He farmed in St. Martin Manitoba prior to coming to Hudson Ontario in 1944. He has been a resident of Pinecrest for the past 16 months.

Deceased by his wife, forty years ago, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Kasha Cowly of Hudson, Ontario and Mrs. Helen Mellon of Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Monday afternoon, May 11, at two o'clock. Rev. R. J. Leighton will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

IMPORTANCE OF RAINY LAKE CAUSEWAY STRESSED BY PREMIER FROST

The importance of the Rainy Lake causeway to Northern and Northwestern Ontario was stressed by Premier Leslie M. Frost at Sault Ste. Marie when he made the announcement concerning the new international bridge linking the two Soos.

The bridge with its approaches, will be 12,000 feet long. It will cross the ship canals immediately east of the existing railway bridge, will have a total river span of just under 5,000 feet with 124-foot clearance over both canals.

"It will be located within the boundaries of the Canadian and American cities," Mr. Frost said. "But it is designed to develop not only Sault Ste. Marie, but the whole of Northern Ontario."

The new bridge, the completion of the Trans-Canada links throughout Northern Ontario and connecting roads involving Chapleau, Timmins, Wawa and Thessalon will open up a tourist's paradise, the premier said.

"We shall be tying in, by reason of the Rainy Lake causeway and other developments, the Mississippi road system and parkway with this bridge, we will tie in Northern Ontario with Chicago and Detroit."

"These great new traffic connections have fabulous possibilities for all of Northern Ontario and particularly those areas around Georgian Bay, Sudbury, Manitoulin, Sault Ste. Marie and the North Shore, Quetico Park and the great hinterland stretching up to Timmins."

He said they will open up great economic possibilities in the pulp, lumber, mining and the tourist industry.

He referred to the road around the eastern end of Lake Superior to link the Soo with the Lakehead, the completion of the road from Chapleau to No. 17 Highway at Thessalon, the road from Chapleau to No. 17 at Wawa and the Chapleau-Foley road which

has been started from both ends.

"When this road is complete, a direct highway connection will be available from Sault Ste. Marie to Timmins, Cochrane, Kirkland Lake, Kapuskasing, Hearst and the surrounding areas," Mr. Frost said. "When conditions permit, a new route will be built inland from Sudbury to Chapleau."

Ontario's share in the total cost of the bridge will be protected through tolls agreement the Premier said.

Stewart Moore Former Resident Died In Edmonton

Word was received in Kenora, Friday of the sudden death of William Stewart Moore, former well known resident and son of Mrs. F. W. Moore, Kenora. The death occurred in Edmonton, May 6th.

The late Mr. Moore was born in Kenora and received his education here, and left for Edmonton as a young man. He was in his 64th year.

He is survived by his widow Rose, one son Kenneth of Dawson, Yukon Territories, his mother, Mrs. F. W. Moore of Kenora; one brother Frank of Saskatchewan; four sisters, Mrs. H. A. (Treasure) MacMurphy and Mrs. W. J. (Violet) McKinnon both of Kenora, Mrs. Alec (Irene) Locke of Hamilton and Mrs. R. (Maud) Sigurdson of Winnipeg. Four grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services will be held in Edmonton, final arrangements are pending.

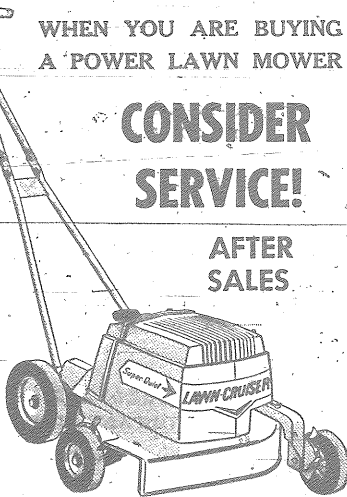



Father Of Kenora Resident Died In Winnipeg

Samuel Wright, 95, of 225 Sydney Avenue, East Kildonan, Manitoba, father of Mrs. Frank Tanner Kenora and well known in this district died Friday, May 1st in Grace Hospital Winnipeg.

He was born at Saxby, Leicestershire, England, coming to Canada in 1919 he farmed in Eagle River, Ontario for 20 years before retiring and moving to East Kildonan. Before coming to Canada he was a locomotive engine driver for many years.

His wife predeceased him in 1936, also one son, Walter died the same year, surviving are five sons, Albert and Ernest of Winnipeg, Cyril of Leicester England, Wilfred of Red Lake, Frederick of McIntosh; one daughter, Mrs. Frank Tanner of Kenora. Also 20 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.
