Walleye Fishing Season Opens In District Today

The Walleye fishing season opens today in Kenora and district. The season has been closed since April 14th.

The Kenora conservation officers today repeated the main rules concerning Ontario angling that really gets going today with the start of the walleye (pickeral) season.

There have been no important changes in regulations since last year, they said, but for the benefit of anglers who are new in this area here are the facts:

- Six walleyes compose the legal daily catch, and only that number can be retained in possession. It used to be that two day's catch made up a possession limit.
 - There is no longer legal size on walleyes.
 - The non-resident license fee remains \$6.50 per individual. There is no longer any family license issued.
- Wardens of the Ontario department of lands and forests also reminded fishing fans of an earlier opening for bass season, June 10, and the June 20 start of muskie fishing. Lake trout are now being

taken.

Limits, in season, for all game fish species found in Lake of the Woods are walleye, six daily; northern pike, six; bass, six; muskie, two; lake trout, five; crappie and perch, no limit.

Other angling dates pertaining to the Kenora area are as follows:

Black Bass, June 10 to December 15.
 Muskie, June 20 to October 15.
 Speckled Trout, May 1 to September 15.
 Splake, May 1 to September 15.
 Lake Trout, no closed season when taken by angling.
 Sturgeon, June 15 to May 14, next following.

Whitefish, no closed season. Limits of catch are as follows:
 Black Bass: six in one day.
 Muskie: Two in one day, not less than 28 inches in length.
 Yellow Pickerel: Six in one day.
 Pike: Six in one day.
 Lake Trout: Five in one day.
 Speckled Trout: One and an additional 14 in one day providing the additional 14 in the aggregate weigh not more than 10 lbs. Not less than seven inches.
 Splake: Three in one day not less than seven inches in length.
 Sturgeon: One in one day.

Note: Possession limit shall not exceed one day's catch. Length is measured from tip of head (jaw closed) to tip of tail (lobes compressed).

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ven. "Be careful (or worried) for nothing, but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God which passes all misunderstanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Jesus Christ."

"Be careful for nothing, that is 'be anxious about nothing.' No anxiety ought to be found in the believer. Great, many, and varied may be our trials and difficulties, yet there should be no anxiety under any circumstances. We have a Father in heaven who is almighty, a Father who loves His children, and whose joy and delight is to help them at all times.

Therefore anxiety should not be found in the children of God, but we should heed the exhortation given us in this verse: "Be anxious about nothing; but in everything by prayer, and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God."

Let us just analyse this verse.

1. "In everything let your requests be made known" - that is not merely when the house is on fire, or when some beloved member of our family is on the brink of the grave, but also in the smallest matters of life. Bring everything before God, even the little things. Let us live in holy communion with our heavenly Father, and with our Lord Jesus Christ all day long. And when we awake at night, by a kind of spiritual instinct let us turn again to Him, speaking to Him, and bringing our various little matters before Him in the sleepless night - the difficulties in connection with our family, our trade, our profession. Whatever tries us in any way, let us speak to the Lord about it. And in like manner, speak to the Lord about our joys, and our easy days. Ask Him to help regarding everything.

2. "By prayer, and supplication" - We ought to wait patiently before God with perseverance, and expectation.

3. "With Thanksgiving" - We should at all times lay a good foundation with thanksgiving. If there is nothing else that you can think of to thank God for there is always this: that He offers to us Salvation and Life, He has given us His Holy Word, His Holy Spirit, and best of all His Son Christ Jesus. Let us not be slow in offering our praise to the Lord, and then - "the peace of God which passes all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." The peace must be known experimentally to be really entered into in all its fullness.

See therefore how you may have this peace of God through paying heed to this exhortation that, in everything - in the most minute affairs of life - we let our requests by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, be known unto God. Albert Wren Speaks To Trades And Labor Group

Albert Wren, M.P.P. for Kenora attended last night's meeting of the Trades & Labour Council held in the basement of the Masonic Hall. The Kenora member was subjected to close questioning by trade unionist present on certain of the recommendations of the Select Committee on Labour Relations. On matters such as Certification, Picketing, Freedom of Speech, Check off, Union shop, the questioning was very intense as questioners sought the reasons for certain observations of the Committee.

The Kenora member answered each question as he interpreted the thinking of the Committee. He pointed out that the Report was not legislation and he would be guided by events of the day and principles involved if and when amendments to existing labour legislation in Ontario were introduced in the legislature.

Mr. Godfrey of Winnipeg was the adviser to the local group in questioning and interpretation and lauded the work of Donald McDonald, Ontario C.C.F. Leader in Ontario. While Albert Wren had supported the railway firemen had stood up for the freedom of association in Trade Unions, had gained pay and wage concessions for truckers in this District in Teamsters, had supported local Carpenters Union in their problems, had successfully argued for no change in medical care for bushworkers, the Winnipeg visitor was delegated to seek aid from Toronto to field a C.C.F. Candidate to speak for labour.

In an interview today, Albert Wren said he had no apologies to make to anyone for his support to working people and he would continue to support the working man in the House. He added that this was a free country and the C.C.F. had every right to run a candidate. If the executive of labour groups want to tie their membership to the C.C.F., they had that right too, which no one can deny them. "In each election we have had a C.C.F. Candidate and I have never expected they would not run this time . . . that is their democratic right."

Canada's first pulp and paper mill was built at St. Andrews near Lachute, Que.

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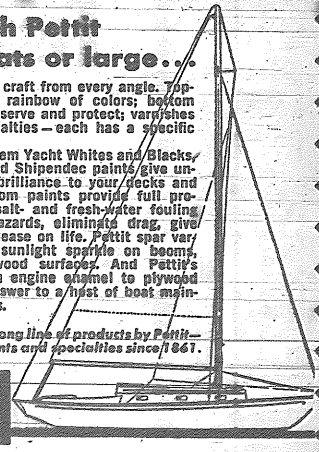

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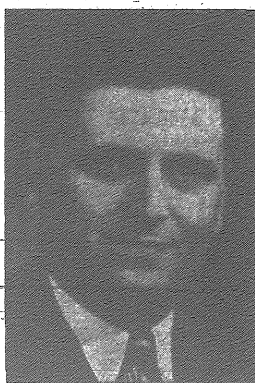
Albert Wren Says:

That the Ontario Liberal Party will combine the Ontario Department of Health and Welfare so that older people will not suffer neglect from jurisdiction of each Department. The hospital insurance scheme would be extended to out-patients, chronically ill, convalescent patients and incurable children. Albert Wren wants too, to explore ways and means of providing pre-paid medical protection.

The Kenora Member advocates a voluntary responsible retirement scheme for all Ontario citizens, geared to cost of living.

ALBERT WREN has long proposed a Health Nurse for all schools in the Districts of Ontario.

In the Indian areas a survey is needed to determine employability and need for welfare services followed by job and vocational training for the Indian people of the North. Health and Welfare has long been a serious concern of ALBERT WREN.

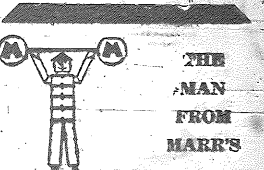

On Monday, May 4th, the district of Kenora Health Unit sponsored a short training course for restaurant personnel in the Legion Building in Kenora. An afternoon class and an evening class were attended by 95 foodhandlers from Kenora, Keewatin, Sioux Narrows and Redditt. The classes were conducted by D. Lemoine and L. Hakenson who gave lectures on restaurant sanitation. Demonstrations of bacterial growth in Petri dishes, dish washing procedures and the effects of chipped and cracked utensils were given. Two films, "How Disease Travels," and "Hashling to Foodhandling" were shown.

This course was then taken to Red Lake and Dryden for afternoon and evening presentations where a total of 47 restaurant employees attended. This training will help to improve sanitation standards in all our eating establishments in the area.

Taylor said, "Education has become everybody's business. That is good. Those of us who are closest to the business of education have sometimes wished that the layman would take more interest in what is happening in the field of education. There is however, the danger that the layman, having acquired a smattering of information will tend to consider himself an expert. We the teachers ought to be saying what should be done and how it should be done. We must be alert to see that our voice is not lost amidst the tumult of other voices." And continuing, she said, "I consider it a partnership in which the Department of Education trustees, and teachers have a common aim - that of providing the best possible education for the children of this province. An important factor in accomplishing this is having co-operation of parents and the public in general."

Borrowed from a recent speech of Sir Ronald Gould in Rome, Italy, Miss Taylor quoted, "Sound work in schools, and high standards of professional behaviour produce the best publicity."

Following the afternoon session, Miss J. Francis, retiring principal and teacher of the Kenora Staff was honoured at a tea. Amid spring flowers and friends, congratulations were extended to her upon completing forty years service in the profession, thirty-eight of those being

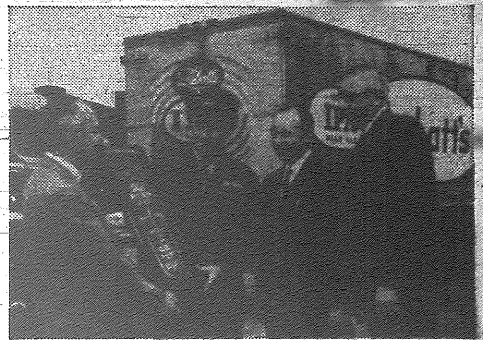

Do have a happy accident-free holiday weekend.

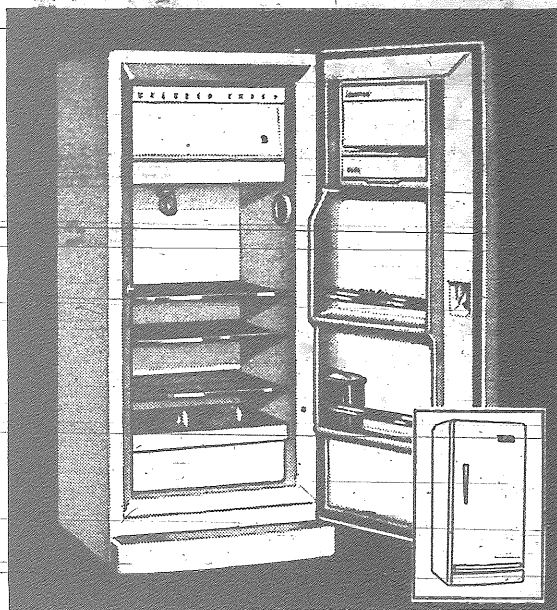
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
