## JOHN WINTERMEYER TO VISIT KENORA AND DISTRICT MAY 24-25

John J. Wintermeyer, Q.C., M.P.P. and Leader of the Ontario Liberal Party will arrive in Kenora on Sunday, May 24th and remain in the area until May 25th, Albert Wren, Kenora's M.P.P. reports today.

Wintermeyer is a graduate of Harvard law school and Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia. Following his law training he took his degree in Commerce at Notre Dame University. He is senior partner of a law firm in his home town of Kitchener, Ontario.

As with both party leaders, Mr. Wintermeyer will be accompanied by several of his own staff and representatives of leading Canadian newspapers when he arrives in Kenora by

car. At press time, Mr. Wren said fuller details will be released following local meetings this week.

As with most Members of the Legislature, Mr. Wintermeyer had a good background of experience on municipal Council in Kitchener. His training and experience fits him well for leadership and in the short time he has led Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition in the House he has demonstrated his ability especially in matters of law and finance. The people of Kenora will

have the opportunity to hear him later this month.

Said Wren today - "It is good to have the leaders of both leading parties visit this constituency. I welcome both Premier Frost and the present leader of the Opposition for I am sure we can get agreement between them on northern needs so that in the end no matter which is in leadership on whatever side of the House, Northern Development would move on apace."

## Snow - High Winds Set Back Season

Today's snowstorm, which has been swept across Northwestern Ontario in blizzard force, is but the latest in a series of disturbances which has brought March-like weather to Kenora during most of the first 12 days of May. Few people are happy with the weather, which hasn't even produced sufficient moisture to produce a credit in its favor.

Rainfall until 8.00 a.m. measured only .05 of an inch, bringing the month's total to 1.22 inches.

Meanwhile, high winds have caused considerable damage to buildings, telephone and power lines and the TV antennae. At the Thistle Rink yesterday, high wind ripped tin from the north side of the roof. Norwestco Communications Ltd. report that falling trees have torn down telephone lines, but workmen have been busy restoring service just as quickly as possible.

## Off Street Parking Lots Being Readied

Off-street parking space will soon become a reality in Kenora and plans for the preparing of two sites are rapidly going ahead.

Council last night granted authority to the Town and Construction Company for the demolition and removal of the old town warehouse and blacksmith shop located on the corner of Chipman and First Street South, at a firm price of \$1,000.00. Alderman A. E. Minor reported that equipment had been transported to the locality and work was commencing.

Workmen are also busy clearing town owned property on Matheson Street where the second parking lot is planned.

## PREMIER FROST DEFIES STORM; COMING BY CAR

Premier Leslie Frost will address an election meeting tonight in the Legion Hall as scheduled. Despite the late spring blizzard which has swept northwestern Ontario all day and forced cancelation of the scheduled flight by the Premier from Atikokan this afternoon, the Mr. Frost will be here.

Cutting short his campaign meeting in Atikokan this afternoon, the Premier and his party started for Kenora by car shortly before 3.00 p.m. The route will take him back to Fort William and then, via Trans Canada Highway to Kenora. He expects to cover the 375 mile distance in time to address his Kenora audience, as scheduled. He leaves again by CPR train No. 8 at 11.30 p.m. for Fort William.

It is a terrific effort, one which Kenora people will appreciate," said Bill Johnson, campaign manager for Progressive Conservative candidate Howard Keffer, in announcing the change in travel plans. "I am sure that the capacity audience which is expected will show its appreciation for Mr. Frost's tremendous desire to come to this riding."

## Raising Speed Limit Will Create Hazard In Norman

"Raising the speed limit from thirty miles an hour to forty miles between Kenora and Norman on Highway 17, is not going to help move traffic any faster, but rather it will create a very definite hazard to the many people who live in the area," said Mr. Evert Larson President of the Norman Home and School Association when he addressed council last night.

Mr. Larson was speaking against a motion recently made by council that the department of highways raise the speed limit from thirty miles to forty from the post office to the Keewatin boundary. Continuing, Mr. Larson stated that the highway was already a speed way and that when police cars were not in evidence cars travelled between 45 and 60 miles an hour and he was sure they would go even faster if the speed limit was increased.

"I am asking this council to consider very carefully the safety of the adults and children of this area before coming to a definite decision," he said.

Backing up his statement, Mr. Larson gave the following facts:

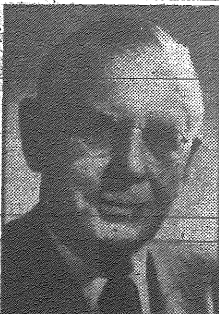

committee read the complete brief which outlined the need of a properly supervised hostel for the 2,500 Indian people of this area. Stressed was the need for a suitable place where these people can spend the night, get warm, or out of the elements or for the most elementary needs and a place to stay while awaiting doctors care.

The old brewery site, situated on First Avenue South, was felt by the group to be an ideal location since it bordered on the waterfront. Council in conjunction with the town planning board is in the process of re-zoning certain areas of the town, putting them in the residential class, the brewery property comes in this category.

The matter was referred to council as a whole for discussion. Full text of the brief will be published in 'Wednesdays' edition of the Miner and News.

The brewery building came up for more attention, when a petition signed by some 56 residents in the area asked that council take steps to have the Lake of the Woods Brewery Building "condemned and torn down as quickly as possible in the interests of PUBLIC SAFETY."

Reasons given were, (1) that the building created a fire hazard, (2) that the building was often visited by small children who gained entry by windows; these children could easily be killed by falling through openings, four floors high, (3) The building was an "eyesore" and detrimental to surrounding property. This petition was referred to council as a whole.

Norman children from grade four and up must cross the highway at least twice a day in order to attend school in Kenora and Keewatin. There are five bus stops, Tourist camps, filling stations, drive-in eating places, the community park and countless homes all along the highway, plus the turn off to the two hospitals. There are no sidewalks except along the road to the hospital bridge and this is not usable most of the time in the winter, due to the town snow plow heaping snow on the walk. Add to this he continued the fact that the highway is very poorly lighted and hardly a week goes by without an accident occurring somewhere along the route. "The citizens of Norman solicit your sympathy gentlemen in keeping the speed limit as is," concluded Mr. Larson.

The matter was referred to Fire and Police committee as a whole.

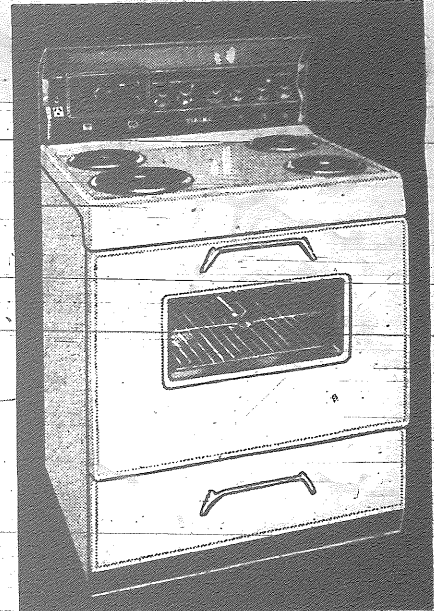

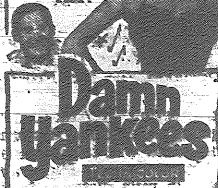

## DRYDEN DODGERS JOIN DISTRICT BALL LOOP

It was announced by Kenora district baseball league president Ted Earley that the Dryden Dodgers have been admitted to the Kenora District Baseball League as the fourth member. The Norman Cubs, who have been in the league the past few years have decided not to operate this season and their franchise has been taken over by the league with all players being free agents for the 1959 season. Should they wish to operate their franchise next year all players will be returned to them.

The four clubs in the league this year will be the Keewatin Indians, Kenora Legion, Dryden Red Sox and Dryden Dodgers. The Kenora District Baseball League is once again a member of the National Baseball Congress. This will be their fourth year of affiliation.

## Rotary Club To Sponsor Bingo And Community Picnic

Kenora Rotarians decided to sponsor a Monster Bingo-in-June, and their annual Community Picnic at Coney Island on the Civic Holiday in August as 1959 projects for civic entertainment and fund raising for club community needs. The business meeting took the form of a general discussion on a number of suggested schemes, including those approved as above.

Another project will be given consideration, with Mr. Adams of the Canadian Opera Company, sponsored by the Operatic Association of Toronto, presenting the plans of that organization. This new group is providing popular operas in English to smaller communities, and a very successful Maritime tour last year has set the stage for Eastern and Western tours and another Toronto presentation.

This group was organized to give young Canadian artists an opportunity to appear in opera, and has already helped some outstanding young Canadian artists to get their opportunity with British and American Opera companies. To this end grants have been received from the Canadian Council.

The opera selected this year, to be sung in English, will be the "Barber of Seville" a pure musical comedy with innumerable farcical situations, and so great has been the response in small Maritime communities that the Eastern and Western tours were unanimously decided upon. The cost to the sponsoring organization locally would be \$800, plus local advertising etc.

President W. H. Marr presided and discussion was lead by Rotarians Eric Apps and Lawrence McLennan. The club will also sponsor a recital by Miss Pat Francis on June 5th in the High School auditorium.

Attendance was 96.36% and last week 98.15%.

## Always Ride With Locked Doors

It happens in fiction, and it happens in fact. A woman driver is sitting at the wheel, waiting for the light to change to green. Suddenly the curb-side door of the car is jerked open, and a man jumps in. He may just be a little drunk . . . or he may be degenerate, or desperate. ### TOWN COUNCIL NOTES

Many and varied were the items dealt with by the town council last evening. "French Fries" will be the order of the day (or night) in Kenora, since council granted John Hutchuk a licence to operate a mobile potato chip unit in the town of Kenora upon payment of \$150.00 licence fee and on the understanding that his unit does not remain in one location for long periods and must not interfere with traffic.

The report of J. A. McCoombs, Town Engineer enclosing a plan showing the proposed dumping ground for the material resulting from the dredging of Laurenson's Creek was approved by council.

Ordered filed was another report from the town engineer referring to the proposal of the

Kenora Chamber of Commerce for the construction of an underpass project to both hospitals and indicating that this matter is the responsibility of the Department of Highways, and as present plans call for the continuing use of the present detour as a permanent means of access to the hospitals, the underpass project will not likely be undertaken.

Mr. K. D. Fisher, Secretary of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, local union 539 will be advised that council is prepared to meet with representatives of the union on May 14th to discuss proposals pertaining to a new agreement.

#### FINANCE

Authorized paid were municipal accounts totalling, \$57,642.18 and Utility accounts amounting to \$56,942.23. Received were cheques in the amounts of \$477.99, the town's share of fines and fees for the month of April from Magistrate's Court and \$788.00 from the police office being parking fines and licence fees for April.

## Dr. J. R. Kidd To Speak At Quetico Annual Conference

An internationally recognized Canadian educator, author and adult education authority will be the theme speaker at the annual meeting of the Quetico Conference and Training Centre to be held May 30. The meeting will be held at the Quetico Centre on Eve's Lake.

Dr. J. R. Kidd, Director of the

Canadian Association for Adult Education, Toronto, will speak on the importance of continuing education in industry, union, civic, and community affairs. He will deal specifically with continuing education in a residential centre. Dr. Kidd is a patron of the Quetico Centre.

At this meeting of supporters of the Quetico Conference and Training Centre its development from a Department of Lands and Forests ranger base to a North-western Ontario, continuing education centre will be outlined. A panel of the Executive Committee will report on the phases of development in the first ten months.

N. Edmonstone, Vice-president and Secretary-Treasurer of Steep Rock Iron Mines and a member of the Financial Advisory Committee will report on the committee's activities to raise funds for the Centre.

D. S. Cheadle, Barrister, Solicitor and Notary, and Legal Adviser to the Centre will report on the organizational structure and membership system.

HOWARD FRANKLIN KEFFER was born in the city of Toronto and received his schooling there. He is of United Empire Loyalist Stock.

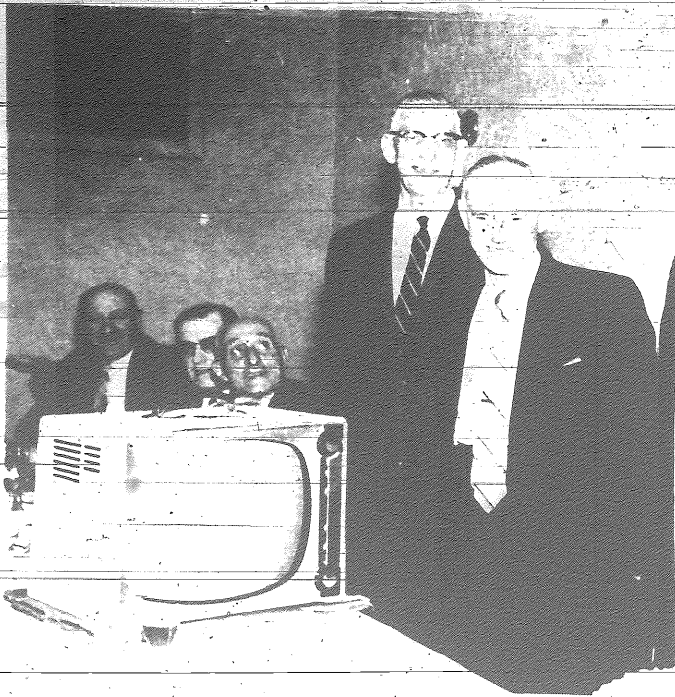

committed for a period of six months.

The board showed concern on hearing again of misunderstanding with the Indian Hospital at Sioux Lookout, over the placement of Treaty children, and it passed a resolution instructing the local director to take up the matter with the proper authorities.

There was a total of 207 children in care at the end of the month, with forty out on adoption probation. Four cases of children of unmarried parents were closed, leaving ten cases active. Protection work is being carried out in forty-two families with 100 children involved.

A gracious offer on the part of the Kinette Club to provide a dryer for the Children's Aid Society was accepted by the board.

The chairman read a letter from Mr. Ken McGeachy, the C.A.S. worker for the Dryden area, thanking the members for giving him the opportunity to attend an introductory course for social workers which was conducted by Mr. W. H. Bury, Director of the Department of Welfare. Mr. McGeachy outlined the studies undertaken and said he had derived great benefit from the training.

The report of the treasurer showed a satisfactorily low clothing account of \$768.33; medical dental expenses of \$352.68; and a boarding account of \$4,424.90 for 156 children.

A report from W. H. Marr who represented this area at the Northern Ontario Economic Development meetings held at the Lakehead was accepted and will be studied by council as a whole.

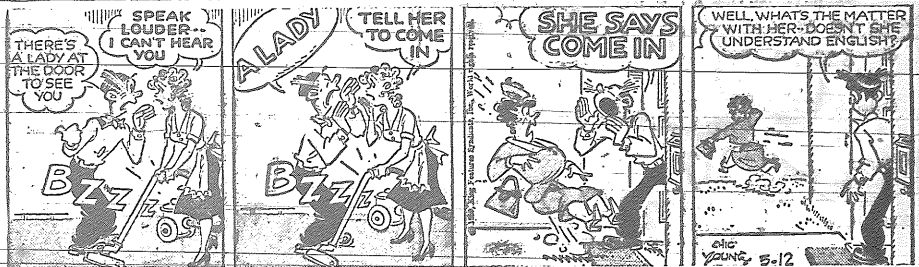
## Forestry Institute Names New Officers At Dryden Meeting
