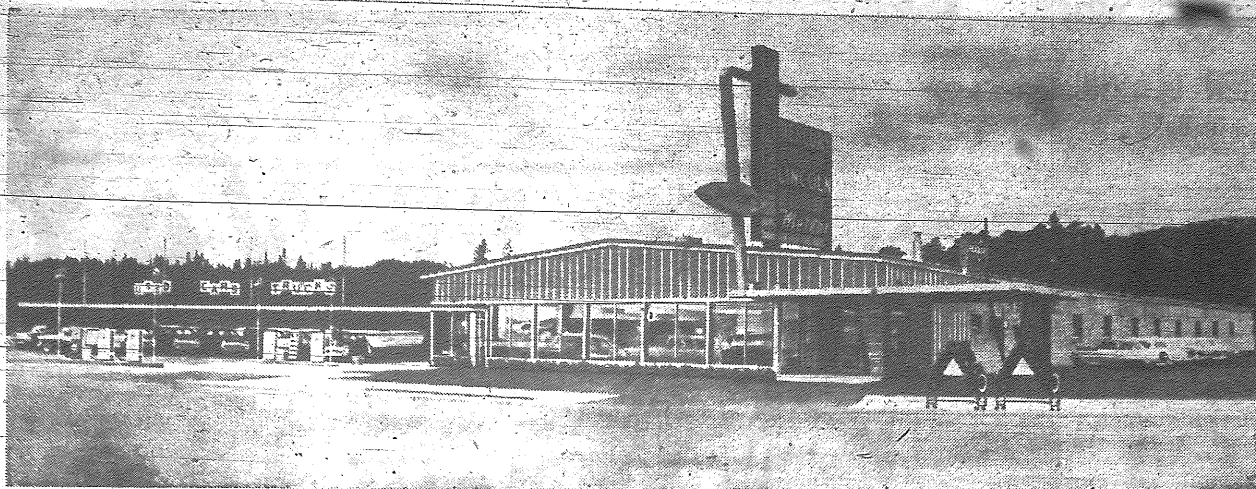

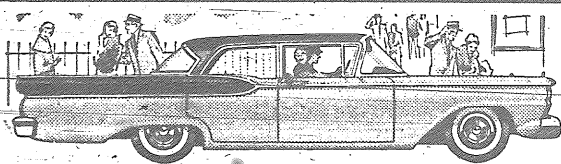

MONTREAL — The CBC has apologized to the Sisters of Charity—the Grey Nuns—for a television program on its French-language network last Sunday purportedly depicting incidents in the life of the order's founder, Mother Marie Therese Marguerite d'Youville.

The 90-minute program was presented the same day that Mother d'Youville, an 18th century Canadian nun, was beatified in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Beatification is the Roman Catholic Church's highest honor next to sainthood.

In a letter Wednesday to Most Reverend Mother Clarinda Fortin, the order's provincial superior, Roger Rolland, program director

for the CBC's French-language network, says "the production took the wrong approach because of clumsy attempts to present something original."

NEW PROGRAM

The CBC hopes, Mr. Rolland continues, that a program scheduled for May 14, showing film taken during the beatification ceremonies, "will be more significant and will draw attention in a fitting manner to the memory of the founder of your order."

Sunday's program, titled La Plus Belle de Ceans—She Who is the Most Beautiful—roused a storm of protest from Quebec viewers who felt it showed both Mother d'Youville and Montreal of the 18th century as loose and

immoral.

The program emphasized Mother d'Youville's life before she became a nun and many viewers apparently felt it concentrated

too heavily on the circumstances of her unhappy marriage which ended with the death of her husband.

There were complaints that both the dress of the actress playing the nun and some of the camera angles used were immodest and also that, in showing her husband's life, there was unnecessary emphasis on the seamy side of the Montreal of that period.

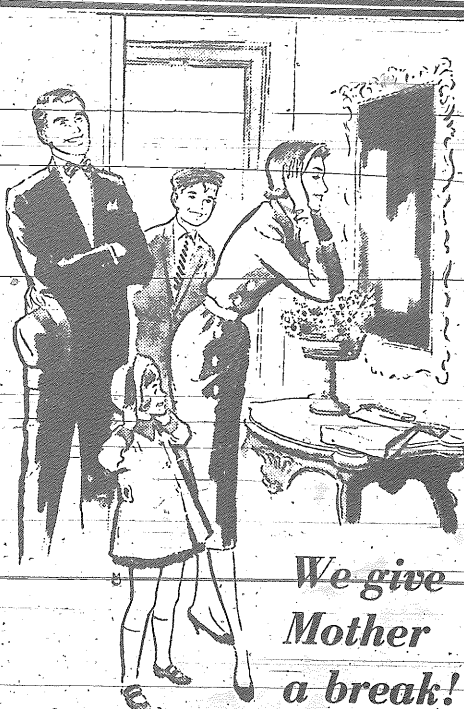
In his letter, Mr. Rolland says the French-language network has been undergoing a difficult period of readjustment since the two-month television producers' strike which disrupted services.

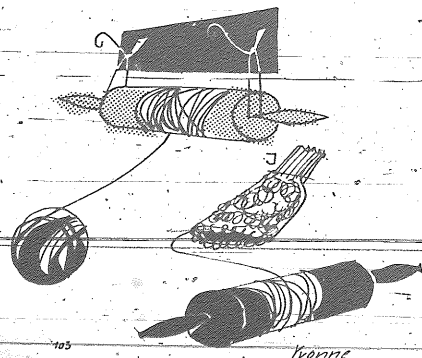

Highest bid for beaver pelts was \$22.50 each. A few mink sold for a top of \$9.

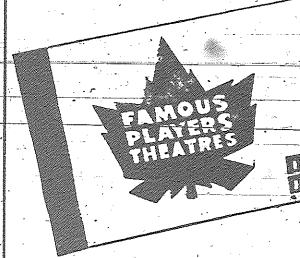

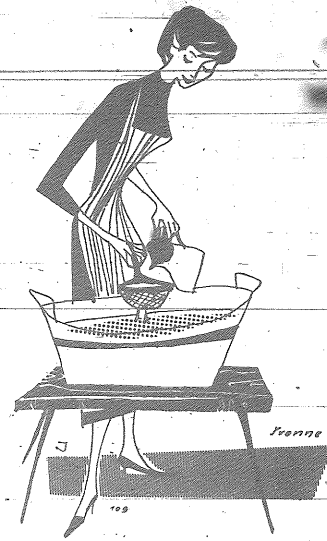



The first tender shoots of rhubarb are poking their heads through the ground now and soon we'll be making fresh rhubarb pie. This is my favorite.

Rhubarb Tapioca Pie

4 cups rhubarb (washed and cut)
2 eggs (separated)
1½ cups sugar
3 tbsps. quick cooking tapioca
1 tbsps. grated orange rind
¼ cup sugar (for meringue)
1 pastry shell (unbaked)

Place rhubarb in large bowl and add egg yolks slightly beaten, also sugar, tapioca and orange rind. Mix well and pile into uncooked shell. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes, then at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes. Remove from oven when rhubarb is tender and pile meringue around edge of pie leaving centre bare. Brown at 325 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes.

Hint for Today

A little lemon juice, cinnamon or nutmeg added to stewed rhubarb is good.

Rhubarb is very versatile. Here it is combined with pineapple and strawberry jello powders to make a delicious jam.

FRANCE, GERMANY AGREE

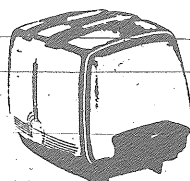

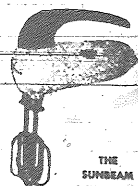

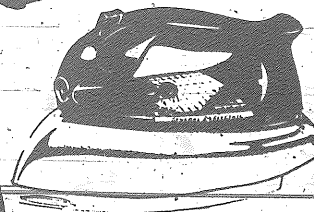
