Osgoode Galloway Keewatin Resident Died Wednesday

William Joseph Osgoode Galloway, well known resident of Keewatin for the past fifty-nine years, died at the Kenora General Hospital, Wednesday evening May 13th, following a lengthy illness. Born at Arthur, Ontario, April 3rd, 1887, he was in his 73rd year.

He came to Keewatin in 1900 and joined the services of the CPR as a trainman in 1915. He was promoted to conductor in 1929 and retired in 1952. He was a veteran of the First Great War, serving with the 52nd Field Artillery; a member of the Minnetonka Lodge IOOF, Keewatin; the Keewatin Legion Branch No. 13. An ardent sportsman, he played hockey and baseball in his early days. He was an adherent of the Keewatin United Church.

He is survived by three brothers, Leslie of Kenora, Hubert of Victoria and Cecil of Keewatin, and one sister, Mrs. A. C. (Janet) McCowan also of Keewatin.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Saturday afternoon, May 16th, at two o'clock. Rev. A. 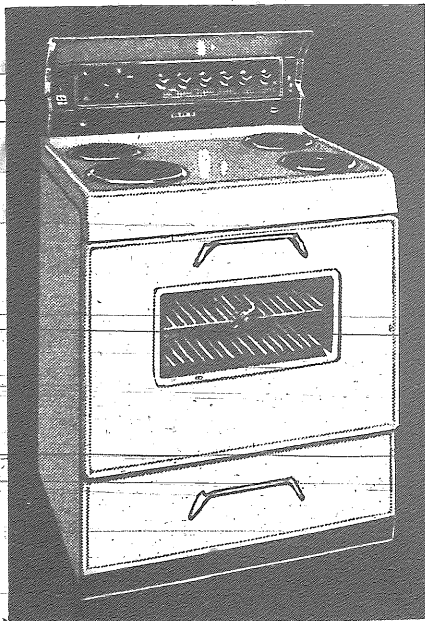
Mr. Carter reported on a joint meeting with the Kenora Public

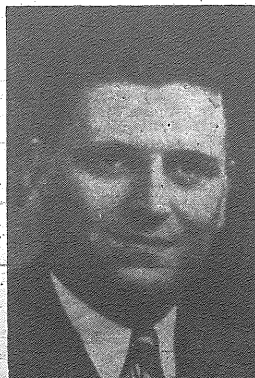

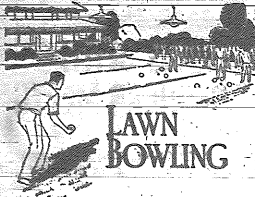

during the month of April and a cheque in the amount of \$50.86 was enclosed to cover this corporation's portion.

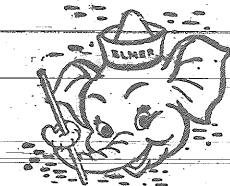
Two communications dated April 2nd and May 4th relative to progress payments in connection with the erection of the new school as submitted by the Board of Public School Trustees were moved filed. Advice from the Ontario Municipal Association concerning the 61st convention to be held in Sudbury August 30th to September 2nd, 1959, was moved filed.

A request from Mrs. C. Young for the purchase of the West Half of Lots 10-11-12, Block 11, Plan 18 was received and the sale of same was authorized for the sum of \$250.00. A second request for lots 3 and 4, block 11, Plan 18 was referred to the Finance Committee of Council for consideration and recommendation. Following presentation of information received regarding the Insurance Survey on all Municipal holdings which had been conducted by Mr. G. G. Landry of Keewatin and Mr. T. G. Cox of the Canadian Surety Company, Winnipeg, Council was of the opinion that this matter should be discussed at a special meeting to be held later this week. Numerous accounts totaling \$41,321.00 were received and authorized paid.

Council was advised that the sidewalk in front of the new Keewatin Citizens Credit Union Office had been completed, also the man-hole on the west side of Sixth Street near Ottawa Street. Immediately suitable posts are available, the railings at the bridge on Wharf Street are to be repaired. The need for repair to the steps on Eighth Street was brought to the attention of the Board of Works as was the necessity of a steel plate on the man-hole at the Recreation Grounds, and the present appearance of the Corporation's Garage which could be remedied with very little repair and paint. Quotations are expected shortly as to the cost of a pumping unit for the Fargo Water Truck.

Parking regulations within the town received considerable discussion and arrangements were made for the purchase of suitable signs in this connection. Upon the recommendation of the Fire and Police Committee of Council it was deemed advisable that a fire-arm replacement be procured for the Police Department.

Council was advised of the recommendation to procure the services of an engineer when considering the possibility of the proposed street lighting plan. By-law number 678 having received first, second and third readings in connection with the agreement between the Corporation and the International Teamsters Union Local 990 was passed.

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Ocean Ships Jam Seaway

Chicago — Large ocean ships, venturing into the Great Lakes for the first time with opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway, have run into some stormy operating and financial weather.

By far the most agonizing thing for shippers has been the traffic jams caused by late lingering ice in the St. Lawrence River. Lost operating days cost money.

One line's operations chief was asked to estimate losses represented by the pileup of ships in southwestern Lake Ontario at the Welland Canal.

"I've been biting my nails for three weeks," he said. "I'd be tearing my hair if I dared face it. Millions and millions of dollars, that's as close as I can come."

There have been other troubles, especially in finding berths for ships, and in handling of cargo.

But nobody is throwing up his hands in despair—yet.

Many of the kinks can be ironed out in time—some problems are being attacked with determination. As for the jam which has had as many as 50 ships backed up at the Welland Canal, many shippers are hopeful that it won't happen again. The jam of 50 ships Sunday was the greatest recorded at the canal.



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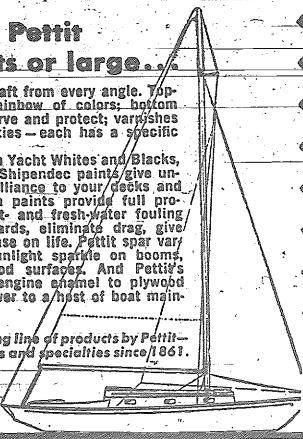

Under it all are dainty, lace-trimmed panties, just

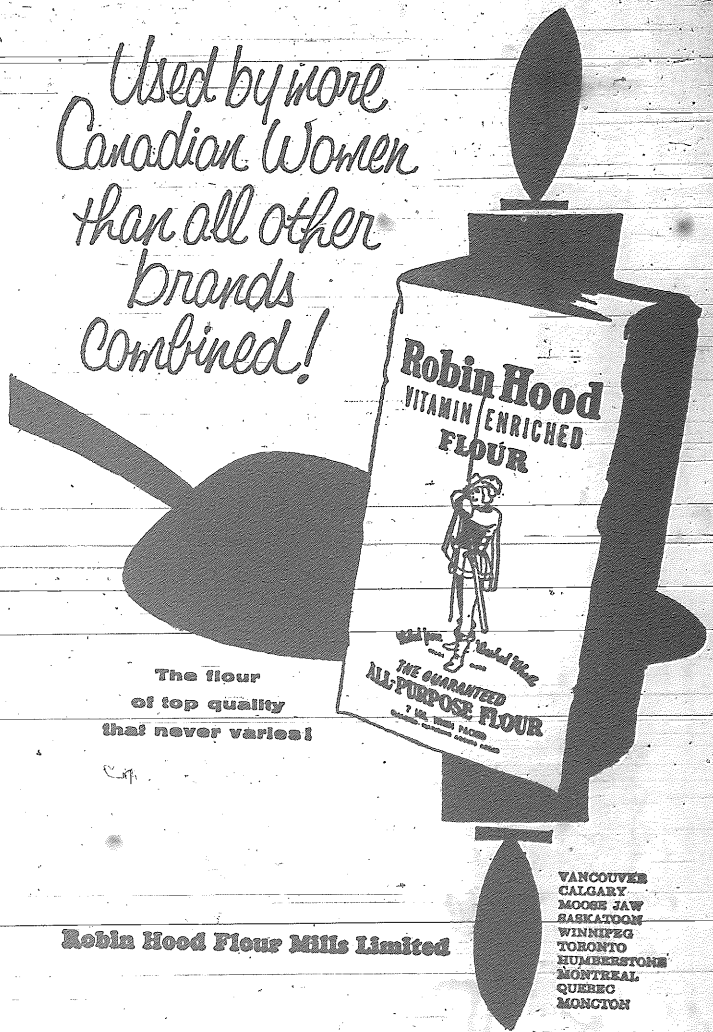
like Gussie's—but more so.

Male players are blasé. Even Karol Fageros' gold-trimmed unmentionables failed to attract much attention. Said one fellow: "Aw, they're last year's panties."

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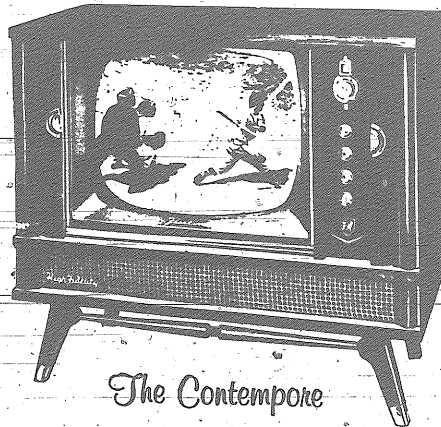
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
