P.C. POLICY LOOKS TO FUTURE SAYS McCAULAY

A fluent speaker with great persuasive powers, the Hon. Robert MacCaulay Q.C. today told a large luncheon gathering of Progressive Conservative party supporters in Keewatin that the Frost Government is "living at

the moment for the future." At the "larger than expected" luncheon held in the Five Spot, the youngest cabinet minister in Canada told his listeners that, while he holds the greatest respect for the past, it is to be the future which we must look. The policies of Government today must be so directed, and Mr. MacCaulay said that the dynamic policy of the Frost Government had made history in the past ten years and would continue to keep Ontario vigorous and prosperous.

The Hon. Bob MacCaulay was recently appointed to head up the new department of Energy and Resources, and today explained briefly the purpose of the new post. Whereas a few years ago there appeared to be a surplus of electrical energy, the Provinces' growth had surpassed predictions and wise decisions of years back today make possible abundant electrical energy. Nuclear energy, gas and coal also fall within the concern of the cabinet minister, who noted that there are still seven possible sites for hydro development in N.W. Ontario, which will be utilized, if needed.

"Thank God no one was hurt. Every one of the 14 employees got out, as well as everyone in the coffee shop." These were the first words of Mr. George Kehler, manager of Penner Motors, following the outbreak of fire shortly after 2.00 p.m. this afternoon, which completely destroyed the modern new garage of Penner Motors (Kenora) Ltd. Within 30 minutes only a twisted shell of concrete blocks and steel remained, together with the skeletons of 2 new cars and six used ones which were in the shop at the time of the outbreak.

CAUSE UNKNOWN

"I really don't know what caused the blaze. It may have been the welding equipment. I really don't know. The fire started along the south wall, midway towards the back. When it got to a large pile of tires, it really got out of control," added Keith Affleck, sales manager. Large supplies of oil, plus numerous cans of paint which had been left over from the recently completed spring clean-up exploded for well over an hour after the initial outbreak, sending debris rocking skywards.

"We have every man and every piece of equipment out to fight the fire," assistant chief Len Whiting said, as he paused

in his work. "As far as I know we have 27 men fighting the fire." Town police and members of the utility department quickly arrived to assist firemen. Hundreds of citizens, drawn by the pall of smoke which drifted skywards were attracted to the scene.

The building, erected only two years ago, measured 88 feet by 146 feet, and the total investment in the premises totalled nearly \$200,000.

Mr. John Penner, president of the Company, when notified of the fire, left by plane immediately for the scene.

It is understood that the building was insured.

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD PLANS WORK AT VARIOUS SCHOOLS

A varied agenda was dealt with by the Public School Board on Tuesday night, May 19.

Accounts totalling \$32,403.69 were approved for payment. It was agreed to proceed immediately with some paving work while a machine was available. At Evergreen School all planned paving will be done, including the bus-stop, volleyball courts, bicycle parking area, and the necessary walks at an anticipated expenditure of \$5,600.00. New System Would Save First Offence Criminal Record

Hamilton — A new system to permit first offenders to escape a criminal record has caught the interest of provincial magistrates and may become common practice.

Almost 100 magistrates attending the Ontario Magistrates convention here this week-end, expressed themselves as favoring a tryout of the system when it was explained by Beamer W. Hopkins, presiding judge of the first Canadian citizen court here.

The system has been recommended by the Fauteux report, and is now under study in the House of Commons, said Judge Hopkins.

His system would mean that a first offender who pleaded guilty would be put under a probation officer's care and then if he convinced the court he intended to "go straight" the guilty plea would not be accepted by the magistrate.

The crown attorney could withdraw the charge and there would be no record.

Previously the first offender who pleaded guilty automatically attained a record.

The Magistrates' association urged that the record of a convicted person put on probation be wiped out if he doesn't repeat the offence within a year. They urged the extension of probation privileges, raising the fees of interpreters, and clarification of the Highway Traffic act.

The association also asked for changes in federal legislation which would make it a criminal charge to skip bail while awaiting trial for an offence against a provincial statute.

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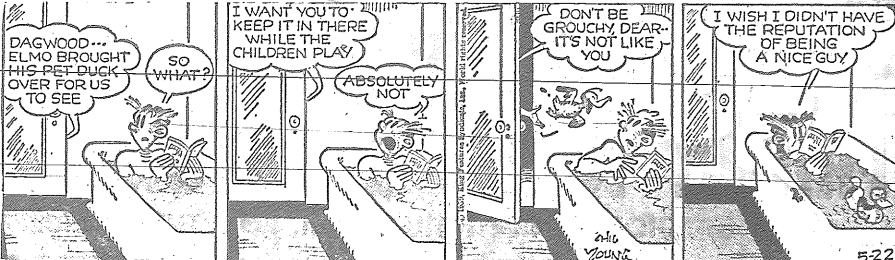

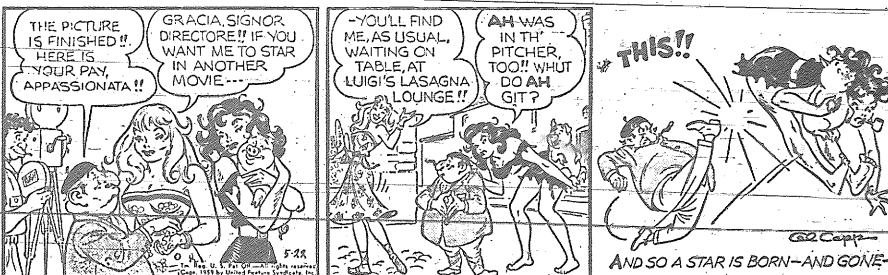

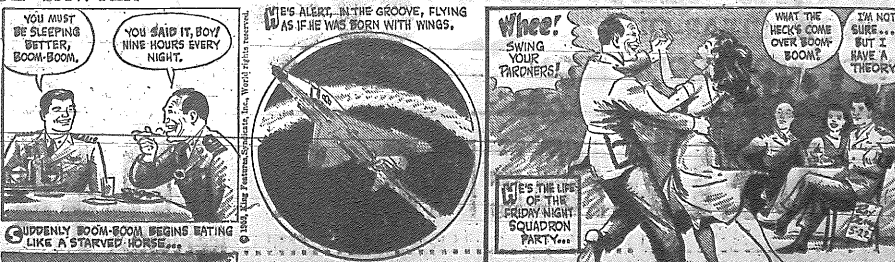

mercy was promised by Mr. MacCaulay. The lakehead ports will be "second to none" on the Great Lakes, under present development plans.

In his report to his supporters, the Minister stressed four phases of Provincial endeavor, which he called the "Four H's" . . . Hydro; Health and Hospital; Housing and Higher education. He stressed the assistance to hospitals, with grants placing these institutions on firm financial footings; the hospital insurance scheme and free polio vaccine.

The key question in the election, thought the Minister, was the matter of education policy. He stated that in the 10 years of government under Premier Frost, the budget for education had been increased from \$3 millions to over \$200 millions. A new teacher's college at the Lakehead was in the immediate future, as well as other aids. He said that the Toronto Star, commenting on the Liberal's promise to assume all education costs, termed such a promise as "irresponsible."

"This is an extremely important election for the people of this riding," said the speaker. "You have a very fine candidate and a tremendous organization. Howard Keffer and Leslie Frost will make an excellent team. I am confident of the verdict June 11th," he concluded.

Water Safety Instructors Course At Fort William

A Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety Instructor's Course will be held on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, June 25, 26, 27 and 29, using the YMCA Pool and the Fort William Red Cross Centre.

The Course is sponsored by the Water Safety Service Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, Ontario Division, in cooperation with the Fort William and Port Arthur Red Cross Branches and the Community Programmes Branch of the Ontario Department of Education.

Applications from any community conducting or planning to conduct a Swimming and Water Safety programme will be welcomed. Applicants should be 18 years of age and hold a Royal Life-Saving Bronze Medalion or equivalent award. Persons who do not meet these prerequisites may register and may be admitted to the Course, depending upon the number enrolled. Applicants who are approved for the Course will be notified of detailed arrangements prior to the Course. Applications must be returned by May 28, 1959.

Railroad Pensioner Man Of Distinction

Calgary, May 21 - The railroad pensioner is a man of distinction, a man with an important place in the modern-day world, a man who can and should build a new career on old foundations.

This was the message given here by G. E. Mayne, Winnipeg, regional vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, to 370 company pensioners at their annual reunion luncheon in the Palliser Hotel.

He gave the history of the C.P.R. Pension Fund, dating back to 1902, one of the first in Canada. It was created by Ford Shaughnessy, President of the C.P.R., who wished to give recognition to the men who had helped push steel across the country, and who had reached

the end of their working day. Then the Company paid the bill; there was no employee contribution.

Now, administered jointly by Company and Union leaders, the fund is still one of the best in Canada, Mr. Mayne said.

Presently there are 15,477 former Canadian Pacific Employees on pension and 2,023 are receiving surviving dependent allowances - a total of 17,500. Among the pensioners there are 50 over the age of 80 and 251 over the age of 85.

HOW'S YOUR MILEAGE?

When car owners get together the first subject is usually "What kind of mileage are you getting out of that bus of yours?"

Some cars, of course, use more gas than others, and give more power and smoothness in return, but the way you drive can have a lot to do with the miles-per-gallon you chalk up.

Highway driving gives better mileage than city driving, but it's not the higher speed that makes the gas go further. The car that gives 20 miles to the gallon at 30 miles an hour will give only 15 miles to the gallon at 60, and 13 miles to the gallon at 70.

It is, of course, the stops and starts of city driving that waste gas. Ten stops in a mile will use twice as much as steady driving at 30.

Under-inflated tires, even if they don't appear soft, can increase gas consumption 5 to 8 percent.

Nervously pushing the accelerator up and down while waiting for a light to change wastes nearly a teaspoonful of gas with each push! Letting the car sit with the engine running can be more wasteful than you'd think. An idling engine can use up a pint of fuel in an hour.

Good care is important, but first of all it takes a good car.

"The girl was blushing like a beetroot when she came round to where I was standing," said Lane, in a letter to the London Star.

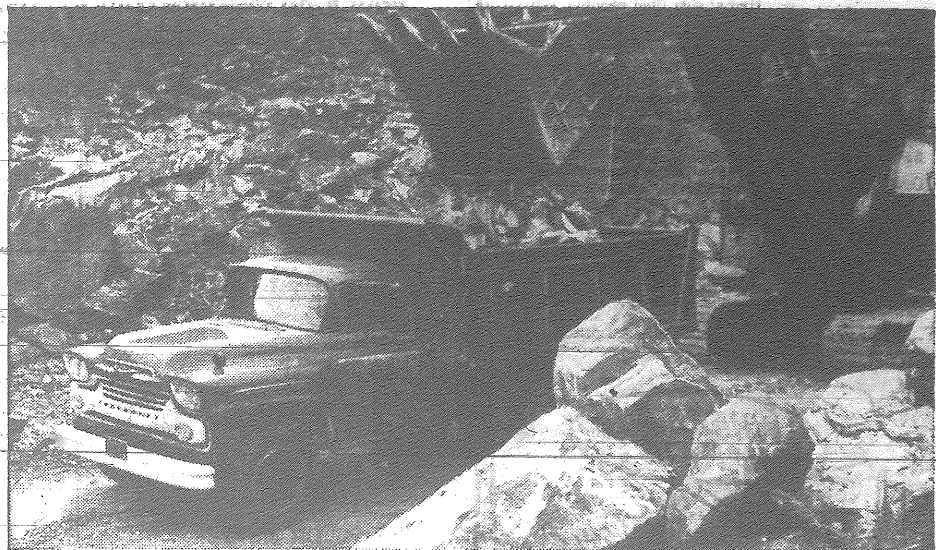
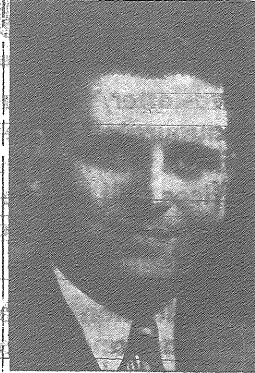
