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

Ottawa, An authority here says civilization—the concept of money and property—has probably been the biggest factor in complicating the marital practices of the Eskimos.

G. W. Rowley, 46-year-old northern affairs department of-ficial and author who lived two years in Eskimo igloos, commented on a report that the territor

ted on a report that the territorial court has granted its first two divorce decrees to Eskimos. "The happiest ighor I ever lived in consisted of two couples." Mr. Rowley said. "It was not until after I left that I learned the two couples originally had been matched the other way around."

matched the other way around.
Originally the practice was for parents to match their children as prospective mates early in life sometimes before they were born.
When the young Eskimo was in a position to support the woman they began to live together.
Simply Separated
If they got along, this was fine, Mr. Rowley said. If they did not, they simply separated and were free to take on a new mate.

There was—and still is among many Eskimos — no marriage ceremony and no separation pro-blems. The wife took the children, although when these existed there was less danger of a break-

A few years ago, it was common for men to have two or three wives. The practice of a woman having more than on husband was occasionally acthree was woman having more husband was occasionally accepted. This was dictated by the of males and females commun.

"In these recent divorce cases

"In these recent divorce cases there probably were bank accounts or property involved," Mr. Rowley said.

Details of the actions before Mr. Justice John H. Sissons of the territorial court on his latest Aretic circuit were not immediately available.

Grounds for divorce in the territories are similar to those in the provinces, the main ground being adultery.
