Lake Level Up 10 Inches Since March 1st

The week-end rain, plus a strong south-east wind has raised the level of the Lake of the Woods this morning to its highest point since last September 16th. The level this morning in Kenora is 1057.80 feet above sea level and in Keewatin 1057.86. This is about the average spread between the Lake level in the two towns.

Rainfall during the past 24 hours ending at 8:30 a.m. today was measured at .19 inches. The wind was gusting to 45 miles per hour. The outflow from the Lake of the Woods Sunday was the lowest for some time, 3750 cubic feet per second.

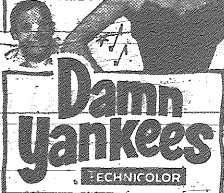

Civilization And Money Brings Eskimo Divorces

Ottawa.—An authority here says civilization—the concept of money and property—has probably been the biggest factor in complicating the marital practices of the Eskimos.

G. W. Rowley, 46-year-old northern affairs department official and author who lived two years in Eskimo igloos, commented on a report that the territorial court has granted its first two divorce decrees to Eskimos.

"The happiest igloo I ever lived in consisted of two couples," Mr. Rowley said. "It was not until after I left that I learned the two couples originally had been matched the other way around."

Originally the practice was for parents to match their children as prospective mates early in life sometimes before they were born.

When the young Eskimo was in a position to support the woman they began to live together. **Simply Separated**

If they got along, this was fine, Mr. Rowley said. If they did not, they simply separated and were free to take on a new mate.

There was—and still is among many Eskimos — no marriage ceremony and no separation problems. The wife took the children, although when these existed there was less danger of a break-up.

A few years ago, it was common for men to have two or three wives. The practice of a woman having more than one husband was occasionally accepted. This was dictated by the availability of males and females in the nomadic Eskimo community.

"In these recent divorce cases there probably were bank accounts or property involved," Mr. Rowley said.

Details of the actions before Mr. Justice John H. Sissons of the territorial court on his latest Arctic circuit were not immediately available.

Grounds for divorce in the territories are similar to those in the provinces, the main ground being adultery.

Now Court Problem
Formerly the Eskimo had few or no possessions to leave anyone, Mr. Rowley said. Some of them now have money and this creates problems that can be handled only in courts.

Although most of Canada's 10,000 Eskimos now follow Christianity, many still follow the old marriage and separation practices, he said.

Mr. Rowley is secretary of Northern Affairs' Advisory committee on northern development.

He said young Eskimos often changed mates — always by mutual agreement and with no trouble—two or three times.

If they did it too often the elders of the community might say, "tut tut, you should settle down," but nothing more serious.

"The only ground needed for separation was incompatibility," he said. "They were very sensible about these things."

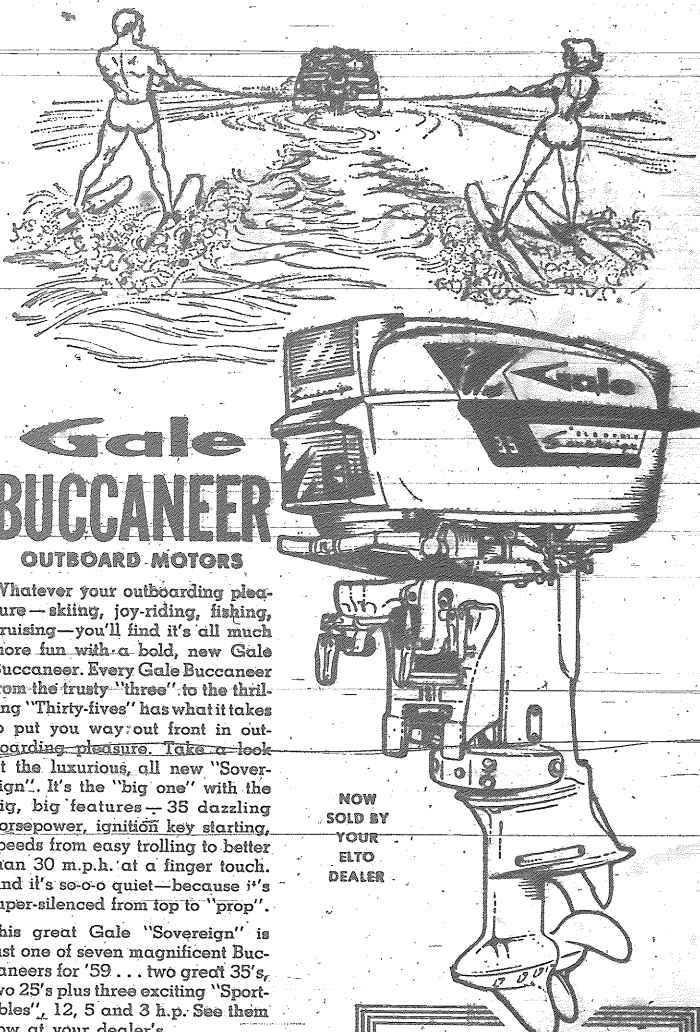

Forestry Dept. To Plant 40,000,000 Trees In Province

Toronto — Again this Spring, Ontario's forestry profession is supervising the planting of some 40,000,000 trees — an operation which is already underway across the province.

Of this total, about 15,000,000 are being planted on private lands with the balance being planted in Ontario government

projects. The latter will include municipal and conservation authority lands which are managed under agreement by the Dept. of Lands and Forests. A larger percentage of these trees will be planted on cut-over and burned-over lands to ensure a future harvest of the most commercially valuable species.

The professional forester has a prominent role in this program. He gathers information describing the present condition of the forest and forest land, analyses this data, and draws up plans for planting the proper species of trees in the particular areas. He also directs the successive stages of the tree planting operations.

All of these 40,000,000 trees — actually seedlings — come from the Lands and Forests nurseries of which there are now 12, including two new sites located near Dryden and Swastika. Present capacity is 60,000,000 trees with potential facilities for expanding this capacity to 100,000,000.

The general proportion of tree species furnished by the nurseries for planting comprises 60% white pine, red pine, jackpine and Scotch pine; 25% white, black and Norway spruce; 12% white cedar, European larch, tamarack, silver maple, white ash, red oak and Carolina poplar. A number of other species make up the remaining 3%.

The pulp and paper companies and lumber operators, in many cases, carry out limited tree planting operations in cut-over or burned-over Crown and freehold land which comprises their timber limits. Generally, they obtain their seedlings from the Dept. nurseries, although some such as Spruce Falls Power and Paper Co. at Kapuskasing have their own nurseries where the stock is grown from seed.

One of the jobs of the professional forester is to determine the best season for planting.

Best survival for seedlings is obtained by planting early in the spring when the frost is out of the ground. However, on light sandy soils, fall planting is successful.

"Survival may range from complete failure to 100% success," says J. A. Brodie, RPF, Timber Division chief for the Dept. of Lands and Forests. "Weather plays a large part in the success and 30%-95% survival is normal."

In tree planting, both machine and hand methods are used, depending upon the terrain. Under

ideal conditions, three men operating a machine can plant 1,000 trees per hour. It takes two men all day to plant the same number by hand.

Once these seedlings are planted, they are periodically checked to ensure that they have a good start towards reaching maturity — a process which may take as long as 80 to 120 years to attain in the case of most coniferous species, although some types such as red pine may be cut for poles at 35 to 40 years. Again in the case of private landowners, some of the pines planted are harvested as a Christmas tree crop at six to 10 years.

Spend 7 Billions On Roads By 1978 — Cass

Henderson, N.C. — More than \$7,000,000,000 will be spent in Ontario during the next 20 years to improve streets and highways, F. M. Cass, the province's minister of highways, said today.

Mr. Cass spoke to 80 Cana-

dian electric utility and municipal officials attending a three-day Canadian street and highway lighting conference. The conference chose this North Carolina site so the delegates could study an elaborate General Electric Co. street layout in which all types

of lighting can be demonstrated. Mr. Cass said the giant outlay by Ontario will be needed to keep pace with a continuing sharp rise in automobile registrations. He estimated Ontario will have 4,000,000 motor vehicles by 1975.

The minister said the \$7,000,000,000 outlay will be shared by the provincial government and 1,000 municipalities. "The results

will be apparent long before the end of the period and the benefit will be cumulative," he said.

More than two-fifths of all vehicle travel in Ontario falls on the provincial highways network, Mr. Cass said.

"In the current fiscal year, the department will make a gross expenditure of just over \$2,000,000 on King's highways and secondary highways exclusive of municipal subsidies and amounts spent on development roads, which brings our gross expenditure up to \$273,257,000, the minister added.

the House that this problem would become serious by 1962.

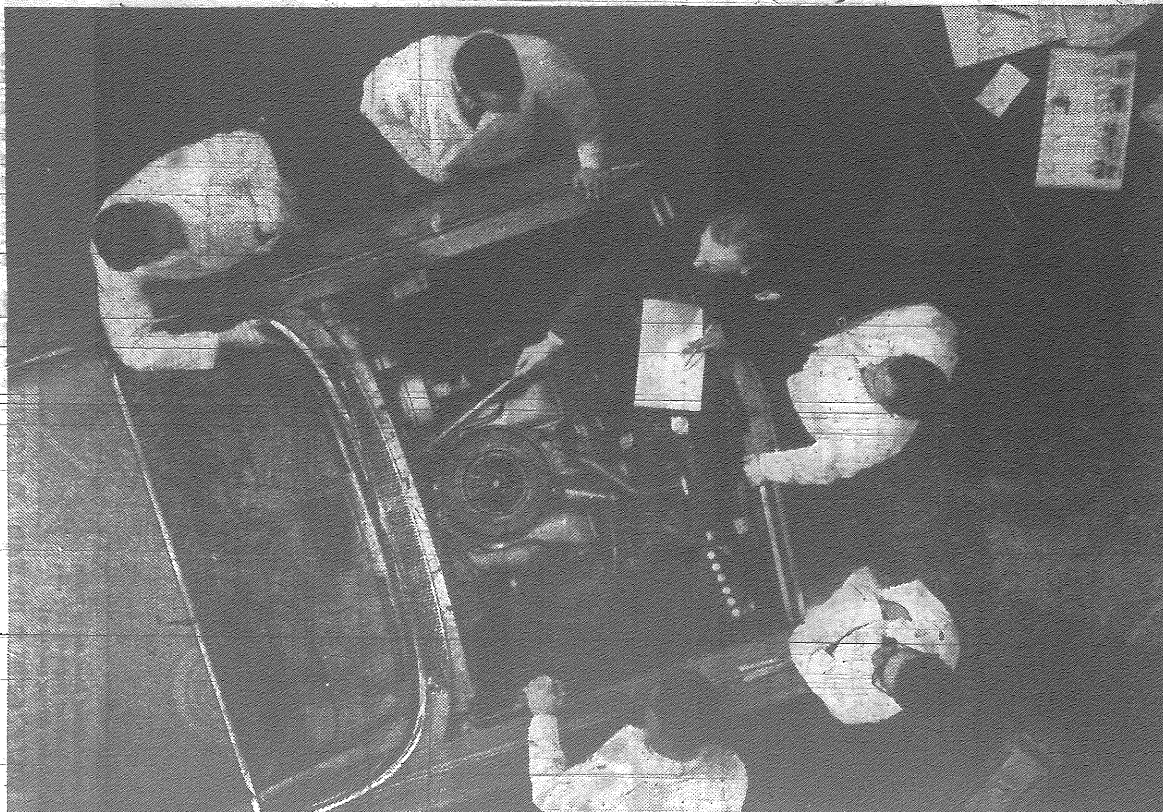
SOUR BOBBY TALKS TO WRONG MAN

WHOLE TOWN IN UNITED STATES SOLD AT AUCTION

Pondosa, Ore.—This tiny eastern Oregon community—the town nearest geographical centre of the U.S.—was sold at auction for \$33,925.

The property, sold as individual units, included a shutdown saw mill, 10 industrial buildings, a general store, a hotel, 53 houses, and 280 acres of land. The community was owned by a lumber company.

Its half a dozen families and a few local ranchers viewed the community's demise with remorse. The sawmill was built in 1926, and at the height of the lumbering boom Pondosa boasted a population of 250.

Many residents thought Pondosa had a future as a tourist attraction for being the closest town to the geographical centre. The centre was shifted from Smith County, Kan., to Union County here with the admission of Alaska and Hawaii as states.

JUDGE RULES LAW CAN'T STOP BARKING

Houston, Tex.—A judge ruled that dog owners cannot be required by law to keep their dogs from barking and added: "As a matter of fact, you can't keep a dog from barking unless you kill it."

Judge William A. Miller tossed out a \$50 fine against L. F. Schaeffer, Jr. owner of the Idlewood kennels.

The kennels owner was fined March 17 in corporation court for keeping barking dogs that made unnecessary noises. He appealed to county court. The complaint had been filed by neighbors.

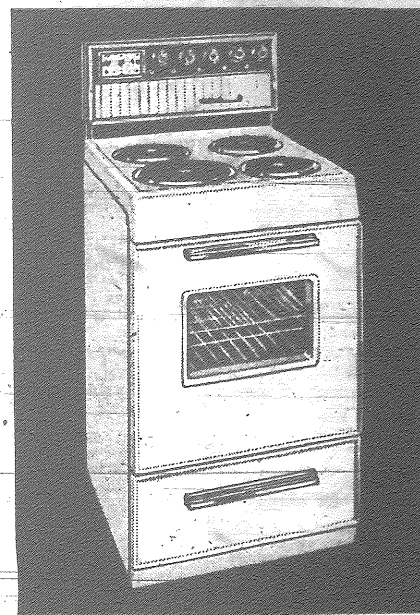
