TAKE 34 SEATS

CONSERVATIVES WIN MANITOBA ELECTION

The Progressive Conservative Party of Manitoba has scored a resounding victory in the Thursday Provincial election.

The Conservatives - under Premier Duff Roblin - had formed a minority government in the last legislature with 26 seats. They came out of Thursday's election with 34 seats - five more than the 29 needed to form a majority government.

There are 57 seats in the Manitoba Legislature - but only 55 were at stake. Voting in the two northern constituencies of Churchill and Rupertsland has been deferred to June 11th.

The Conservative victory was scored mainly at the expense of the Liberal-Progressive party.

The Liberals had held 19 seats in the last legislature. They saw this figure cut to eleven in Thursday's voting. The CCF had held eleven seats and won ten.

The CCF - at the beginning, at least - showed more strength than the Liberals. But as the vote-counting progressed, the Liberals picked up strength to finish with one more seat than the CCF, and thus form the official opposition.

Premier Roblin and all his cabinet ministers were re-elected.

A big loss to the CCF was the defeat of their Party Leader Lloyd Stinson, defeated in the Winnipeg constituency of Osborne by Progressive Conservative W. O. Baizley.

The Liberal Leader - D. L.

Campbell - trailed in the early count in his rural riding of Lakeside but came on to win by a narrow margin - 120 votes - over his Conservative opponent.

An early tabulation of the popular vote - one thousand 100 of one-thousand 730 polls - shows the Conservatives gained 45 per cent of the vote. The Liberals received 29.2 per cent; the CCF 24.7.

The Conservatives and Liberals ran candidates in all 55 ridings. The CCF ran 44 candidates. There were three Independents and three Labor-Progressive candidates - all defeated. The social credit party did not contest the election anywhere.

Young Boy Escapes Serious Injury

Six year old Roy Burke narrowly escaped serious injury late Thursday afternoon when he rode his small bicycle off the sidewalk into the road, and collided with a car.

The accident which occurred at 5.15 p.m. in front of the Legion Building resulted in the boy receiving a scratched knee. Driver of the car, a Star Taxi was Harry Wojciechowski.

Dr. Baizley, Former Resident Unseats Man. CCF Leader

Dr. W. Obie Baizley, former well known Kenora resident upset Lloyd Stinson CCF leader in the Manitoba government, when he defeated him in Thursday's general election.

Dr. Baizley, candidate for the Progressive Conservatives for the Osborne seat, scored one of the major upsets of the election, which saw the Conservatives in the majority, when he defeated the leader of the CCF.

While in Kenora, Dr. Baizley was a valued member of the Kinsmen Club, he coached the Rotary Club hockey teams from Bantam to Juvenile, and was very active in community affairs.

Thursday's election, marked his first venture in the field of politics.

FRESNO, Calif. — Boy is vicious, the complaints said. Judge George W. Huffman was dubious.

"Vicious?" queried Haig in shocked tones. "Why, Boy wouldn't hurt a flea." And he stopped and patted Boy on the head. Boy hit him on the elbow and hip.

Judge Huffman adjourned the case for 30 days.

LONDON (AP) — Moscow radio said today Soviet Premier Khrushchev told visiting West German editors eight hydrogen bombs would be enough to put West Germany out of action.

The broadcast quoted Khrushchev as saying "obviously not more" would be needed to take care of the rest of Western Europe.

Moscow reported the talks between the Soviet premier and the German delegation took place Tuesday.

In the same talk, Khrushchev was quoted as saying the Soviet Union would have "losses and great ones" in event of war, but "the western powers would be literally wiped off the face of the earth."

He said NATO's bomber force was out of date and the United States also was lagging behind the Soviet Union in rocket technology.

TIMED FOR GENEVA

The belated account of Khrushchev's remarks is being released by Moscow almost on the eve of the foreign ministers conference in Geneva.

The radio reported this exchange took place:

Khrushchev: "You probably realize how many nuclear bombs with a capacity of 3,000,000 to 5,000,000 tons would have to be exploded on the territory of West Germany to put her out of action?"

Editor G. Braune, one of the group: "Eight hydrogen bombs?"

Khrushchev: "Obviously not more. And to you think that we haven't eight hydrogen bombs?"

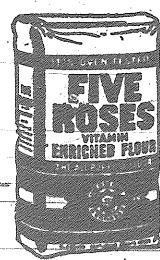
Moscow said Khrushchev then added:

"And how many are needed

to put other West European countries out of action? Obviously not more."

Claiming he was threatening nobody, Khrushchev said a war would end quickly in a Soviet victory.

Jaffray Melick To Crack Down On . . .

or within any defined area thereof, for seizing and impounding and for killing, whether before or after impounding, dogs running at large contrary to the by-law . . .

Sub-sec. 2.—For the purpose of this section a dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found in a highway or other public place and not under the control of any person.

Part II.

Section 9.—Any person may kill a dog, (a) that is found killing or injuring cattle sheep or poultry.

(b) that in a township or village is found between sunset and sunrise straying from the premises where the dog is habitually kept.

(c) that is found straying at any time and not under proper control, upon premises where cattle, sheep or poultry are habitually kept.

Section 15, Sub-sec. (1)—where the owner of a dog has knowledge that his dog has killed or injured cattle, sheep or poultry, he shall destroy the dog or cause the dog to be destroyed within forty-eight hours after acquiring such knowledge.

Recently in Jaffray and Melick township three dogs chased and almost killed a valuable heifer. The animal was saved by the interference of the owner.

Any dog owner wishing to possess a dog will be well advised to keep the dog from running at large in Jaffray and Melick, otherwise he runs the risk of having his dog destroyed.

New Way To Cut Milking Chores

Dairymen using D.H.I.A. and R.O.P. for herd records will be interested in this. The Ontario Agricultural College is testing an automatic meter in a pipeline milking system and the results look good.

"Weights proved accurate within one-quarter of a pound in a four-breed test," says O.A.C. Dairy Science Department Head, Dr. D. M. Irvine, "and because the meter is part of the milk pipeline, no air can get into the milk during weighing."

The meter, marketed as a milk-o-meter, costs about \$135 and is one of the two in operation in Canada. Besides recording the milk weight, the machine also is equipped with a sample cut which gives "excellent representations of individual fat content". It has now been R.O.P. approved.

The pipeline meter at the O.A.C. fits between the pipeline and the milker. One meter handles one milker. The machine is composed of four basic parts: an upper shell, a lower shell, a balanced central pan, and a record apparatus. The flow of milk in four-ounce intervals causes a tipping action of the pan, and this continuous process results in weight registration.

Dr. Irvine expects that many dairymen whose herds were on R.O.P. or D.H.I.A. will now take advantage of milk pipelines. They will be able to run the milk from the milkers in the stable or parlour, directly into the bulk tank and thereby save a lot of pall-lifting.

DEFENDS "GIRLIE" MAGAZINES

Toronto—A Toronto psychiatrist came to the defence of "girlie" magazines, and said sex does not begin with reading them.

"I have examined hundreds of sexual offenders and I am not convinced that the cause of any of their acts was the reading of a publication," Dr. John Rich told a panel at the annual meeting of the Parents Action League.

Dr. Rich, director of suburban Thistle-down hospital for Emotionally Disturbed Children, said it is better for adolescents to satisfy their curiosity by looking at "girlie magazines" than by peeping in bedroom windows.

While Dr. Rich was speaking a woman passed him a copy of a magazine with pictures of a half-nude girl in two provocative poses.

He was in the middle of a sentence when the pictures landed in front of him.

"Oh my goodness," he said, "this lady needs treatment." He then added: "This is strictly a clinical reaction on my part."

"I don't think a normal child would be affected by this picture," he continued. "An abnormal one might."

"I think my children would be bored with it. Admittedly they are young. But I wouldn't stop them from seeing it."

Houses Sell Well

Sales outlook for houses across Canada, reports Forbes Gilbertson in The Financial Post, is generally good.

Major centres report sales normal, perhaps slightly better than last year at the same time. One or two report that better weather has brought buyers flocking to see model homes.

At the same time prices are up generally, ranging from very slight amounts to \$700-\$1,200 in a metro area like Toronto. While building costs and labor play a part in this, the real bugaboo is land.

In a key area like Toronto, price of a lot averages around \$6,000-\$7,000, ranging as high as \$9,000 in parts of New York. North of Toronto's Highway 401 in Scarborough Township, lots have been offered at \$5,800. In Stouffville, well outside the Toronto metro area, land is reported to be selling at \$4,500 per lot.

Most serious problem facing builders as a new building season gathers spring momentum is the perennial one of mortgage money.

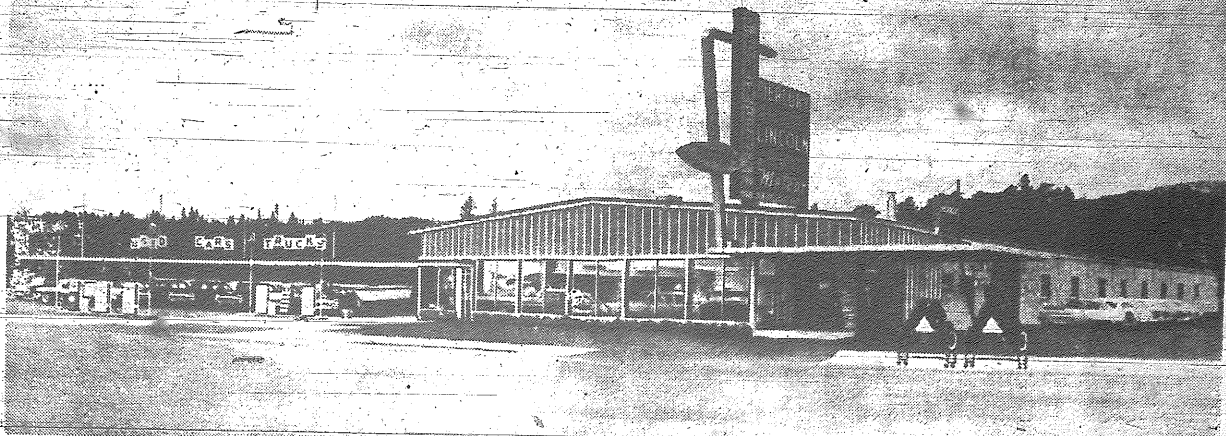

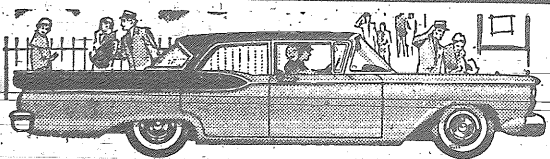
